GRIM NOT UNBAY.

Has a Contract With the League—His Players Bought by Other Clubs. SPOKANE, June 30.—(Special.)—Jack Grim, manager of the now defunct Portland team of Pacific National, said at midnight:

"I have no intimation of the action of the league delegates at Tacoma and know absolutely nothing of future plans of my team. I am under contract to the league for the season, therefore I do not feel at all uneasy, for my salary will probably be paid inasmuch as dealings with league directors have been fair to date."

"At this juncture the Associated Press account of new schedule came and Grim was shown it revealed that the league would have a new team. 'Do you expect to manage the new team?' was asked."

"I suppose the owners of the Salt Lake team will employ their own manager," said Grim.

"Have any of your players plans for the future in case they are dropped?" "That I do not know. Several of them have offers from the outland league, but I have held them together until now. I can't say they will leave me, or the new team."

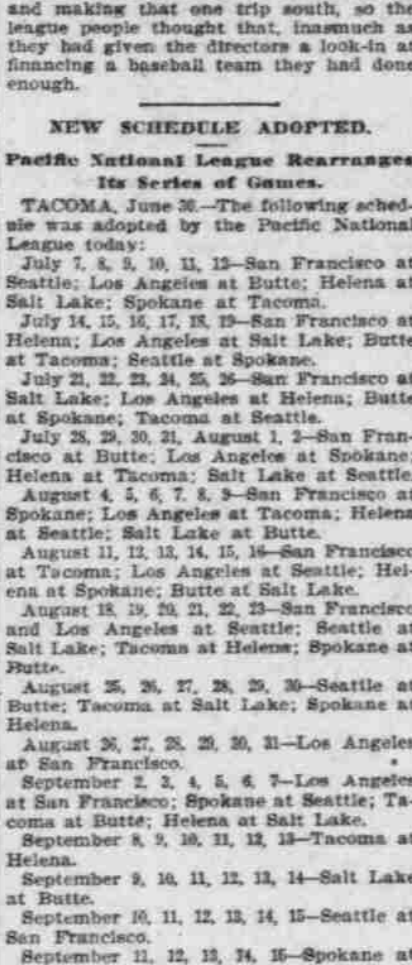
Allison Tariff Plank Is Not to Their Liking.

GOVERNOR TAKEN TO TASK

Havallan Lawmakers Accuse Dale of Official Discourtesy.

HONOLULU, June 30.—Governor Dale sent a message to the House on Monday evening half a dozen times in the act passed to provide for payment of the bills. Some of the local press, and Representative Vida introduced a resolution instructing the clerk to send a letter of inquiry to the executive asking him if he had given the information to the House about what his vetoes were to be, and if he considered such a course courteous to the Legislature. The resolution was adopted.

BID ADIEU TO KIEL.

Americans Leave German Waters Amid Great Booming of Cannon.

KIEL, June 30.—The United States squadron sailed at 6 P. M. today from Kiel, all the German ships saluting and the Americans replying. The flagship Neuzarke, Tlago and San Francisco will go through the Cattagat, stopping at Kallund Borg, Denmark, for two days. The Maches will go by way of the Kiel Canal to Brunsdattel and thence rendezvous with the other American ships off Spithead. The squadron will arrive at Portsmouth July 7.

The sailors of the imperial standard were fired at the Hohenzollern sailed for Eckernforde this morning to accommodate the Emperor and Empress tonight, after the cruiser yacht race. The Emperor started for Eckernforde on board the Meteor at 7 A. M. The Empress was on the Iduna, which also started for Eckernforde.

EMPEROR'S YACHT IS BEATEN.

Syndicate Boat Hamburg Wins the Fifty-Mile Race. KAISERLICH YACHT CLUB, Kiel, June 30.—The yacht Hamburg beat the Emperor's Meteor in the 50-mile race at Eckernforde, crossing the finish line a minute and a fraction ahead, which, with the handicap, made the Hamburg win by four minutes and 30 seconds.

GLUCKHAUF, UNOFFICIAL TIME.

The Betty VI was third. The 1600r cutter of the German turret ship Kaiser Wilhelm II beat the Chicago's 1500r cutter today in a race over a two-mile course, covering the distance in 25 seconds better time. The winning German cutter, on account of having an extra pair, started 15 seconds after the Chicago's boat, and finished eight seconds ahead. The Kaiser Wilhelm's cutter is the champion of the German squadron, and won a cup from 12 other German 1600r cutters yesterday.

AWFUL DEFEAT FOR MAD MULLAH.

