MINISTRY NOW SAFE

Balfour Cabinet Will Hold On
at Least Two Years More.

LIBERALS DIVIDED TOO BADLY

They Will Not Risk Challenging
Britain to a Vote on Its Fiscal
Policy—Irish Bill Not Seriously
Jeopardized.

LONDON, June 18.—From interviews with members of the House of Commons belonging to various parties, the Associated Press learns that the consensus of opinion at Westminster forecasts another two years' tenure of office for the present government, although the prophecy is always made with the proviso, "barring accidents." Good judges see little possibility of accidents being involved in the issues now agitating the British press.

Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman today held a conference of leading Liberals on the advisability of raising the whole question of the fiscal policy of Great Britain, but in view of the attitude of even the malcontent Unionists, who are out-and-out free traders, it is not considered probable that the Liberal leader will risk challenging the government to a vote in which he is certain to be defeated.

In spite of the sharp issue raised in the Irish land bill question on the subject of a minimum purchase price, the ultimate passage of the bill is not as seriously jeopardized as might be imagined. The Nationalists certainly hope to bring some further concessions from Chief Irish Secretary Wyndham by a show of opposition, but the leaders of the Irish party are still inclined to exert all their influence to keep the government in power.

Further consideration of the bill has been postponed until July 22. There is some talk of convening another Irish convention to consider the future attitude of the Nationalist party toward the bill.

Land Bill May Be Withdrawn.

LONDON, June 18.—The Daily Mail understands that the government has threatened to withdraw the Irish land bill unless some agreement is arrived at with the Irish party on the vital points. The free trade versus protection fight is threatening to become active, both inside and outside of Parliament. Both sides are organizing their forces.

JEW MASSACRE FRUSTRATED.

Russian Police Compel Mob to Abandon Its Plan.

BERLIN, June 18.—The Tagesschau of St. Petersburg correspondent telegraphs that a report gained circulation at Novgorod-severakole, in the government of Charkov, similar to that which caused the massacre at Kishinev, namely, that the government had ordered the extermination of the Jews.

The people began to make preparations most openly, talked the matter over publicly and appointed May 27, coronation day, for the massacres. Terror seized the Hebrew population, which assembled in the synagogue on the day appointed. There were 500 persons within and without the building awaiting the beginning of the massacre, but the police paraded the streets in force and prevented the gathering of mobs, although some persons formed crowds and shouted to strike the Jews dead. The day, however, passed without any serious outbreak.

The Marshal of the Aristocrat, Prince

Gallatin, and several priests of the Russian church, attended the coronation celebration in the synagogue, so as to reassure the Jews. Their presence caused a restraint on the populace.

AMERICAN SQUADRON ABOUT DUE.

European Fleet Is Expected to Reach Kiel Saturday.

BERLIN, June 18.—The United States European squadron is due to arrive at Kiel Saturday. The squadron goes through to Kiel channel. The Kearsarge, Chicago and San Francisco will go through the Cattegat. Owing to the great boom and keel of the Kearsarge it was decided not to attempt to steam through the 56-mile channel.

The German naval authorities have arranged to entertain the American squadron as well as their officers. Ambassador Tower will give a dinner to Emperor William June 26, at which Prince Henry of Prussia, the members of the Emperor's suite, the principal officers and embassy staff will be present. The banqueting-room of the Imperial Yacht Club has been engaged for four large dinners, including one to be given to the Emperor. The American squadron will sail for England June 30, the same day the Emperor leaves Kiel.

Official Count of German Election.

BERLIN, June 18.—The results of the Reichstag election are as follows:
Socialists, 44 elected and 122 re-elected; Center party, 88 elected and 26 re-elected; Conservatives and Free Conservatives, 57 elected and 52 re-elected; Nationalist Liberals, 5 elected and 46 re-elected; Right Radicals, 24 elected and 8 re-elected; Left Radicals, 11 elected and 5 re-elected; Poles, 14 elected and 5 re-elected; Hanoverians, 8 elected; Danes, 1 elected; Anti-Semites, 1 elected and 5 re-elected.

