## Astoria Officials Return With Alleged Perjurors.

## OTHERS HAVE BEEN BILKED

## Lane's Kneecap Has Been Broken For At Least Twelve Years, and He Has Served Time at Folsom.

ASTORIA, Or., June 9.—(Special.)—Sheriff Linnell and City Attorney Smith returned on the steamer Geo. W. Elder today from San Francisco with H. Lane, alias John L. Bock, and Joseph S. Smith, alias George R. Rodgers, who were wanted here to answer to the charge of perjury in the case against the city in which Bock secured a judgment in the sum of \$250.00 for injuries alleged to have been received by falling through a hole in the street plank.

One of the men was captured in the mountains while he was returning to his ranch from a trip to the mines, and the other was found in Oakland. Both men had legal right against being brought back to Oregon. To hold them Attorney Smith filed a complaint charging them with being fugitives from justice. The case was called to trial and considerable testimony taken, but by contesting every point Mr. Smith had the hearing postponed until Monday morning. This step was necessary on account of a photograph in getting the requisition papers. The latter were signed by Governor Pardee on Saturday, and the next morning the officers secured their men and left on the steamer.

Both Mr. Smith and Sheriff Linnell speak very highly of the courtesy extended to them by the court officials of Oakland, and say they were given every aid possible. During the hearing some strong affidavits were presented showing the previous records of the men. One was from Thomas Wilkinson, warden of the penitentiary at Folsom, who had a photograph easily identified as Lane, or Bock. It says that C. R. Lane was received at the prison from Contra Costa County on August 12, 1880, to serve the term of grand larceny, and was discharged on December 13, 1887. In its description of the convict it says Lane's right kneecap was badly broken and he walked lame.

There was also an affidavit by E. W. Lues, who has known Lane and the two Smiths for 12 years, and has lived near them. It says that during all that time Lane's kneecap has been broken. It also says that Lane secured \$200 from a woman in San Francisco about three years ago; in December, 1890, he obtained \$1000 from a San Francisco man; about 1892 he was paid between \$50 and \$100 by the San Francisco Railway Company, of Oakland, and in 1902, under the name of John E. B. Myers, he got \$2000 from the City of Seattle on account of the injury to his kneecap.

The affidavit further states that J. S. Smith, who testified in the damage suit under the name of John S. Smith, is an accomplice of Lane; that Delbert Smith, who testified that he was with Lane when the latter was alleged to have been injured here in August, 1900, was a son of J. S. Smith and had twice been indicted for burglary, and was not in Oregon in August, 1900.

## MORMON CHIEF AT LA GRANDE.

Joseph Smith and Aids Preside at Conference.

LA GRANDE, Or., June 9.—(Special.)—The quarterly conference of the Union Stake of the Church of Latter Day Saints was held in the meeting-house here Saturday and Sunday. President Joseph P. Smith, his second counselor, Arthur H. Lund, and his son, Hiram Smith, who is one of the council of 12 apostles, were present. This was a notable visit as it is seldom these officers leave Salt Lake City.

The business of the conference was the sustaining of all the church from high to low, receiving reports of organizations and from bishops and elders, and hearing sermons and addresses on the church work. A high priest quorum was organized and James A. Price, Lehi Wright and Louis A. Perry elected counselors. So many people attended that the house, which would not receive them. ## AFRAID OF WELKING FLOOD.

Farmers Say Baker City's Reservoir Dam Is Not Safe.

BAKER CITY, Or., June 9.—(Special.)—There is still trouble brewing out at the Goodrich Creek reservoir, between the farmers and city officials. A committee of farmers made a careful examination of the reservoir dam Sunday, and they reported it unsafe. They say the water has percolated through the embankment in several places, leaving it soft and unstable. At the present time there is only ten feet of water in the reservoir. When it is full it covers 20 acres of ground and contains 3,000,000 gallons of water. The people living in the valley below the reservoir object to its being filled up, for fear the dam will give way.

## ASTORIA CHILD'S FEARFUL FALL.

Ernest Medley Has a Fractured Skull and Dislocated Shoulder.

ASTORIA, Or., June 9.—(Special.)—Ernest, the 4-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. William Medley, met with a serious and perhaps fatal accident this evening while playing with some companions on Fourth street. The boy fell off the sidewalk onto the beach, a distance of about 30 feet. He struck on a rock, fracturing his skull and dislocating his shoulder. His recovery is considered doubtful.

