McFarlan Pitches Winning Ball for Browns.

ONE RUN FOR SAN FRANCISCO

New Portland Twirler Scatters Eight Hits and Fields His Position to the Satisfaction of the Critical Fan.

A goblin of misjudgment, beginning with Umpire Levy and ending with Phil Nadeau, robbed Dan McFarlan of a shut-out game yesterday afternoon. This clever pitcher made his initial bow during the matinee, and before he had curved three balls over the plate he had captured the hearts of the faithful and the 758 women who had journeyed out to the grounds at Twenty-fourth and Vaughn streets to see him in action. When the curtain was rung down on the final scene they declared one and all that he would do. These critical people also left the grounds thoroughly satisfied with the work of Francis also. In short they saw a ball game with just enough sweating on the right side of the ledger to suit home consumption, and with just enough good playing to suit the most finicky.

It was a bit unfortunate that McFarlan's first appearance could not have been nine buckets of hepcot varnish, for he certainly had some Sainits looking like a lot of sand-lot bushwhackers. They found him for eight hits during the battle, but they never came thicker than two in a cluster and although there were several critical moments when a baseballist from Bay City roosted at third, the tall, slender Easterner never lost his cool. He kept winding up and unwinding with a coolness that was a pleasure to witness. There were errors behind him, one of which he was guilty of himself, but which did not count.

McFarlan's Clever Fielding

McFarlan fielded his position like a past master of the art and he did this without a glove, a thing which surprised the fans, for with these bare hands he smothered two chances. The one that he made was in trying to catch Delmar, whom he had walked, at second. Twice he tried for the Saint and twice the ball was jolted out of Hollingsworth's hands by the collision of runner and shortstop. The third time, Delmar, who was on his toes took third. He did there, however, and he was no different from three others, who were also doomed to meet their fate at that station, while the game was in progress.

Browns Quick to Score

The Browns did not delay the scoring a second after they got into action. Pee Wee Lindsey, the left semiprofessional one, whose antics in mid-diamond resemble a quacked some cock sparrow, proceeded to issue a promissory note to Hurlbert. Van Buren did what he was expected to do, hunt safely. Nadeau sacrificed, the pair, and they both scored on Anderson's two-base walk. In the second and third innings they laid up, but in the fourth a walk to Vignoux became a run when McFarlan lined out his double-sacker. There were two more innings of rest, and then the Deacon scored his second bingie. Nadeau again helped him along with a sacrifice. Van took third on a passed ball, but he had really made up his mind to steal. Hollingsworth drew a pass and stole second. Blake's long single, which Lynch was slow in handling, coupled with some fast base-running by Hollingsworth, sent two runs over.

Work of the New Men

The work of the two new men was all that could be asked for. Francis handled four chances. In the fourth he checked the flight of Lindsey's grave burner and threw it to Vignoux in time to kill Lynch as he tried to score. Twice he nailed smashes in time to get his man at second and in the last chapter he gathered in Irwin's fly that ended the game. The score:

NEZ PERCES INDIAN PITCHER ON SALEM TEAM WHO WILL BE TRIED BY BROWNS.

SALEM, Or., July 31.-Special.-The above cut is an excellent likeness of Salem's Indian pitcher, Sam Morris, whose splendid work in the box is to a great extent responsible for the Raglans' promising position for the winning of the Willamette Valley League pennant, which will be decided either by Roseburg's game with Eugene at Eugene next Saturday or with the former's game with Salem here on Sunday, in the event Roseburg wins from Eugene.

He is a full-blood Indian of the Nez Perces tribe, and was born in Idaho 21 years ago, his home being near Lapwai. He entered the Chemawa Indian Training School in October, 1914, and will remain in the school for at least three years more in order to complete his course. Although he started in to play ball in the latter part of last season, this is practically his first season in the pitcher's box, and he has made a most enviable record, and it is believed that he will continue to improve as he has done this season, he has a most promising future before him in baseball lore. He is perfectly cool under the most exciting circumstances, and has pulled the team out of a number of tight boxes by his splendid head work, his wonderful speed and control of the ball, and explicit confidence in himself.

