IOWANS HAIL CHIEF

Roosevelt Visits the Home of Secretary Shaw.

DENISON IS WILD WITH JOY

Hundreds of Doves, as Emblems of Peace, Are Released as President Rises to Speak—He Pays High Tribute to Shaw.

DENISON, Ia., June 2.—The special train bearing President Roosevelt and party arrived in Denison, via the Illinois Central, on time. During the morning hours, heavy-laden excursion trains arrived from all points. The Presidential party and other distinguished guests were driven through the city past the homes of Secretary Shaw and Representative Connor, through cheering crowds and returned to the station, where they found a crowd of not less than 10,000 people assembled. The President was introduced by Secretary Shaw, who was received by the people of his home with a tremendous ovation. Senators Allison and Dolliver also joined the party here.

The crowd went wild when the President arose to speak, and it was several minutes before the cheering ceased. Just as the President arose, hundreds of white doves were released from the crowd in front of him, and these emblems of peace hovered about the President's head and evoked an outburst of applause. The President spoke for nearly 20 minutes, and paid special tribute to the Iowa member of the Cabinet.

HIGH PRAISE FOR IOWANS.

President Sees in Them the Qualities That Overcome Misfortune.

DENISON, Ia., June 2.—The President's address here this morning dealt with the flood situation and was as follows: "Friends—At this time as I come into your beautiful state there have come calamities upon your people here in Iowa, and to an even greater degree in Kansas and Missouri. I see by today's papers the awful disaster in Georgia.

"We have Biblical authority, as well as the authority of common sense, for the statement that the rain falls on the just and on the unjust alike.

"When the hand of the Lord is heavy on anybody, the wisdom of man can do but little. Now and then in our country, from drought, from flood, from pestilence, trouble and misfortune will come, but oh, my friends, as I drive through your city this morning and now as I look at you, the men and women of this state, I know that all your troubles are temporary, that your misfortunes will be met and overcome, because in heart and hand the American citizen is able to win his way in the long run.

"When misfortune that human wisdom cannot avoid comes, of course there will be suffering, there will be misery. Those

of us who are free from it can try and must try to lighten it all we can, but we cannot help the fact that there will be much suffering. Furthermore, if through our own folly we do what is wrong, if we act foolishly in matters of legislation, we shall pay the penalty. If the business world loses its head it has lost what no law can supply, but in spite of that we shall go forward.

"We shall keep in the run, not only of adding, but of increasing prosperity, if as people we only keep our sanity, if as people we keep the qualities which made us win out in the Civil War, and which have brought us in triumph through other crises, so far.

"Some think a good deal can be done by law, a good deal can be done by honest and upright administration of the law. I think you will do me the justice to say that I do not say what I do not mean. I never said anything of the stamp that I would not say on the stump, so what I say now you can take as sincere. We have, in the persons of Iowa's representatives in both branches of the National Congress, in Iowa's representatives in the administrative branches of the National Government, men to whom I can turn as illustrating what I mean when I say that we are helped greatly by good laws and by intelligent business and honest administration of those laws. We need the ability that you in Iowa have furnished in your public servants. We need the standard of integrity that you have set in public life. We need that uprightness and fearlessness in a public servant which makes him do his duty, disregarding either the clamor of the many or the snarling of the few. We need that integrity, a course of conduct demanded by regard for the immutable law of righteousness."

SECRETARY MOODY ARRIVES HOME

He Discusses the President's Tour and His Appeal for a Great Navy.

WASHINGTON, June 2.—Secretary Moody returned to Washington today from his trip through the West, during which he spent almost the entire month of May with the President, joining him when he entered California, and leaving him last Sunday morning. The Secretary said he was enjoying his trip thoroughly, and is enthusiastically received everywhere. Secretary Moody says the President aims to create a sentiment in favor of a larger Navy, notably in the interior of the country, where the people do not have the opportunity to see warships. Secretary Moody himself is anxious there shall be no retrogression in our naval program.

Secretary Moody declines to say whether he would recommend the construction of five battleships by the next session of Congress, an inference deduced in some quarters as a result of his speech at Salt Lake, when he told the Governor that if the next Congress treated the Navy as well as the last, he would name one of the battleships in honor of the State of Utah, nor was he prepared to say whether the Administration had in contemplation a general naval program with a view to the construction of five such ships a year.

While his remarks at Salt Lake were made in a facetious way, yet there is no doubt the Secretary heartily favors the gradual addition of ships to the Navy so that it may be adequate to what, in his opinion, are the needs of the Nation within a few years. The Secretary said tonight that recruiting in the Navy will be resumed tomorrow.

Grand Island Is Disappointed.

GRAND ISLAND, Neb., June 2.—President Roosevelt's train reached Grand Island at 11 o'clock last night. A large crowd was at the station to greet the President, but he had retired during the run from North Platte.

LARGE BANK FAILS

Ames & Co., of Toronto, Suspend Payment.

VICTIMS OF THE STOCK MARKET

Heavy Declines in Canadian Securities Prove Ruinous—Firm Is One of the Largest in the Dominion.

