HARVESTING IN WHITMAN COUNTY.

Crop Prospects in the Palouse Better Than Early Estimates.

COLFAX, Wash., July 20.-(Special.)-Harvest has begun in Western Whitman County. nber of headers ran several days last week, and many more started this morning on Fall wheat, which is ripening rapidly and is much better than expected two weeks ago. The weather since July I has been almost ideal for wheat, and the crop will be much better in consequence than the earlier estimates made when the weather was dry and hot. It is now generally believed that Whitman County will produce about 80 per tent of Inst year's yield, and with the advance in price the farmers expect to have as much money from this season's crop as from that of 1902, which unusually prosperous season.
