Cardinal Gibbons Given Cordial Greeting.

HE IS VISIBLY TOUCHED

DiPietro Will Be Compromise Candidate for Pope.

RAMPOLLA AND GOTTI FOR HIM

Nearly All of the Prelates Who Will Attend the Conclave Are Now on Hand—Busy Scenes at the Vatican.

ROME, July 27.—Almost all the cardinals of the conclave have now arrived. Their time today was mainly occupied with a long meeting of the congregation of the Holy Office, presided over by Cardinal Rampolla.

The cardinals today again discussed the advisability of sending a note to the powers regarding the condition of the Holy See, and the possibility of a compromise candidate.

Cardinal Rampolla is unable to secure the necessary majority for DiPietro as the vote he will be the representative of the Rampolla-Gotti faction, it is said, and yet would be fairly acceptable to all.

Cardinal Gibbons, who is expected to be the only English-speaking cardinal in the conclave, arrived today from Ireland. He said he believed the remotest chance of election for DiPietro.

Highly Compliments Gibbons. Speaking of Cardinal Gibbons, the Irish cardinal paid him a glowing tribute, although, like all priests here, he held out no hope that the American cardinal had the remotest chance of election.

Only Two Cardinals Will Be Absent. It is now practically certain that all the cardinals will be present at the conclave except Cardinal Moran, archbishop of Sydney, who will not reach Rome in time.

At today's meeting of the congregation of cardinals were present, and all noticed the exceptionally cordial reception accorded to Cardinal Gibbons, who was visibly touched by it.

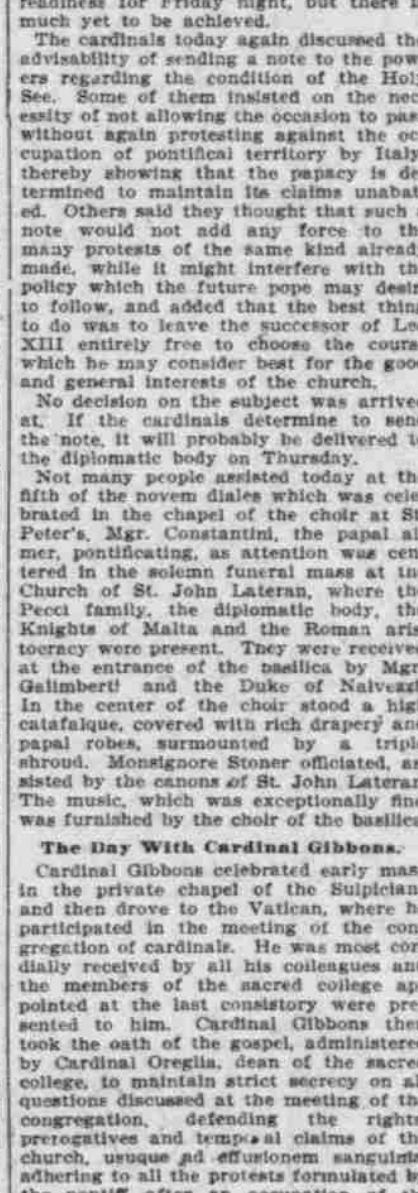