TORONTO, Ont., June 2.—A. E. Ames & Co., one of the leading firms of bankers and brokers in Canada, closed their doors today. Their failure was due to heavy declines in Canadian securities, which have been extensively dealt in on the New York and Boston exchanges, as well as on the exchanges here and at Montreal. It is stated that when market conditions have become settled and the securities held by the company and their customers reach figures approximating something like their actual value, the assets of the company will fully offset its liabilities.

The stocks in which Ames & Co. and their clients have been largely interested are in Dominion steel companies, purchased around \$20, and which are now selling at \$15 per share; Schloer-Sheffield, and other industrial purchased at figures much higher than their present price. Twix City, which has declined from \$18 to \$2, was another stock held in large blocks by the firm's clients. After a meeting of the members of the firm, it was decided to suspend payment. The following notice was posted:

"Owing to the continuous severe decline in the securities market we have found it necessary to suspend payment, and would ask the indulgence of our friends for a few days until we can prepare a statement of our affairs and decide what is best to be done.

"A. E. AMES & CO." On this announcement a panic ensued on the Stock Exchange. Hundreds of persons gathered in front of the offices of the company, clamoring for information as to the extent of the firm's liabilities. The last statement of the savings bank department of the firm showed \$200,000 on deposit. It is impossible to figure the firm's total liabilities at the present time, owing to the extensive fluctuations in prices of securities in which the company and its clients are heavily interested.

It is stated on good authority that Mr. Ames has put \$100,000 in the business, and the other members of the firm, R. Tudhope, E. D. Frazer and A. E. Wallace, sums aggregating nearly the same amount.

It is known that one of the Toronto banks recently advanced \$300,000 to Ames & Co. in the hope that that amount would be sufficient to tide over the affairs of the firm. Ten million dollars is the amount of the firm's liabilities as generally agreed upon by bankers and brokers. Against this amount the company holds securities which, in any half normal condition of the market, would be ample.

Stocks Demoralized at Boston.

BOSTON, June 2.—News of the failure of A. E. Ames & Co. threw the Canadian stocks listed on the Boston Stock Exchange into complete demoralization. Dominion Coal common declined from \$5

to \$3. Dominion Iron & Steel, which opened at 12 1/2, touched 13 1/2, a new record, but rallied to 14, later declining. Canadian Pacific fell 3 points to 115 1/2.

FAILURE FELT IN WALL STREET.

Canadian Stocks Held by the Bank Make Big Declines.

NEW YORK, June 2.—The panic in Montreal was reflected in the New York stock market only in such stocks as are traded in on Montreal account, which are known as the Canadian group in New York. An extreme decline of over 12 points in Twin City Rapid Transit was the most conspicuous instance, but Canadian Pacific, Minneapolis, St. Paul and Sault Ste. Marie stocks and Detroit United Railway were down from 1 1/2 to 5 points. The general market was affected and the result was to make the bears cover. Canadian Pacific showed good rallies later in the day.

Ames & Co. have several correspondents in the city, including two exchange firms, Laidlaw & Co. and W. H. Goodby & Co. The insolvent firm is said to be one of the largest and best-known in Canada. The amount of Ames & Co.'s assets and liabilities is not even approximately here. It is not believed that either of the local representatives are at all involved financially. The firm of A. E. Ames & Co. is a commercial rating of more than \$1,000,000.

FRANCE ALARMS JAPAN.

Incursion of Troops Causes a Protest to Be Entered.

VICTORIA, B. C., June 2.—The crisis in China grows apace, according to news received by the Empress of China, for not only is the situation grave in the north, but also in the South, for with the incursion of French troops across the Kwangsi borders, Peking has become greatly alarmed. On the arrival of the French force at Chinan, Governor Wang Chih Chung, of Kwangsi, asked the French Consul to demand their withdrawal, but he replied he had no authority over the forces. Peking correspondents say that it is considered at Peking that the action of the French in the South is taken for the purpose of creating a pretext in favor of Russia. An influential petition has been received at Peking from Hong Kong asking for the dismissal of Governor Wang Chih Chung on the ground that he is in league with the French.

The situation regarding Manchuria was very grave when the Empress called. Reliable reports published by the Japanese papers told of continued war preparations. A Chee Foo dispatch said that Russians were busily chartering steamers to carry troops and arms to Taku Shan and Yalu.

It is reported that the Nippon Yusen Kaisha has been asked to hold its fleet in readiness for transports. Stories of large accumulations of troops by Russians and Japanese are frequent in Japan papers. The Russian squadron was maneuvering off the Yalu when the Empress sailed, on May 22.

Mr. Sun, Governor of Moukden, arrived at Moukden and interviewed there, said Russia aims at securing permanent possession of Manchuria and the mouth of the Yalu.

Japan-China Postal Convention.

TOKIO, May 22, via Victoria, B. C., June 2.—The Japan-China postal convention regarding mail service was signed at Peking by the Japanese Minister and Sir Robert Hart, on May 12. The convention will become effective after two months from that date. By its terms ordinary mails will be forwarded from Japan to any part of China and vice versa at the same rate of postage as that of the domestic service now in operation in Japan.

Serious Rioting in Croatia.

VIENNA, June 2.—The entire garrison of Agram, capital of Croatia, was called out to clear the streets of rioters yesterday. A number of persons were injured
