Washington Senator Returns From Gray's Harbor.

PLANS TO DEEPEN THE BAR

Lively Republican Fight for Walla Walla Mayorship—Will Ed Hamilton Try to Be Congressman?

Levi Ankeny, of Walla Walla, junior United States Senator from the State of Washington, has returned to his home to take an active part in the municipal campaign at Walla Walla. He has been visiting Western Washington points, and passed through Portland yesterday, after having spent several days in the Grays Harbor country investigating the plans for continuing the work of building a jetty outside that harbor.

The people of Gray's Harbor are very anxious to have the jetty completed, explained Senator Ankeny yesterday, "and I am confident that Congress will make a satisfactory appropriation. The federal government heretofore has recognized the necessity for continuing this work, and the construction of that part of the jetty already built has increased the foreign commerce of the harbor of Aberdeen and Hoquiam remarkably. Last year the Gray's Harbor towns shipped more than \$3,000,000 worth of products, and there is little question but that this could be materially increased if the harbor facilities were improved.

"The people of Gray's Harbor are anxious that the water over the bar should be made six feet deeper and that the harbor should be protected by extending the work. I was shown the effect of the work already done by a committee of Gray's Harbor citizens, and have pledged myself to aid them in continuing the work.

"I shall be glad to do the people of those cities whatever benefit I can. It is easy for one to see the necessity for the work, and it can readily be understood that an investment made by the federal government in continuing the harbor improvements will be money well spent. Heretofore Congress has looked upon Gray's Harbor as one of the points where improvements should be made, and I think I shall be able to throw some new light upon this contemplated work that will aid in securing additional appropriations. I believe the entire congressional delegation from Washington is in favor of the appropriation, and I believe we shall have the support of other Western representatives and Senators."

Content in Walla Walla.

In Senator Ankeny's home town, Walla Walla, there is a municipal contest that is attracting general attention throughout the Northwest. Opponents of Senator Ankeny have insisted upon the nomination of Frank Dement as an independent candidate for Mayor to oppose Gilbert Hunt, the present Mayor and friend of Senator Ankeny. Years ago Mr. Hunt was a Democrat, but he left the party when free silver was urged by the Democrats under Bryan. He was elected Mayor of Walla Walla two years ago by the business men, who were anxious for a change in administration and the introduction of business principles. Mr. Hunt was then and is now a Republican, though his election was accomplished on non-partisan lines. He has been re-nominated in a similar manner.

"I intend to support Mayor Hunt for reelection next month, and I believe my friends will do so," explained Senator Ankeny, discussing the situation at Walla Walla. "I have no doubt that Mr. Hunt will be re-elected, though I understand his opponents have made preparations for a hard fight. They have nominated Frank Dement, who is favored by what is known as the 'Boxer' element of the Republican party.

"The 'Boxers' have been opposing me and it is doubtful if a part of their opposition to Mr. Hunt is a part of their theory that he is a friend of mine. But Mr. Hunt is a fearless and independent man, one who would not hesitate to tell one of his friends that he would not support him or his policies if he believed him to be wrong. I have been an admirer of Mr. Hunt because of his sterling integrity and fearless character. He is a man for Walla Walla and not a factional leader.

To Succeed Cushman.

Over on the Sound country there is talk of the nomination of State Senator Ed S. Hamilton, chairman of the last year's delegates to the State Convention, to the State Legislature, to succeed Congressman F. W. Cushman. Senator Hamilton is one of the men who were responsible for Senator Ankeny's election, and if it were possible Ankeny would like Senator Hamilton to succeed him. The question of Senator Hamilton's nomination for Congressman was submitted to Senator Ankeny, and he replied:

"Mr. Hamilton would make one of the very best Congressmen Washington could send to the national capital. He is strong, fearless, determined, a well-balanced man, and one who would accomplish a great deal for his State. I am sure nothing would give me greater pleasure than to see him nominated for Congress.

"But do you think Senator Hamilton could accept? I know he would cheerfully sacrifice his own interests for the benefit of the Republican party and his State, but I am not yet certain that he would be willing to make this fight. He is a close personal friend of Senator Foster, and if the latter is a candidate for reelection, as I understand he will be, would Senator Hamilton be adding him in accepting the Congressional nomination? Senator Hamilton will think of it among the first considerations, and he will answer the question himself. I do wish Senator Hamilton could be sent to Washington, but I am not certain that he would accept the nomination. I should like to vote for him."

Supt. Westendorp's Removal.

