

WHATCOM'S WORTH

Lumber, Shingles and Salmon
Are the Big Three.

LARGEST CANNERY IN WORLD

Bellingham Bay Cities Enjoying
Great Prosperity—Eastern Cap-
ital Controls Cannery
Industry.

WHATCOM, Wash., July 26.—(Staff correspondence.)—Lumber, shingles and salmon are the "big three" industries which have built up the thriving cities of Whatcom and Fairhaven. Like nearly all the rest of the Puget Sound cities, these towns were overgrown in the early '80s, and the business of catching and canning salmon and converting tall timber into a merchantable article of commerce for a time was abandoned. The business of selling logs to a horde of speculators who had come to the coast to speculate with the get-rich-quick microbe was so alluring that all other industries came to a standstill. Eventually the limit was reached when the supply of victims was exhausted, but the impetus given the towns by the wave of speculation which swept against them had carried them on to a point far in advance of the needs of the surrounding country. Then came the period of waiting for the country to catch up. The bats and the owls were the only tenants of some of the fine buildings which had been erected to meet a demand that came and vanished so quickly that neither the landlords or the tenants could raise the rent. The country did catch up with the cities; in fact, these two factors which, under normal conditions must have a simultaneous growth, got to working together harmoniously at a much earlier date after the deluge than was the case with Seattle and Tacoma. They have been for a long time enjoying great prosperity, and a natural, healthy growth has expanded their suburbs until it is now a difficult matter for the stranger to understand exactly where Whatcom leaves off and Fairhaven begins. The entire water front between the two cities is lined with sawmills, shingle mills and salmon canneries.

Largest Salmon Cannery.

At Fairhaven proper is located the largest salmon cannery in the world. It is owned by the Pacific American Packing Company, and was built for the purpose of handling the enormous catches of sockeye salmon that are frequently made in this vicinity. Unfortunately, since its completion the rivers of sockeye salmon are in such small proportions to work the cannery up to its capacity have been very few, and it is now an opportunity to tax its equipment to the limit.

This cannery is fitted with all of the latest improved machinery for handling the fish, and in its equipment will be found a number of labor-saving devices which were invented and first used on the Columbia River. The Jensen can-filling and can-making machinery are there, and in big letters on the front of the retorts which extend in all directions, in hundreds of eight to ten foot long rows, "Made by the Astoria Iron Works." Even the skillful Chinese "butchers" whose marvelous dexterity in separating the sockeye from its head and bones is a thing of beauty are in most cases graduates of a Columbia River cannery, and accordingly first-class artists.

The acquisition of some of these Bellingham Bay canneries and the traps from which they secured their supplies of fish cost Eastern capitalists who now control them many millions of dollars. Almost fabulous prices were paid for the canneries, and many of the canneries were taken in by the combine at prices enormously in excess of their actual value. The equipment of the canneries was sold at a loss, and the water rights in the Sound. The Lumber Traffic.

As is the case in Oregon, the Bellingham Bay lumber manufacturers ship a large portion of the products of their mills west by rail, but they also have quite an extensive foreign trade, principally with Alaska. Sawmills have been running in this vicinity for more than a third of a century, and, quite naturally, a large area of the land tributary to the water courses has been logged off, and the logs are now brought in by rail and shipped to the coast. Farming on Small Scale.

Whatcom is the trading point and distributing center for a considerable area of farming land along the small streams, bays and among the neighboring islands. Agriculture is an industry of minor importance compared with logging and lumbering, but as decreasing stocks of raw material will curtail the volume of the lumber and shingle business, there will be an increasing area of land used for agricultural purposes. Not all of the land now being denuded of its covering of spruce and cedar is strictly first-class agricultural land, but the most of it when cleared, as it some day will be, will grow crops. As it is on its agricultural resources that a country must rely for permanent growth and stability, the ultimate future of the Bellingham Bay country, aside from the fisheries and quarries, lies in the conversion of these denuded forests into farms, gardens, orchards and pastures. The timber that is now making this part of the country so prosperous can never be replaced, and it is now being wanted, but, with her wonderful fisheries and increasing agricultural development, the practice of the enterprising Bellingham Bay cities is assured.

WHEAT RAISED ON CHEAP LAND.

Eastern Washington Farmers Get Big Returns on Money.

COLFAX, Wash., July 26.—(Special.)—Thrashing has begun in Western Whitman County, the first thrashing of the year being on the farm of Monroe Martin, 2½ miles southwest of Colfax. Mr. Martin's wheat is yielding an average of 30 bushels per acre. He had expected only from 20 to 25 bushels before harvest, but the heads are filled to the very top, and the grains are so large and plump that the yield is much greater than he expected. The grain is of excellent quality and will grade No. 1. The wheat was sowed last fall, but owing to the unfavorable spring, it was thin on the ground. At 90 cents per bushel, the price now prevailing, the crop will yield 15 to 18 per acre. At the price paid at the opening of the season last year, it would have required a yield of 45 bushels per acre to produce the same money.
