NAVY WILL PUNISH

Bremerton Will Get No More
Ships for a Time.

OFFICIAL REPORT CAPS CLIMAX

Assistant Secretary Darling Declares
the City Must Get Rid of the
Saloons, Even if They Have
to Be Purchased.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, June 1.—"Until we have some visible evidence that Bremerton intends to comply with our demands for an improvement in the surroundings of the Puget Sound navy-yard, no more vessels will be ordered there for repairs," said Assistant Secretary Darling today, after reading the full report of Captain Bleeker. Captain Bleeker states that a large majority of the citizens of Bremerton are sincere in their desire to clear the town of questionable resorts and to conform to the requirements of the Navy Department, but intimates that there is no way of closing up the saloons until their licenses expire. There are now 15 saloons in the town, six on Front street, two, it is said, operating without valid license. One saloon-keeper voluntarily went out of business since December. Five licenses will expire in September, and others not until December. To allow these saloons to run until that time is not satisfactory to the department.

Saloons Must Go or Work Will Stop.
"We do not care how they get rid of the saloons," says Secretary Darling. "They can buy them out, revoke their licenses or take some other method, if they are determined to reform. But the saloons must go, or work will stop."

Captain Bleeker reports that Bremerton is now saddled with a \$4000 debt, and between the lines the Secretary reads that Bremerton does not want to close the saloons until this debt has been cleared. "Captain Bleeker's report," says Secretary Darling, "clearly shows that, notwithstanding their promises of reform and their reports of reform made last winter, the authorities of Bremerton have absolutely nothing in that direction. Now they must stand the consequences. Orders were issued for the Marshfield and Boston to go to Mare Island for repairs, and the New York will also be repaired there if she can reach the yard. There is to be \$10,000 expended on these vessels that was to have been spent at Bremerton, and this, with the work on the Philadelphia and the Wisconsin, would have meant the expenditure of several hundreds of thousands of dollars on Puget Sound. If Bremerton prefers to raise \$4000 from liquor licenses to having this great amount of Government money paid out in wages to its citizens, all right."

The Ranger, which has just arrived at Bremerton, will for the present lie idle. The department has not decided whether this ship will be sent back to Mare Island for repairs. Captain Bleeker's report shows that the licenses of all gambling-

houses have been revoked, and all such resorts have been closed since January.

Captain Bleeker, in his report, says the run element in Bremerton, in sympathy with whom are three members of the City Council, succeeded in forcing the renewal of the licenses of two saloons which expired in April, but the Mayor refused to sign these licenses, and no money has been received for them. The commanding officer of the receiving-ship Nipsic, in a report, says:

"Mass meetings were held recently at which these members of the Council were denounced, and a committee was appointed to request them to resign their offices. This they refused to do. Efforts have been made and are being made by the respectable members of the Council to prosecute these two saloonkeepers, but through the powerful influence of the saloon element and their sympathizers obstacles have thus far defeated justice. I believe the large majority of the citizens of Bremerton are sincere in their desire to clear the town of objectionable resorts."

PUBLIC DEBT SHOWS DECREASE

Month of May Has a Reduction of
\$2,247,385 to Its Credit.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—The monthly statement of the public debt shows that at the close of business May 2, 1903, the total debt, less cash in the Treasury, amounted to \$1,130,556,900, a decrease for the month of \$2,247,385. The debt is recapitulated as follows:
Treasury notes outstanding \$514,541,760
Debt on which interest has ceased since maturity 1,294,900
Debt bearing no interest 256,170,000
Total \$1,130,556,900
This amount, however, does not include \$38,752,369 in certificates and treasury notes outstanding. The cash in the treasury is classified as follows:
Gold reserve fund \$150,000,000
Trust fund 593,763,809
General fund 313,657,070
This latter fund includes \$150,557,346 in National Bank deposits, and \$8,549,469 in the Treasury of the Philippines to the credit of the United States disbursing officers, total \$1,57,459,735, against which there are demand liabilities outstanding amounting to \$482,151,641, which leaves a cash balance on hand of \$75,358,367.
The total receipts of the Government for the month of May were \$44,133,669, and the disbursements \$46,381,054. The total receipts for the 11 months of the present fiscal year were \$510,533,471, and the expenditures \$471,888,582, leaving a surplus for the 11 months of \$38,644,889. Last year the surplus on June 1 was \$78,556,100.