"Female Bluebeard" on Trial.

BERLIN, June 18.—The trial of the so-called "female bluebeard," Frau Pryzgodka, began at Allenstein, East Prussia, today. Her first husband, Pryzgodka, a hotelkeeper, caught her putting arsenic in his coffee, and remembering that her other husbands, all prosperous peasants, died suddenly, the authorities exhumed their remains and found arsenic in each of them.

Ex-Cabinet Officers Sent to Prison.

SOFIA, Bulgaria, June 18.—Ex-Premier Ivanoff, ex-Minister of Public Works Touncheff and ex-Minister of the Interior Radoslawoff, who were indicted in November last on the charge of malfeasance in office, were sentenced today to eight months' imprisonment at hard labor.

Tariff Revision Is Defeated.

OTTAWA, Ont., June 18.—The House of Commons divided early today on a motion of want of confidence by Mr. Tardif declaring for an immediate revision of the tariff and an energetic policy of transportation. The motion was defeated on a straight party vote.

GENERAL WHEATON DEAD

END COMES AS A GENERAL BREAKING DOWN OF HEALTH.

Retired Officer Who Won Fame and Promotion in the Indian and Civil Wars.

WASHINGTON, June 18.—Major-General Frank Wheaton, U. S. A., retired, died here today, aged 70 years. A widow and two daughters survive him. Death resulted from a general breaking down in health.

(Major-General Frank Wheaton was born in Providence, R. I., May 8, 1833. He became a surveyor and went to California in 1850, being employed as a civil engineer on Mexican boundaries. He was commissioned First Lieutenant in the United States Cavalry in 1856, and served in Kansas, Nebraska and Missouri against the Indians. In March, 1861, he was promoted to Captain. On the breaking out of the Civil War he returned home and, enlisting with the Rhode Island Volunteers, was made Lieutenant-Colonel of the Second Regiment. July 21, 1861, he was advanced to Colonel and, on November, 1862, to Brigadier-General of the volunteers. By brevet the same year he became Major-General of the volunteers. He was with the Army of the Potomac from the first Bull Run battle to Lee's surrender, and particularly distinguished himself in the battles of the Wilderness, Cedar Creek and Petersburg. After the war he served from Lieutenant-Colonel to Major-General in the regular Army, retiring for age in 1897.)

Widely Known in Masonic Circles.

NEW YORK, June 18.—Hiram S. Armstrong, prominent for many years in the clothing trade of New York, and widely known in Masonic circles, is dead from heart failure. He retired from active business several years ago.

Author John Paul Boeck.

PHILADELPHIA, June 18.—John Paul Boeck, known as a writer of fiction and travel, is dead. He came here from Richmond, Va., where his family was prominent in political and social circles.

Lewis J. Kaufman.

NEW YORK, June 18.—Louis J. Kaufman, vice-president of the American Federation of Roman Catholic Societies, died here today.

Secretary of Brooklyn Jockey Club.

NEW YORK, June 18.—Rugh D. McIntyre, secretary of the Brooklyn Jockey Club, died at his home in Brooklyn today.

ASKS ROOSEVELT'S ADVICE

Booker Washington Has an Offer From Britain.

WASHINGTON, June 18.—Professor Booker T. Washington, president of Tuskegee Institute, called upon President Roosevelt today to consult with him concerning his acceptance of an offer he recently received from Lord Gray, of the British South African Company. The company desires Professor Washington to visit South Africa and continue the study of race conditions in the British territory and report to the British government. Professor Washington will be absent about six months.

It is scarcely probable he will accept the offer, as influential friends have urged that it would keep him away from his work in this country too long.

Many Priests to Change Fields.

