MILITIA CALLED OUT

Arizona Troops Leave for Scene of Strike.

REQUEST MADE FOR REGULARS

Thirty-Five Hundred Miners Are Out for an Eight-Hour Day, and a Large Number Are Marching About Armed.

PHOENIX, Ariz., June 9.—On representations made by the Sheriff of Graham County and Captain Ryming, of the ranger force, jointly, Acting Governor Stoddard this afternoon ordered the entire force of the Arizona militia, under Acting Adjutant-General McClintock, to report at Morenci at eight o'clock to preserve order. A request was also made to President Roosevelt to call out the regular force at Forts Grant and Huachuca. Company B, of this left on a special train late tonight, meeting the Yuma company at Maricopa.

The call for troops is the result of the attempted operations under the eight-hour law passed by the last Legislature. The operators at Clifton, Morenci and Metcalf offered to pay nine hours' wages for eight hours' work. The miners, of whom 80 per cent are Mexicans, and many of the remainder Italians, refused, and over 200 walked out. This was last week. The smeltermen joined the strike, swelling the number to 350. Some trouble was threatened, and on Saturday night a force of 15 rangers was ordered to repress the leaders.

The situation was quiet, but today, the Sheriff and Captain Ryming, the miners are all armed and marching through the streets and from one camp to another. They say the only hope of restoring and preserving order is the presence of troops.

MINERS TO FORM MORE UNIONS.

Federation Decides to Put a Number of Organizers in the Field.

DEANER, June 9.—A large fund will be set aside by Western Federation of Miners for organization purposes in addition to the regular funds used in line by the executive board. Some time was consumed today in discussion of the fund and need for more organizers. Probably half a dozen men in addition to the executive board members will be put to work.

AN effort was made to have the bylaws changed so that those in charge of men are not eligible to membership in the federation, but this failed. It is a custom for those who are promoted to the charge of men to continue membership, but remain away from union meetings. The American Labor Union Convention was not in session today, allowing the constitution committee a full day in which to work.

Union to Reconsider Peace Pact.

CHICAGO, June 9.—At a meeting of the Laundryworkers Union last night was voted to reconsider the agreement made by the union in reference to open shops, the vote standing 57 to 13. The agreement containing this clause was signed last Saturday night and terminated the long laundry strike. The action taken last night was the forerunner of a vote

that will be taken at a special meeting to be held when the "open shop" proposition will be submitted to a final vote. Much dissatisfaction was expressed at the meeting over the "open shop" agreement, which it was said, would ultimately result in the wedding out of all union employees.

Parks Bailed Out to Be Arrested.

NEW YORK, June 9.—After being bailed out in the sum of \$500 by his friend, William S. Devery, ex-Chief of Police, and enjoying a few hours' liberty, Samuel Parks, representative of the Housemithie' Union, who yesterday was arrested on the charge of having accepted money from the Hecla Iron Works to call off the strike, was re-arrested. He appeared in court for a hearing on warrants issued on affidavits sworn to by Herman Lobel, of Lobel, Andrews & Co., and Louis Brandt, of Brandt Bros., who allege having paid to Parks the sum of \$500 to call off the strike. Several witnesses were examined today, and, at the suggestion of the District Attorney, the matter went over until June 17.

Material Dealers End Lockout.

NEW YORK, June 9.—The executive committee of the Lumber Trades Association and the New York Truckowners' Association decided today, after a conference with the committee of the members of the United Board of Building Trades, who yesterday held the meeting of the United Board of Building Trades, because of the refusal of the board to expel the Material Drivers' Union, to open their yards for the delivery of material tomorrow. This ends the lockout which the material dealers decided upon with a view to putting an end to the building strike and the strike of the material drivers.

More Chicago Walters Ordered Out.

CHICAGO, June 9.—The ranks of the striking restaurant employees were augmented today when the 200 employees of the Kuntz-Remmer Company were ordered out.

Textile Workers Winning Strike.

