GERMANY IS FULLY SATISFIED

Election of Sarto Regarded as Auspicious for Triple Alliance.

BERLIN, Aug. 4.—The election of Cardinal Sarto as the new pope was made known here at 1 o'clock this afternoon through the newspapers, which were eagerly reading the news. An hour had not passed when the German Emperor was fully satisfied with the election and believes that the relations between the Vatican and France, and to try to prevent a similar struggle against the congregations in Spain. The Foreign Office had not received advice from M. Viviani, the French Ambassador to the Vatican, up to a late hour this afternoon, but relying on reports from other sources, a notification was sent to the Vatican, who is subjecting at a watering-place in the interior of France, and to President Loubet, who is at the Chateau de Mazaen, near Montelima, which he recently purchased. ROME, Aug. 4.—"Sarto," the name of the new Pope, means "tailor," and Pius X, when a young seminarian, being rather elegant in his priestly robes, his companions used to joke, saying he evidently knew the business. He began his education in the seminary at Treviso, and continued at Padua, the seat of the famous university, one of the best, not only in Italy, but in the world. He is still Cardinal Giuseppe Sarto was born at Riese, province of Venice, June 2, 1858. He is learned in the ecclesiastical doctrine, is modest, energetic, a good administrator and organizer, a patron of the arts and his seriousness always has been proverbial. He has been known for many years as one of the greatest preachers in the church. Cardinal Sarto belonged to the Ecclesiastical Congregation of Bishops and Regulars, Sacred Rites, Indulgences and Sacred Relics. He is still in the prime of his life. He has never taken great part in the political and public life of the church, but divided his time between good words and study. Although most faithful to the King and Queen of Italy in Venice, he was considered among the more liberal members of the Italian episcopate and Sacred Rites. It is reported that he is allied with him on one occasion when Sarto disapproved Rampolla's policy. The new Pope was only 23 when he was consecrated a priest at Castel Franco, the bishopric of the great master Giordano. He acted, for nine years, as coadjutor to the parish priest at Tombo, Province of Padua, a small village of 250 people, where he was distinguished by his virtues. His kindness was untiring. He sought to fill their wants, and never a murmur was heard when he was called in the middle of Winter night to attend to the sick. He gave freely of his very small means, until he often went without meals himself, but he kept many a poor family from starvation.

TO STOP JULY 4 THUNDER

St. Paul Will Pass an Ordinance Prohibiting Fireworks.

ST. PAUL, Aug. 4.—On account of the Fourth of July, and the opposition developing in the city as to the use of blank cartridges, bombs, pistols and other noisemakers. Corporation Attorney Michael has drafted an ordinance, which is to be introduced in the city council, declaring that all these forms of Fourth of July amusements are prohibited. After Sarto's body had been held by the lynchers for a time, long enough to make certain he was dead, the rope was tied to the telegraph pole and the body left suspended, and it is hanging there at this hour. The crowds, when they were satisfied the wretch had breathed his last, quietly melted away and sought their beds, and the streets soon were deserted.

SHERIFF FAITHFUL TO TRUST

But Deputies Are Swept Aside by the Mob.

LEWISTON, Idaho, Aug. 4, 1:15 A. M.—At 11:15 this morning a mob of 100 men stormed the County Jail at Asotin and gained possession of William Hamilton, the murderer of Mabel Richards and dragged the prisoner to the street. As the leaders emerged from the jail with the terror-stricken fiend, the mob took up the cry and he was beaten, kicked and dragged to a point three blocks away where he was hanged to a guy wire of a telephone pole. The officers refused to deliver the keys but were so outnumbered by the aroused mob that they made no resistance with firearms. After the hanging the mob dispersed. Sheriff Richards, father of the murdered girl, early in the evening swore in 25 deputies to guard the murderer from the fury of the mob, but the officers were swept aside as they in the wild rush of the excited populace. Crowds from surrounding valleys augmented by over 300 men from Lewiston filled Asotin until nothing short of soldiery could have saved Hamilton's neck.

