

WATCH HIM DROWN

John G. Vandye, Jr.'s Friends
Could Not Save Him.

WERE FISHING IN ROGUE RIVER

Fifty Young Men Leave His Home
Town to Endeavor to Find the
Young Man's Body—Leaves a
Young Wife.

MEDFORD, Or., June 28.—(Special).—News has been received from Agate by telephone that John G. Vandye, Jr., was drowned while fishing on Rogue River, just above Bybee's bridge, about 12 miles from Medford, between 4 and 5 P. M. He was in company with Ed Bodge, Guy Childers and Al Elsmert, all of whom saw him drown, but could not get to his assistance.

Mr. Vandye was about 29 years old, a member of the dry goods firm of J. G. Vandye & Co., also a member of the City Council. He was one of Medford's most popular young men, and his sudden death has cast a gloom over the entire community.

Upon receiving the news about 50 young men left here for the river in hopes of recovering the body, but as yet it has not been found. He has been married about six months, and his young wife is prostrated. He also left a father, mother, brothers and sisters.

SUITS NOT AS REPRESENTED.
Oregon City Man Says Chicago Firm Has Biked Him.

OREGON CITY, Or., June 28.—(Special).—Dr. M. C. Strickland, of this city, has instituted in the Oregon City Justice Court a suit against the Columbia Tailoring Company, of Chicago, to recover damages in the sum of \$10. The complaint alleges that he has been damaged to that extent by misrepresentation on the part of an agent for the defendant company in selling him a suit. This proceeding is the sequel to the recent operations in this city of a transient agent for the defendant tailoring company. With a splendid lot of samples and smooth and convincing way the salesman, who gave the name of Fitzpatrick, was successful in inducing many prominent citizens to place with him an order for suits.

Because of the extremely low prices he offered the wily agent succeeded in getting many of his customers to make a cash deposit equal in amount to the selling value of the suit. This week the suits began to arrive by express. Instead of being according to sample, the garments were of inferior quality and are mislabeled. The Wells Fargo Express Company here has been furnished in the pending action and a number of rejected suits in the local office have been seized by legal process. The case will be heard soon.

TYPHOID NOT EPIDEMIC.
Salem Has No More Than Her Share

SALEM, Or., June 28.—(Special).—Dr. A. E. Pierce, Dr. Harry Lane and Dr. Woods Hutchinson, of the State Board of Health, visited the State Insane Asylum, Penitentiary, Reform School, Mute School and Asylum farm today and examined the source of water supply of these institutions. Samples of water were taken from the supply at each place and a sample was also taken from the city water pipes. The water will be subjected to chemical analysis with a view to determining its healthfulness. A report of the result of the investigation will be made later.

Last evening the committee from the State Board of Health held a conference with the physicians of Salem, when the local conditions were discussed informally. The prevalence of typhoid received chief attention. It was the consensus of opinion among the physicians that there is not now an unusual number of typhoid cases in Salem and that the disease is not in the nature of an epidemic here. It was also the opinion that there is no more typhoid in Salem than in other Oregon towns. The committee is investigating the subject of typhoid in Oregon and will visit other cities soon.

RATTLESNAKE AT LONG BEACH.
Probably Came Down on Driftwood From Far to the East.

ILWACO, Wash., June 28.—(Special).—The first rattlesnake ever seen on North beach was killed yesterday by Carl Shahan at the Ilwaco Life Saving Station, 10 miles from this city. This rattler was 4 feet in length, about 2 inches through and had 12 rattles and a button. Old residents of the beach cannot remember far enough back to call to mind the sight of rattlesnake in this part of the country, and all are wondering how his snakehood happened to be where he was found. Many theories are advanced.

As the streams are swollen and a large amount of drift floating some suggest the snake came from the mountains on the watersheds of the Columbia or Snake rivers. It is thought it might have been in hollow log and floated off in this way and its home landed ashore near where a snake was killed.

His snakehood was far away from home, it was not by any means any the worse for his long journey, as when approached he coiled in a striking attitude and prepared to make an assault on Mr. Shagan.

FUZZY WORMS EAT WEEDS.
Garden Truck and Crops Not Harmed at Walla Walla.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., June 28.—(Special).—It developed today that the invading horde of caterpillars which has been from some unknown source into the Walla Walla Valley is neither the regular worm nor the tent caterpillar, but an entirely new species, which was never seen here before and whose genus no one has yet been able to place.

