Montgomery was taken from the Tomah jail and hurried to Sparta, on a freight train. The mob dispersed when the Tomah National Guard Company was called to gether.

POLITICIANS ARE INDICTED.
St. Louisans Are Charged With Naturalization Frauds.

ST. LOUIS, June 5.—John P. Dolan, chairman of the Democratic city committee; Thomas Barrett, marshal of the Court of Appeals; Patrolman Frank Garrett and John Bartholomew, Democratic precinct committeemen in the 24th ward, were indicted today by the Federal grand jury. The four men are charged with naturalization frauds.

Lutheran Missions Prosperous.
BALTIMORE, June 5.—At the second day's session of the general synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church, the report of the board of home missions, of which Rev. W. H. Mamma was president, was read by A. Stewart Hartman, showing the board's work to be in a highly satisfactory condition. The report of the trustees of the National Lutheran Home for the Aged was submitted.

The report of the synod of Home Missions shows that 135 missions are now carried on being under the care of the synod, showing a gain of 49 in the past two years. The Missionary Society membership, as computed by years, is 26 more than the former biennial, and twice as many new conversions have been organized. The net gain in the membership has been 410, an increase of 138 over the former biennial. The number of Sunday schools has increased from 135 to 225, an advance of 90.

SCORES 88 POINTS OUT OF A POSSIBLE 125.

MINNAPOLIS, Ore., June 5.—(Special.)—Albany wins the College Athletic League of Oregon field meet hands down. The final score was: Albany, 88; Minnerville, 2; Newberg, 6. Marks and Coats are the heroes of the day. Marks made the best time of the season in the distances. He made the half mile in the time of 2:03 4/5. This was a heart-breaking race between him and Cummins. McIntyre, but Marks' beautiful strides carried him over a winner. He also made the mile in a

successful one, because many athletes have been developed that will return and win points for Oregon next year.

This is the first year that the university has ever been defeated in track athletics by a rival Northwestern college. Captain Payne states that Oregon's defeat was due partially to poor management. Albany won the victory, however, which they no doubt could have earned under any conditions.

WASHINGTON AND IDAHO TIED.
Each Wins 61 Points in Championship Meet at Moscow.

MOSCOW, Idaho, June 5.—(Special.)—Idaho and Washington Universities met

in the championship meet at Moscow.

The two teams were tied, each winning 61 points. The two events of the meet were the 100-yard and 200-yard dashes. Pearson and Tilly tied in the 100, Pearson won in the 200, beating Caulkins 1-5 of a second.
