BATTLE OVER CRAPS

White Boys Try to Break Up Game.

ONE NEGRO KILLED; TWO SHOT

Mob Has Rope Around Neck of Another, but Police Save His Life—Three Whites Are Badly Hurt.

PITTSBURG, Pa., May 31.—One negro was killed and two probably fatally shot, a third was badly beaten and thrown over a hill, and three white boys were severely, but not fatally, wounded in a quarrel over a game of craps at West Liberty this afternoon. The enraged mob of whites had the rope about the neck of the third negro and were dragging him to a tree to lynch him when he was rescued by officers. Both sides had revolvers, and during the battle 100 or more shots were fired. The quarrel was the result of an attempt on the part of the white boys to break up the craps game and stop the gambling. The dead are: CHARLES KELLY, negro, aged 30. The injured: William Davis, negro, probably fatally. "Sandy" Garrett, a negro. George Forter, negro. Leo Kern, white, aged 17. John Pierce, white, aged 17. Joseph Tumbach, white, aged 17. A slight disturbance occurred at the fet given in the Gardens of the People's Hall. The police suppressed the disorder and closed the theater attached to the hall.

JOKER CAUSES PANIC.

Cried Out Tigers in St. Petersburg Zoo Were Loose.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 31.—The energetic precaution taken by the police authorities were ineffective in maintaining order during Friday's celebration of the bicentenary of the foundation of St. Petersburg. In addition to the prohibition of illuminations, several bridges over the Neva were dismantled in order to prevent the people from flocking to the center of the city.

SHOT FROM AMBUSH. Two Men Are Slain by Concealed Marksman.

LONDON, Ky., May 31.—John Farmer and a young man named Whitaker, have been killed near Bernstadt. A brother of Whitaker was slightly wounded. The survivor stated that he was riding some distance behind the other two men when he heard shots fired.

FRENCH GENERAL ATTACKED. Moors Wound Thirteen Members of His Party.

LONDON, May 31.—Advices from Algeria report that M. Jonnert, the governor general, was attacked by Moors near Fighig, while journeying from Djennat-Bou-Dar to Bonassouf with a large party. A brisk fusillade ensued, in which 13 persons were seriously wounded. M. Jonnert was not hurt.

Moore, chief of the Weather Bureau, may never be recorded a place in the Hall of Fame, but future generations are likely to rise up and call him blessed. WAITE WANTED IN MANILA

ARRESTED BY UNITED STATES MARSHAL IN SEATTLE.

Alleged to Have Taken \$6000 of Bank's Money With Him When He Left the Islands.

SEATTLE, May 31.—Deputy United States Marshal John Stringer arrived in Seattle this morning, having under arrest Ed L. Waite, who is wanted in Manila for embezzlement. Waite left Manila May 2, taking with him, it is alleged, \$6000 of the money of Colonel Newberry's bank, of which he was cashier. He was traced from the Philippines to Hong Kong, where he boarded the steamship Tartar for Vancouver, B. C., and the authorities at Washington were notified.

FILIPINO FANATIC MUST DIE. Rios Is Convicted of Murder and Sentenced to Death.

MANILA, May 31.—Senor Rios, the fanatic Filipino leader in the Province of Tayabas, who was captured about a month ago, has been convicted of murder and sentenced to death. Twenty-seven of his followers were also sentenced to various terms of imprisonment.

SMITH ANSWERS TULLOCH

EX-POSTMASTER PASSED ON IRREGULARITIES AT TIME.

LONDON, May 31.—The British Consul at Erzerum reports that an official estimate places the number of persons killed in the earthquake in the Van district of Asiatic Turkey at 800, while the loss of cattle was incalculable, owing to the lateness of the Spring, a large majority of the animals being indoors.

PARIS POLICE CHARGE CROWD. Free Thinkers Attempt to Make Demonstration.

PARIS, May 31.—The Free Thinkers and Anti-Clericals attempted to make a manifestation in the Place de la Republique today, but an imposing display of the police and the Republican Guard prevented the carrying out of their plans.

Even Innocent Divorcees. LONDON, May 31.—The Bishop of London, in an open notice, reiterating that there is no official obligation upon the clergy to remarry guilty divorcees, and discouraging the marriages in church of those who are divorced, threatened action in the ecclesiastical courts against offending clergymen.

McGovern Loses Forfeit Money. NEW YORK, May 31.—Sam Hannis, manager for York McGovern, announced tonight that the battle with Abe Attell, which was suspended on June 25, has been declared off, and the \$1000 posted with the International Athletic Club, of Buffalo, will be forfeited.

Sailboat Is Overtaken. BRISTOL, R. I., May 31.—While trying to reach a sailboat anchored in Mount Hope this evening, a party of Fall River yachtsmen were captured and three of them were drowned. Two of the others were in a serious condition when rescued from the water.
