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WHEELBARROW LOADS OF ROSES—Roses are being sold on an extensive scale for pleasure involves more of labor and anxiety, to say nothing of expense, than many would care to justify. A citizen who has made himself a victim of this "fad" on a broad-gauge style which keeps him busy during most of his "leisure" moments, has a wife who sympathizes with him and has all in her power to aid him in making a success of the business. She spent most of the day yesterday clipping faded and damaged roses from the bushes and at evening had five full wheelbarrow loads piled in one corner of the garden and was naturally a little weary. A friend passing asked her if it were not a little trying to have a husband so devoted to rose culture. She acknowledged that it involved a lot of extra work for both of them, "but," added she, "men must have something to dream about, and keeps him at home evenings." When asked why she did not dry the rose leaves and use them in closets and bureau drawers to scent her linen, as used to be the custom, she said there were too many of them, and they would fill the bureau and closets and leave no room for linen. She tried it last year and found that there were worms among the leaves and this prevented her from attempting it again. One may have too much even of a good thing, and "enough is as good as a feast," even of roses.

SHORT CUT GRASS ON PARK STRIPS—The high grass and weeds growing between so many sidewalks and curbs and fences in the residence portions of the city must be cut. Such was the declaration of an officer of the Civic Improvement League yesterday. Last year the City Council passed an ordinance to the effect that the grass growing in the streets must be cut during the months of June and September. Already many complaints have been made to the Improvement League that the law is not being complied with, especially in the Nob Hill portion of the city. The complaints are principally from women. On rainy days the grass acts as a sponge and wets the pedestrian while on dry days it holds the dust, soiling the clothes of every one who passes. The officers of the league declare that the grass must be cut and threaten to make a couple of examples of negligent citizens in the Police Court next week.

BACK FROM THE MOUNTAINS—City Health Commissioner Bierdorf arrived home yesterday from a week's vacation in the mountains looking as sunburned and tanned as possible. He has an interesting story to tell of his vacation, and took a trip into that region to have a look at his property. He could not get any nearer than within 20 miles of the city, owing to the snow and ice. When he had reached an elevation of 9000 feet he found the snow seven feet deep and a prospect that the farther he went the deeper it would be, so he camped a day there and then turned back. While camped he enjoyed a lively thunder storm accompanied by heavy rain. He says there are many people camped along the road on their way to the Thunder Mountain, and that the snow is so deep that they all say that the season is a month later than usual.

DEATH OF EDWARD POINTER—A Clatskanie, Cal., paper has received in the city containing the announcement of the death of Edward Pointer at Deer Park, that state, on June 2. Mr. Pointer was born in Portland 45 years ago and lived here until 1890, having been engaged in the candy business with James Stitt for four years, and with Scott Gilbert for the last two years before that date. In 1890 he sold his property on Jefferson street, Sylvan, where his brother, Theodore Stitt, and his nephew, William Bush, his health had been failing for some time, but death came unexpectedly from heart disease.

WANTED FOR WIRE DESTRUCTION—The police are trying to locate Albert E. Livingston, who deserted his wife and family in Chicago a few weeks ago and is thought to have come to Portland. Livingston is described as a man of medium build and light complexion. He has blonde hair and is about 45 years of age. No reason for the desertion is given in the dispatch received yesterday. The cottonwood is a hard tree to kill and a root left in the ground has caused the growth of thirty shoots between the stone blocks in the gutter which are growing rapidly and will soon raise the blocks out of the ground.

The head camp of Modern Woodmen has refused to admit Texas and New Mexico. Robbers secured \$300 in cash and \$300 in stamps by cracking the Colfax, Ill., postoffice safe. Three New York brewers, who sold their large plants to an English syndicate, have bought them back. Philadelphia yesterday celebrated the 100th anniversary of the evacuation of Valley Forge by the Continental Army. In a fight with negro highwaymen at Hutchinson, Kan., John Newberry was killed and R. Gross seriously wounded. N. Belson, an Atchison, Kan., saloon-keeper, was shot and killed yesterday by T. McKen in a dispute over a dice game. Careless smoking by miners in a Twilight, Pa., powder house caused an explosion which resulted fatally to three slaves. George Durham and Fred Underwood, negroes, were hanged at Parkville, Ark., yesterday for the murder of Sheriff John Powers in 1902. A Connecticut court has made an order which will make it possible for the final link in the New York-Boston trolley line to be completed. Otto Thurner, an electrical expert from Germany, was instantly killed by touching a live wire while inspecting a new switchboard at Philadelphia. Mrs. Sam Bailey, of St. Louis, and daughter and son were mysteriously murdered yesterday. They were poor, and a motive for the crime is hard to find. The 11th Eastern conference of the Young Women's Christian Association will be held under the auspices of the American committee at Silver Bay on Lake George, June 25-July 30.
