SEATTLE, Aug. 5.—As a direct result of the Treasury Department's recent ruling permitting American salmon packers a drawback of duty paid on foreign fish caught for export, the Canadian packers have sought a truce in the warfare going on near the border waters.

CHINESE PHILATES ARE VERY BOLD

Come Right Under the Nose of British and American Vessels.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 5.—Arrivals by Empress of Japan last night, from the Orient, state that pirates infest the river between Canton and Fuchau. They recently perpetrated an extraordinary audacious crime right under the very noses of the British gunboats, Moorhen and Sandpiper, the United States cutter Callao and three German and French gunboats.

CHINESE SOCIETY WANTS REFORMERS TURNED OVER FOR EXECUTION

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—The State Department today received a cable dispatch from the Bow Wong Society of Honolulu, asking that the United States Government interest itself in the "reform" editors who are under arrest in Shanghai. Nothing is known of the Bow Wong Society, but it is believed to be a revolutionary organization of Chinese origin.

All Idea of Leaving Macedonia Is Abandoned.

NOTE TO POWERS IS ISSUED

Situation is Said to Be Very Serious—Move is Regarded as a Menace to the Bulgarian Government.

STRIKES CAUSE RIOTING

BRITAIN DENIES CHINESE REQUEST

LONDON, Aug. 5.—In the House of Commons today, Premier Balfour, in reply to a question, stated that instructions had been given to the British Minister at Peking not to agree to the Chinese Government's demand for the surrender at Shanghai of the editor and staff of the Chinese reform organ, Supao.

PARTY FOR ADMIRAL COTTON

American Minister Honors Distinguished Visitor to Portland.

CONTRA, Portugal, Aug. 5.—United States Minister Bryan this afternoon gave a garden party at his villa here in honor of Admiral Cotton and the American Naval officers, who came out by rail from Lisbon, which they will visit tomorrow.

BULGARIANS IN REVOLT

Committee's Decision for War is at Once Followed by Hostilities.

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Aug. 5.—The Macedonian Committee states that a revolution has been proclaimed at the village of Monastir in the Central Revoltary Committee. Forces in the District of Monastir, Rezen, Oehrida, Debro, Tcherovo, Poretchko, Krachovo, Perlevo, Strin, Kaylar and Demirhissar simultaneously commenced hostilities. All telegraphic communication has been cut in the districts mentioned.

KING HONORED BRISHEEN

Number of Men Promoted as Result of His Visit to the Island.

LONDON, Aug. 5.—A long list of honors conferred by the King in connection with the royal visit to Ireland is published tonight. The recipients include Sir John Charles Ready, Colonel M. J. P. O'Connell, and a prominent Ulster man, who have been named Privy Counsellors, and Sir Daniel Dixon, Lord Mayor of Belfast, and Edward Fitzgerald, Lord Mayor of Cork, who have been created Barons. Other honorees are distributed to the officials of the principal towns visited during the royal tour.

CLOSURE RULE IS APPLIED

British Sugar Convention Bill is Reported to the House.

LONDON, Aug. 5.—After debating the Sugar Convention Bill in the House of Commons all day, the opposition fighting the bill with the utmost pertinacity, the government at midnight began the wholesale disposal of amendments by application of closure, and the bill was reported to the House unamended at 2:30 A. M.

Another Report of the Foo Flood

BERLIN, Aug. 5.—A dispatch received here says that 700 persons were drowned in the disastrous floods which occurred at the Foo, China, July 27. The bridges within the city and many houses with their occupants were swept away in the torrent. Two thousand of the inhabitants are left without means of subsistence.

STEEL MAGNATE HURRYING TO BEDSIDE OF HIS DAUGHTER

All Transcontinental Records Promise to Be Broken—Three Days, Nine Hours, 54 and 30 Seconds.

CHICAGO, Aug. 5.—To reach the sick bed of his daughter, reported dying in Los Angeles, Cal., Henry E. Lowe, of New York, chief engineer of the United States Steel Corporation, is rushing across the Western prairies on a 2000 special train that promises to beat all transcontinental speed records.

Jewish Immigration Increasing

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 5.—According to advices from Ellis Island, the Jewish immigration to America from the Province of Kherson is rapidly increasing.

Miss Lowe Already Dead

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 6.—Mary Lowe, the 11-year-old daughter of Chief Engineer Henry Lowe, of the United States Steel Corporation, is dead at a hotel in this city, while her father is speeding across the continent on a special train.

Will Cut Wages to Have Union Shop

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—Union men recently employed by a firm of machinists in Jersey City have struck, practically for a reduction from \$15 to \$12 for a day's work. The men were brought from other points and paid more than the union scale, but the proprietors assert that they demand recognition of union, regardless of the reduction in wages.

O. P. BOOKWALTER LEAD

Curtis Company's Financial Agent a Victim of Consumption.

DENVER, Aug. 6.—P. M. Bookwalter, who was financial agent of the Curtis Publishing Company, of Philadelphia, the publishers of the Ladies' Home Journal and the Saturday Evening Post, is dead at the Oakes House in this city of consumption. Mr. Bookwalter was a native of Indiana, where he was born in 1867. With Mr. Bookwalter at his death was his brother, C. A. Bookwalter, Mayor of Indianapolis.

WRIGHT IN COURT

Financier's Bonds Are Given at \$250,000, Which We Will Get.

LONDON, Aug. 5.—Whittaker Wright, the promoter and director of the Lorton & Globe Corporation, Ltd., was arraigned at the Guild Hall Police Court today and remanded after formal evidence of his arrest had been taken. The prisoner's bail was fixed at \$250,000.

Servant Burned to Death in Fire

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—At the fire in Ronkonkoma, L. I., which has destroyed the dwelling occupied by Commander Stuart, of the Navy, his wife and two children, one of the servants was burned to death. Another, although seriously burned, leaped from a second-story window. Commander and Mrs. Stuart, with their children, whose rooms were on the first floor, escaped unhurt.

HAVANA, Aug. 5.—The July treasury receipts were \$1,944,706, leaving a balance in the treasury of \$3,338,400.
