Hospitality of Britain Is Returned.

LOUBET GIVES A GREAT DINNER

French Embassy in London Presents a Gay Scene—President's Visit to the City in Semi-State Arouses Great Enthusiasm.

THE DAY WITH LOUBET. Host at dinner to King Edward in the evening. Calls at the French hospital and visits the home of the French government early in the morning.

LONDON, July 7.—France lavishly returned Great Britain's hospitality tonight by a dinner given by President Loubet to King Edward at the French Embassy.

As a Compliment to the King. The interior of the Embassy was profusely decorated. The white-walled banquet hall was transformed into a bower of roses as a compliment to King Edward.

President Loubet was early today and began an extensive round of functions, calling at the French Hospital, visiting the home for French governesses.

Queen's neck and corsage were literally covered with diamonds, and on her head was a high diamond tiara, while the other members of the royal family and the nobility in neighboring boxes vied with one another in their display of jewels.

The whole house, floor and boxes, was a mass of color. Roses, orchids, electric lights and flowers covered every available point. All the members of the Diplomatic Corps in London were present, wearing their decorations, while, with the members of the Cabinet and officers of the army, hardly a uniform in Great Britain was not represented.

The brilliant assemblage of guests besides the notable French visitors, included the Prince and Princess of Wales, the Duke and Duchess of Connaught, and other members of the royal family, the Cabinet officers, a number of members of the House of Lords and of the House of Commons, and Field Marshal Lord Roberts.

After luncheon the Lord Mayor toasted the President of the French Republic. In reply M. Loubet said he was happy to bring to the heart of the City of London a cordial greeting from the French people.

Opera for the President. The gala operatic performance given at Covent Garden tonight in honor of President Loubet was a scene of marvelous brilliancy.

STEEL TRUST EARNS LESS

Quarter Just Ended Shows \$1,102,530 Less Business Than a Year Ago.

NEW YORK, July 7.—The directors of the U. S. Steel Corporation met today and declared the regular quarterly dividends of 1 per cent on the common stock and 3 1/2 per cent on the preferred stock.

Net earnings for the half year aggregate \$1,585,235, as against \$4,273,415 last year. Deducting amounts set aside for striking funds on bonds, depreciation and reserve funds reduces the net earnings for the six months of this year to \$4,282,000.