CRY OF POSTAL FRAUD BASELESS.

"Excess" Payments More Than the
Rest of New York Offices.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—The case of August W. Machen, ex-General Superintendent of the free delivery system of the Postoffice Department, who was arrested on a charge of receiving a percentage of the profits of a concern furnishing supplies to the Postoffice Department, will be presented to the grand jury next Wednesday.
Postmaster-General Payne today called attention to the public charge that the amounts paid for rentals of postoffices in New York State exceed what they should be by over \$200,000.
"The fact is," he said, "that the total amount of rentals for postoffices in the state last year aggregated only \$468,311.31. This includes rentals for light and heating." Postoffice Inspector Mayer was in conference with Assistant United States District Attorney Taggart this afternoon in connection with the presentation of the Machen case to the grand jury. Postoffice officials deny that any immediate arrests are in contemplation. They do not say that such steps might occur at any minute.

WHITAKER WRIGHT LOSES

NOTED PROMOTER MUST GO TO
ENGLAND FOR TRIAL.

United States Supreme Court Holds
That the Crime Alleged is an
Extraditable One.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—The United States Supreme Court today refused to grant a writ of habeas corpus in the case of Whitaker Wright, the financial promoter, who is in custody awaiting extradition on charges of fraud in England. The opinion affirms the decision of the United States Circuit Court for the Southern District of New York, which held that the crime alleged against Wright is an extraditable offense under the terms of the treaty between the United States and Great Britain. Wright is in the custody of Marshal Hendon, under an order of commitment issued by United States Commissioner Alexander, of New York, before whom the complaint was made by the British Consul-General at New York. That complaint charged Wright with having committed fraud in England, while acting as a director of an English corporation.

Today's decision sustains the lower court in its refusal to admit Wright to bail.

HIS CONVICTION HELD LEGAL.

Supreme Court Passes on Fine Point
of Law Affecting Hawaii.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—The United States Supreme Court, in an opinion by Justice Brown, today decided the case of the Territory of Hawaii vs. Oaki Mauchichi, a Japanese, who was convicted of manslaughter and sentenced to 20 years' imprisonment in Hawaii under the laws of the Hawaiian Republic adversely to the claim of the prisoner that his conviction was illegal and invalid.
In delivering the opinion of the court, Justice Brown quoted the provision of the annexation resolution to the effect that "the municipal legislation of the Hawaiian Islands enacted for the maintenance of order, and not inconsistent with this general resolution, nor contrary to the Constitution of the United States, nor to any existing treaty of the United States shall remain in force until Congress of the United States shall otherwise determine." He said that the question at issue is whether in continuing the municipal legislation of the Islands not contrary to the Constitution of the United States, it was intended to abolish at once the criminal procedure there in force in the Islands and to substitute at once and without new constitution the common law proceedings by grand jury and petit jury which had been held applicable to other organized territories. He said that if the literal meaning of the resolution should be accepted, Mauchichi would be entitled to his discharge, but added that the intention of the legislative body should be taken into consideration. The decree of the Circuit Court for the Territory of Hawaii, therefore, was ordered reversed and the case remanded with instructions to dismiss the petition. In his dissenting opinion, Justice Harlan said that under the majority's opinion, Congress could keep in force the Hawaiian laws relating to criminal matters even though in direct conflict with the provisions of our own Constitution. This, he said, assumed the possession of power of Congress quite as omnipotent as that of the English Parliament. In his judgment, Congress had no power to withhold the fundamental guarantees of life and liberty from any people over whom we exercised sovereignty.
Attorney Morse, in behalf of counsel for Mauchichi, presented a motion for leave to file a petition for a rehearing, and a stay of the mandate in the case. The Chief Justice said that the motion would be entered, and that the entering

of the motion would necessarily act as a stay of the mandate.

Coinage of Mints for May.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—The total coinage executed at the mints of the United States during May was \$1,790,686, as follows:
Gold \$2,000
Silver 1,584,000
Minor coins 127,686
These amounts are exclusive of the coinage for the Philippines, which aggregated for the months of April and May \$1,812,396 pesos.

