

RIGHT TO LABOR IS FREE

JUDGE BEATTY DEFINES LAW AS TO BOYCOTTING.

Issues Two Injunctions Against Unions in Federal Court—Right to Work or Strike.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 27.—United States District Judge Beatty, of Idaho, sitting in the United States Circuit Court here, today rendered two decisions in labor suits, and in both instances his rulings were against boycotting. In the case of the Gulf Bag Company, of this city, against its striking union employees, the injunction restraining the defendants from interfering with the work of the company was made permanent. A significant portion of the Judge's decision was as follows:

"It was an effort on the part of the defendants to force higher wages for their associates by unlawful interference with the rights of others to labor who were not associated with them. All laboring people fully understand that whenever they refuse to work for any cause they have the right to quit work. Whether as individuals or as organizations, they must also understand that all men, whether associated with them or not, have equal rights with them in the labor world. The right to labor or to cease to labor is as free to all as it is to water to seek its level. This Government is one of liberty under the law, and its people are free men. Neither will tolerate the attempt of any to enforce assumed rights by crushing the inalienable rights of others. Until all recognize and obey that law the contest must and will go on."

In the case of Michael Hallanan, of New York, vs. the Journeymen Horseshoers' Union of this city, the restraining order against the defendants was made permanent. Hallanan manufactures a horseshoeing pad, and was boycotted by the New York union because he would not use the stamp of the international union. The boycott was taken up by the San Francisco union and Hallanan's trade suffered.

SALMON RUN ON CLACKAMAS.

Hatchery to Be Filled With Eggs—Fish Ladder at Oregon City.

OREGON CITY, Or., July 27.—(Special.)—Deputy Fish Warden Webster was in the city today and reports that the run of salmon on the Upper Clackamas has opened under most favorable conditions, and with every prospect for a large take. Spawning, which was begun several days ago, will be carried on with an increased force of men beginning August 1, and continued throughout the month. It is the purpose of the Fish Commission to supply the full capacity of the Clackamas hatchery, which will accommodate 2,000,000 eggs.

Mr. Webster returned this morning from Portland, where he caused the arrest of H. G. Barber for having in his possession and selling sturgeon out of season. A The State Fish Commission has not decided definitely with reference to the fish ladder that is to be installed at the Willamette Falls in this city. Low water is being awaited as the opportunity time for placing the ladder, for which a Legislative appropriation of \$5000 has been made.

CALLS IT SON-IN-LAW'S SCHEME.

Hermann Grimm Alleges That Divorce Suit Is Fraudulent.

OREGON CITY, Or., July 27.—(Special.)—Hermann Grimm, who is defendant in a divorce suit recently brought by Sophia Grimm, today filed a general demurrer, accompanied by a motion asking to be heard in opposition to the plaintiff's order of the court by which the plaintiff was granted \$400 with which to prosecute the case, and the further sum of \$20 a month as alimony during the pendency of the suit.

Grimm also files an affidavit in which he denies all of the allegations set forth in the complaint and charges Robert Grimm, son-in-law of the plaintiff, and one of her attorneys, with conspiracy to defraud him out of his property, which, he says, is worth only \$2000. Instead of \$20,000, as alleged by the plaintiff, he claims that his dissatisfied wife is entirely under the influence and control of Glinther.

LAW FOR REJECTED LOVER.

Portland Woman Has Him Arrested for Making Threats.

WHATCOMB, Wash., July 27.—Mrs. Rollins, formerly Miss Emma Thompson, of Portland, married here last days ago to Sidney Rollins, swore out a warrant this morning for the arrest of J. D. O'Connor, a former lover, who, enraged with jealousy, had drawn a gun and threatened to shoot her.

holders of the Western Pacific Railroad Company met today and formally authorized the directors to issue \$50,000,000 worth of 5 per cent bonds, redeemable in 30 years. It was stated that the company has 14 surveying parties at work mapping out a route from San Francisco to Salt Lake.

STRANGER IS HELD UP.

Proverbial Long and Short Man

Given Another Trick.

E. Burdell, a comparative stranger in

the city, reported to Captain Moore at police headquarters last night that he had been held up at 11 o'clock by two men at Second and Madison streets.

