

TO REMOVAL THE BAN

St. Rayner Would Practice Law Again in Oregon.

PROMINENT MEN SIGN PETITION

Disbarred for Extracting From the Records Testimony Damaging to His Client McDaniel, Now Serving Time for Murder.

SALEM, Or., July 14.—(Special.)—Henry St. Rayner, who was last winter disbarred from practicing as an attorney in the courts of this state, has applied to the Supreme Court for reinstatement. His petition for this favor from the court is supported by nearly all the leading attorneys of Portland and by members of the bar in Nebraska, where he formerly practiced. St. Rayner was disbarred for extracting from the records in the McDaniel murder case material testimony, the absence of which would have aided his client.

The petition for reinstatement seems to be based upon the theory that St. Rayner has been punished enough. That is the suggestion made in a separate letter addressed to the Supreme Court by Judge Alfred P. Sears, of Multnomah County. Mr. St. Rayner has presented voluminous letters and newspaper clippings showing his standing in legal and political circles at Sidney, Neb., and has a personal letter from Congressman Neville, of that state, testifying to his good reputation and his ability. He was chairman of the Republican county central committee and backed but one-half of one vote of being nominated for Congress by the Republican convention in 1904. He was a member of the Nebraska Legislature of 1888 and 1889, and according to a letter signed by a committee of members of the Sidney bar, he was recognized as the ablest member of that legislative assembly.

George Shambrook.

ROSEBURG, Or., July 14.—George Shambrook, a well-known and wealthy pioneer citizen of Douglas County, suddenly expired at his home at 10 o'clock Sunday evening, aged 72 years. Mr. Shambrook was born at Cambridge, England, in 1828. He came to Oregon in 1847 and to this county in 1854. He was married to Lucretia Redmon. There were 12 children, of whom the following are now living: D. R. Shambrook, County Clerk, Roseburg; B. F. Shambrook and Mrs. Martha Stewart, Portland; Jessie L. and Maud Shambrook, of Umpqua; Perry, Mr. Robert Evans, of Silverton, and Mrs. Mary McKelchick, of Astoria.

H. C. Smith.

At Tucker, near Castle Rock, R. C. Smith died on Wednesday night, July 8, from paralysis. He crossed the plains in 1852. He studied marine engineering and became captain of a vessel that plied the Columbia and Cowlitz rivers. He was interested in legal matters, and studied law and practiced in Oregon and Washington for a number of years. He was elected to the Territorial Legislature and served with honor to his constituents. He married Miss Clara Booth in 1874. To them were born two children, Miss Clara Smith and Jessie B. Smith. Retiring from the practice of law he became interested in fruit raising, owning the largest fruit farm in the county. Mr. Smith served as Fruit Inspector for several years.

Fitzwilliam Guerin.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 14.—The death is announced in this city of Fitzwilliam Guerin, a veteran of the Civil War, and one of the best-known photographers in this country. Guerin won 15 gold and four silver medals in 19 exhibitions, and in 1900 he was the president of the National Photographers' Association. A widow and three sons survive him.

Inspector Arrasmith Reappointed.
OLYMPIA, Wash., July 14.—Governor McBride has reappointed J. W. Arrasmith, of Colfax, as state grain inspector, his term to expire July 1, 1905. The Governor has also reappointed David Anderson, of Rosalia, and William H. Reed, of Tacoma, as members of the State Grain Commission.

Mrs. Amanda Hodson.
ROSEBURG, Or., July 14.—Mrs. Amanda Hodson, one of Oregon's pioneer women of 1849, died at the residence of Rev. J. M. Reese, in West Roseburg, Sunday, aged 72 years. She came to Oregon in 1849 and resided in Salem until about 1880, since when she had lived in Roseburg.

School Meeting at Oregon City.
OREGON CITY, Or., July 14.—(Special.)—At a meeting of the Board of School Directors last night, C. O. T. Williams was re-elected clerk for the ensuing year. W. W. Mars and S. S. Walker were elected janitors, respectively, of the Eastman and Belmont schools. The contract for furnishing school supplies for the year was awarded Chasman & Co., whose bid was \$191.28. One other bid was submitted, that of Hentley Bros. for \$200.

