RUSSIA REFUSES.

Jewish Petition Will Receive No
Consideration.

WASHINGTON, July 16.—It was learned
today that the State Department has re-
ceived a reply from Russia stating that it
neither would receive nor consider the
matter of the Jewish petition on the sub-
ject of the Kishinef incident. The infor-
mation was received by cablegram from
Mr. Riddle, the American Charge at St.
Petersburg, who was given the difficult
task of inquiring of the Russian govern-
ment as to its attitude with respect to the
petition of the Jews.

garded the affair as an internal matter
as to which she, in the exercise of her

HOPE IS IN CONGRESS

President Wants Remedial
Financial Legislation

ON LINES OF RECENT SPEECHES

Senator Lodge Confers With Chief
Magistrate Before Attending Ses-
sions of Alaska Boundary
Commission.

OYSTER BAY, L. I., July 16.—President
Roosevelt is deeply interested in the
proposed financial legislation. As a student
of affairs, he has noted for a long time
the necessity of financial legislation of a
remedial character and today he expressed
to Senator Lodge, of Massachusetts, his
desire that early action upon the subject
should be taken by Congress along the
lines of his recent messages and speeches.
Indeed, it can be said he hopes action will
be initiated at the extra session of Con-
gress, which he will call on Monday, No-
vember 8.

Senator Lodge arrived here this morning
and passed the day with the President at
Sagamore Hill. He is a member of the
Alaskan Boundary Commission, which is
to begin its sessions in London early in
September. Before sailing for England to-
morrow on the steamer Cedric he came to
Oyster Bay to consider with the President,
among other things, the work of the com-
mission. He left this evening for New
York.

Before his departure Senator Lodge gave
to the Associated Press a statement con-
cerning his conference with the President.
In this statement the President's hopes
regarding financial legislation are re-
flected.

"We discussed," said Senator Lodge, "a
variety of topics, including the work of
the Alaskan Boundary Commission, which
is to begin in London early in September."
"Yes," the Senator continued, "in response
to an inquiry whether he had discussed
with President Roosevelt the proposed ex-
tra session of Congress, 'we considered it
at some length.'

"You know, of course that an extra
session is to be called to meet on Monday,
November 8, immediately following the
Fall elections. This session will be called
primarily for the purpose of enacting leg-
islation approving the Cuban treaty, which
was ratified by the Senate last Spring.
The President hopes, however, as I do,
that we shall be able to take up for early
consideration financial legislation along
the lines of his messages and speeches. This
legislation takes the deepest in-
quiry."

"Did you discuss with the President any
specific financial measure?"

"No, not at all. No specific bill was under
discussion. The preparation of a mes-
sage of that kind is the work of Congress

itself. It was understood when the Senate
adjourned last Spring that the committee
on Finance would prepare a remedial finan-
cial measure during the recess. The com-
mittee now is engaged on that work. I
assume that the House committee on
banking and currency also will take up
the subject, but I am not informed
whether it is the intention of that com-
mittee to begin the consideration of the
subject before the extra session shall con-
vene.

"As I noted, the President is deeply in-
terested in this proposed legislation, and
it is his hope and desire that early ac-
tion may be taken by Congress to remedy
existing financial conditions."

HIDES BRING INFECTION.

Secretary Wilson Determined to
Avert Danger.

WASHINGTON, July 16.—Secretary
Wilson stated today that the effort to have
Consuls in countries where foot and
mouth disease exists at the dis-
tinction of the ports of entry in this
country, or to prohibit the trade al-
together. Such a step, he added, would be
taken with great hesitation. This refer-
ence applies particularly to Argentina and
a number of countries in Europe.

"The danger of the outbreak in this
country from the importation of hides
and wool," said the Secretary, "is im-
minent in the near future. The recent ep-
idemic in the New England States cost
the Government about \$250,000. This is
from a money standpoint, but if one of
the outbreaks should occur in the West
or Southwest it would require much more
money to eradicate it. Meanwhile our
commerce with foreign countries would
be interfered with, so that the question
now is what to do with the commerce
that comes from the countries that ne-
glect to stamp out that disease."