The species has a thorny covering, from which many spikes protrude, and over which light brown fuzz is scattered. Two rows of stripes run the length of each side of the body near the under part. The specimens travel as rapidly. Horticultural Inspector Frank Morse, who examined them today, says, as six or eight at a minute. Mr. Morse is sending specimens away for identification.

Wheat or garden stuff is not being injured. The visitors live on weeds exclusively, such as hollyhock, wild chesnut, burr, arbutus and others. To night the host is turned southwest toward a city, from which it is distant only two and a half miles. Those who examined the caterpillars today thought the worms would eventually devour new species of moth or butterfly. Many are already mining webs, and seem to be nearing cocoon stage.

ALBANY, Or., June 28.—(Special).—The merchants' carnival will open in Albany tomorrow and will continue throughout the entire week, closing with a grand parade of July celebration. 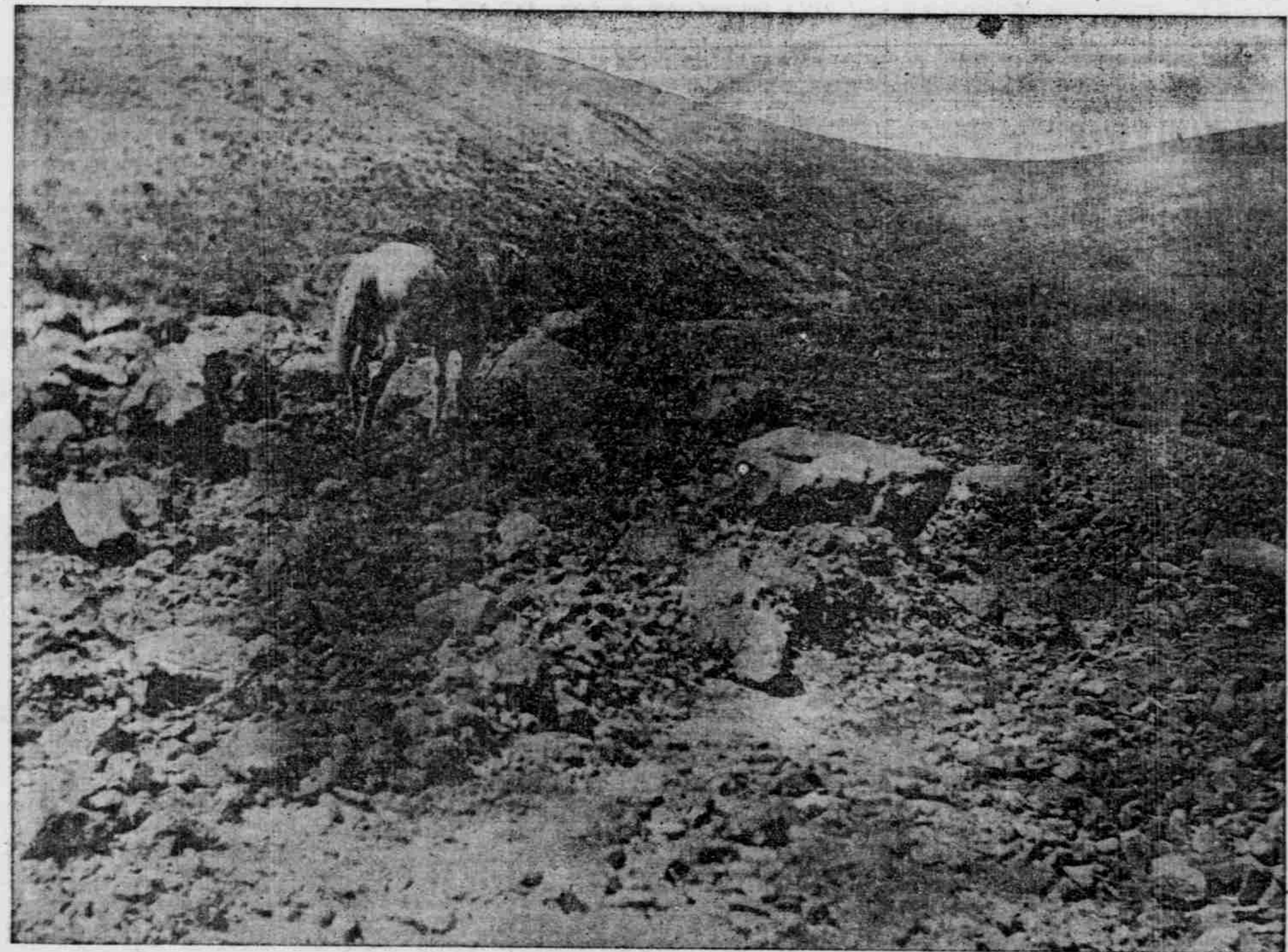
TOLD HIS BROTHER TO PAY.

