

IS TOO ZEALOUS

Only Charge Against Dr. Hutchinson.

MUST MOVE TO SALT LAKE

Incurred Enmity of Packers and Butchers.

IN INTEREST OF THE PEOPLE

Charges Were Made by Union Meat Company and Local Butchers—He Stands High With Department—Says Erred on Right Side.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, July 14.—As a result of an investigation into charges lodged against him by the Union Meat Company and several retail butchers, Dr. E. N. Hutchinson, representative of the Bureau of Animal Industry at Portland, is soon to be ordered to Salt Lake City, and a new man will be assigned to the Portland station. Dr. D. E. Salmon, under whose direction the investigation was made, declines to discuss either the charges or the report thereon, merely announcing the intended transfer. From other sources it is learned that the department highly regards Dr. Hutchinson, and that he has its sympathies at the present time, but the recent investigation leads to the conclusion that he, in his anxiety to protect the meat consumers of Portland and to insure the sale of only the best products in that city, slightly exceeded his authority as a representative of the Government. His activity in that direction is not condemned by the department, but inasmuch as Dr. Hutchinson, under a strict construction of the law and regulations, did exceed his authority, and thereby incurred the ill-will of the business interests with which he had extensive dealings, it was deemed advisable by the department to assign him to another station, where there would be no friction. The department takes the position that should Dr. Hutchinson continue in Portland, the recent unpleasantness would probably be prolonged, and on that account better results would be obtained by making a change. The department maintains that while Dr. Hutchinson perhaps erred, it was on the side of right. He was overzealous rather than negligent, and his transfer to Salt Lake, it is said, will be sufficient reminder to him not to lay himself open to a similar complaint a second time.

Dr. Hutchinson's successor at Portland has not yet been selected.

PRAISE FOR COLONEL DOSCH

American Consul at Kobe Writes of His Work.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, July 14.—United States Consul Lyon, at Kobe, Japan, in a report to the State Department on the Osaka Exposition, incloses a list of exhibits made by the State of Oregon and "calls attention to the fact that Oregon is the only American state which has gone to any expense in order to make an exhibit at this fair."

He adds: "Colonel Dosch, the very active and efficient commissioner in charge of the Oregon exhibit, is making the most of the very small appropriation set aside by that state to help show up its products. The Oregon exhibit has no state building, but is housed in the foreign samples building, alongside the Canada building, which, with its contents, is reflecting a small degree of credit upon Canada. It is said that the Dominion has expended the sum of \$20,000 upon the enterprise and its efforts to make a good show stand in marked contrast with the inactivity shown by the United States. Canadian commissioners are distributing a great number of pamphlets in the Japanese language, descriptive of their products."

"One of the principal features inside the Canadian exhibition building is the great rush by the Japanese each day at 4 P. M. to purchase biscuits and loaves of bread baked in full view inside the building. Hundreds of these people then stand with their arms over the rails and money in their hands, ready to purchase, all clamoring loudly to be waited upon. The bread is made of hop yeast and is in much greater demand than the supply. It is expected that in the future Canadian flour will be in great demand, as the bread made from it is of most excellent quality. Had some of our Northwestern States been in evidence at the Osaka exhibition with their hard-wheat flour, the fact could have been demonstrated that our flour is just as good and can make as much bread as the Canadian flour on exhibition."

Colonel Dosch has organized a Japanese syndicate to take over his exhibits at the close of the exhibition, thus giving practical effect to the efforts of his state. This syndicate is organized and incorporated with a cash capital of \$100,000 to handle Oregon products and manufactures. A representative of the syndicate will join Colonel Dosch and remain with him until the close of the exhibition in order to become familiar with the merchandise to be handled in the future.

PRESIDENT DISCUSSES PETITION WITH JEWISH LEADERS.

Anxious to Dispose of It and May Adopt New Means of Preventing Coolness With Russia.

WASHINGTON, July 14.—It is now suggested that the whole Kishinef petition matter may be resolved into a brief statement through diplomatic channels to the Russian government that such a petition is in the hands of the United States, thus leaving it to Russia to say whether it would or would not receive the document if it were presented. This would close the incident without subjecting United States relations with Russia to a strain, and is considered quite as effective as the actual presentation of the petition.

PETITION IN PRESIDENT'S HANDS.

He Discusses It With Jewish Committee and Desires Quick Action.

OYSTER BAY, N. Y., July 14.—An important conference was held at Sagamore Hill today between the President and representative Jewish citizens of the Society of the B'nai B'rith regarding the petition to the Russian Government on the Kishinef outrages. Besides the President, the parties to the conference were Simon S. Wolf, of Washington; Oscar S. Strauss and Leo N. Levi, of New York.