He has a baseball record that any ballplayer would be proud of. Out of the series of 23 games played with the Salem Raglans, in the Willamette Valley League, this season, he has pitched 15 games, 11 of which he won and five of which were shutouts. He has shut out the Albany team twice, the Eugene team once, the Roseburg team once, besides having shut out the Wasco team in a game between Chemawa and Wasco, at the Dalles on July 4 last. During the 15 games pitched, 46 men have faced him and he struck out 18 of them. During the whole series he has made only two wild pitches, given eight men bases on balls and hit three men with pitched balls. Another feature of his playing is his ability to hit the ball. He has been 6 times at bat and made 15 hits, giving him an average of .354 per cent.

Early in the season he received an offer from Manager Lehman, of the Oakland Coast team, to go to Portland, where the Oakland team were there last, but Morris was afraid that he would not get a square deal in the tryout, and he respectfully declined the flattering offer, saying that he preferred to remain with the amateur league until he had become more fully developed. Morris will be given a trial by the Browns. His friends feel confident that he will make good.

FIVE OF THE DIRECTORS RESIGN

Manager Vignoux Will Be Retained by New Officers in His Position, as Well as His Team of Players.

The Browns this morning have a new president, and a new board of directors. At a meeting of the club stockholders held last night, President J. P. Marshall, J. C. Alsworth, treasurer, and Max Fieschner, F. A. Spencer and A. H. Devers severed their connection with the club and the stockholders proceeded at once to elect R. F. Prael, president of the Multnomah Athletic Club, president of the club to succeed Mr. Marshall. R. W. Schmeier, assistant cashier of the Alsworth National Bank, was elected vice-president and treasurer, and John F. Richards, of Closset & Devers, secretary. The other members of the new board of directors are: Isaac White and R. S. Farrell, only two of the former members of the board remain. They are Paul Westinger and C. K. Zilly.

The action of Mr. Marshall and the other members of the club directorate was not a sudden determination on the part of the men who have made good, clean baseball possible in Portland. The move has been under consideration for

some time, but action was deferred until the entire new management could be selected one that would not only see to it that Portland's standing in the Pacific Coast League would be jealously maintained, but one that would be controlled by gentlemen whose business standing in the city was the highest.

The new officials of the club will take charge at once. From what could be learned last night there is to be no change in the present management of the club or the players. Sammy Vignoux will manage the players, but there will be an understanding between Vignoux and the new officials. According to one of the board, he will be given a chance to make good, whatever that may mean, and if he does not managers will be tried until one who does deliver the goods. It is also understood that but few changes in the present personnel of the club will be made. While it is true that the club is top-heavy with players, the new management will be slow to make any changes that will tend to weaken the team and spoil the present winning streak. YACHT RACES FOR TROPHIES.

Second of Oregon Yacht Club Series to Be Held Today.
The second of the series of class yacht races being pulled off by the Oregon Yacht Club will be sailed on the regular course at the Yacht Club harbor, at 7:30 o'clock this evening.

The races are being held for A and C class boats, and are sailed for points, the boats having won the greatest number of points after the last series, next Saturday, to hold the honors until next season.

Last Saturday but two classes, B and C, participated in the races. The Synamox Skipper John Burkhardt, won in B class, winning the Friedlander challenge trophy. For two years the Owyhee has retained possession of the trophy, but last Saturday finished four minutes after the Synamox had completed the three-mile course.

The Skylark won in C class, finishing five minutes before "The Swallow," the yacht taking second place.

The handicaps races will also be pulled off next Saturday, and will be the same in detail as those sailed two weeks ago. The main point of difference between the handicap and class races is the placing of the handicap. In the former the boats start together and race the time allowed, while in the class races the boats start at different times, according to their handicaps, which makes a closer finish.

The latest fad at the Yacht Club is the racing dingies. These are nothing else than the nine-foot tenders, and are being rigged with spirit sails by a number of the young sailors. H. P. Todd, Nelson Dodge, Frank Ryan and C. Creighton are already cruising about the river in the little craft, which have become so popular that eight other yachtsmen are rigging their dingies. As soon as all the tenders are rigged, the yachtsmen intend to hold a dingy racing tournament, which promises much amusement.