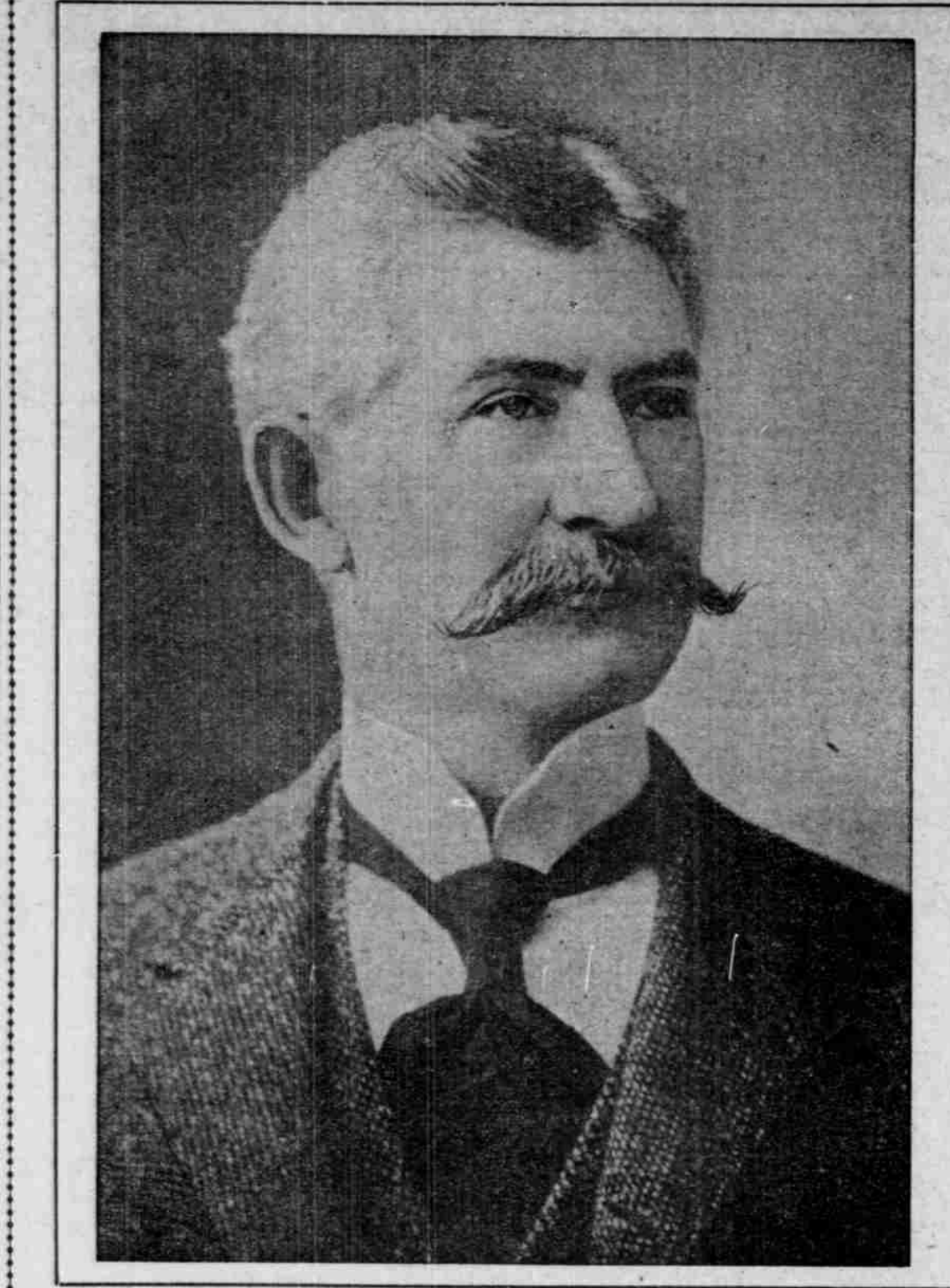

"I was impressed in Northwestern Washington with the warm support Superintendent Westendorp had for the substantial business interests and the politicians Superintendent Westendorp is regarded as the best fitted man Washington ever had for superintendent of the reform school. I have been told that opposition to his administration had developed, but I was unable to find any evidence of it.

"The people generally seem to be sorry to see Superintendent Westendorp leave the State reform school, and I am afraid we will realize later that a mistake has been made in dispensing with his services."

Portland's big benefit entertainment for the Heppner fund is to be presented tomorrow afternoon in the Marquam Grand Theater. The tickets have been selling very freely, but there is still plenty of room for those who wish to contribute. The benefit committee, composed of J. Wesley Ladd, W. D. Wheelwright and Edward Ehrman, will hold a meeting this morning, at which Manager George L. Baker will make a report of the progress he has made toward furnishing the entertainment. Mr. Baker returned from Seattle with the Baker Stock Company, whose members have volunteered very willingly to do their part toward bringing an additional \$500 into the relief fund.