The Administration has been emphasizing by delay of the representatives of the B'nai B'rith Society in presenting the petition. A draft of the document was handed the President several weeks ago by Mr. Wolf, but it was decided after some consideration to modify the text of the petition before presenting it formally to this Government for transmittal to Russia. Time was desired, too, to obtain to the petition the signatures of representative citizens of the United States, of all the religious faiths. As a result, the document was not placed in the hands of the President until today.

The result of the conference at Sagamore Hill has not yet been disclosed, but a strong intimation is given that the petition may not be forwarded to the Russian Government. The desire of both the President and Secretary Hay is that the Kishinef incident should be closed as soon as possible, as further delay in its consideration might prove embarrassing to this Government in its diplomatic negotiations with Russia. Inasmuch as the Russian government has indicated by the adoption of severe measures a genuine disposition to punish adequately the perpetrators of the Kishinef murders and in addition those who instigated them, it is a problem for the President and Secretary Hay to solve whether representa-

tions concerning the incident now are either desirable or necessary.

Members of the Jewish committee, together with Dr. Bernard Shaw, editor of the Review of Reviews, and his friend from England, Maurice Sheldon Amos, were the guests of the President at luncheon.

Secretary Root left today for Washington. He said that he could not sail for England before the 23d of August because it was desirable that he should see the general staff in full operation before he left the country.

Messrs. Wolf, Levi and Strauss concluded their conference with the President and left for New York this evening. Prior to their departure they announced that, while their conference had been eminently satisfactory, they were not in position at this time to discuss the result. While many citizens of Jewish faith have signed the petition, a majority of the signers are of other religious beliefs.

It has been learned that a statement soon will be made by the State Department at Washington which will disclose the steps taken and to be taken by this Government, but there are reasons why publicity at this moment should not be given to the precise method of procedure.

PETITION IN PORTLAND.

Citizens Will Be Requested to Sign It Regarding Race or Creed.

Portland's best citizens will today be requested to sign the petition to Czar Nicholas II in behalf of the persecuted Jews of Russia. Copies of the petition arrived this morning from I. J. Aschheim, grand secretary of district No. 4, Independent Order of B'nai B'rith, whose headquarters are in San Francisco.

A canvass of the city will be made by a committee of prominent Portland Jews. The names of representative citizens will be placed upon the petition and the whole forwarded to New York, where it must arrive by August 1 in order to be bound into the volume which will be sent directly to the Czar of all the Russias.

The signatures of Jews will not especially be requested, unless they hold office. Among the instructions from the order is the following:

"It is not desired that the signatures of Jews, as such, be obtained in large numbers. Where Jews hold office or are especially prominent their signatures may be obtained, but where the lists can be filled out by prominent non-Jews it will be preferable."

to his hands. The circulation of the petition throughout the United States is in pursuance of the order of President Leo N. Levi, the head of the Order of B'nai B'rith, whose office is in New York.

It is believed by the members of the committee that the people of Portland will not all object to the signing of the petition. The accounts of the outrages perpetrated upon the Jews at Kishinef are still fresh in the minds of every one, and it is believed that when the appeal is read the signatures will quickly be forthcoming.

A number of names were fixed to the petition as soon as it came into the hands of Mr. Sichel, but no canvassing has as yet been done.

The petition is in the name of "the enduring principle of religious liberty." The appeal concludes as follows:

"Far removed from Your Majesty's domains, living under different conditions, and owing allegiance to another Government, your petitioners remain loyal to the name of Christ, to plead for religious liberty and tolerance, to plead that he who led his own people and all others to the Shrine of Peace would new justice to his reign and fame by leading the world in opposition to religious persecution. The petition's appeal has evidently been carefully composed by the officers of the B'nai B'rith, judging from the following excerpts:

Religious persecution is more sinful and more fatuous even than war.

War is sometimes necessary, honorable and just—religious persecution is never defensible! The sinfulness and folly which give impulse to unnecessary war received their greatest impetus from the religious intolerance of the 19th century. The enduring principle of religious liberty; that by a gracious and convincing expression Your Majesty will proclaim to the world the government of your own subjects, but also for the guidance of all civilized men that none shall suffer in person, property, liberty, honor or life because of his religious beliefs; that the humblest subject or citizen may worship according to the dictates of his own conscience, and that government, whatever its form or agencies, must safeguard the rights and immunities by the exercise of all its powers.