Fisherman's Number Was Not Plain.
ASTORIA, Or., July 14.—(Special.)—The trial of Sam Lazarovich on the charge of operating fishing gear without having a license number on his boat or net was called in Justice Goodman's Court this afternoon. The defendant, who had a license, pleaded guilty to the charge and was released by the payment of the costs and agreeing to have his number properly displayed in the future.

Gets Judgment Against Station.
SALEM, Or., July 14.—(Special.)—In the Circuit Court today the jury returned a verdict of \$250 in favor of J. T. Agutter against the town of Station. This is the

second trial and, as many witnesses have attended, the expense has been heavy. The litigation arose out of a change in the streets, whereby the city tried to cut off a few inches from the front of Trotter's property.

Royal Arch Masons at Enterprise.
ENTERPRISE, Or., July 14.—(Special.)—On Saturday evening, under a dispensation granted by the Grand Chapter of Oregon, Most Excellent High Priest E. W. Salmon Run Is Very Uncertain.
ASTORIA, Or., July 14.—(Special.)—The run of fish at the present time is very uncertain, as one day the catch is fairly good and the next day shows a marked falling off. As the salmon average large the cold storage plants are handling the bulk of the catch and the canneries are doing but little proportionately. Everything is in readiness for the expected big run and should it occur the plants will be prepared to handle an immense pack each day.

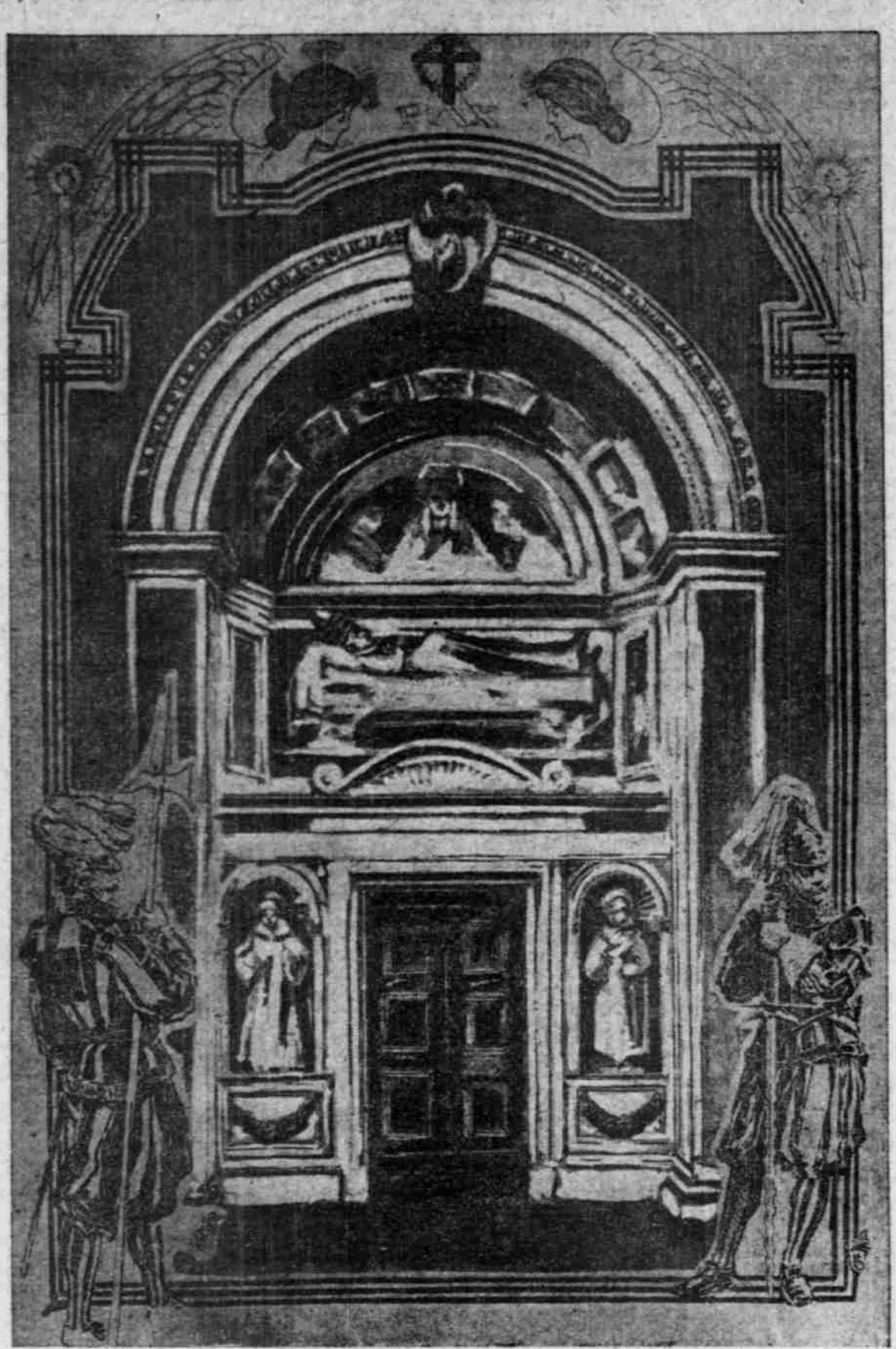
The arguments of the attorney for the Government dwelt at length upon the figures given by witnesses at New York and Chicago. TO SUCCEED ROOT