PHILADELPHIA, June 9.—The executive committee of the Central Textile Workers' Union today reported that up to date 81 firms have given in.

TRAIN JUMPS THE TRACK

Eleven Passengers Are Hurt, but No One Is Killed.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., June 9.—A north-bound passenger train on the Louisville and Nashville road was wrecked at Colesburg today. Nobody was killed, but 11 persons were injured. The seriously injured: Gus Laman, Louisville, baggage-master, will probably die.

Engineer Harry C. Palmer, Louisville, probably fatally hurt.

James B. Cowherd, Louisville, Adams Express messenger, fatally hurt.

The train jumped the track as it descended a hill.

Shot by Guard in Flood District.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 9.—For refusing to obey the command to halt, Albert Husky was shot and mortally wounded tonight by John Maloney, a member of the Sixth United States Infantry, who was doing guard duty in Kansas City, Kan., where a military form of martial law has been in force since the flood.

Aid for Oppressed Jews.

PITTSBURG, June 9.—The most important business transaction by the convention was the adoption of a resolution by which the federation will in future join with Jewish philanthropic societies in aiding oppressed Jews throughout the world instead of devoting all its attention to providing homes for Jews in Palestine.

ARABS SUE FOR PEACE

FRENCH GENERAL IN ALGERIA IS VISITED BY SEVEN ENVOYS.

He Refuses to Treat With Any Save the Amer or Head Men of the Villages.

BELI OUNIF, Algeria, June 9.—The Figulians today advanced cautiously to the edge of the hills occupied by the French forces, but no renewal of the action occurred.

During the day envoys from seven villages around Figul came to make their submission and offered to accept any terms. General O'Connor refused to receive them, saying he would only treat with the Amer or with the head men of the villages personally. The General is skeptical regarding the promises of amendment, owing to the fanaticism of the population.

The natives reported that 300 were killed and many were injured as a result of the bombardment yesterday of the Zengia village, which was almost completely destroyed.

TURKEY HAS NO STABLE POLICY.

Orders to Suppress Balkan Disorders Are Changed Each Day.

BERLIN, June 9.—A dispatch to the Tribuna from Constantinople says: The feeling of the Sultan and palace officials regarding the Balkan disorders fluctuates widely from day to day.

A certain degree of tranquillity seems to prevail one day and another day the Ministry for War determines on fresh dispositions of troops, hurried reinforcements to the border garrisons, and orders the prompt completion of the projected armaments. Then again it is reversed after fresh councils. Part of the time Albania causes acute anxiety, and then it is Macedonia, because symptoms are said to have been recently discovered of Austrian interference. The Sultan and his Ministers are in a state of painful incertitude and without adequate reason.

Letter Calls Forth Curses on Church.

BERLIN, June 9.—The pastoral letter of Cardinal Kopp, Bishop of Breslau, against Socialism and Polish Nationalists, which was read in all the Catholic churches of Upper Silesia on Sunday, instead of the sermon, caused an outburst of feeling in the Polish press and political clubs. Disturbances took place in the churches during the reading of the letter. There were murmurings and loud coughing and even curses were uttered. The clergy are circulating a blacklist of the names of the newspapers which their parishioners must not read. Boisterous political meetings were held last night.

Meeting of Irish League Suppressed.

DUBLIN, June 9.—An Irish National League meeting announced to take place at Tall, Waterford, Sunday, was suppressed by the police. The members of the league, however, assembled in a field outside of town, at which the proposal of the corporation of Waterford to present an address to King Edward on the occasion of the King's proposed visit to Ireland was denounced.

France Raises Duty on Coffee.

PARIS, June 9.—Finance Minister Rouvier today informed a deputation, representing the coffee interests, that budget considerations compelled an increase in the duty on coffee by 40 per 100 kilos. He added that the Franco-Brazilian treaty would be renewed before June 30 in order that a new tariff may be put in force before the end of the year.

BAD FIRE AT PEKIN.

Buildings Occupied by the Treasury Department Are Destroyed.