At the meeting of the committee the programme will be definitely settled. When the Marquam box office opened Saturday morning at 10 o'clock for the exchange of the tickets for seat checks a long line of waiting people extended from the office window to the street. All day long a crowd surged around the box office. Many, in the belief that the box office was open Sunday, went there yesterday, but found, as usual, that it was closed.

WILL SEEK NEW TRIAL.

Leasia Says He Did Not Get Justice From Jury.

Martin V. Leasia, convicted of murder in the second degree, will appeal his case. "I do not feel that I have been tried justly," said he yesterday, "and I shall make another attempt to obtain justice. My wife's father shot me, and I felt that I was justified in firing to protect myself."

"You should have given yourself up at once," said his father, who was listening to his statement, "and not have made an attempt to get away. That was the only wrong thing you did."

"I was in such a frame of mind," said the prisoner, "that I did not know what I was doing. I do not blame the jurors for the decision they rendered. There were so many lies sworn to at the trial that they could not get a true statement of the facts before them. Already my wife has put my child in an orphan's home, to be adopted by any one that wants it. I think that she has done this to hurt me."

PREVENT FIGHTS

Church Committee and District Attorney Agree.

POSITION OF MAYOR WILLIAMS

If Council Forbids Pugilism He Will Enforce Ordinance—Pastime Club Denies It Has Prized Fights or That Brutality Prevails.

When the next prizefight, or glove contest, is about to be pulled off a complaint is to be made to the office of the District Attorney and a warrant sworn out for the principals and the promoters. The committee appointed by the Calvary Presbyterian Church has promised to make the required complaint shortly before the next contest or fight is about to take place. District Attorney Manning, on his part, has promised to make the arrests whenever the complaint is received.

The committee consisting of W. J. Honeyman, L. M. Parrish and John Bain, recently appointed for the purpose of endeavoring to put a stop to prizefighting in this city, has had interviews with the Mayor and Council yesterday. The Mayor stated that in view of the fact that the City Council had passed an ordinance providing for the licensing of such exhibitions, they had no power to prevent them. Mayor Williams, however, stated that, if the council would pass an ordinance prohibiting them, he would see to it being enforced.

Mr. Manning, the District Attorney, on being appealed to, gave the committee his unqualified promise that during his term of office he would see that the state law regarding such exhibitions is rigorously enforced irrespective of the attitude of other officials.

There is no intention of letting the matter drop, and should any future matches be attempted, the committee's attorneys will have to reckon with the law.

The managers of the Pastime Club, which conducted the last exhibition, do not look with any alarm upon the movement started by the Calvary Church committee. They do not intend to defy the church members, but to make no effort for future fights after the benefit boxing match has been carried out for the aid of the Heppner people.

"We have never had a prizefight at the Pastime Club," said Jack Day, manager of the Pastime Club, last evening. "What we have presented has been nothing but glove contests or boxing matches. When we give the benefit contest I will present a box to the committee from the Pastime Club, and they may use it for themselves if there is anything brutal about the exhibitions which the Pastime Club has given. I hope that they will accept the invitation that they have given to the committee to use the Pastime Club for their exhibitions. I can say that we never have given a prizefight, for there has been no knock-out, and we make it a rule to stop a fight whenever it becomes brutal, and it is apparent that one man has no chance of victory."

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CUBA FREE OF YELLOW JACK

Smallpox Is Unheard Of, but Tuberculosis Increases Its Ravages.

WASHINGTON, June 20.—A copy of the monthly report of Dr. C. J. Finlay, chief sanitary officer for the island of Cuba, which has been received at the Cuban Legation here, contains the following:

"The showing for 1903 and the beginning of 1904 is very satisfactory, not only in regard to the complete exemption from yellow fever and smallpox, but also in the number of deaths from malaria and in the total mortality. There has been no smallpox on the island since June, 1901, no yellow fever since September, 1901, and the progress in the decrease in malaria has continued without interruption.

"The condition regarding tuberculosis, however, is not so satisfactory. There has been an increase of 6 to 8 per cent in deaths from that disease in each of the years 1901 and 1902, and at the present time the proportion of deaths from that cause to the general mortality amount to over 15 per cent. The Board of Health is making efforts to test the efficiency of sanitary measures in that direction."

PIOUS INDIANS TIMID.

Whites May Not Attend Klows Baptist Meetings.

HOBART, O. T., June 21.—The Indian Baptist Association, which is composed of Klows Indians, has adopted a resolution excluding all whites from their meetings. Missionaries working among the Indians announce this as a result of the timidity of the Indians in participating in religious exercises in the presence of the whites.
