

JUNIOR FOUR WIN

Portland Crew Outrows the James Bay Men.

GLOSS SECOND IN THE SINGLES

R. C. Hart Is Chosen President for the Evening Term—Regatta Is to Be Held in Portland in 1904.

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 24.—(Special.)—Two of the best events in the opening day of the regatta, the North Pacific Association of Amateur Oarsmen opened here this afternoon, were those in which the rowers from Portland took part. In one first was secured, Victoria claiming a loss by reason of an anchored steamer being somewhat in the course, and in another second was taken after a very exciting finish with the Victoria. There was considerable rain last night, but the sun was shining this afternoon, although a cool east wind was blowing. This, however, did not interfere seriously with the rowers. The only drawback was a steamer laid up in a part of the race where the course was laid, which was not removed owing to misarrangement.

In the junior singles, 14 miles straightaway, between E. C. Geiger, James Bay Club, Victoria, and V. Larson, Vancouver, the former won easily. In the junior doubles, Geiger and Laine, Victoria, defeated King and Bond, Vancouver. In the first half of the race the craft were bow and bow. Strength and weight gave an easy victory.

The junior fours was the first race in which Portland took part, winning over opponents Victoria and Vancouver. Three boats were covered when Portland and Vancouver slowly drew ahead. Vancouver lost ground, which Portland drew up, made a spurt and for the moment it was thought would secure lead enough to win. They lost the place owing to bad steering in avoiding the steamer, and Portland won by three lengths.

The race of the day from the spectators' point of view was the senior singles. The competitors were Desbriay, James Bay Club, Victoria; Gloss, Portland, and Springer, Vancouver. The contest between Gloss and Desbriay was magnificent. All through the race the rowers maintained a steady pull, occasionally one of the shells taking a slight lead, then the other. It was the most exciting moment of the whole afternoon, and many bets were taken on either man, and they neared the finishing buoy each without apparent advantage. Spectators who enticed slowly and to no great extent over boating went wild and loudly cheered the contestants. Both had their supporters, and the rowers put forth their utmost effort. When Desbriay crossed the line with a small margin of a foot or two, just enough to enable the judges to give the decision, the waters of Burrard Inlet were almost raised by the shout of the large crowd who took such interest in the race. The senior fours, 14 miles straightaway, will be contested today, and is the best of the series. Other events will make a good day's sport. The event concludes with a banquet tonight. Attendance at regatta of spectators was very large, and the contestants were liberally and impartially applauded. The summary:

Junior singles—Geiger, James Bay Athletic Association, won; Larson, Vancouver Rowing Club, second. Time, 11:25. Junior doubles—Geiger and Laine, J. B. A. A., won; Atwell, King and R. J. Bond, Vancouver Rowing Club, second. Time, 11:25.

Junior fours—Portland Rowing Club won, James Bay Athletic Association second. Time, 3:43-4.

The Portland crew took the lead about half way up the course and maintained it to the finish.

Senior singles—Desbriay, J. B. A. A., first; Gloss, Portland Rowing Club, second; Springer, Vancouver Rowing Club, third. Time, 11:38-4.

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 24.—It being Portland's turn in the nature of order of rotation, the 1904 regatta of the North Pacific Association of Amateur Oarsmen will be held there. This was decided upon at the annual meeting held here this afternoon. The regatta will be held between July 15 and August 15 next year, the exact dates being left to the Portland club to decide.

R. C. Hart, of Portland, was chosen president of the regatta. J. B. A. A. Helmsken, of James Bay Athletic Association, Victoria, vice-president, and W. W. Kent, of the Vancouver Rowing Club, secretary-treasurer. The executive committee is composed of J. B. A. A. Helmsken, of the Portland Rowing Club; Buchanan and Johnson, of the Nelson Rowing Club; O'Sullivan and Lawson, of the James Bay Athletic Association, Victoria; and Seuker and Russell, of the Vancouver Rowing Club.

