

REGATTA IS OPEN

Queen Frances Crowned at Astoria.

A VERY BRILLIANT SCENE

Graceful Acceptance of Homage of Subjects.

THOUSANDS SEE THE RACES

Land Parade and Land and Aquatic Sports Keep the Thousands of Visitors in a Constant State of Good Humor.

ASTORIA, Aug. 19.—(Special.)—The ninth annual regatta opened this morning under the most auspicious circumstances. Fine weather, the attendance of fully 15,000 visitors, the presence of the warships in the harbor, the many beautiful and richly dressed women who composed the royal party and guests, the pronounced enthusiasm displayed by those participating in the events and by the spectators, all aided in making the scene attending the opening of the regatta one that will long be remembered.

The crowning of Queen Frances I took place under circumstances that were grand in the extreme, presenting a spectacle the equal of which has never before been seen at any public function on the Pacific Coast. No Queen in the United States ever received greater homage or was accorded a more royal greeting by her loyal subjects than did Queen Frances when she was proclaimed Queen of the ninth annual regatta this morning.

Sun Lights Up Brilliant Scene.

At the moment the sun shone with brilliancy and a slight breeze just rippling the water gave a dazzling effect that only an artist could picture. Then there was silence for a few moments while the coronation ceremonies were in progress, followed by another outbreak of enthusiastic acclaim when the band started to play "America" and the whistles and strains of the fleet began to do things in their noisy way. Of the fleet of fully 25 vessels at anchor and moving about the royal barge seven were Government steamers, each wearing every stitch of bunting that it could carry, the most noticeable being the strings of signal flags between the masts of the tenders Manzanita and Heather, which read "P-H-A-N-C-E-S-I."

Admiral Smith Swears Fealty.

At the close of the coronation ceremony the first to greet Queen Frances was Admiral Smith, who, on bended knee, swore fealty to the new sovereign. He was followed by Mayor Surprenant and Governor Chamberlain, who tendered the allegiance of their municipality and state in happy expressions of appreciation of serving such a beautiful and just Queen.

Shell and Barge Races.

The rowing races followed the coronation, and while the anticipation of the land parade attracted the general crowd from the water front, those who really love aquatic sports stayed and witnessed some excellent contests. The first was the junior four-oared shell race, which was won by the Columbia second and the Arleta a close third.

Manzanita Crew Is First.

The last rowing event of the morning was between the cutter crews of the light-house tenders Manzanita, Columbia and Heather. It was a race from start to finish. The Victoria crew won by a small margin which the judges officially announced as three seconds.

CREWS OF TENDERS ARE RIVALS.

Do Not Need Orders to Enter the Boat-Racing Game.

ASTORIA, Aug. 19.—(Special.)—The report sent from Astoria yesterday regarding the alleged desertion of several members of the light-house tender Columbia's crew because they would be obliged to row in the regatta races is wholly false. In the first place, crews do not "desert" the light-house tenders, as they can quit whenever they desire; but just a man has left the Columbia for months, and the great majority have been with her for over a year.

Again, no one of the crews is "forced" to enter the regatta races, and it is wholly optional with the men whether any of them enter. The racing crews of all the tenders are made up of volunteers, and this year every sailor on board the Columbia, with the exception of one who was ill, volunteered to enter.

There is always a friendly rivalry between the crews of the various tenders, and this with the men's desire to assist in making the regatta a success, is a sufficient incentive to induce them to participate in the races.

