

KILLS HIS PARTNER

H. M. St. Cyr Shoots Archie Emmons in Idaho.

THEIR DISPUTE IS OVER A TEAM

Slayer Claims Self-Defense, but Witnesses Say That It Was a Most Foul Murder—St. Cyr Gives Himself Up.

BOISE, Idaho, June 4.—H. M. St. Cyr is in jail at Weiser charged with the murder of Archie Emmons last evening at Lardo, on Payette Lake, where the men ran a hotel. They had dissolved partnership, but there was a dispute between them over the ownership of a team.

Emmons got the team and was driving it up the road when St. Cyr stepped out of his house with a rifle and taking deliberate aim shot Emmons through the head. The victim fell out of the wagon and lay face down in the road. St. Cyr drew his revolver and shot the prostrate man through the head again.

The coroner held an inquest and the jury returned a verdict of "murder." St. Cyr was taken to the jail and given himself up and was brought to Weiser this evening. The crime was committed in Boise County and Sheriff McDevitt is on his way to Weiser to get the prisoner.

When St. Cyr gave himself up he claimed he had shot in self-defense, but it seems the story is as given.

St. Cyr was at one time a locomotive engineer on the O. & N. Afterward he posed as a mining expert and more recently started the Payette Lake Hotel. Emmons is spoken of as having been a good man.

KRESSLY TALKS OF FORGERIES.

Strange Attitude Provokes Suspicion of Insanity.

SPOKANE, Wash., June 4.—(Special).—Stretched out wearily upon his back, with a wet towel wrapped around his head, Foster Howard Kressly talked last night for two hours about the remarkable career of crime in which he has been engaged for the past six months. Kressly was in jail at a driver's house, but will move down town tomorrow. With no more apparent concern than would be shown by a child telling of toys, the young man who for years had been at the top notch as a criminal, today discussed a gigantic series of forgeries that may reach 1,000,000 shares of stock.

Kressly appears to be unbalanced in mind. Kressly confessed he has been forging the name of Colonel William M. Ridpath, president of the Lucille Dreyfus Mining Company, to certificates of stock in the company and securing heavy loans on security. The broker's affairs are in such a tangled condition that the extent of his defalcations are only guessed at about \$50,000 worth of stock.

He was visited yesterday by a dozen mining men who had been deceived by him. The stranger part of the affair is that they are giving him all the help and comfort in their power.

"Prosecute me!" he exclaimed with surprise, in answer to a question. "Why should anybody prosecute me? I never meant to harm a soul. All that stock that I forged was issued just to tide me over for a little while. You see, it is easy to write a name. Ridpath's name. Anybody could learn to do it in ten minutes."

Picking up a fountain-pen and a piece of paper, he put the pen carefully between his fingers and said, "I will rapidly write 'W. M. Ridpath.' 'No, that's a bad R,' he exclaimed. Starting in again, he wrote out the name in close cursive to the real signature. Then changing the manner of holding the pen, at request he wrote his own name beneath it. The complete difference in the two was startling.

So good is his forgery that J. C. Williams, who has known Colonel Ridpath in close business relations for years, declared absolutely that one of the forgeries shown him on Dreyfus stock several days ago was genuine. Colonel Williams had been puzzled to detect the difference.

WESTENDORF HAS RESIGNED.

Long Superintendent of the Washington State Reform School.

CHEHALIS, Wash., June 4.—(Special).—Thomas P. Westendorf, who has for the past 12 years been superintendent of the State Reform School, has resigned his position and tendered his resignation to the State Board of Control. Tuesday Mr. Westendorf was summoned to Olympia by the board and Governor McBride and his resignation accepted.

The action is the outcome of the long-continued fight, dating back several years, which has been made against the superintendent. It is understood that the board has a new man selected to take charge of the school.

During the incumbency of Professor Westendorf, Mrs. Westendorf, who has acted as matron, the Reform School has been the reputation of being one of the best-conducted institutions of its kind in the United States, both the pecuniary and the work, having devoted their lives to it.

WOMAN GIVES MURDERER AWAY.

Negro Ex-Soldier Slays an Elderly Lady for Her Money.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 4.—Miss Annie Ross, a white woman of this city, visited the police office and said that about a month ago she visited Oakland in company with a negro ex-soldier named Walker, and remained there three days with him. They visited Mrs. Elizabeth Le Roy, colored, aged 82 years, president of the Ladies' Union. Mrs. Le Roy exhibited \$40 in coin, and Miss Ross says Walker's cupidity was so aroused that he murdered the woman and buried her body in the back yard.

The police later unearthed the body and are now searching for Walker. The murder is now being investigated by the police and since the crime had been in the County Hospital here.

PREMIER M'BRIDE'S CABINET.

Four Have Been Named for Portfolio.

MEMBERS OF STATE BOARD.

Governor McBride Names Men Educators to Fill Women's Places.

