#### American Fire Insurance Company Asks to Be Reileved.

American Five Insurance Company of Philadelphia, yestorday filed a suit in the State Circuit Court against Dr. John Welch, a dentist, asking to be relieved of Weich a density asking to be reneved of the payment of 500 insurance on a fire joss in the Dekum building.