Robert Shaw Oliver Slated for War Secretary.

WHEN BUSINESS IS SETTLED

Elihu Root Anxious to Retire When He Has Wound Up Certain Affairs, but May Remain Until After Congress Adjourns.

WASHINGTON, July 14.—It seems to be a general understanding among officials of the War Department who ought to know that the name of Robert Shaw Oliver, who has just been appointed Assistant Secretary of War, will be favorably considered for Secretary of War when Secretary Root retires from the Cabinet. It has been known for some time that on the completion of certain important business which Secretary Root has in hand he intends to return to New York to resume the practice of law. Just when this might happen has been and is still very indefinite.

Secretary Root will sail for England the last of August to take his place as chairman of the American Commission in the Alaska boundary case. It is understood that he will continue as Secretary of War during the time he is absent abroad. In case the affairs that have been under his special charge and in which he is very much interested are still unsettled when he shall have returned to this country, it is expected that he will continue as Secretary of War. There are other considerations that may prolong his stay as a member of the Cabinet until after the next session of Congress shall have adjourned. The fact that he is familiar with everything pertaining to Philippine affairs, with the administration in Cuba and with the management of all military matters since the Spanish war, all of which subjects may be considered by the next Congress, may cause him to continue until then in his present position.

Assistant Secretary Sanger, who is to be succeeded by Mr. Oliver, intends to relinquish his position as soon as possible, and it is probable that he will depart before Mr. Oliver comes to Washington. Colonel Sanger tendered his resignation last March, asking to be relieved solely on account of the health of Mrs. Sanger, which compels her to be away from Washington much of the time. President Roosevelt and Secretary Root were very reluctant to part with Mr. Sanger, but they recognized the demand as imperative.

Secretary Root returned to Washington late tonight from Oyster Bay. A number of Army promotions and retirements were dwelt on while he was at Oyster Bay, and these will be announced in a few days.

He declined to make any statement bearing on the subject of his retirement from the Cabinet. He will not discuss the matter in any way.

The Secretary expects that the work of the Alaska boundary commission will be completed in season to enable him to return to Washington in time to submit his report to Congress on the assembling of that body in regular session in December.

ANOTHER CASE OF "GRAFT"

High Postal Official Accused of Blackmailing Subordinates.

WASHINGTON, July 14.—The Postoffice

inspectors are investigating charges made against John M. Masten, now assistant superintendent of the railway mail service, and formerly chief clerk of the First Assistant Postmaster-General's office. A man named Terry, now in the Government service, has made an affidavit before the inspectors alleging that Masten, while chief clerk to the First Assistant Postmaster-General, proposed that Terry pay him \$50 down and \$10 a month to secure reinstatement in the employ of the postal service, to help him. The Federal grand jury in this city is considering several important Postoffice cases which are expected to prove of widespread interest. Postmaster-General Payne said this afternoon that he expected there would be some important news during his absence on his trip along the coast, and that he expected the grand jury would furnish some interesting developments. There is no definite information available as to the identity of the cases, but the jury has been working on them for some time.