JEFFRIES MEETS WITH ACCIDENT

Fighter Suspends All Work as Result of Injury to His Leg.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 24.—Word was received here this forenoon from Harbin Springs, where Champion Jeffries is training for his fight with Joe Kimball, that Jeff had been compelled to suspend work owing to the serious condition of his left leg.

It appears that the condition of the leg is due to a series of accidents. Jeff, while training, gave it a bad wrench. A physician has advised the champion to give this sore limb perfect rest, and as the latter has no desire to lose his forfeit money, he has decided to do no more work until it is better.

The story of the injury causes some concern here, as the sporting men are beginning to evince an excited interest in the forthcoming fight and are fearful that Jeffries may not be able to enter the ring in the best condition.

WIN HANDICAP DOUBLES.

Fenton and Bellinger Defeat Archer and Paget.

Fenton and Bellinger won handily by two straight 6-3 scores from Archer and Paget in the men's doubles handicap tennis tournament finals at the Multnomah Club yesterday afternoon. While the games were hotly contested, they would have proved much more interesting had the handicap given Fenton and Bellinger been different. All four players are playing in exceedingly good form this summer, especially Bellinger, who bids fair to take a leading place before the close of the season. Fenton is playing his first season at the game, and for the short time he has been practicing is showing up very well.

Nearly a month has been consumed in playing of the men's doubles tournament, owing to the fact that several of the players have been on vacations or otherwise engaged when the games have been scheduled. None of the games has been won by default, however, and while the contests have been going on a great deal of interest has been manifested.

SHAMROCK TO RACE COLUMBIA.

YOUNG CORBETT WINS EASILY.

Maynard, of Philadelphia, Knocked Out in the First Round.

PHILADELPHIA, July 24.—"Bully" Maynard, of this city, was knocked out in the first round by Young Corbett tonight at the Industrial Athletic Club. The men were to have boxed six rounds. Maynard was in prime condition, but Corbett was a trifle fat. The fight, as far as it went, was fast and all in the champion's favor. A few seconds before the bell sounded ending the round Corbett caught Maynard on the jaw with a right, sending him down and out. Maynard was knocked down three times during the fight.

He also has advised them that the question of reinstatement and the charges of non-payment of dues are separate and distinct subjects, the former being regarded as a closed incident.

Bookbinders Held Secret Session. WASHINGTON, July 24.—The local branch of the International Bookbinders' Union held a largely attended meeting tonight to consider what action should be taken in the event that W. A. Miller returns to duty tomorrow. The meeting discussed the matter for three hours and then adjourned. President Barrett tonight was absolutely noncommittal as to what was done at the meeting. An impression prevails that Public Printer Palmer will find some solution of the difficulty.

AFTER MORE ATTORNEYS

Hawaii Begins Disbarment Proceedings on Summer Case.

HONOLULU, July 24.—(By Pacific Cable.)—In the Supreme Court today Attorney-General Andrews began the additional disbarment suits which have been expected for the past week in connection with the Summer case. The defendant attorneys in the proceedings instituted are J. A. Magoon and George A. Davis. The charges are similar to those made by Attorney-General Andrews against Humphreys and Frank Thompson and include the allegation that the accused induced the capital to pay them extortionate fees for their connection with the litigation, which the question of his insanity was at issue.

HAS LIBEL SUIT ON HAND

It Alleged That Late Pope Was Too Intimate With Countess.

ROME, July 23.—The Socialist paper Avanti, having published a story to the effect that Leo XIII, while archbishop of Perugia had had too intimate relations with the Countess of Gualandino, a woman, the latter has brought suit against the paper for libel. The attitude of the Avanti towards the Vatican is shown by the fact that on the day following the pope's death the only discordant note in the eulogies of the Rome papers was struck by the Avanti, which said:

"We Socialists without disdain, but with indifference, pass before his corpse and will take the new enemy."

WILL OF MRS. BLAINE.

Estate Valued at \$500,000 Is Left to Her Children and Their Heirs.