NEW YORK, June 18.—Many impending changes among the pastors and diocesan officials of the Catholic Church of this city have been brought to light following the

announcement that the Rev. John P. Childwick, formerly of the battle-ship Maine, has resigned his commission as Chaplain in the Navy to resume parish work. It is said these changes will bring back the Rev. Dr. Richard L. Burtell to his charge, the Church of the Epiphany, from which he was removed by the late Archbishop Corrigan, at the time of the famous Father McGlynn controversy.

TO PRESERVE HEALTH.

Rules Which State Board of Health Will Enforce.

The State Board of Health has adopted a set of rules which make strict provision for reports on cases of contagious diseases for quarantine, vaccination, transportation of infected corpses, precautions against spread of disease from animals to man, and inspection of food, dairies and milk.

The rules provide that practicing physicians report cases of contagious disease to the County Health Officer within 24 hours after discovery. County health officers and physicians must make monthly reports of deaths. The superintendents of state institutions, children's homes and other institutions of a public nature must report to the State Board of Health cases of contagious diseases within 24 hours. Monthly reports of births must be made to the county health officer by physicians, midwives or householders. The standard blanks of the United States Census Bureau for birth and death reports were adopted.

County health officers must deputize all persons who sell or handle baskets, and the latter shall issue birth permits on demand of the health officer. A public notice of deaths of bodies in general. These regulations must be observed in the shipment of bodies from other states for burial in this State. Careful regulations are made for the disinfection of bodies.

Rule 14 reads:

"No person suffering from diphtheria, membranous croup, scarlet fever, smallpox, measles, whooping cough, bubonic plague, leprosy or other dangerous communicable disease shall be admitted into any public, parochial or private school, college, or Sunday school, or shall enter any assemblage or railway car, vessel or steamer, or other public conveyance."

No person shall be admitted to any school or college from a house where such disease has occurred, without presenting a physician's certificate that danger is past. No child shall be allowed to leave a house where such disease has occurred until the building has been disinfected and quarantine removed. Physicians must report cases of such disease within 24 hours to the county or other health officer having jurisdiction. In such cases, the county health officer must place on the building a quarantine card or flag bearing the word "Contagious," the color to be yellow for smallpox, green for diphtheria, red for scarlet fever and all other diseases. Persons attending cases of such disease must use every possible precaution to prevent communication, and buildings where such cases occur must be disinfected under the direction of the health officer. Periods of isolation for patients and persons exposed are provided for in the regulations.

School boards must have children vaccinated. School or library books must not be taken into houses where there are cases of disease, and, if they have been taken there already, must be destroyed or disinfected.

The quarantine rules forbid the bringing into the state of persons sick or sus-

TRAINS COME TOGETHER

Keeper and Sixteen Racehorses Killed—One a Fast Animal.

ST. LOUIS, June 18.—Shortly before midnight, an East-bound Big Four passenger train ran into the rear end of an Illinois Central train in East St. Louis. J. J. Dodge, of Dallas, Tex., who was in charge of an express car loaded with racehorses, was instantly killed. Thirteen of the trotters were so badly mangled that they will have to be shot. Rubino, with a record of 2:30 was killed outright.

Girls Buried Under Building.
NEW YORK, June 18.—The third floor

of a building at 40 Bowery, occupied as a box factory, caved in today, burying some 30 young women. Several were seriously injured. The girls were at work on the second floor.

Liquid to Blot Out Fire.

Pittsburg Dispatch.
Tests of a new liquid, a patent for extinguishing fires were made recently in Munich, Germany. Rags saturated with petroleum can be burned upon the hand after it has been immersed in the liquid. Small fires can be extinguished with the

hands, and with one puff of the liquid a fire in a pit of tar was put out in one second. The tar, even after petroleum had been poured over it, could not be again ignited, as the liquid formed a thin, unmeltable crust which completely shut out oxygen. A pile of wood several yards in height and width was ignited until it was in full blast. The first was completely extinguished in 12 seconds with a little more than 12 gallons of the liquid. Small quantities of the preparation are sufficient for extinguishing purposes, so that the damages produced by water are avoided.
