NINE MONTHS WITH NO PAYMENT.—Now that the water has gone down, and sand can be had in any quantity, the Trinidad Asphalt Company seems to have begun the work of finishing up in good earnest.

At least it is breaking up more pavement and getting ready so far as this goes to make more repairs. It is, however, said that the mill with which it grinds rock into dust, to mix with the sand, before mixing it with the asphalt, is broken. It may be that the mill has been so long that some part of it is rusted out, so that it is unable to produce the sand, so long a delay as the impossibility of procuring sand, for after a few days' sunshine, dust by the carload is being used on most of the streets, enough to mix with all the asphalt in Trinidad. It is, however, given out cold, that the pavement of Alder street is not likely to be completed for nine months, but an effort will be made to have the block in front of The Oregonian office completed sooner.

Some ten years ago a block of asphalt pavement was laid on Fine street between Second and Third, which was proven to have been made of coal tar and sand. The contractors were not paid for the work and were practically run out of business, but the greater part of the pavement is still in use and many say that if the little breaks which first appeared in it had been repaired, this would have been one of the best and most desirable pavements in the city. The report once in circulation that the material instead of being coal tar, was really asphalt, stolen from the asphalt company as a joke, probably never had any foundation.

OBSTRUCTING THE SIDEWALK.—Permission was granted some time ago for parties engaged in elevating a house on Seventh street and putting a new story under it, to use the street in front for piling necessary materials for the work. The permit has been stretched till the materials have extended themselves out in front of the buildings on both sides of the one being elevated. Yesterday the various departments of the city government and about all the city officials were kept on the alert answering telephone calls and complaints. Emissaries and inspectors were rushed to the front to get things put to rights. It is not unusual for people who obtain a permit to use a portion of a street temporarily to occupy a much larger portion, and to act as if their permit was a permanent arrangement. Of course, the city officials have overlooked this matter.

SALOONS CHASE NOBODY.—The new dog license year does not begin till September 1, but preparations are being made for collecting the tax. A display of over a dozen different kinds of tags of various sizes, shapes and colors has been prepared for the Executive Board to make a selection from. The style of tag used last year is not liked, and many would prefer to have none. People who keep dogs which go out on the street are required to have a license, which provides some kind of protective armor for the brutes unless they desire to have them killed. The number of dogs kept in the city is about the same proportion to the inhabitants as the number of saloons. One difference between the two is that the saloons do not run after anybody.

MAY EXTEND UNION AVENUE.—Residents in the extreme eastern portion of the city, in Piedmont and thereabouts, are now in hope that Union avenue will be extended through the Love tract to the Columbia road, or as it appears on the map, Columbia boulevard. Strenuous efforts to secure this extension have been made for years, but have always been opposed by Captain Love. Twice he has contested the extension in the courts, and won his suit. Only a short time ago the Council again took steps to have Union avenue extended, and now that Captain Love has been defeated, he will probably not object to as speedy a division of his property as possible. It is hoped that the desired extension of Union avenue will be made.

WAS TOM WILLIAMS BURNED?—Horsemen about town are laughing over what they consider a joke played on "Tom" Williams, a millionaire sporting man of California, who was in the city a short time ago, endeavoring to make arrangements to extend his racing circuit to the tracks here, so as to be able to hold certain horses on this Coast. He saw a tiny foal of a Shetland pony in some circus and, wishing it for a pet for his little daughter, he went to the circus and bought it for \$200, or \$5 a pound, as it weighed 50 pounds. The circus man laughs this story to scorn, and says he sold the colt as a Madagascar horse for \$600, and if he had known it was "Tom" Williams who was buying it he would have charged him \$1,000. The man who fitted up the colt in a crate in which the colt was to be shipped to San Francisco, took the little animal to his house to show it to his little girl, who at once fell in love with it and refused to part with it, and when it was taken away fairly went into hysterics. There is evidently something wrong as the stories told do not jibe, and it would be interesting to hear Mr. Williams' version of the affair.

WHO'S GOT MISSING FLAGS.—City officials are having no end of trouble with the flags that the city for use during the reception of President Roosevelt. There were some 345 flags of different sizes bought. After the reception was over only about 100 flags were turned in. The other 245 have never turned up. The next thing, the flags or part of them were loaned to the pioneers' annual celebration and 100 were used. The rest were made good by Secretary George H. Himes, at an expense of \$60. The remaining flags were dried, folded, numbered and baled and stored away in the City Hall. The city officials are now ordering that no one be allowed to take any of them without an order from him. Next the Lewis and Clark Exposition sent for the flags and said they had paid \$500 for them, and then came the Woodmen, and wanted to borrow them. It was found that the Exposition Company had not paid \$500 for any other sum for the flags. Mayor Williams decided that the Woodmen might have the use of some of them by giving a suitable bond to return them. Just what will be the next complication is not yet known.

PEDESTALS VS. STREETS.—There appears to be no particular effort made by the city authorities to regulate the fellows who sell peanuts, candy from push carts on the streets. One of these fellows yesterday afternoon had located his cart, ten feet long and three feet wide, and loaded with a varied stock of cheap confectionery, on the sidewalk, walk on the south side of Washington street, about midway between Third and Fourth streets. A more valuable street for business cannot be found in the city. The dealer in front of whose store the outfit was, pays a fabulous amount of rent. The proprietor of the push cart said he had paid a license of \$5 a week, but had no permit to stand there. The proprietor of a store near by said he had to drive such fellows away from in front of his place every day. As these push-cart fellows are not to get in the most thickly thronged streets, they are very much of a nuisance and amount to nothing in the way of ornament.

HOW TO LIGHTEN CITY.—It is some little time since the city has had a selection of city buildings were handed in by the gas and electric light companies, but no choice has been made. The Electric Light Company submitted a flat bid to light the streets and all city buildings. This kind of a bid the gas company could not make as their pipes do not reach all the fire engine-houses and there was no provision in the advertisement for bids which would allow of coal oil being used in these places. Arc lamps were also specified for street lighting, which the company, of course, could not furnish and so they feel as if they had hardly an even show in the matter. The light fixtures in the City Hall are for gas, electricity, but in out-of-the-way engine-houses, where there are no light fixtures and no gas pipes, electricity is the least difficult to get installed.

HOW TO SHARPEN LAWNMOWERS.—A man who knows something about machinery expressed much disgust yesterday, in passing a nice lawn where the owner was sitting on the grass between two lawnmowers on the blades of one of which he was using a file, probably with the intention of sharpening it. He was also taking a rest on the lawn. The man was a "disgruntled" one, but there is not one person in a thousand in this city who knows how to sharpen a lawnmower. The proper way is to put a little oil and emery powder on the blades and then screw a little handle in the hole provided for it in the end of the revolving part, and turn it backward. The blades will then be sharpened against the rub iron. Filing the cutting edges of the blades spoils a lawnmower. People who have to use lawnmowers will find it worth while to try this method of sharpening them.
