SHOW FEAR FOR POPE

Attendants Display Anxiety at Consistory.

HIS HOLINESS IS VERY WEAK

Vast Assemblage is Confident the Aged Pontiff Has Bestowed His Last Benediction—Father O'Reilly Made Bishop at Baker City.

ROME, June 25.—The public consistory, postponed from June 18, was held today with much pomp and added interest and reverence, for, in spite of the reassuring news concerning the pope's health, many believe that this will be the last consistory under Leo XIII. The assemblage gathered at the venerable pontiff with intense curiosity, and there was redoubled enthusiasm in the cries of "Long live Leo." He looked a little more wasted, a little more bowed, his voice was somewhat thinner, and it was evident that his attendants were anxious.

There were many strangers among the crowds gathered in the corridors of the Sala Regia and Sala Ducale to witness the passage of the cortege. The pontiff was borne in the sedia gestatoria by eight bearers clad in red brocade. They were flanked by the bearers of the famous flabell or feathered fans.

The pope smiled while he blessed the crowds as he passed. In fact, at times he tried to rise so he could impart his benediction, and it was only when he descended from the sedia gestatoria that his extreme weakness was apparent. Following the pontiff came a gorgeous line of scarlet-clad cardinals, friars in various habits; priests and members of the papal court, wearing velvet knee breeches and white ruffles. The church dignitaries were escorted by the noble Swiss and Palatine Guards, which with the Sistine choir, chanting solemnly, formed an emotional picture.

Special tribunes were erected on both sides of the papal throne for the accommodation of the members of the diplomatic corps, the King of Malta, the Roman aristocracy, the families of the pope, and relatives of the newly created cardinals. Among the Americans were Mr. Kennedy, rector of the American College; Mr. Farrell, secretary of the American College, and privy chamberlain to the pope; Mr. Robert Seton, formerly of Jersey City; Titular Archbishop of Heliopolis, and Right Rev. F. Z. Roeder, Bishop of Jarro, Philippine Islands.

Ceremony Made Short as Possible. The ceremony was made as short as possible, in order to ease the pontiff's fatigue. The pope sat on the throne facing the broad covered benches in the form of a square on which the cardinals were seated.

The new cardinals present, who were to receive the red hat from the pontiff, according to custom, first took the oath in the Sistine Chapel, and were then ushered into the Sala Regia, where they were greeted by the master of the ceremonies. On approaching the pontiff the three cardinals knelt and kissed his foot and his hand, and the pope then gave them the double embrace. The new cardinals afterward embraced the other cardinals. Returning to the pontiff, each of the new cardinals then received from his hand a cardinal's hat, which ended the ceremony.

The pope thereupon rose, bestowed the apostolic benediction, and, preceded by the pontifical cross and surrounded by the cardinals and attendants, retired.

FACE MARTIAL LAW

Street-Car Strikers Are to Be Shot in All Riots.

WARN WOMEN TO STAY INDOORS

Richmond Service Is Only Possible Under Protection of Militiamen—Strong Guards on Duty All Over the City.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 25.—The United Typothetae of America, in convention here, sent a delegation to Washington tonight to protest against the removal of Superintendent of the Money Order Division Metcalfe, as they believe his dismissal to be unwarranted.

The delegation, which is said to represent 20,000 workers, will advocate the President's refusal of recognition of the bid of Paul Herman for the money order plants against the New York concern, which has had the contract for years, and by which Herman was employed until a few days before the bids were submitted. They held that such recognition would encourage unfaithfulness and dishonor among employees.

Press Club's Convention Ends. ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 25.—The annual convention of the International League of Press Clubs came to an end this afternoon. Salt Lake was selected as the next place for the convention.

FATALLY HURT IN CIRCUS. Employee Is Attacked by Elephant While Walking in His Sleep.

OGDEN, Utah, June 25.—John Wilkins, an employee of Sells & Downer's circus, died here today from injuries received in an encounter with an elephant on the circus train between Ogden and Evanston early yesterday. It is said that Wilkins walked in his sleep, and as he was passing the animal it attacked him. Wilkins was crushed in a horrible manner.

Mexican Indian Troubles at an End. TUCSON, Ariz., June 25.—United States customs officials at Nogales have been informed by the Mexican government that the orders forbidding the importation of firearms from the United States by Americans crossing the line, which has been in effect ever since the Yaqui troubles, has been revoked, as they consider the Indian troubles at an end.

CUSTOMS OFFICIAL TO GO

TACOMA AGENT WILL PROBABLY HAND IN HIS RESIGNATION.

John W. Linck Has Not Explained Away the Charges Preferred Against Him.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, June 25.—Special Agent John W. Linck of the Treasury Department, stationed at Tacoma and assigned to Oregon and Washington customs districts, will probably tender his resignation within a few days. Charges were recently filed against Linck alleging misconduct, and he has been given every opportunity to make a full reply, but his explanations are not satisfactory to the department. Senator Mitchell and several other persons in the Northwest telegraphed to Secretary Shaw protesting against Linck's removal, and the department replies to these telegrams strongly indicate that Linck must resign before long or he will not be given the opportunity. The department refuses to make public the charges against Linck.

KETTLE POISONS MEAT.

Ex-Member of Congress and Family in a Dangerous Condition.

MONTROSE, Colo., June 25.—By eating meat cooked in a kettle in which spray poison had been mixed six weeks before, the entire family of C. M. Kem and the hired men, 11 in all, were prostrated yesterday afternoon. None has yet died, but they are not out of danger, as the poison was arsenic, which is slow in its action. Mr. Kem at one time represented Nebraska in Congress.

Cash Register Man Is Indicted. NEW YORK, June 25.—The Federal grand jury in Brooklyn today presented two indictments against George F. Miller,

general agent of the Brandt Automatic Cashier. The indictments charge Miller with aiding and abetting ex-Representative Briggs to violate the United States revised statutes in paying money to Driggs. Miller was arraigned and withheld his plea pending examination of the indictment by his counsel. He gave bail in the sum of \$2500.