HARVEST PROSPECTS EXCELLENT.
Linn County Crops Have Been Helped by the Showers.

ALBANY, Or., June 28.—(Special).—Linn County farmers are elated over the excellent prospects for good crops. The damage done by the few days of hot weather early in the month has been overcome by the cool weather and rains of the past week and the indications are that almost a full crop will be harvested.

Just now the rain is doing some damage to hay. A considerable amount of clover hay has been cut and will be injured some by the rain. A week's good weather would see a large portion of the hay crop safely harvested.

The fruit outlook is excellent, although the crop of apples and pears will be light. There will be an extraordinary yield of prunes, which constitute by far the greater portion of most orchards. The prune trees in this section will be loaded with all the fruit they can possibly bear. In some instances a part of the fruit will have to be shaken off to save the trees.

Sabin's Reward for Linecutters.
SAN FRANCISCO, June 28.—There were no important developments in the strike of the telephone linemen today. President Sabin, of the telephone company, today issued a circular offering a reward of \$1000 for the arrest and conviction of the persons who about 1 o'clock this morning cut the main lead of 30 wires on the San Pablo road, Alameda County.

RICH IDAHO PLACER SOLD

OLD MAN SHORT WORKED IT WHEN HE NEEDED MONEY.

Eastern Company Will Take Gold Out at a Rapid Rate With Improved Appliances.

WEISER, Idaho, June 28.—(Special).—An important mining deal was closed last week by which the placer ground one mile above where the Little Salmon empties into the main Salmon, passed into the possession of the Pittsburg Mining Company. The company is composed of several wealthy Pittsburg people and Weiser residents. The consideration was \$12,000. The placer ground is known as Short's bar, and is known to be very rich.

The ground belonged to old man Short, who worked it only when he needed some money. The ground consists of 100 acres, part of which Mr. Short farmed and had a large orchard on it. He took \$15,000 from a very small portion of it, working it in a desultory way.

The Pittsburg company will expend about \$15,000 to equip the mine. A ditch will be constructed to bring 100 ft. of water to the ground, and two large giants will be operated. The company expects to take out as much in one year as Mr. Short has since he has been there. There are many rich gold-bearing gravel bars on the Salmon River and the new company will be the means of advertising them and bringing them to the front.

Miss Craft Is Named Queen at Albany

ALBANY, Or., June 28.—(Special).—The contest for Queen of the Merchants' Carnival to be held in Albany this week, ended last night. Miss Agnes Craft was the fortunate young lady who was elected to preside over the festivities of Linn County's first carnival. The total number of votes received by Miss Craft is 885, almost double the number of her nearest competitor.

Queen Agnes I is a native daughter of Linn County, and has resided in Albany for a number of years. The coronation ceremonies will be held Tuesday evening in the Stadium. On Thursday evening the carnival committee will give a grand ball in honor of the Queen.

Artery Severed by a Fall.

EUGENE, Or., June 28.—(Special).—Mrs. Minnie Washburn, received word last evening of a serious accident to her son Chester, in Benton County. Young Washburn was engaged with a party of geological surveyors and was stationed on Mary's Peak, southwest of Corvallis. About a week ago he sustained a fall, breaking an artery in his leg. He managed to make his way nine miles to the nearest ranch and was taken from there to Corvallis.

Foot Struck a Circular Saw.

ALBANY, Or., June 28.—(Special).—John McDowell, who is employed in a sawmill near Sulphur Springs, Benton County, met with a serious accident yesterday. While working in the mill his foot came in contact with a circular saw and was almost severed from the limb, making it necessary to amputate a large part of the injured member.

ALBANY, Or., June 28.—(Special).—William Percy, a young man who arrived in Albany a few days ago, was arrested by Chief of Police McClain for the theft of a gold watch in Roseburg. Sheriff Parrott, of Douglas County, came after Percy today.
