

STRIKERS FIRED ON

Six Richmond Street-Car Men
Are Wounded.

GUARDS SHOOT INTO A CROWD

Militiamen Now on Duty Will Be Re-
inforced Today—Lines Are Oper-
ating Under Military Protec-
tion—Bombs Are Exploded.

RICHMOND, Va., June 24.—Six men were wounded tonight, two of them seriously, by guards in the employ of the street railway company, who fired into a crowd of strike sympathizers at Main and Lombardy streets, just outside the city limits, where a big crowd was congregated. Officers of the company say the guards were fired on first, and that they returned the fire with their shotguns. At least six persons were struck, and two of them were seriously wounded in the back with buckshot.

While this was taking place in the West End, exciting scenes were enacted in the East End, where cars were operated under the protection of the militia. All sorts of missiles were hurled at the cars and many obstructions were placed on the track. Finally the cars, under the pilotage of a detachment of the Richmond Howitzers, with a Gatling gun, were taken to the barns. All cars were withdrawn from the streets at 1:45 P. M. for the night.

Five companies of the Seventy-first Regiment from Norfolk and Newport News are en route to this city to reinforce the troops already here, and they expect to arrive early in the morning.

Cars were run on all lines today under military protection. Two militiamen, with bayonets fixed, stood guard at the front and two on the rear platform of each car. The power houses and supply depots within the city also have been guarded with militia, while sentinels have been posted at car-line crossings. Notwithstanding these precautions, the first car of the Clay street line to leave the East End this morning was attacked and obstructed by a mob, and Captain Skilpith, of one of the Richmond companies, was wounded in the leg by a fragment of a bomb exploded on the track. Prominent in the crowd that held out and put the cars, the strike-breakers, and the militiamen are women, the wives and daughters of strikers and strike sympathizers. The military force now on duty in Richmond aggregates about 300 men.

WILL STRIKE IN RETALIATION.

New York Building Trades Will Re-
sist General Tie-Up.

NEW YORK, June 24.—To strike on every building in operation in New York, in retaliation for the tie-up, was the general tenor of the speeches at the meeting of the diverging bodies of the United Board of Building Trades today.

John J. Donovan, ex-president of the United Board of Building Trades Union, announced in a speech tonight that all the trades interested in building operations in Greater New York would go on strike tomorrow morning.

According to Mr. Donovan not only would all the trades be in line with the strike, headed by the plasterers, but all the operations in the country where members of the Building Trades Employers Association are interested would be involved. The cause of the sudden decision to strike was the desire of the workers to reply effectively to the ultimatum of the employers that the workers must accept the employers' plan of arbitration. Sixty-eight thousand men will be affected by the strike in Greater New York.

RAILROAD FACES A BIG STRIKE.

All of the Freighthandlers in Chi-
cago May Walk Out.

CHICAGO, June 24.—A general strike of all the freighthandlers employed by the railroads centering in Chicago may follow the calling out of the Chicago & Alton men today. According to President Curran, of the Freighthandlers Union, unless the management of the Alton road shall recede from the stand taken it will be necessary for him to extend the strike to the other lines to enforce the demands of the union. The freighthandlers employed by the Alton road quit work today because two union men had been discharged. There is no question of wages in the controversy, as less than a month ago all the roads signed a new agreement granting the freighthandlers a substantial increase in wages.

President Curran asserts that the two men were discharged because they were prominent in the Freighthandlers Union, and he says those two men must be reinstated. The railroad management declares that the men were discharged for neglect of duty and cannot be taken back.

COAL QUESTION PINCHES

"Cussedness" of Men Who Control
Shipping of Supply.

Coal is selling in Lowell for prices ranging from \$7.75 to \$8 per ton. There is plenty of coal already mined or being mined, and the cause of the strike are very small. Consequently there must be some reason for this excessive price aside from unavoidable scarcity or inability to get it out of the ground. In Lowell the reasons are simple: that there is an active demand and the supply sent here is carefully and willfully restricted so that the demand shall not get too speedily satisfied. Last winter the coal sheds everywhere were swept clean. Every surplus pound of coal was discovered and used. Those who now control the coal supply got things just where they wanted them, as a matter of fact, by learning exactly where they stood. This situation they are not allowing to get away from them, apparently, and the cause of high prices at a season when coal should be low is purely and simply the willful "cussedness" of the men who control the shipping of the supply. The people, who have no defense at all against extortion, are paying whatever is demanded, and cannot do otherwise. We rather think that the plan is to keep the price of coal fairly tight right along, not perhaps going to sensational extremes, which could hardly be sustained as things now stand, but to keep them about as high as the public will submit to by a judicious control of the outflow of coal. How long this will be endured we do not know. It seems too bad that such a necessary article should be in the hands of greedy proprietors, but it is and it will remain there until some means is found of taking it out.