That immediate vicinity of the city is adorned with elm trees, and it was from the heavy shade of the trees that the two men stepped out and confronted Burdell. Both had cocked revolvers aimed at the victim.

His description is that of the proverbial long and short man, and both wore masks. The description of one of the highwaymen differs entirely from that of any man who has heretofore been engaged in the road-gang business in Portland. While he covered Burdell with his revolver the smaller man went through the victim. The latter had a fine gold watch, but after examining it both robbers declined to take it and returned to Burdell's vest pocket. Mr. Burdell claims to have had \$60 in a pocket of his underclothing which the highwaymen did not find.

Mr. Burdell, when held up at Second and Madison streets, was on his way home from a visit to friends out Second street. He rooms in the Terminal House on Everett street, between Seventh and Park streets.

He was in his pockets at the time of the hold-up. The robbers found the change, but purposely omitted to appropriate it. It is thought that the highwaymen were lying in wait for big game with their pockets full of gold, which failed to appear at the appointed time and place.

BIG STREET-CAR MERGER.

All Interurban Lines About Los An-

geles May Be Joined.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 28.—The Times today says:

"Talk is going the rounds about an immense holding company that may be organized within six months to merge all the interurban electric lines tributary to Los Angeles. Local officials have nothing to say about the project, but it is understood that such a corporation, if formed, would need a capital of quite \$50,000,000. The holding company was one of the details hinted at when it was recently announced that Huntington had secured a vital interest in the Los Angeles Traction Company through its purchase by the Southern Pacific interests. It is possible that the organization of a holding company that even Messrs. Clark and Sherman, with their extensive interurban interests, the Hollywood, Santa Monica and other points will join with Huntington and Harriman.

BACK FROM TUTUILLA.

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number or they would kill man for man. After I had gone about a mile they let me go, although they took my hat away from me. They were very kind to me and told me they would see no harm to me to take my hat. They took the hat of the Captain of the Guard Murphy and four or five others, including my grandson, Harry Wilkinson. After they had gone a little way again they took his clothes off and he had to don convict's garb and return to the prison in it. They took Murphy a little further along and made him divest himself of his trousers. Murphy was obliged to come home without outer garments. The convicts took the rest of the officers with them so as to guard themselves against capture. The men they took were: General Overseer McDougall, Guard Glen-dorf, Guy Jeter, foreman of the rock quarry; Tony Brown, stage driver; and Guard L. S. Vertrees.

"They have taken those men along with them and two or three others whose names I have not at hand. As soon as I came back to the prison I had the wounded men taken to my residence and everything possible is being done for them. I sent to Sacramento for two surgeons and trained nurses to care for the wounded officers."

"Turnkey Joseph Cochran made a brave defense in the captain's office, but I thought it was unwise, for everything was in possession of the prisoners. He tried his best to overcome the convicts, but he was out in several places about the head and shoulders and in the side with razors, and was saved from death by the knife coming in contact with a rib."

CONVICTS LOOT A STORE.

They Gather Up Captives and

Wagon in Their Flight.

PLACERVILLE, Cal., July 27.—A report

received here is to the effect that the general merchandise store at Pilot Hill, kept by S. D. Diehl, one of the Supervisors of Eldorado County, has been plundered by the 13 escaped convicts.

The escapes are said to have with them several guards and a number of citizens parted up on the way, making 23 in the prison. They are said to have a four-horse wagon and are now coming down the Coloma road from Pilot Hill. It is reported that the Sheriff, with 15 men, is in close pursuit.

Another and later report says that the escaped convicts have not left Pilot Hill, but are still in possession of Diehl's store.

WARDEN'S STORY OF AFFAIR.

Guards Surprised and Overpowered—

Cochran's Hopeless Fight.

SACRAMENTO, July 27.—Warden Wil-

kinson gives this version of the affair: "This morning about 6:45 I went up to the prison, as I am accustomed, to see the convicts eat their breakfast. I have been doing this same thing every morning for three years and a half, and I never take so much as a cane with me to protect myself. They had not in all that time raised a hand against me. I stopped at the captain's office to wait for the prisoners to walk out from their breakfast. It is our practice, if any convicts are misbehaved, to pick them out from the procession and to hold a court there in the office and determine their punishment. We were all myself and officers—quietly sitting in the office when the line made its appearance from the breakfast-room and started for the grounds. Suddenly seven or eight of the prisoners made a rush from the line with razors and knives drawn and came directly for us.

