

RIVER STILL RISES

Stage of Water Yesterday Nearly Twenty Feet

WILL BE TWENTY-FIVE FEET

Twenty-one Feet Predicted by Wednesday—Rise Will Continue—Anniversary of Great Flood of 1894 Recalled Its History.

The river at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon stood at 19.8 feet. The water is rising at the rate of one foot every 24 hours. The highest known stage is 33 feet reached in 1894. The hot wave will probably reach the head of the Columbia and Snake today or tomorrow. Twenty-one feet is expected here Wednesday. If the snow melts to any great extent a further rise of six or seven feet is probable.

The highest stage of the great flood which inundated a portion of Portland in 1894 was reached June 7, nine years ago yesterday, when the water stood 33 feet above zero. Reports of serious disasters from floods and tornadoes in many parts of the East and the fact that the June rise of the Columbia is now being caused by the same cause, have caused many to feel uneasy lest there may be another great flood here. While this is possible, it is scarcely probable, as the water Saturday was only 19.1 above zero, and river men generally do not look for any exceedingly high stage this season.

The following statistics of the highest stage of water for the 24 years from 1870 to 1902, inclusive, as far as any official record has been kept, have been procured from Official Forecaster Beale:

In addition, Mr. Beale gives his snapshot prediction for this season, as follows: 1903, June 25, 25 feet.

As the site of the city slopes gradually away to the east and north, the boundary of the submerged district in the flood of 1894 is a zig-zag line. On Morrison street, the water reached back nearly to Third street, on Alder nearly to Fourth, on Burnside nearly to Ninth, and on Everett, Flanders and Gilman to Tenth.

At the maximum height on June 7 the counter in the First National Bank was just covered. A high-water mark cut on the door casing of Stewart & Winslow's carpenter shop on Sixth street, now in place, the water reached back nearly to Third street, on Alder nearly to Fourth, on Burnside nearly to Ninth, and on Everett, Flanders and Gilman to Tenth.

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
