

RUSSIA GIVES IN

Concessions to Powers in Far East.

AMERICA GETS ITS WISH

Extraordinary Favors Are Also Shown Japan.

GREAT BRITAIN WELL SATISFIED

Cesar Will Soon Issue an Important Document on the Manchurian Situation—English Warships are Ordered to Leave.

LONDON, July 28.—The Daily Chronicle this morning on the authority of a usually well-informed correspondent, reports that peace will be preserved in the far East throughout the coming winter. The correspondent says Russia has made important concessions to the United States and Japan, while Great Britain, who has conducted her negotiations on more sober lines, also has obtained her desires. The Chronicle adds that an important Russian statement will be issued shortly. Meanwhile the paper says, it is significant that two British warships have just left Wei-Hai-Wei.

LONDONERRY HONORS RULERS.

Due Appreciation Shown of Its First Visit From English Sovereign.

LONDONERRY, Ireland, July 28.—King Edward and Queen Alexandra were accorded a great reception on their arrival here today. Large crowds from the surrounding districts assembled to greet the first English sovereign who had ever visited Londonerry. Their majesties were met at the railroad station by the Mayor and corporation. The usual number of addresses were presented, replies to which the King expressed his pleasure at the references to the spirit of good feeling and harmony pervading all classes in Ireland, adding that if his visit helped to extend and consolidate this feeling he would be richly rewarded.

TO FORMULATE FISCAL POLICY.

British Cabinet Will Be Called to Meet in September.

LONDON, July 28.—It is stated that arrangements have been made to call a meeting of the Cabinet at the end of September, at which time it was anticipated that the Ministers' investigation of the fiscal problem will be completed and the Cabinet will be in a condition to reach a definite decision on Colonial Secretary Chamberlain's proposals.

JEWIS WERE NOT MASSACRED.

Moroccan Affair Only a Fight Between a Netter and a Girl.

LONDON, July 28.—Nothing is known here of a report published by a news agency in the United States to the effect that a massacre of Jews had occurred at Ofran, near Tangiers, Morocco. The Morning Leader writes from Tangiers, from a source saying the Jewish quarter of Ofran was looted by Arabs July 17; that a building was destroyed, a girl was abducted and in a quarrel between her abductors regarding possession of the girl, six Arabs were killed.

RUSSIAN LABOR TROUBLE SERIOUS.

Baku Strike Is the Worst the Nation Has Ever Known.

LONDON, July 28.—The Russian correspondent of the Times says in this morning's issue that the strike at Baku seems to have been the most serious labor disturbance that has ever occurred in Russia; that it extended to Tiflis, to Nostoff and Novo Tchetkanik in the district of Don Cossacks, and that the Far Eastern Railway employees were concerned.

CORK VENTS ITS DISPLEASURE.

Those Who Oppose Visit of King Tear Down Decorations.

LONDON, July 28.—According to telegrams received here from Cork, a special police force has been appointed there to watch night and day in order to prevent the destruction of decorations by those who are opposed to the visit of King Edward and Queen Alexandra to Cork. The decorations along the route to be followed by the royal procession, which were already far advanced, were found in several instances to have been pulled down and otherwise damaged.

AMERICANS HONORED IN SPAIN.

King Charles Gives a Luncheon to Officers of Squadron.

LIEBOW, July 28.—King Charles gave a luncheon on Monday at Cintra, 14 miles from Lisbon, in the mountains, in honor of the American officers and tonight a banquet was given in their honor at the Ministry of Marine. All the members of the Ministry were present and cordial speeches were delivered. The duration of the stay of the American squadron here has been decided.

TURKISH MINISTER PROMOTED.

His Predecessor Is Believed to Have Made a Fortune Out of Position.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 28.—Djelal Bey, Minister of Public Instruction, has been promoted to the position of Minister of Marine, which was occupied for 22 years by Hashan Pasha, who died on Sunday.

DARING RESCUES AT FIRE

Seven People Nearly Perish in Blaze in Tenement-House.

NEW YORK, July 28.—Seven persons were rescued from death in a tenement house fire in Harlem early today. The fire started in a hardware store on the ground floor of the five-story tenement house at 2100 Eighth avenue, where 11 families live, numbering in all about 60 persons. Four policemen aroused the tenants and a wild panic followed. On the second floor policemen rescued Clara Hopper, six years of age, and Max Christion, 30 years of age. An officer guided his way to the third floor, where he found Ruth Christie, three years old, overcome by smoke, and took her to the street, while his comrades rendered the same service to her parents. A woman and her seven-year-old daughter were also carried down from the third floor. The other tenants managed to get out unscathed. The principal damage was caused by smoke, and the loss on the building was small.

Peruvian Congress Is Convened.

LIMA, Peru, July 28.—President Romonazo today convened the new Peruvian Congress amid a great demonstration. There were loud acclamations upon the arrival of the members of the assembly. Perfect order was maintained. All business was suspended.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 28.—A tornado has passed through the District of Tschirgoff. Three villages were destroyed in a few minutes. Churches and houses were lifted bodily and carried a long distance. The loss of life was great.

ODD WORKING OF BRAIN.

Man Suffering From Concussion Impelled by Sight of Gun to End Life.

NEW YORK, July 28.—Curious evidence bearing on the effects of concussion of the brain has been heard, cables the London correspondent of the Herald, at the inquest over Rev. W. W. Noble, who killed himself after a fall from his bicycle. The accident was not serious, but the minister evidently suffered from concussion of the brain, say the doctors. While dressing, later, he found a revolver in a drawer, the sight of which impelled him to use it. "There are conditions of the brain, following partial concussion," said one medical witness, "when an object suggests to the sufferer its immediate and practical use. If a spade be found, for instance, he would begin to dig. In this case, the impulse to shoot was merely involuntary."

The paddles and Mehard's coat were picked up on the lake today. It is feared all three have been drowned.

HANNA, Wyo., July 28.—The bodies of four more men, Finlander, have been taken from the Union Pacific mine at Hanna. All of the bodies were badly burned and only recognized by the room checked.

Body of Salt Lake Bather Found.

SALT LAKE, July 28.—The body of Roy Larkin, the 15-year-old boy who was drowned in Great Salt Lake last Thursday night, was found tonight in the shallow water of the north shore of Antelope Island, 11 miles from Salt Air.

Governor Will Not Remove Troops.

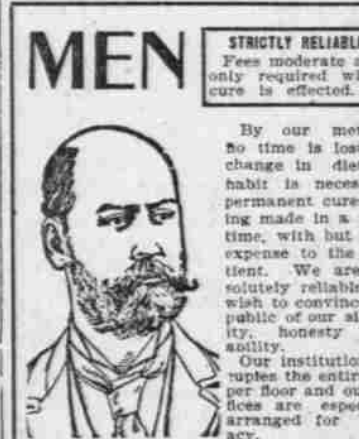
