The exercises opened with "Hail Columbia" by the band, after which Chaplain D. B. Gray delivered an impressive invocation.

In his address of welcome President J. C. Morland, a pioneer of '02, referred fondly to the Heppner disaster, and stated that the meeting was being held under the shadow of a great calamity such as Oregon had never known before.

The band then played "The Red, White and Blue," and an adjournment was taken for dinner, which was served in the building by the Women's Auxiliary.

TOTTENHAM CHARTERED.

Mammoth Freighter Coming to Portland for Lumber.

The Pacific Export Lumber Company, whose extensive operations in the foreign lumber trade have made Portland famous all through the Orient, will shortly have at Portland the largest fleet they ever assembled here to load for a foreign port.

The Tottenham is of 484 tons gross register and has a carrying capacity of 3,000,000 feet of lumber. She sailed from Mill for San Diego June 3 with about 100 tons of freight for the California port.

NEARLY OUT OF COAL.

Steamship Eva Had but Fifteen Tons When She Arrived at Astoria.

ASTORIA, June 17.—(Special.)—The German steamship Eva, which arrived yesterday from San Francisco, had but 15 tons of coal in her bunkers when she arrived. She took on 45 tons of fuel here before proceeding up the river this afternoon.

Captain Genaux, of Seattle, representing the Board of Underwriters, arrived here this afternoon to take charge of the disabled schooner Sequoia. A diver has been engaged to repair the rudder, and as soon as that is completed the intention is to take the vessel to Puget Sound under her own steam and place her on a drydock.

The British ship Agnes Oswald, which arrived yesterday from Honolulu, was today taken across the river to the Government quarantine station, where the vessel and her ballast will be thoroughly fumigated.

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DAVID DALGLEISH DEAD

PIONEER IN WOOLEN MANUFACTURE OF OREGON.

One of Three Men Who Made the Brownsville Mill a Success—Active in Church and City Affairs.

Dispatches received from Los Angeles announce the death there yesterday of David Dalgleish, for many years prominent in business in Portland and a pioneer in the woolen manufacture in Oregon.

Mr. Dalgleish had been suffering from a complication of diseases for the last two years, and went to Los Angeles in January in the hope that the climate would benefit him. This hope was not realized, and he submitted to a surgical operation, from the effects of which he never recovered.

Mr. Dalgleish was born 65 years ago at Galashiels, Scotland, the center of the Scotch woolen industry, and became a thoroughly skilled workman in that trade. He came to Salem in 1870 and worked in the woolen mill there, together with Thomas Kay and Fred Croft, who were also practical woolen weavers.

Mr. Dalgleish was not only a successful business man, but was active in public and church affairs. About seven years ago he represented his ward in the City Council. He was a prominent member of the St. Andrews Society, which is composed of Scotchmen and their descendants; was its president in 1892, and nothing gave him greater pleasure than to help any of his countrymen who might be in need.

The death of his only son, Gilbert, two years ago, was a severe blow to Mr. Dalgleish, for he was a promising young man of 24 years, and from that event dates the failure of the father's health. His wife and only daughter, Mrs. John Baine, survive him.

The body will be brought to this city and will be buried in Riverview cemetery.

Scalers Will File a Protest.

VICTORIA, B. C., June 17.—A petition is being sent to Ottawa by local sealers, which, in its preamble, states that it has come to the knowledge of the sealers that the leases of the seal rookeries on the Pribilof Islands from the United States are bringing influence on Great Britain and Canada to abolish Peleagie sealing in that territory may secure a monopoly. This the sealers fear would rob hundreds of employment and destroy industry.

Prominent Seattleites Divorced.
