IRISH HONOR RULERS

King and Queen Continue Triumphant Tour.

PEOPLE COME MILES TO SEE

Woman Appeals to Her Majesty for Clemency to Her Husband in Prison, and After Inquiry It is Granted.

GALWAY, Ireland, July 30.—King Edward and Queen Alexandra continued by motor their inspection today of some of the wildest and most picturesque regions of Ireland. The start was made at 9 o'clock from the little town of Leenan, on the shore of Killarney Bay, where the Mayor, the local clergy, the parish priests and a deputation representing 30,000 inhabitants of the wild Connemara Mountains presented an address. The King, in replying, said he had already inspected some of the cottage industries, and he wished to assure the inhabitants that he was equally pleased with the spirit of industrial activity and the warm, hearty welcome of the people, which he and the Queen both would long remember. The hearty tone of His Majesty's speech was received with every evidence of appreciation.

where the party had luncheon. The town was surrounded by a guard of honor of "Connemara Cavalry," peasants from the surrounding country astride saddleless mountain ponies and wearing "jerry" hats decorated with tricolor ribbons and green rosettes.

Their Majesties took a train for Galway and arrived here late in the afternoon. They met with an enthusiastic reception. The King was presented with addresses by the District Council and other bodies, to which he replied briefly. Their Majesties then boarded the royal yacht, which was lying in Galway Bay. Tomorrow they will take a train for Kenmare, near which place they will be the guests of Lord Lansdowne, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, at his country seat.

At Kenmare, where Their Majesties stopped for luncheon, an extraordinary incident occurred. A hooded woman approached the Queen with a petition for the remission of the remainder of a sentence of six months passed upon her husband. Inquiries proved that the man's character justified clemency, and the Queen, with the King's permission, remitted the sentence on the spot. The surrounding crowd, learning what had occurred, cheered wildly.

For visiting the famous Connemara marble quarries near Reeces, the local authorities provided a dilapidated, grimy launch, with two jaded horses and a "jerry" of the usual class. It was doubted whether their majesties would enter such a crowd of peasants and bareheaded women with red petticoats who lined the steep, muddy hill, the King, smiling at the singularity of the vehicle, entered it without hesitation, the Queen, Princess and the Earl of Dudley following him. The "jerry" was somewhat nervous, and the King asked a member of his suite to mount the box beside him.

In a similar vehicle were Lady Dudley and other ladies of the Queen's suite. An escort of Connemara Cavalry completed the procession. Progress was slow on account of the mud, but going up hill there was always a dozen peasants who sprang to the back of the launch to push, the Queen smiling encouragement.

down the hill the progress of the equipage was checked by two ropes attached to the axle to which a score of men were holding and acting as a brake.

Throughout the utmost good humor prevailed, the peasants pressing closely around the royal party without restraint.

BOERS MAY BE DEPORTED.

Chamberlain's Sounds Warning to Mischief-Makers in South Africa.

LONDON, July 30.—In the House of Commons today, during the discussion of the Colonial Office vote, replying to a bitter attack on the government's policy and Lord Milner's administration of South Africa by Mr. Markham, Liberal, in the course of which he charged that affairs were growing worse, Colonial Secretary Chamberlain defended at some length the administration of South Africa. He said the greatest difficulty was not the reconciliation of the Boers and Britons, but the reconciliation of the Boers with themselves. The Secretary called attention to the fact that the British were making every effort to develop the country, and were forming local agricultural associations of which, in many cases, were former leaders of the Boer forces.

Mr. Chamberlain admitted that much remained to be done, and said if it was found that the work of pacification was prevented by irreconcilables, the government would not hesitate to use its strong power to deport the mischief-makers.

Charles and the royal Princesses will visit the American warships, Admiral Cotton will entertain the King and his party at luncheon on board the Brooklyn. High court, military, naval and civil officers and the foreign naval attaches will be present.

The Portuguese newspapers are referring approvingly to the speech made by King Charles when he received Admiral Cotton and the other American officers and entertained them at the royal castle at Cintra on Monday last. His majesty expressed himself in such sympathetic terms in regard to President Roosevelt and a people of the United States that Minister Bryan, Admiral Cotton and the other Americans present were really affected by the King's remarks.

The papers are also mentioning gratefully the banquet Tuesday night, given in honor of the American naval officers by the Ministry of Marine at the Arsenal, at which all the cabinet ministers were present. His eulogistic references to Portugal are much appreciated by the press.

CONDONES RUSSIAN AGGRESSION.

Corea Proposes to Re-Purchase Lands to Keep Treaty.

LONDON, July 30.—The Times this morning prints a Tokio dispatch which says that Corea contemplates repurchasing the lands privately acquired by the Russians at Yonampoh, and afterward leasing them to Russian holders, thus legalizing their tenure, said to have been originally obtained in defiance of treaties.

MEANING OF ITO'S PROMOTION.

Japanese Statesman's Way to the Premiership is Now Clear.

TOKIO, July 30.—Although Marquis Ito has been made President of the Privy Council, formerly presided over by Marquis Saigun, the latter loses no rank by the change. Count Maekawa and Marquis Yamagata have been appointed members of the Privy Council. The main point about the elevation of Marquis Ito is that it clears his way to the Premiership. Incidentally it composes the Cabinet difficulty and allows an unbroken front to be presented to foreign nations, but there is a strong belief that it also heralds the calling of the Marquis to control the difficult foreign situation at any time needed. It is believed that Marquis Ito, who has the full confidence of the Emperor, is in favor of conservative measures toward Russia and that he will exercise diplomatic means of obtaining a quid pro quo in Manchuria before resorting to hostilities. He is regarded as a "safe man" in a crisis.

The news that America is using the Manchurian question as a lever in the Russian position matter revived hope of her assistance among the anti-Russian party. Russia has been growing more aggressive in Manchuria and Corea, while Great Britain and Japan have been manifesting greater vigor in counter action.

Crown to Control Church Property.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 30.—An official decree has been issued which places all the property and revenue of the Armenian church in Russia, amounting to \$5,000,000, under the control of the Russian crown, to be administered by Russian Ministers in trust. This measure is intended to prevent the use or misuse of funds for the Armenian national cause in Russia and abroad.

Danger of War Averted.

VIENNA, July 30.—The Allgemeine Zeitung asserts that British mediation at Tokio and French mediation at St. Petersburg for the moment has averted the danger of war. It has not opened the way to a Russo-Japanese understanding.

MADRID, July 30.—Premier Villaverde has published an official note declaring that no alliance exists between Spain and France, but that a good understanding exists, which may possibly serve as a basis for something more in the future.

IRISH BACK HIM UP.

Reception Given to Keating to Show British Press in Error.

NEW YORK, July 30.—John T. Keating, of Chicago, ex-National president of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, was given a reception by the Clan-na-Gael tonight at Cooper Union. Mr. Keating, who arrived from Ireland today on the White Star steamship Teutonic, delivered the address at the annual pilgrimage to the grave of the leader of the United Irishmen in 1793, Theobald Wolfe Tone, at Rosinstown, Ireland, on June 21, upon the invitation of the Nationalists of Ireland, and was attacked for the speech by the organs of the Parliamentary party, which declared that Mr. Keating did not speak as the representative of any one in America.