Castro's Order Will Be Recognized.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—It is probable that the United States Government will recognize the legality of President Castro's decree closing a number of ports in Venezuela in the possession of the insurgents. Technically, this decree does not constitute a blockade, but probably the consequence of its enforcement would be similar to one.

Kansas Given Leave to Amend BILL.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—The United States Supreme Court today granted leave to the State of Kansas to file an amended bill in the original proceeding of the state against the State of Colorado to restrain the latter in the use for irrigation of the waters of the Arkansas River. Colorado was given leave to file a reply.

American Treaty With Cuba Up.

HAVANA, June 1.—The permanent treaty between Cuba and the United States, accompanied by a message of transmission from President Poincaré, was read in the Senate today, and referred to the committee on foreign relations.

Supreme Court Adjourns.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—The United States Supreme Court adjourned for the term today, after delivering some 40 opinions.

CAUGHT BY MOLTEN LEAD

Three Men Are Cooked Alive Without the Least Warning.

PUEBLO, Colo., June 1.—While a gang of laborers were digging a trench near one of the blast furnaces at the Colorado Fuel & Iron Company's steel works this evening, the vent at the base of the furnace opened without warning, and molten iron and blazing gas came pouring upon them. Antons, fell down a steep collar on the side of the fiery material, amid a cloud of hissing steam and smoke. Three of the men were literally cooked alive, their clothes burned off and the skin so blistered that they are unrecognizable. The horrified workmen pulled them out as quickly as possible and rolled them in a muddy pool near by. They were then hurried to the hospital, but are suffering agonies, and the doctors say they will all die. The men are Austrians.

Journalist Falls to His Death.

SANTA FE, N. M., June 1.—George H. Cross, a veteran journalist of New Mexico, fell down a steep collar on the Plaza, and was killed. He was the founder of a daily newspaper at St. Joseph, Mo., and for several years was editor of the Optic at Las Vegas and the New Mexican at Santa Fe.

Three Killed in Explosion.

ELMIRA, N. Y., June 1.—An explosion at 5:30 this afternoon destroyed the plant where Jovite, a high explosive, was manufactured. Three men were killed.

Merger Case Is Advanced.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—The Supreme Court of the United States today granted the motion made by Solicitor-General Hoyt two weeks ago, to advance the case of the Northern Securities Company. The court fixed December 14 next as the date for argument.

French Surrounded in China.

PARIS, June 1.—A dispatch from Saigon, capital of French Indo-China, says

Governor-General Beau has been detained in Tonquin by the serious conditions prevailing in the adjoining province of Yuan Nan, where the rebellion is spreading. Two hundred French subjects are surrounded at Yuan Nan Pu and the Hong Tse railroad works are interrupted.

Of the Pace in High Finance.

Boston Herald.
Mr. Harriman's vermillion appendix is removed. Mr. Morgan is at Aix-les-Bains for his complaint. Mr. Gates has been ordered to rest for his stomach trouble. William Rockefeller, Henry O. Havemeyer, H. H. Rogers and George V. Babcock are among the other distinguished financiers who have been previously operated upon for appendicitis, and these are only samples. It's the pace in high finance that either kills or calls for the surgeon's knife.

French Budget Without a Deficit.

NEW YORK, June 1.—Minister of Finance Rouvier, by insisting on rigid economy in his departments, has succeeded in drawing up a budget without a deficit, says a Paris correspondent of the Herald. There still remains, however, the settlement of the floating debt created by the deficits of the last four years. For this he proposes to issue a consolidation loan.

New York Had a Dry May.

NEW YORK, June 1.—Although cold, damp winds marked its close, the month of May established a new record in this city for drought, and approached within one degree of the record for heat in that month. In the 31 days of May and the last 14 days of April, only one-quarter of an inch of rain fell.

Prince Henry's Flagship Aground.

PARIS, June 1.—The German cruiser Ariadne, flagship of Admiral Prince Henry of Prussia, which arrived at Brest with the rest of the German squadron, May 31, grounded amidships today on the extension of the breakwater now in course of construction at Brest.

Jews Are Thankful to America.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 1.—The American subscription for the relief of the sufferers at Kishinev have been gratefully acknowledged by the Jewish community, which recognizes that the United States has easily taken the lead both in material and moral sympathy.