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 4.—(Special).—Governor McBride today named three members of the new State Board of Education. He has appointed Professor S. W. Terkel of Seattle, the successor of Mrs. Ryan, of Vancouver; Professor J. M. Hitt, of Port Townsend, to succeed Miss Sarah Lawton, of Spokane, and Professor J. W. Shapiro, of Seattle, to succeed Miss Grace Henderson, of St. John.

The old board has been in session here for the past three days and adjourned to meet Monday, June 22. When the board reassembles it will be after the new members qualify.

These three appointees are named for a term expiring March 1, 1906. Mrs. Carrie Shaw Rice, of Tacoma, is the other member of the board whose term has expired, but the Governor has made no appointment as yet for that place.

W. J. IDEMAN IN JAIL.

Charged With Embezzlement of \$10,000.

SEATTLE, June 4.—A special to the Post-Intelligencer from Oregon says: W. J. Idelman, the Deputy Collector of United States Customs at the boundary of the Forty-Mile River, is in jail at Eagle City, charged with embezzlement. He was imprisoned by United States Commissioner Samuel Graef. Idelman was taken to Eagle City yesterday by Deputy United States Marshal F. W. Clayton. His reported shortage is \$10,000.

It was reported some time since that Idelman was to be removed, but nothing serious was publicly suspected.

FIGHT DUEL WITH RIFLES.

Foreman and Sheepherder Shoot Without Scoring.

WEISER, Idaho, June 4.—(Special).—A duel with rifles was fought at the sheep shearing plant of N. H. Cottrell, about 30 miles from Weiser, last Saturday. Both men were slightly wounded. The matter was kept quiet and no arrests were made.

Bob White, one of the duellists, was foreman for Mack Olson, a prominent sheepman. He discharged a man named Vermillion for some misconduct. Vermillion became enraged and went to the camp, where he armed himself with a .38 Winchester rifle and defied any one to approach the camp.

White went to another camp near by and secured a 30-30 Winchester. Approaching the camp he ordered Vermillion to leave. Instead of doing this he began shooting at White, inflicting minor wounds. White retreated to a shallow gulch near by. Just as he was about to fire, Vermillion struck him in the hip inflicting a slight wound.

LOWER FREIGHTS WEST.

GREAT NORTHERN TO FAVOR NORTH PACIFIC COAST.

Reduction Soon to Be Announced Will Tend to Bring Cars West for Incoming Shipments.

SEATTLE, June 4.—The Great Northern Railway will in a few days announce another amendment to the freight tariff which promises to reduce rates from all points East to the North Pacific Coast. This reduction is in line with the policy which has been established by President James J. Hill that as soon as the shipments offered the road to the North Coast would justify, the rates would be reduced to give to ships on the coast the same that section by rail instead of ocean, that a supply of cars may be kept on the Coast to handle the East-bound shipments from this territory.

The first amendment to the tariff was announced a month ago, reducing the rate on about 500 commodities, being a saving of 10 per cent. in this section of from 10 to 20 per cent. Similar reductions were made by the Southern lines. The matter did not take on the nature of a fight, for the rates were put into effect as a permanent feature and part of the policy of the Great Northern road.

It is understood that the second amendment is to include a greater number of articles than the first, and to reduce the rates from the rate that is now in effect and graded from Chicago, the Missouri River and other points from where shipments are made to this territory.

ANOTHER RAILROAD FOR ALASKA.

Equipment for Solomon-Council City Line Will Soon Go North.

SEATTLE, June 4.—J. W. Dickson, at the head of the Council City & Solomon River Railroad, sailed yesterday for Solomon City, Alaska. One hundred and twenty thousand dollars worth of railroad equipment will follow on the steamships Eureka and Astor for the construction and operation of a railroad from Solomon City to Council City, a distance of 50 miles. There are now 25 carloads of steel rails, 15 flat cars, two locomotives, and a complete stock ready for setting up in Seattle ready for shipment. All told, there are 100 tons of outfit now being shipped from the East and shipped from here to Solomon during the summer. It is calculated, if no untoward events occur, that the railroad will be in operation by August 1.

The work to be done this summer by the railroad company is but a small part of the work projected. From Council City the line is projected to run to Cape York, several hundred miles northwest, and a branch is projected to connect with Nome and another to the Kuskokwim district, and one up the Fish River in a northeast direction.

DISCRIMINATION IN RATES DENIED.

WASHINGTON, June 4.—The Atchafalaya & Santa Fe Railroad today filed with the Interstate Commerce Commission an answer to the complaint of discrimination made by J. F. Stout, of Hemet, Cal.

The answer denied that the rates on dried fruits from Southern California points are unreasonable, and discriminated against small proportion of the total shipments of dried fruits to Eastern points from California.

RUN DOWN BY TRAIN.

EVERETT, Wash., June 4.—Burdett Bobbin, an Arlington, Wash., man, was run down and killed yesterday near Bryant by a Northern Pacific train.

Seattle Hopes for New Depot.

SEATTLE, June 4.—The Northern Pacific Railway has started on its share of the terminal work here and before August 1 it is probable the ground for the new depot will be broken and the construction of some of the outer railroad avenue tracks for their permanent position will be begun.

