HUMBLE HEROINE'S DEED.

How Mrs. Frederick Emmett Saved a Trainload of People.

A woman's quickness of thought and promptness of action stood between two trainloads of passengers and a terrible disaster on the New York & Harlem Railroad on Tuesday last. The signals either did not work or were disregarded, and as it was, a flying express crashed into a local train just ahead of it on the same track, with possibly fatal results for one person and serious wounds for a few others.
The heroine of this event is Mrs. Frederick Emmett, a woman of 30, who is employed in a New York rubber factory at 110 a week and makes a home in the suburbs for a husband and two children. These particulars are stated because the world knows too little of the good people in it, and Mrs. Emmett deserves vastly more fame than half her contemporaries whose names and portraits are published widely in connection with the general interests of the day.
She had been traveling on the local train herself, and after alighting at a stopping place beyond her dwelling, was walking back over the track when she saw the express come booming along. Like a flash she thought of the train ahead of her and the local could not yet have got off the track ahead. The air was thick, and smoke and steam enveloped the approaching locomotive like a cloud, but with her umbrella in one hand, her lunch basket in the other, and her voice raised to its highest pitch, she contrived to alarm the engineer. In another moment his grow would have plowed the train ahead into kindling wood and he would probably have lost his life. By her meritorious warning he was enabled to put on all-brakes and reverse his engine, so that, although part of the rear car struck was wrecked, most of the passengers suffered no worse fate than a very disagreeable shaking up.
The natural impulse of a normal woman, it is said, when confronted with an awful calamity actually impending, is to scream or faint. Mrs. Emmett screamed, but not faintly. She screamed--or shouted--for a definite purpose, and with great effect. So far from fainting was she that she ran back and bustled herself caring for the injured persons, not leaving the scene to go home and see her family till the last practicable attention had been paid them. Nay, more, on her way back to

the wreck, appreciating the possible seriousness of the case, she stopped at a store just long enough to turn in an emergency call to two physicians by telephone.
If nature and the social organism ran their course in parallel lines, the useless men and women would be placed where they could be drummed into earning small wages and learning what life really is, while those of grander mold would sit in high places, where their influence and example would be wide-reaching. Mrs. Emmett is a striking illustration of the reversed pyramid occasionally encountered in our cosmogony. She has a 100 head overlooking a pair of 10 hands. If the management of the Harlem Railroad are as appreciative of such things as the knowledge of some others we could mention, the apex would soon be mounted on a better base in their employ.

TRAIN HITS WAGON

By Balking of Mules, Five People Are Killed.

FOUR SUFFER SEVERE INJURIES

Blowing of Whistle Frightens the Team, Which Stands Still Until the Engine Brings Death and Destruction.

CINCINNATI, July 9.--A west-bound train on the Pennsylvania Railroad from Columbus tonight struck a wagon coach, containing nine people at a crossing near Redcomb Junction, eight miles from this place. Five people were killed and four injured. The dead: OLLIE COPEHAVEN, 11 years; CHARLES COPEHAVEN, 25 years; CHARLES LEMMICK, 12 years; WILLIAM DOWDY, 25 years. The injured: Albert Copenhaven, aged 14 years; Nellie Copenhaven, 8 years; Samuel Copenhaven, 2 years; Charles Johnson. The injured Copenhaven children are in a critical condition. Johnson will recover.
J. C. Copenhaven, accompanied by his five children, Grace Lemmick, William Booth and Charles Johnson, neighbors of Copenhaven, were going to Madisonville, where the latter intended to purchase supplies for his boarding-house, which he conducted near Redcomb Junction. On reaching the crossing they failed to observe the train and started over the track. The engineer blew his whistle, but the mules became frightened and stopped, leaving the wagon on the track. The engineer was unable to come to a stop, and the train struck the wagon, completely demolishing it and tossing the occupants in all directions. Four were killed outright and the other died two hours later.

Drowned Trying to Ford a Creek.
NEODESHA, Kan., July 9.--The bodies of a man and boy have been found in Chetopa Creek, near here. The body of a horse was also found and a buggy. Identification was impossible, but from letters the man had it is thought he was R. W. Wessel, of Whittier, Mo. A letter mailed at Little Beaver, Mo., addressed to him, was found.

Explosion Wrecks Powder Works.
VALPARAISO, Ind., July 9.--The plant of the Artisan Powder Company at Miller's Station was demolished by an explosion today from unknown cause. The loss was \$10,000. Nobody was hurt.

COLLEGE LIFE IN THE 40'S.

Depleted by S. Wier Mitchell, the Eminent Author.

(University of Pennsylvania Record.)
My own class was graduated in 1884. The college was then hardly more than a day school. In the simple yellow stucco building on Ninth street we had three morning recitations, and there our distinctive collegiate life ended. The change from that day to this has been great indeed, but I am clear in my mind that in some respects you have lost out of the college life that which it were better to have kept.
Our sports were less violent than yours, and they took up no such time as now take from the more important matter of intellectual development. We had no football or races, or contests with other universities, but we played cricket, and played it well, too; and rowed on the river, and sparred with the once-famous "Tom" Barrett. Neither were we photographed in the daily papers alongside of "Rocky Ned" and the "Virginia Bantam." We had no game which necessitated the attendance of a physician. Our elders did, in those naughty days, on rare occasions indulge in this luxury, but that was when they intended to inflict personal injury.
It is needless to insist on what we missed, and what, in consequence, my generation failed to be and to do--it is sadly interesting to speculate on what we might have been--for by this time you must all be aware that without college athletics no nation can long survive. Who can doubt that the discipline of the football field must have been terribly missed at the "Bloody Angle" and on Cemetery Hill? We played hard in my college days, but we talked of our sports less than you do. On the other hand, we were enthusiastic concerning the rising literary lights of Emerson and Carlyle, and had, as I take it, a keener in-

terest in the intellectual life of the world and of the college than exists today.

You, I fear, care too little for your intellectual athletes, and certainly do not decorate or publicly honor them or portray them in your class records as you do the baseball stars. As I remember, we regarded our honor men with a certain veneration and took such interest in our society debates as I hope still exists within the sacred walls of my own Philomathean. There were other differences: I do not recall ever hearing of bets on our cricket matches. Perhaps, however, we may at times have been a little vicious. There were, in fact, certain personal remarks that was not wise to make unless you felt willing to take off your coat back of the college. Nowadays the training in athletics is said to make this vulgar resort needless and to encourage such amiability as did not exist in the less polished life of my college years.
It is rather late to say to a graduating class that athletics have today too large a place in the life and talk of college

At the sports are too many I see them, to insure that the body shall be made and kept sound, enduring sound, so as the better to enable men to meet the demands of our energetic life. A distinguished surgeon said to me last night that hundreds of men are today suffering and will continue more and more to suffer from the injuries received in football. If this be the result, are we not justified in asking that this attractive sport should be so modified as to free it from the unwholesome consequences which must affect the competency of many active lives?