PEKIN, June 9.—The extensive building occupied by the board of revenue and rites were totally destroyed by flames today. The revenue building contains 4,000,000 taels. The buildings adjoined the legations, and the foreign military guards did effective service. The Chinese fire department, equipped chiefly with banners and gongs, was helpless.

The soldiers demolished the board of rites building to prevent a further spread of the flames to the foreign section. No estimate of the loss is obtainable at present.

Odd Funeral of a Millionaire.

OTTAWA, Ontario, June 9.—The funeral of S. J. Major, a grocer, rated a millionaires took place today. His will provides a special chariot be constructed and upon it his uncoffined body is to be borne from his home, past his store, to the church and cemetery. This will be the first and last use to which the car will be put, as with the flowers, it is to be burned immediately. The will provides also that the house and store shall be draped in black for 90 days.

Midway Island to Be Fortified.

HONOLULU, June 9.—The United States tug Iroquois has left for Midway Island, which is to be a cable station. The Iroquois will assist the cable ships in any way possible and the Captain Pond, who goes on board with Captain Rodman, commander of the vessel, will report on a site for a lighthouse. It is expected that the island will be used as a calling place by vessels when it is in cable communication with the world. Captain Pond will also make a report on plans for fortifying the island, it is stated.

Austria May Speak for Jews.

VIENNA, June 9.—In the Reichsrath today, Deputies Oser and Strachner gave notification of an interpolation inviting the Premier, Dr. von Koerber, in conjunction with the Foreign Minister, Count Goluchowski, to draw the attention of the Russian government to the grave danger to general peace involved in outbreaks like the one at Kishinev, and to urge the prevention of further excesses.

Russia Promises Jews Protection.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 9.—General Arsenieff, the new Prefect of Police of Odessa, in receiving a deputation of Rabbis recently, assured them that the Jews of Odessa could pursue their avocations without fearing anti-Semitic outbreaks, as the authorities would strictly suppress any such movement at its outset.

Peru Now Has the Gold Standard.

WASHINGTON, June 9.—The State Department has been notified by United States Minister Dudley that Peru has successfully put in operation the law passed two years ago providing for the adoption of the gold standard on March 1 of this year.

DECIDE TO MEET OFTEN

White Ribboners Will Hold World Convention Every Two Years.

GENEVA, Switzerland, June 9.—At today's session of the convention of the W. C. T. U., the presiding officer, Mrs. Lillian M. N. Stevens, of Portland, Me., read Lady Henry Somerset's presidential address, in which the absent president predicted that the eventual outcome of the W. C. T. U.'s fight would be a complete victory over the liquor traffic. The address also referred to Great Britain's unenviable reputation for intemperance; and modern governments were alive to the danger, and referred to the fact that Russia, France and Sweden were strenuously fighting the evil. Lady Somerset also mentioned the "magnificent efforts of the United States, more powerful in its youth to overcome the custom engrafted into old countries, enfeebled by time," and concluded with an appeal for the exaltation of the home, asserting that the work of the world's W. C. T. U. could be best summed up in the words of its greatest founder, the late Miss Frances Willard—"to make the world wide for women and more homelike for humanity."

WORKMEN IN SESSION.

Supreme Lodge Is Royally Welcomed to St. Paul.

ST. PAUL, June 9.—The Supreme Lodge, A. O. U. W., began its biennial session at the State Capitol today. Mayor Smith and Governor Van Sant welcomed delegates to the city and state. Supreme Master Workman Webb McCall replied on behalf of the delegates, after which the lodge went into executive session.

In his report Supreme Recorder Sackett gave the total membership at the close of 1902 as 61,901. The amount that has been paid to widows and orphans during the year was \$4,165.15.

Clark Chosen by Irrigationists.

OGDEN, June 9.—Chairman Kiesel, of the executive committee of the 11th Irrigation Congress Convention, announces today that the committee has chosen Senator W. A. Clark as president of the congress.
