CONSTITUTION NEARLY WINS.

Reliance Is Given a Close Race—Columbia a Bad Third.
NEW YORK, June 19.—The Constitution did not defeat the Reliance on the time allowance in a 25-mile race over the course of the Indian Harbor Yacht Club in Long Island Sound today as she gave the admirers of the new boat a bad scare. In more than four hours of sailing the Reliance outlasted the Constitution by only 1 minute and 50 seconds elapsed time. It is estimated that the new boat will have to allow the Constitution two to three minutes in a 30-mile race, which, if true, would give today's race to the older boat, and might give her one of the earlier races as well, when the Reliance beat her by two minutes and a fraction.

The Columbia was again outclassed from the start. Her gain of about 12 minutes on the second leg of the race was time wasted by the other boats in a luffing match.

Between the leaders the race was hotly contested, first one and then the other getting the better of it by sudden shifts of the wind, which, when it began to blow steadily, left the Reliance about one minute ahead.

The Constitution's fast sailing today was all the more formidable, from the fact that the race was sailed under light winds and smooth water, under which conditions the Reliance has often beaten her. The course was a triangle, 10 miles across the Sound, five miles over to the Connecticut shore, and 10 miles along that shore to the finish line. Summary:

Soon after sunrise today a driving northeast storm set in. It was very early in the morning that it would continue throughout the day, so that there was little hope three hours before the time set for the start that the yachts would appear.

REVOLVER MATCH BY CABLE.

United States and France Will Compete June 30.
NEW YORK, June 19.—It is altogether likely that the proposed cable revolver match between the United States and France will be held June 30, says a Herald dispatch from Paris. The conditions already agreed upon are as follows: Fifteen competitors (amateurs only) on each side, with five substitutes. To shoot at 200 yards, 10 shots at each mark of arms, at a distance of 50 yards, and at whatever place the shooter may choose, but in the presence of a delegate appointed by the National Revolver Association of America or the Union des Societes Ter de France.

Series of six balls are to be completed by each member. Eighteen trial shots on a sure target will be allowed. The general rules will be the same as governed the contest of 1900, when the Americans won by 61 points, J. A. Deltz, Jr., making the highest score. The names of the marksmen on both sides must be made known before June 28.

PEACOCK SENTENCED TO DEATH.