Waiting for a Leader

LEWISTON, Idaho, Aug. 4, 1:22 A. M.—At midnight the lynch mob at Hamilton, Asotin had not taken place, but is expected at any moment. One thousand people are now in the town and the jail is surrounded. The most intense feeling is expressed here to be the most certain to take place before morning. Hundreds of people from Lewiston and the population from all Asotin County are now gathered around the county seat and the arrival of the leader from the Anatone country is all that is lacking to turn the throng into a frenzied mob. The jail is strongly guarded and it is reported that the officers will make a fight to protect the murderer's life.

CHINA'S ARE EXCITED Execution of More Reformers Is Desired.

NOTE TO FOREIGN MINISTERS

Extradition of an Editor and His Staff Is Demanded—Once They Are Secured, Punishment Will Be Swift.

PEKIN, Aug. 4.—The Chinese government has addressed a note directly to the foreign ministers, requesting the extradition of the editor and staff of the Chinese newspaper, the organ at Shanghai, who are charged with seditious writings, thus reinforcing the demand of the Shanghai officers on the Consuls. The demands say that the prisoners are wanted for execution. A trial is not mentioned, and it is, therefore, inferred that the authorities propose to dispense with such a formality.

FAVORED-NATION CLAUSE A BAR

Britain Cannot Prohibit Importation of Bounty-Fed Sugar.

LONDON, Aug. 4.—While the House of Commons was in committee on the sugar convention bill today, a long discussion arose as to whether the importation of bounty-fed sugar should be prohibited. The authorities are taking extraordinary precautions. Bulgarian Fire Turkish Villages. CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 4.—Himil Pasha reports that a band of 150 Bulgarians fired the Turkish villages of Delhime and Ramna in the Monastir district, destroyed a government building and the telegraph office in the village of Korovo with bombs, and burned granaries belonging to Turks and Greeks in the villages through which they passed.

IRON AND STEEL BOUNTIES EXTENDED

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 4.—In Parliament today a resolution was adopted extending the bounties on iron and steel and granting bounties on structural and steel plates on the wire rods. The bounties on wire rods is \$4 a ton. That on structural steel and plates is \$3.

RUSSIAN RAILROAD FEELS STRIKE

KIEFF, Russia, Aug. 4.—The employees in the workshops of the Southwestern railway and other works have struck. A few battalions of infantry have occupied the railroad station and the neighboring workshops. Quiet has thus been maintained.

GERMAN ARMY SCANDAL AHEAD

BERLIN, Aug. 4.—The details are published today of a court-martial held at Metz, on a noncommissioned officer named Dunkel for mistreating private soldiers at Moerschingen. Five hundred and seventy-five instances of cruelty are reported since last December were cited. The evidence showed Dunkel's methods of punishment, such as compelling a soldier to run up a hill carrying a room and ram his head against a wall.

CHINESE OFFICIALS DENOUNCED

VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 4.—The high authorities and military officials of Kwangsi have been denounced to the Chinese government by the new Viceroy for sending false reports of the rebellion in that province, which is regarded as very alarming. A number of sympathizers of the rebels attacked Anjen Hien in Henchou Prefecture, and, owing to lack of sufficient arms and ammunition, could not effect a capture of the city. The citizens were also practically without arms, and the Governor, hearing of its danger, sent a large amount of war munitions to be sent to the rebels, but the escort was defeated, and the munitions captured by the rebels, who then assaulted and captured the city.

WILL CONTINUE AS VICEROY

SIMLA, India, Aug. 4.—Viceroy Curzon informed the Council at today's sitting that he had decided to accept the Government's offer of an extension of his term of office, with permission to take a vacation in England in 1904, should he so desire. Lord Curzon said he was fully aware of the strain on his health and spirits, and the fact that only two Viceroys in the last 50 years had stayed in the country beyond five years. This, however, was the result of a Government which had embarked on wide schemes of reform and it would be a neglect of duty to abandon his share of the work.

RUSSIA TO FAVOR WORKMEN

LONDON, Aug. 5.—The Times Russian correspondent this morning describes the attitude of Russian Minister of Finance Dr. Witte, on the labor troubles, as favoring measures for the amelioration of the condition of the workmen and the removal of grievances, and it is asserted that the Council of State has favored his opinion that mere police suppression cannot produce a satisfactory settlement.

CZAR'S DEMANDS IN TREATY DEAL

BERLIN, Aug. 4.—The papers today print a statement, which is regarded as semi-official, to the effect that Russia will insist on such conditions as indispensable for the conclusion of a treaty.