AUGUSTA, Me., July 24.—The will of Mrs. James G. Blaine has been filed for probate here. No public bequests are made. The will is dated at Washington, Aug. 6, 1901. No inventory was made of the estate. It is estimated at over \$500,000, and is divided between the children and grandchildren.

NEGOTIATIONS FOR ISLANDS OFF.

American-Danish Treaty for West Indies Is Abandoned.

WASHINGTON, July 24.—The treaty providing for the acquisition by the United States of the Danish West Indies officially died today. If Denmark should conclude to sell the islands to the United States, it would be possible to revive the provisions of the treaty which has just failed, meantime the position of the State Department is comfortable, for having done its part toward completing the bargain, the American Government of course could not retract the sale of the islands by Denmark to any other government.

Board Divides on Battleship Plans.

WASHINGTON, July 24.—Rear-Admiral Bradford's letter to the Secretary of the Navy, objecting to the plans adopted by the Board of Construction for the \$1,000-ton ships Mississippi and Idaho was made public today. Rear-Admiral Melville indorses the objection, and thus equally divides the Construction Board. Secretary Moody will take the matter under advisement.

Wants to Float Loan in America.

WASHINGTON, July 24.—Minister King at Bangkok reports to the State Department that inquiries have been made to him as to the chance of placing in the United States a loan of 1,000,000 pounds sterling.

Case Goes to the President.

WASHINGTON, July 24.—The case of Assistant Paymaster Delano, court-martialed for irregularities, has gone to the President. It is understood the sentence is that of dismissal.

Turner Sails for London.

NEW YORK, July 24.—Ex-United States Senator George Turner, of Washington State, a member of the Alaska Boundary Commission, sailed by the Celtic today for London.

New American Consul at Hull.

WASHINGTON, July 24.—Walter C. Ham, of Pennsylvania, has been appointed United States Consul at Hull, England.

NO REVOLUTION ON.

Princess Ferdinand Has Not Fled From Bulgaria.

VIENNA, July 24.—The reports that a revolution has broken out in Bulgaria, and that Prince Ferdinand has fled, are semi-officially characterized as unfounded. It is explained that July 25 is the anniversary of the death of Prince Ferdinand's father, and that the immediate object of his present journey is to visit his grave at Coburg, which is his annual custom.

Another Version of Princess' Flight.

BERLIN, July 24.—Notwithstanding the semi-official denial that Prince Ferdinand's departure to Serbia amounts to a flight, the German press, which gets well-authenticated information from Bulgaria, says it believes that the rumors of the Prince's flight has some basis, and regards it as probable that he has left the country in the event of a revolution.

Ferdinand Passes Through Belgrade.

BELGRADE, July 24.—Prince Ferdinand, accompanied by his wife, passed through the city today on his way to Vienna.

IRELAND HONORS ITS RULERS.

King Edward's Warm Words on Receiving an Address of Welcome.

DUBLIN, July 24.—King Edward and Queen Alexandra separately visited a number of public institutions today. The scenes of welcome witnessed during the previous days of their visit were repeated by the crowds lining the routes followed by the King. His Majesty first visited the King and Queen's visit to the Irish Constabulary depot, where a drill exhibition was given in their honor.

UNION ROW NOW AT CRISIS

MILLER WILL REPORT FOR WORK IN GOVERNMENT OFFICE TODAY.

Bookbinders Threaten to Go Out, but Rely on Public Printer to Find a Way Out of Muddle.

WASHINGTON, July 24.—W. A. Miller, the foreman of the binding division of the Government Printing Office, against whose reinstatement the Bookbinders' Union is fighting, appeared at the Government Printing Office today and tomorrow will report for duty under the direction of Public Printer Palmer. A committee of the Bookbinders' Union today filed with the Civil Service Commission a copy of their protest against Miller. This protest is a duplicate of the one filed with Secretary Cortelyou and Public Printer Palmer. Prior to the filing of the protest Commissioner Proctor said to a reporter that it was a useless action on the part of the union, as the Civil Service Commission and protest to it.