British-Abyssinian Force Kills 70,000 of His Spearmen. LONDON, June 30.—The War Office today received a dispatch from Colonel Rochford, one of the British officers serving with the Abyssinian forces in Somaliland, which says the Abyssinians, on May 31, after a series of forced marches, struck the Mad Mullah's forces near Jeyd, surprising them at dawn, and killing 10,000 spearmen and capturing almost all their cattle and sheep and 1000 camels.

Colonel Rochford adds that the Abyssinian forces actually closed to the Mullah all the watering-places south of the Geroluhul-Gadai line, and he hopes they will soon be in contact with the British forces and thus be able to co-operate in the pursuit of the Mullah, who is delayed in his movements by the fact that he is crossing a waterless part of the country. The Colonel's dispatch is dated June 14.

BRITISH OFFICERS NOT HELD PRISONERS.

LONDON, June 30.—General Manning, the British commander in Somaliland, has telegraphed to the War Office discrediting the reports that several British officers are prisoners in the Mad Mullah's camp. The general says deserters from the Mullah's forces deny the rumors.

ANTI-FRETRADERS AT WORK.

Chamberlain Men Will Not Wait for Cabinet Inquiry. NEW YORK, June 30.—The outspoken followers of Colonial Secretary Chamberlain in the House of Commons are not waiting for a Cabinet inquiry, but are consulting their constituencies respecting the proposed fiscal congress, says the London correspondent of the Tribune.

SERBIAN LAWMAKERS ADJOURN.

All Legislation Is Left to the Skupshchina to Be Elected Soon. BELGRADE, June 30.—At the meeting of the Skupshchina today Premier Avakumovic read a ukase, closing the session specially summoned by the provisional government. The Premier thanked the Skupshchina in behalf of the government for the election of King Peter, and added that the government had concluded that it was better to postpone all legislation until the new Skupshchina was elected.

ELECTION RIOT IN STRASBURG.

STRASBURG, June 30.—The defeat of a clerical candidate for election to the Reichstag in a country district adjacent to Strasburg occasioned a riotous outbreak against the anti-clericalists. Mobs paraded the streets, shouting and stoning Jewish shops. The clericals have declared a boycott against the Jews and Protestants.

GERMAN NAVAL OFFICERS RECALLED.

BERLIN, June 30.—The commander of the German squadron in American waters, Commodore Scheder, and Admiral Count von Baudissin, second in command of the East Asiatic squadron, have been recalled.

HITCH IN OREGON SHORT LINE DEAL.

SALT LAKE CITY, June 30.—The formal transfer of the Southern branches of the Oregon Short Line Railroad to the San Pedro, Los Angeles & Salt Lake Railroad, which was scheduled to take place at midnight tonight, has been postponed to an indefinite date. Word to this effect was received by the Oregon Short Line officials today, and advising them to take no action in the matter until further instructions were received.

AMERICA HAS NOT YET TAKEN UP MATTER WITH RUSSIA.

PETITION IS HELD IN ABEYANCE. Uncle of the Czar Says It Will Be Regarded as Meddling in Internal Affairs and Cannot Be Received. CASANI CONFIRMS IT. WASHINGTON, June 30.—When the dispatch from St. Petersburg saying there had been no negotiations between Russia and the United States relative to President Roosevelt's intention to forward to the Russian government a petition from the American Jews concerning the events at Kishineff.

FINANCIAL AID IS GIVEN.

Russia Orders Bank to Discount Bills of Kishineff Firms. ST. PETERSBURG, June 30.—As a result of the petition presented by the deputation from the mercantile community of Kishineff, which waited on Finance Minister Witte on June 25 asking for a moratorium for exchange and other facilities to rehabilitate the credit of those who suffered from the recent events, the State Bank at Kishineff has been authorized to discount the bills of the firms which were protested during April and May.

RUSSIA IGNORES COREAN PROTEST.

Work Continues on Barracks and Other Buildings at Yong Ampho. VICTORIA, B. C., June 30.—News was received here by the steamer Aki Maru that the Russians are going on with their building operations at Yong Ampho, irrespective of Korean protests. Communication is being maintained by three steamers from Antung. Permanent barracks, warehouses, stores, etc., are being built. Reports are also received that the Russians have secured concessions on both sides of the Yalu. The Korean government has granted a concession to A. Jinsuke, a Japanese, in the same locality and complications will doubtless arise as a result.

ENGLISH REVENUE RETURNS DECREASE.