## TO STUDY INDIAN LORE

## COLUMBIA UNIVERSITY GRADUATE WILL COME TO OREGON.

He Will Live With Silette Tribe and Compile Their History for the Smithsonian Institution.

NEW YORK, June 9.—(Special.)—Harry Bull St. Claire, Columbia University student, will start for Oregon on Monday next to prepare for a stay of several months in the immense forests of Oregon with the Silette tribe of Indians. He will adapt himself to his surroundings and live with the Indians, studying their language, customs, legends and history, and upon his return will compile a record of the tribe. Mr. St. Claire, who has made an exhaustive study of American Indian life and languages for several years, is undertaking his present trip at the instance of the bureau of ethnology of the Smithsonian Institution at Washington, and when his record has been completed it will be placed on file in this bureau, at Washington, and serve as the official report on that tribe. The report will be all the more valuable as it is the only thorough investigation has been made regarding the habits of the Silette tribe and very little is known about their language.

Mr. St. Claire is a graduate of Columbia College, with Phi Beta Kappa affiliation. Since he left college he has continued studying at Columbia, making a deeper research into subjects of ethnology and anthropology. Along with his recent studies he has assisted Dr. W. H. Henshaw at the American Museum of Natural History, as well as contributing at various times to the bureau of ethnology of the Smithsonian Institution. He has very happy expectations of the result of his present trip.

EPPINGER CREDITORS ANGRY.

Three Banks Have Attempted to Corral All the Securities.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 9.—Matters have reached an acute stage in the Eppinger affair, and the public is prepared for some drastic developments. A committee of the directors of the insolvent wheat firm of Eppinger & Co. met this forenoon for the purpose of investigating the situation, and while no conclusion as to ultimate action was reached, it became apparent that the failure has aroused the ire of the business men to such an extent that if there is any ground for criminal proceedings they will attempt to bring them.

The temper of the creditors was not improved by the action of three creditor banks who went to Port Costa with replevin papers and levied on all the wheat in the warehouse of the company. This effort of a few to get hold of all the wheat there has caused the meeting to decide to petition for an order declaring the firm bankrupt, and thereby securing a legal and fair division of what property remains.

The undercurrent of discontent is so strong that there is not the slightest doubt that the arrest of some responsible persons would be made if the creditors were not deterred by considerations of expediency. Members of two creditor firms said this forenoon that there was no sentiment or sympathy left in the matter, and that they would prosecute if they should decide that business consideration pointed to the step as the wisest course. The members of the firm have not been seen in business places for two days, and this afternoon there were many anxious inquiries as to their whereabouts.

The attorneys formerly in the case were David Friederich, J. W. Lillien, Alfred and Alfred Sutro. They were instructed to at once prepare the necessary papers and file them in the United States District Court. One of the attorneys stated that they would ask for the appointment of receivers for both Eppinger & Co. and the Pacific Warehouse Company. The main committee will report back to the creditors tomorrow, and in the meantime the members will hold themselves subject to a meeting call at any time the attorneys may so request.

WILLOWS WAREHOUSE DENIES REPORTS.

WILLOWS, Cal., June 9.—The report that a large amount of wheat had been sent from Willows warehouse to Eppinger & Co.'s Port Costa warehouse, receipts for which had been hypothecated, is not true. The Eppingers held no receipts for grain in any warehouse of the Willows Warehouse Association. In fact, P. H. Green, secretary of the association, says that no receipts for grain stored in any of their nine warehouses are outstanding.

O. R. & N. COPPER STOLEN.

LA GRANDE, Or., June 9.—(Special.)—Five boys were on trial in the Justice of Peace Court Monday charged with stealing about 500 pounds of brass and copper findings from the O. R. & N. Co., and selling the same to an Armenian boy, named Crippen, Berkeley and Stone, who were discharged, but Fred Fair and Charlie Martin were bound over to the Circuit Court on the showing that they sold the stuff.

The brass has the letters "O. R. & N." stamped on it. Abrahams is a junk and notions peddler, who resides here and drives to outside precincts to trade. He has not been arrested.

BETTER WEATHER FOR BERRIES.

SOME MARION FRUIT WAS VERY BADLY SPOILED.

SALEM, Or., June 9.—(Special.)—The weather at Salem was considerably cooler today than it was Saturday, Sunday and Monday. President Hofer, of the Salem Fruit Growers Association, says the berries that ripened during the hot days were so badly spoiled by the sun that they could not be shipped as first-class fruit. None of that fruit was put on the market under the union's label.
