

ROBBED IN HER ROOM

Mrs. Robert Seater, of Seattle, First Chloroformed.

BURGLARY IN BROAD DAYLIGHT

Fleet Struggles Vigorously With Two Thieves, but Is Soon Overcome and Loses the Sum of \$1900 Concealed in Dress.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 5.—Mrs. Robert Seater, wife of a prominent furniture dealer, was chloroformed and robbed of about \$1900 in her apartment in the McCormick block, on Pike street, shortly before noon today. Two men entered the room, and Mrs. Seater, thinking they had come to pay a bill, walked to the opposite side of the room and shortly thereafter she was looking for a name on the men had given, she was seized and a gag placed in her mouth. Mrs. Seater tried to summon assistance, but was overpowered and a cloth saturated with chloroform placed to her nostrils. In a very few seconds she was unconscious, in which condition she was found by her husband about an hour later.

Mrs. Seater says that the robbers were strangers to her, and that when they first entered the room she did not suspect them. They seemed to be aware that there was a large sum of money in the house, and were probably advised that the money was kept on Mrs. Seater's person.

When she was found by her husband, it was discovered that the robbers had torn open the front of her dress and removed the money from a small cloth in which she had kept it sewed up. Several buttons were lying about the floor, which showed that she had struggled with her assailants before the drug had taken effect.

BOY'S DETERMINED SUICIDE.

Could Not Stand Disgrace Brought by Father and Brothers.

MOSCOW, Idaho, June 5.—(Special.)—Roy Vickery, the 17-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Vickery, took two doses of morphine with suicidal intent yesterday morning. Death occurred at 6 o'clock this morning. The only known cause for the act was a sense of shame at the record of his father and brothers. The father is a fugitive, unable to return home, on account of criminal charges against him, and the two brothers are inmates of the penitentiary. Young Vickery had been living with his mother and two sisters in the south end of town.

Dr. Clark stated that although the boy had doubtless taken morphine in the afternoon, he had seen the doctor's card taken a largely increased dose of poison. Search of the premises was made this morning and an empty morphine bottle was found in the lot of the stable. Officers are informed that with the bottle was found a note from the boy giving the disgraceful conduct of his father and brothers as reason for his action.

Mrs. Woods, who is supposed to have found the note, refuses to give it, and will not talk of the matter.

CONSTABLES HAD TO SHOOT.

Greeks Accused of Robbery Attempt to Escape at Yreka.

YREKA, Cal., June 5.—(Special.)—The interpreter for the St. Greeks working on the railroad near Dunsmuir was last night waylaid and robbed of a large sum of money by six of them. During the night the crew was taken to Montague, where some work had to be done. Today Constable Brown, of Dunsmuir, went to Montague to arrest the Greek robbers. He secured the assistance of Constable Niles, and after 15 minutes had fired by the Constables at the fleeing six Greeks they surrendered, and after being handcuffed and chained together they were taken back to Dunsmuir to stand trial.

Great excitement prevailed at Montague, but the brave officers took the gang without any damage to either side.

ASSAULT ON A WEISER MAN.

Called From His Bed, He Received Terrible Blow.

WEISER, Idaho, June 5.—(Special.)—Frank Johnston, a lively-able keeper of this city, was assaulted at about 1 o'clock this morning and dangerously if not fatally injured. The assault was committed by Gus Hotchkiss, a cowboy, and G. H. Ferguson, a second-hand dealer. The two men went to the barn and called out Johnston, who was in bed, and asked for a bribe. He handed it to Hotchkiss, who immediately struck him on the head with the heavy bill, cutting a deep gash and it is feared fractured the skull. Both men are under arrest.

There is no known reason for the attack. Hotchkiss and Ferguson were intoxicated.

DRUGGIST HABEAS IS CLEARED.

Prosecuting Witness Did Not Establish Charges of Theft.

SALEM, Or., June 5.—(Special.)—Recorder N. J. Judah this morning dismissed the charges against Jacob Haber, the druggist charged with giving a banquet and toilet articles from the store of F. G. Haas. Similar action was taken in the case of Clarence Beauchamp, who was charged with being accessory to the theft of \$125 from the same store.

The case was called for trial yesterday, but the prosecuting witness, Haas, failed to appear. The case was continued until today, when his attendance was secured. His testimony did not establish the charge he had preferred, and the case was dismissed.
