DEATH IN FIRE DAMP

Another Explosion in Cumberland Mine at Nanaimo.

TWELVE CHINESE ARE KILLED

**Eight Injured by a Mysterious Fire—
Property Not Seriously Damaged—Prompt Work of
Rescue.**

NANAMO, R. C., July 16.—Word reached here today that, by an explosion of fire damp last night in No. 6 mine, Cumberland, where 80 Chinamen and four Americans are employed, 20 men were killed and eight injured. Since the strike the mine has been worked entirely by Mongolians, with few white overseers. This is the mine where an explosion occurred three years ago, in which 26 men lost their lives.

Thirty-one of the Chinese and the boss got out with safety, but several were badly burned. Manager Matthews, Overseer Williams, and Manager Ward, Keasley and Keasley descended to the pit and worked their way to within ten feet of where the other men are supposed to be, but other volunteers were not so lucky. The Chinese recovered. There is apparently no fire in the mine, and the workings are clear of black damp.

The cause of the explosion is unknown. The Chinese are supposed to have used safety lamps, owing to the gassy state of this mine. The explosion was not an extensive one, as is shown by the slight damage to the mine, and although the explosion was confined to the lower levels, the loss of 12 lives, no sign of the disaster was apparent at the pithead and nothing was known until the cage was lowered and the men were rescued. It reached the top when they excitedly told of a fire. Shortly afterwards two others came up, telling the same story; then came a rush until it had reached safety.

The work of rescue was delayed by fire damp, and John Keasley, fire boss, narrowly escaped being overcome, but he was soon dragged to the air. Thirty-one bodies were recovered, and 11 were injured having afterwards died, and it is expected that another will not live.

SCHOOL POPULATION LARGER.
But Enrollment in Josephine School
Has Decreased.
SALEM, July 16.—(Special).—The annual report of the public schools of Josephine County, which was filed today in the office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, shows that during the past year the school population of that county has increased from 2770 to 2773, and at the same time the enrollment in the schools has dropped from 2112 to 1986. The number of pupils employed has been reduced from 85 to 60. The number of persons of school age not attending any school has grown from 463 to 530, but the average daily attendance has increased from 100 to 112, with 117% in 1926. The average length of the school year has dropped from six months and eight days to four months

The receipts of the schools of Josephine County for the year ending in June, 1901, amounted to \$23,258.15, as against \$20,978 for

the preceding year. The decrease is due to lower taxation under county and school district levies. This decrease of nearly \$1,000,000 helps to explain the corresponding decrease in disbursements, expenditures for 1903 being \$21,127,175 against \$23,431,778 for 1902. The decrease falls in the expenditures for teachers' salaries, the budget for 1903 being \$1,000,000 less than for 1902. While a smaller number of teachers are employed, and the length of the school year has shortened, the average wage paid have increased. The average salary for teachers is \$343 per month, or \$4,116 per year. The average salary for females is \$305. It is \$50 for males and \$37 for females.

Owing to a change in the time of making the statistical reports for the year ending in 1902 were for a period of months, while those for 1903 cover a period of only 12 months, so that in some respects the comparison is not truly representative of the conditions.

SAYS PEACOCK WAS INSANE.
Application Will Be Made for Commutation of His Sentence.
SALEM, July 14.—Special District Attorney H. J. Hayter, accompanied by Attorney Oscar Hayter, of Dallas, that application will be made to Governor Chamberlain for the commutation of the sentence of William F. Peacock, who was convicted in Polk county of the murder of Alexander Kerr. He is now incarcerated in the penitentiary awaiting execution on August 7. Unless his sentence should be commuted to life imprisonment, as requested, he will be the first person to be hanged at the State Prison.
Mr. Hayter's notice to District Attorney H. J. Hayter informs the latter that the application for a commutation of sentence

will be based upon the ground that Peacock was insane and was not responsible. At the trial of the evidence was taken, leading to show that Peacock came of a family in which there was a taint of insanity, and that his mental condition was such that he imagined his self persecuted and magnified supposed injustices.

"Peacock is confined in one of the cells at the State Prison such as is used for keeping other prisoners. He is quiet and seems to be resigned, an his father though he has not lost all hope of saving his life.

No preparations have yet been made for the hanging. Contracts have been let for the building of a temporary scaffold to be put up at the prison, but this will not be completed until Fall. If Peacock should be hanged there in August it will be necessary to build a temporary scaffold to be removed in December.

FAZON WINS HIS FIGHT.

Will Not Return to Seattle to Settle Trial for Larceny.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 18.—William Faxon, gambler, has won out in his effort to prevent the trial of the state of Washington from removing him from the State of Colorado to Seattle, to stand trial on the charge of larceny by embezzlement. Faxon, who is charged with swindling, gambling game in the Rainier Grand Hotel, in this city, and of unlawfully taking large sums of money from many persons. Faxon's alleged co-conspirator, Colonel John W. Peabody, proprietor of the hotel, and one of the best known hotel men in the state, and M. J. Huff, another gambler. The three are charged jointly.

Faxon was arrested recently in Denver, Colo. He refused to return to Seattle and the case was taken before Governor Peabody, to whom regulation papers from

The Governor heard the evidence in case, and yesterday afternoon announced that he would not turn Faxon over to state authorities of Washington.

Marion County's Population Grows

SALEM, Or., July 18.—(Special.)—A growth in population of Marion County the last twelve months is indicated by the forthcoming report of County School superintendent E. T. Moores. That report will show that there are now in county 873 persons between the ages of 4 and 20 years, whereas there were 698 a year ago.