"They were joined by others—I judge there were about 15 in all. Blood began to flow in all directions. I saw that it was hopeless to put up a fight against such odds. One of the convicts came up behind my back and with a razor tried to cut open my abdomen. My belt is split from end to end and my coat is hanging in shreds. I felt no pain and I don't believe I am out.

"The convicts got me and Murphy and five or six other officers, whom they disarmed. They kept us and proceeded to the yard and out of it by the front gate toward the armory post. The Gatling guns in the stations on the hilltops and along the prison walls could have been fired, but had they done so they would have killed the captain and officers, as the Gatling guns remained silent and the guards were unable to rescue us or to prevent the escape. As we neared the armory a guard came out, and they seized him. They took the key away from him, entered the armory and equipped themselves with all manner of weapons.

"They then started along the dusty road and crossed the prison ranch toward the Mormon Island bridge. They kept saying to us that they would not harm us, but they would not tolerate any harm to their

THE WORLD'S CHAMPION HIGH-JUMPER AT THE ATLANTIC CITY HORSE SHOW.

The annual horse show at Atlantic City was held last week, July 14-18. The picture shows "Heatherbloom," the world's champion high jumper, in a trial, clearing the bars at 7 feet 3 1/2 inches. "Heatherbloom" recent in a contest was made last November, in Chicago. In a trial at his training grounds he has cleared 8 feet 3 1/2 inches, the highest jump on record of any horse with a man up.

Guard Tommy Ryan, who had followed, and who caught sight of the fugitives from the hill south of the river, took a potshot at the crowd. There was a scattering for rocks, logs, etc., and Guard Vertrees took advantage of the commotion, sprang into the river and lay low until his captors had passed on.

A mile from the bridge the band of convicts held up a citizen and took his clothing, but refused his team on the ground that it was not good enough. A mile further they reached the residence of Daniel Foster, and after ransacking his house, taking all his provisions and extra clothing, forced him to hitch up his four-horse team and haul them on their way, he acting as driver. From that point the convicts started over the mountain road leading either to Auburn or to Pilot Hill.

The free men who left the armory as prisoners of the convicts were Warden Thomas Wilkinson, Captain R. J. Murphy, Stenographer Harry A. Wilkinson, G. E. Peters, Guards J. Klenzendorf, C. H. Jolly, W. J. Hopton, L. C. Vertrees, T. C. Brown, ambulance driver, and Chief Engineer C. H. Ward.

Pursuit Is Prompt.

Purses were started in pursuit, 21 guards, headed by Lieutenants, and were after the fugitives half an hour after they started. Sheriff Reese deputized J. Hinters, who gathered a posse and started on the trail over the mountains, and posers from Eldorado County were also put in motion.

BATTLE WITH CONVICTS.

One Killed and One Wounded—Two

Captives Escaped.

AUBURN, Cal., July 27.—A fierce battle

occurred between the escaped Folsom convicts and the officers tonight near Pilot Hill, in Eldorado County. The convicts were traveling in a four-horse wagon, and after holding up John Mendis at Pilot Hill and looting his store of the stock of provisions, proceeded in the direction of Coloma.

Shortly after leaving Pilot Hill they were overtaken by posers from Sacramento, Folsom and Placerville. Guard Curry, of the Folsom posse, opened noisome goliath shots by shooting one of the horses attached to the convicts' wagon, and this blocked the advance and an open fight ensued. Convict Howard was killed outright and Seab, the negro convict, was badly wounded. Guards Brown and Klenzendorf, who were with the convicts, managed to escape. It was also noticed that Gordon and another convict were missing, and it is presumed that they dropped out somewhere between Folsom and Pilot Hill and have taken to the woods, which anywhere in this locality would provide safe hiding.

Guard Jeter, who is still in the hands of the convicts, is a resident of Lincoln, Placer County. It is feared that he and the other three guards will be killed before they are let go.

Late this evening Harry Wilkinson and a party of three arrived in Auburn from the Folsom Prison, and in company with ex-Sheriff William C. Conroy, one of the most daring men in California, drove immediately to the scene of hostilities.

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