An agreement has been reached between the Postoffice Department and the Civil Service Commission regarding the transfer of employees from other departments to the Postoffice Department. The new regulations provide that in such transfers it must be shown that the person to be transferred will be employed on work similar to that previously performed by him and that the transfer will enable him to perform such work better than a person selected from the eligible registers of the commission. The pending irregular transfers.

The resignation of George A. C. Christy, who was given a leave of absence as law clerk of the department shortly after the sensational filing of the Assistant Attorney-General's safe by Mrs. Tyner, has been under discussion at the department, but there will be no final action before Postmaster-General Payne's return to the city.

Mr. Payne will leave here tomorrow morning, and will be aboard the revenue cutter while it makes its regular cruise, which will extend as far as Boston and possibly up to the Maine coast. He said tonight that he had not made his vacation plans yet, but that he would like to visit Poland Spring, Me., if possible. He expects to be away most of August.

Monument to the Mayflower.
PROVINCETOWN, Mass., July 14.—The Cape Cod Pilgrim Association has been formed here to place a suitable monument on High Pole Hill, the highest point in town, to commemorate the arrival of the Mayflower in the harbor on November 11, 1620. The monument will be a column of stone at least 20 feet high, visible 25 miles at sea in clear weather by all coasting vessels and ships plying between Boston and Europe.

GEN. MILES AS HORSEMAN

HE RIDES NINETY MILES STRAIGHT AWAY IN OKLAHOMA.

Record Time for First 35 Miles—Arrives at El Reno Unwearied, Proving He Is Sturdy Still.

EL RENO, Okla., July 14.—Lieutenant-General Nelson Miles completed a horseback ride from Fort Hill, Indian Territory, to Fort Reno, Oklahoma, a distance of 90 miles, in nine hours and ten minutes. The first 35 miles were made in record time, the distance being covered in two hours and 25 minutes. Upon completing the trip, General Miles showed no signs of fatigue and 40 minutes after his arrival at Fort Reno reviewed the troops stationed at that post. The ride was taken, it is stated, to demonstrate that General Miles, at the age of retirement, is still a sturdy man.

General Miles spent Monday morning inspecting Fort Hill, resting in the afternoon preparatory to taking his long ride. There was a large crowd at the fort when General Miles came from the commandant's house shortly after 4 o'clock this morning to make the start. He was booted and spurred and wore a common military suit. As the general started out at 5:30, he was cheered lustily. He was accompanied by Captain Ray of the Eighth Cavalry. The weather was cool at the start, but became intensely hot. Anadarko, Oklahoma, 35 miles distant from Fort Hill, was reached in two hours and 25 minutes. The ride was made in ten-mile relays, soldiers stationed along the line furnishing fresh horses.

A salute was fired as General Miles entered Fort Reno. He showed no signs of weariness as he dismounted and said: "I enjoyed every moment of the trip and there was one thing that was particularly good; that was when I came up to the men who had charge of the pack teams just south of the Canadian River. They had lunch ready and I enjoyed it with them. It made me feel extra good."

Immediately after reviewing the troops at Fort Reno, General Miles, accompanied by Colonel Maus, drove into El Reno and caught a train for Fort Riley.

PORTS MAY BE OPENED.

Russian Diplomat Discusses Manchurian Affairs With Hay.

WASHINGTON, July 14.—Far-reaching in its effects on the Manchurian situation was the conference today at the State Department between Secretary Hay and Theodore Hansen, the Russian Charge d'Affaires, who called, it is understood, to bring important advice from St. Petersburg regarding the ports in Manchuria which Russia is willing China shall open to the United States. This has been the question that has deadlocked the negotiations for some time. What transpired at today's conference can only be surmised, as both of the conferees declined to discuss the matter.

Immediately after Mr. Hansen's departure Mr. Hay sent for Mr. Rockhill, Chief of the Bureau of the American Republics, and formerly American Commissioner to China, and the two had a long conference.