CAUSE OF MASSACRE FOUND.

Murderer of Boy Whose Crime Aroused Anti-Jewish Frenzy.

KISHINEF, July 14.—The murderer of the boy Dubassery, whose death was charged to the Jews, and which was the immediate cause of the massacre, has been discovered. He is a gardener and has confessed that he and the boy's uncle committed the crime.

The new Governor of Kishinef, Prince Urusoff, has exchanged visits with leading Jews of the city.

Poultney Bigelow Is Divorced.

NEW YORK, July 14.—Justice Gleagel, in the Supreme Court today, signed a decree of absolute divorce in favor of Edith E. Bigelow and against Poultney Bigelow.

ELECTION ONLY DAZED HIM

contending rival factions in Walla Walla County politics, were interviewed by The Oregonian correspondent tonight relative to the significance of the local election and of yesterday on the political situation and on their personal feelings in the matter.

Mr. Ankeny freely stated that the McBride faction had formed a close combination with the Democratic party to defeat the Ankeny Republicans. He said:

"I am very much pleased at the reelection of Gilbert Hunt and equally sorry that Mr. Kees was defeated. I consider Mr. Kees the most competent man in Walla Walla for the position of City Marshal. I equally regret the defeat of two able and competent citizens like A. J. Gillis and Henry Osterman for the Council."

"I do not care to discuss the question of whether there is political significance in this election. I have reason to believe that Governor McBride was anxious to see both Mr. Hunt and Mr. Kees defeated. There is no doubt there was a combination between the McBride Republicans and the Democrats to carry this out, and in the case of Mr. Kees it succeeded, while the result shows that Mr. Hunt, who was equally in disfavor in the eyes of the McBride people, ran 33 votes ahead of the main strength of the combined forces."

The municipal election in Walla Walla is supposed to be non-partisan, so that we can elect the very best men to office. I supported Mr. Hunt for Mayor a year ago, and I volunteered to support him again, and also to support Mr. Kees, because I considered them both thoroughly efficient and competent and, as I have said, I am sorry they could not have both won out."

"I still hope that Republican principles will always prevail in Walla Walla County and in the state."

Ex-Governor Moore was not willing to talk, saying: "I would not care to speak on the alleged political significance of the election. The results themselves tell the story better than I could."

To his friends yesterday Mr. Moore expressed great pleasure, however, at the result, saying that a man who had gubernatorial aspirations, meaning Gilbert Hunt, had been pretty well jarred, even if not quite defeated.

No contest on Mayor Hunt's small majority is probable, though allegations of illegal voting are numerous. The town was quiet today, but many prominent Republicans were casting around to see what the sentiment was toward a united Republican party, and are said to have found it favorable.

NEWS OF THE TWO FACTIONS.

Scoby Says It Means Nothing, McBride Seeks Victory.

OLYMPIA, Wash., July 14.—(Special).—The result of the municipal election in Walla Walla is not looked upon by the friends of Senator Ankeny in this city as especially significant of the overthrow of the Ankeny machine in that city and county. J. O. B. Scoby, one of Ankeny's

warmest friends in the state, said today:

"It is so utterly impossible to hold a municipal election in a city the size of Walla Walla without local issues of a wholly unimportant and nonpolitical character having their influence that I do not see how the result in Walla Walla can be termed a defeat or victory for any one faction. I have been so busy that I have had little time to read the accounts of the election there, but the impression I have gained is that on the Majority and on the Marshals, where were the main fights, the opposing candidates were Republicans. Now there was the Democratic vote to go somewhere, and it has been my experience and observation that in cases like that the Democratic vote goes 'agin the government.' It was therefore no indication of how the Republican party in Walla Walla feels toward Mr. Ankeny and his friends. In regard to local issues being felt in the outcome, it is apparent that there was a saloon and anti-saloon issue of no small proportions, so on the whole I do not consider the result of much moment in the political world, either way."

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Story of Fight With Yaquis.

TUCSON, Ariz., July 14.—A Star special from Hermosillo, Mexico, says:

A Sergeant and a Corporal of the Mexican army, who were carrying a dispatch from Bonacita to Repara, in Sonora, were attacked by a party of Yaqui Indians Monday afternoon, who sent a volley from ambush by the roadside. The Corporal was shot through the abdomen and tumbled from his horse. The Sergeant's mount was killed and he was wounded, but he made a fight for life and escaped after killing two Indians. When the Sergeant disappeared the Indians killed the wounded Corporal with their machetes and then burned the body. It is impossible to verify the above story.