MEN IN MOB WILL ESCAPE

CORONER IMPLICATES NO ONE IN
BURNING OF NEGRO.

Wilmington People Make Demon-
stration for Release of Man Held
Before Verdict Is Known.

WILMINGTON, Del., June 24.—Arthur

Corwell, who claims his home is in Hartford City, Ind., and who was arrested last night on the charges of complicity in the burning to death of George White, the negro assailant and murderer of Helen Bishop, was released on \$5000 bail tonight. He will be given a further hearing tomorrow.

Tonight 200 persons gathered in front of the City Hall, where Corwell was confined, and made a demonstration. The police authorities took every precaution to prevent an attempt at rescuing the prisoner by the crowd. The crowd committed no overt act, however, beyond making a great noise. There were loud cries for the release of Corwell.

FOUND GUILTY OF PEONAGE.

Georgia Judge Fines Three Young
Men for Holding a Negro

Macon, Ga., June 24.—In the United States Court today Judge Spear imposed a fine of \$100 each on three young men, William Shy, Arthur Clawson and Robert Turner, for holding a negro in involuntary servitude. He suspended the fine until conditions, and in so doing said:

"In view of the fact that it is the first crime of the kind which has ever occurred in Georgia and because of the frank confession of the young men, sentence is imposed in order to convince the public that the purpose of the court is to warn and deter others from like crime. During good behavior the fine is suspended upon payment of \$1 by each."

TILLMAN CARRIES HIS POINT.

Ex-Lieutenant-Governor Secures a
Change of Venue.

COLUMBIA, S. C., June 24.—Arguments on the motion for a change of venue in the case of ex-Lieutenant-Governor James H. Tillman, indicted for murder, were concluded late this afternoon, and Judge Townsend at once announced his decision that the change should be granted. Counsel disagreed concerning the county where the case should be tried, and the time was left undecided for the present. The belief is that Judge Townsend will name either Saluda or Lexington County.

NEGRO IS SPIRITED AWAY.

Officers Put Slayer of Detective Be-
hind Bars.

PEORIA, Ill., June 24.—John McCray, the colored desperado, who killed Detective W. E. Murphy last night, was taken

out of the county jail through a door in the rear shortly after noon today. A carriage was waiting, and Sheriff Potter, accompanied by two deputies and his prisoner, drove to Peoria, boarding a Burlington train for Galesburg, where McCray will be imprisoned until the date of the trial.

In the early part of the evening a crowd gathered in front of the jail, and it became evident that an attempt would be made to force an entrance. In order to convince the mob that McCray had been removed, a committee composed of six members of the mob were permitted to search the building. After hearing the report of the committee that McCray was not in the jail the mob dispersed.

Negro Fiend's Victim Dies.

ST. LOUIS, June 24.—Mystery as to the identity of the negro who assaulted Miss Florence Bruno, a white girl, and Annie Green, a colored woman, yesterday afternoon, between East St. Louis and Belleville, grows, and the authorities are unable to solve it. Miss Bruno died today from the effects of her terrible wounds, and her fellow victim is thought to be past recovery.

Negro Kills Chinese Cook at Hotel.

CHICAGO, June 24.—During a row in the Arlington hotel in this city Charles Blue, an aged negro, stabbed the Chinese cook and killed him. The negro gave himself up to the authorities. The trouble arose over serving a meal, and was started by the cook. It was clearly a case of self-defense.

Sentenced to Prison for Peonage.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., June 24.—Today in the United States Court J. W. Pace, a prominent planter of Tallapoosa County, was arraigned for trial on 11 indictments charging him with peonage. He pleaded guilty, was sentenced to five years imprisonment and appealed.

Negro Lynched for Assault on Girl.

ELK VALLEY, Tenn., June 24.—Case Jones, the negro accused of assaulting 15-year-old Margaret Bruce yesterday, was caught during the night. He confessed and was promptly strung up, his body being riddled with bullets.