The Great Northern has started on the same work at the same time. Within the next months the Northern Pacific line between Seattle and Tacoma will be doubled.

KITITAS COUNTY SUES THE STATE.

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 4.—(Special).

A case in which Kittitas County seeks to recover \$500,000, erroneously paid the State in taxes, is before the Supreme Court of this county today. Kittitas is one of the several counties that made errors in certifying total assessed valuation to the State for equalization.

Appropriations made by the Legislature to reimburse all others were vetoed by the Governor.

SEVENTEENTH LEAVES JUNE 23.

Nineteenth Headquarters Will Be at Vancouver Barracks.

VANCOUVER BARRACKS, Wash., June 4.—(Special).—The time of the departure of the Seventeenth Infantry for San Francisco, to take the transport for Manila, has at last been definitely settled, after having been received from department headquarters that the regiment will leave Vancouver Barracks June 23. Upon their arrival at San Francisco they will march to the Presidio and encamp there until the day before the transport sails, July 1, when they will go aboard.

Ant Surgeon L. C. Duncan, N. J. Barron and P. W. Huntington are the medical officers detailed to accompany the regiment.

The headquarters staff, band and First Battalion of the Nineteenth Infantry, now stationed at the Presidio, are under order to arrive at Vancouver Barracks not later than the 23d of this month, to relieve the Seventeenth Infantry, while Major James B. Goe, staff and Companies 1 and 2, Third Battalion, will reach Port Wright on the 23d and relieve companies K and M, Seventeenth Infantry, stationed there. The remaining two companies of the Third Battalion, K and M, will reach Fort Lawton on the 23d, to relieve the one company, L, of the Seventeenth, now there.

It is not expected that Colonel David Johnston Craigie, now in command of the Seventeenth Infantry, will go with the regiment to the Philippines, as the Colonel will be promoted to the rank of Brigadier-General and then be retired in either July or August, the time not having been definitely settled yet.

NATION AS BANK PARTNER.

CHICAGO CLEARING-HOUSE WILL ELECT UNITED STATES TO MEMBERSHIP.

CHICAGO, June 4.—The Tribune today says: The bankers of Chicago will meet tomorrow to take action on a plan for the admission of the United States Government as a member of the Chicago Clearing-House. It is almost certain that an arrangement will be concluded similar to the deal between Secretary of the Treasury John Sherman and the Associated Banks of New York, in 1853, whereby the Subtreasury became a kind of business partner of the banks of that city.

Secretary Shaw reached Chicago yesterday, and was in conference for a long time with J. B. Forgan, chairman of the executive committee of the Chicago Clearing-House. Late in the afternoon Mr. Forgan issued a call to all the members of the clearing-house for a meeting tomorrow afternoon, at which it is expected Secretary Shaw will be present.

One of the results of the Government's becoming a member of the Chicago Clearing-House will be that hereafter the banks in the West in settlement of constantly fluctuating accounts with the Government, would buy exchange on Chicago rather than on New York. The scheme will also lessen the necessity of a small army of clerks under heavy guard every day carrying bags of coins and rolls of bills between the various banks and the Subtreasury.

FINANCES OF SUSPENDED BANK.

TORONTO, Ont., June 4.—A. E. Ames & Co. handed out a statement last night in which they state that the firm's liabilities at the end of last month were \$1,100,000, with a book surplus in the business of \$1,100,000. To this surplus is to be added the surplus of individual members of the firm, outside of money employed as capital in the business. With the savings deposits of \$100,000 added, the liabilities are reduced in round figures to \$700,000. The firm hopes to pay all creditors in full.

TRUSTS CROWD NONE OUT.

Field for Educated Men and Women Was Never Wider.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., June 4.—James B. Dill, of New York, delivered the address at the commencement of the University of Minnesota today. His subject was "The Outlook for the College Graduate in America." He declared that the trust movement, instead of restricting the field for educated men and women, opened for them new opportunities for usefulness. "The corporation movement," he said, "instead of crowding men out, has opened for them new fields of usefulness and has increased the financial return for intelligent, conscientious effort. It has, to a large extent, eliminated the prestige of rich men's sons and ended the career of the 'Miss Nancy' type. From motives of self-interest, the corporation can recognize the 'pull' basis of making appointments."

"When the trust movement shall have extended itself, when it shall have eradicated wrong tendencies and strengthened those elements which are right, then of men in charge of great combinations will be required not only intimate knowledge of the business itself, but the training to be derived from a university course. Many amalgamations, formed ostensibly for the purpose of a mutual protection, have accomplished little else than the unloading of blocks of indigestible securities upon a deceived public, which in reality was the purpose for which they were organized."

Such combinations never had an excuse for existing, nor a chance of success, except as it was possible to suppress trade in a way thoroughly repugnant to American principles. A certain class also of the labor element is tending toward the suppression of production. "Certain promoters, self-styled finan-