LONDON, June 30.—The revenue returns for the quarter ended June 30 were £71,064,573, a decrease of £1,358,840 compared with the corresponding period in 1902. The chief items showing increases are customs £2,800,000, and postoffice and telegraph £1,000,000. Expenditure for the quarter was £72,422,000, and property and income tax £1,500,000.

EXTRA GUARDS TO SUPPRESS TURKS.

SOFIA, Bulgaria, June 30.—Owing to the increasing Turkish persecution of the Bulgarian population in the Turkish frontier provinces, the Bulgarian government has called out 300 additional reserves, who will be brigaded among the frontier guards in a view of checking the movements of revolutionary bands along the border.

INSURANCE FIRMS MUST MAKE DEPOSITS.

YOKOHAMA, June 30.—An order has been issued requiring foreign fire and marine insurance companies to deposit securities the minimum sum of \$50,000.

termination to maintain that status quo in the far East which is now being questioned by the Russian tactics.

The old proposal of an exchange between Russia and Japan of Manchuria for Corea has been revived, and a number of professors of the Imperial University have been asked to prepare a report on the matter to protest against the policy.

Other papers are taking up the question from various points of view, but all indicate a common resentment at the Russian attitude that seems to be of a deeper and more ominous character than ever before.

The Niroku prints a significant article in which it says: "The Russian tactics in persuading the United States to turn her back on the Anglo-Japanese alliance. We know also that it is almost certain that England will not draw her sword in order to act as a common resentment at the Russian advantages Japan may encounter, she and she alone will be compelled to push it to the last argument."

The article continues at length in advocacy of war with Russia.

ASSEMBLING OF AMERICAN FLEET DUE TO RUSSIAN ACTIVITIES.

TIENTSIN, June 30.—The local news papers comment on the alleged significance of the gathering of the American, British and Japanese fleets in the northern part of the Gulf of Pechili. It is asserted that no less than 100 vessels of various kinds of ships of one sort and another are assembled at Port Arthur. The Japanese reserve officers who were on leave from North China are said to have been called home.

PARIS INCREASES DUTY ON CATTLE.

PARIS, June 30.—The Chamber of Deputies has passed M. Dussuy's bill increasing the duties on cattle and fresh meat. The new duties on oxen are 30 francs in the general tariff and 20 in the minimum tariff; sheep 15 francs and 10 francs and pigs 15 francs and 10 francs. A clause in the bill empowering the government to suspend the duties without consulting the Chambers in the case of a rise in the price of meats was rejected at the request of the government.

RUSSIAN GRAIN CROPS DOING WELL.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 30.—An official forecast of the winter grain crops show that the Russian crop is generally satisfactory throughout the empire. The conditions favored spring sowing, so the outlook for the harvest is good. In a few provinces where there have been two successive crop failures the people ate the seed grain, and will probably need government assistance.

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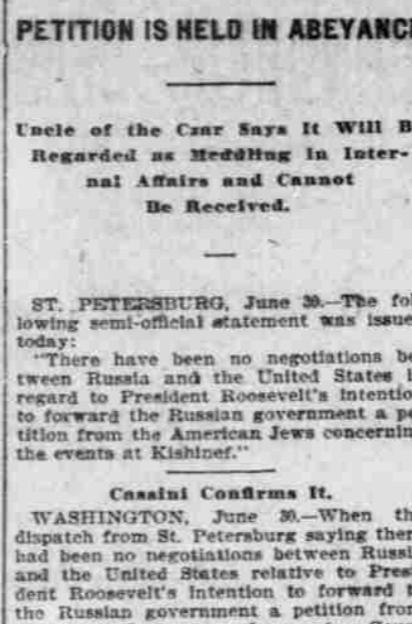

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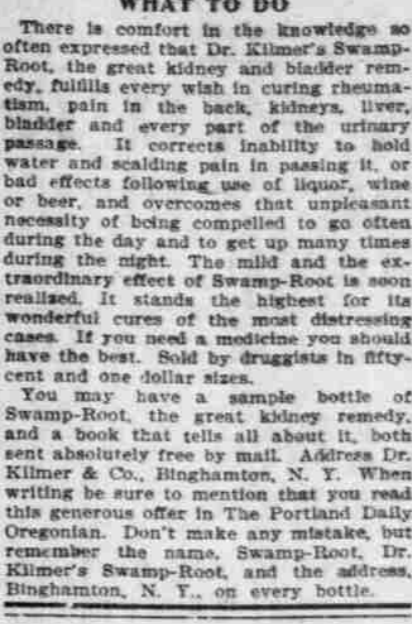
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