PAYNE MAY RETIRE.

Rumor Names H. H. Kohlsaat for the
Postmaster-Generalship.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Wash-
ington, July 16.—Notwithstanding the pos-
itive assertions by Postmaster-General
Payne and his closest friend, Hanna, and
also the assurance of President Roose-
velt, the rumor that the Postmaster-Gen-
eral is soon to resign is kept in circula-
tion. A report growing out of the fact
that H. H. Kohlsaat, of Chicago, was at
Oyster Bay yesterday is to the effect that
if Payne does retire Kohlsaat will be se-
lected for the place.

COTTON AND TOBACCO GROW.

Hawaiian Government Station Proves
by Experiment.

HONOLULU, July 16.—(By Pacific cable.)
—Jared G. Smith, United States special
agent in charge of the Hawaiian Experi-
ment Station, has been successful in his
experiments of growing cotton and Su-
matra tobacco. He believes that both ar-
ticles may become staple products of the
islands.

SCANDAL AT HONOLULU.

Expense Vouchers of House of Rep-
resentatives Disappear.

HONOLULU, July 16.—(By Pacific cable.)
—Allegations have been made that the

vouchers of the expenses incurred by the
regular session of the House of Represen-
tatives have been either concealed or de-
stroyed, and the newspapers demand their
publication. It is charged that scandalous
revelations would result from their pub-
lication. Clerk Mahala denies that the
vouchers are in his possession.

TRIAL OF SUBMARINE BOATS.

Experiments Will Determine Rec-
ommendations to Congress.

WASHINGTON, July 16.—Secretary
Moody intends that exhaustive experi-
ments shall be made with all the subma-
rine boats that the Government has on
its hands, as soon as the Summer
maneuvers are over. If not found sat-
isfactory, he will recommend to Congress
that no more money be appropriated for
this class of craft.

Army Must Ask for Date.

OYSTER BAY, July 16.—No official in-
formation of the intention of "Mother"
Jones and her "army" to visit the Presi-
dent at Sagamore Hill has been received
at the executive offices here. In the cir-
cumstances neither "Mother" Jones nor
her "army" would be received by the
President, unless arrangements were made
in advance. If such arrangements were
not made there will be no possibility of
the army reaching Sagamore Hill. The
members would be sent back by the sec-
retary. It is reasonably certain the Presi-
dent would not receive the "army" as a body.

Supplies for Militia.

WASHINGTON, July 16.—It is an-
nounced at the War Department that all
requirements made by the Governors of
the different states for supplies and equip-
ments for the organizing of the militia
of their respective states will be charged
to the annual allotment of funds, under
section 1681 of the revised statutes, un-
less it is specifically requested that the
requirement be made chargeable to the
provisional allotment of the \$2,000,000
under the act of Congress approved March
2, 1903.

Battleships at Bar Harbor.

BAR HARBOR, Me., July 16.—Seven
war vessels, the first of the fleet which
will participate in the maneuvers off the
Maine Coast later in the month, arrived
here today. Today's fleet included the
battleships Indiana and Texas, and tor-
pedo-boat destroyers Chauncey, Bain-
bridge, Barradale and Decatur.

May Be Old, Must Be Hale.

WASHINGTON, July 16.—President
Roosevelt has issued an order eliminat-
ing old age as a disqualification for eligi-
bility to appointment as laborers in the
Government service. The physical qualifi-
cations, however, must be met.

Guatemalan Extradition Treaty.

WASHINGTON, July 16.—Secretary Hay
and Minister Arratia today exchanged rat-
ifications of the Guatemalan extradition
treaty which was signed some time ago.
The treaty is on modern lines.

Venezuelan Minister Coming.

SAN JUAN, P. R., July 16.—General
Hernandez, popularly known as "El
Mocha," the new Venezuelan Minister to
the United States, has arrived here on
the steamer Caracas on his way to New
York.