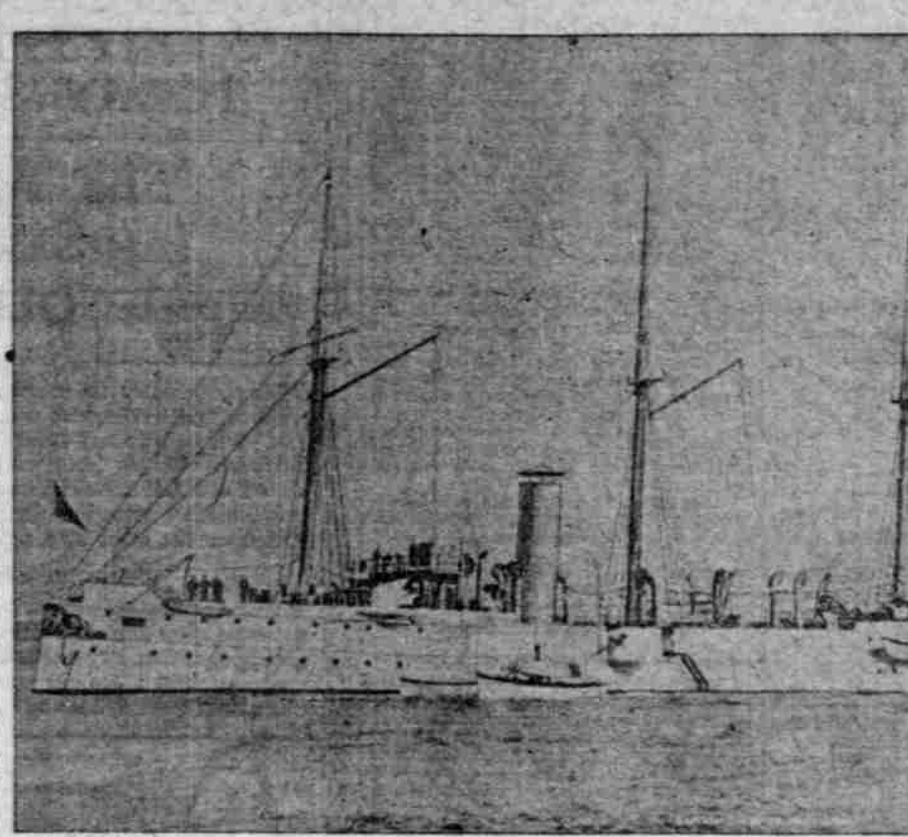

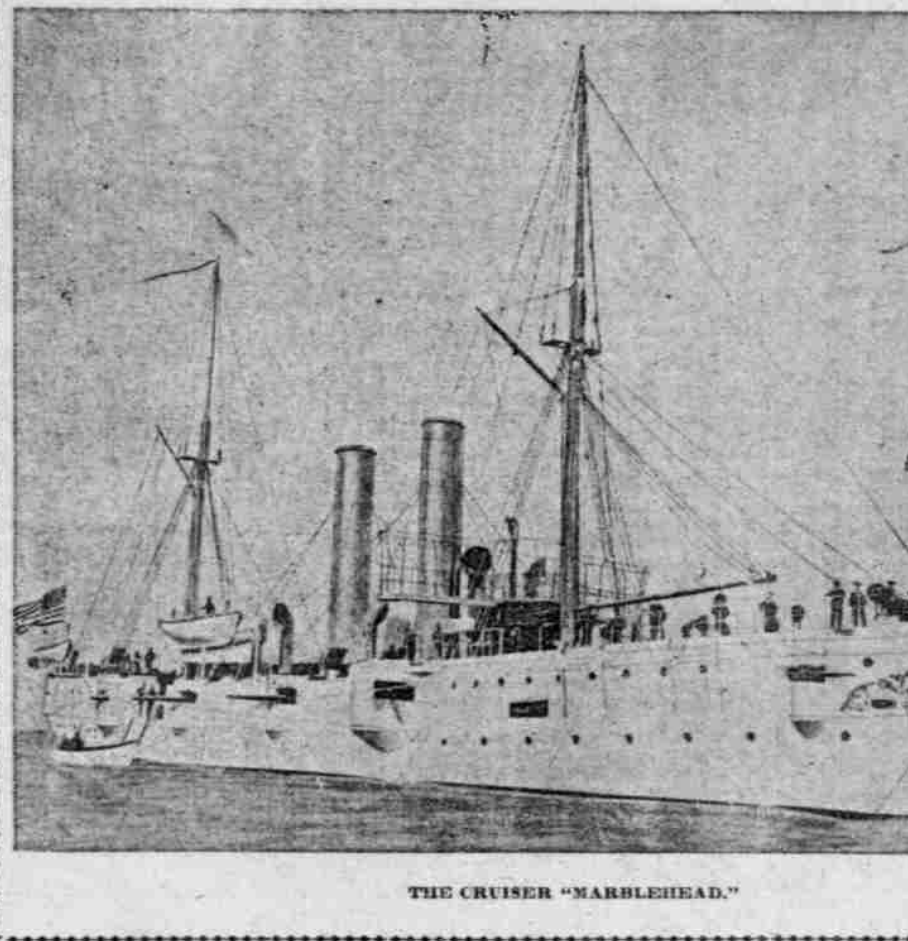

MINERS DIE OF HUNGER

TANANA GOLD-SEEKERS ARE IN A TERRIBLE FLIGHT.

Hundreds Are Without Food and Barely Sustaining Life on a Diet of Berries.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 19.—A special dispatch to the Province from Dawson says that H. Bratnoder, a miner, arrived there today from the American Tanana with the story that several hundred miners are on the verge of starvation in the northern part of Tanana district. Several are said already to have died, and many of the living are sustaining their existence on berries.

Bratnoder passed through the district a fortnight ago, and he reports the condition of the miners as pitiable. He says that action was being taken to secure assistance from the United States Government.

FELL UPON TINES OF FORK.

COLFAX, Wash. (Special.)—Robert Thomlin, a laborer, employed on the farm of E. N. Leslie, was seriously injured yesterday evening by being thrown from a load of hay onto a pitch fork, the three tines of which entered his body and head. One tine entered his chest near the left nipple and penetrated the lung two inches. Another tine ran deeply into his shoulder and the third passed through his ear.

He was brought to town today and placed in St. Ignace's Hospital and has a fair chance of recovery. Thomlin is 22 years old and single.

NORTHWEST DEAD.

David Cherry Pioneer of Lane. EUGENE, Or., Aug. 19.—David Cherry, who died at St. Vincent's Hospital, Portland, yesterday morning, was an old pioneer of Lane County. He was a resident of Eugene, and a well-respected man of considerable property in this community. He was 67 years of age. He leaves two sons, Robert of Salem, and Harry, of Portland, who were by his side when he passed away. The remains were brought to Eugene last night.

NORTH YAKIMA, Wash., Aug. 19.—

John Wilson Beck, familiarly known as

JUDGE Beck, of this county, and one of the earliest pioneers, died at his home in this city Monday night, after a short sickness from dropsy.

Deceased crossed the plains in 1867, and after living at Walla Walla for two years, came to the Yakima Valley in 1869. He located a homestead close to Yakima City, and built the first irrigation canal in the valley in 1870. He also planted the first apple orchard in the valley and watered it by his canal system, which was a private concern. When he thought of planting the orchard there was much joking about him growing fruit in a desert, but he demonstrated that it could be grown here. He was the first Justice of the Peace in the county, beginning his services at Yakima City in the '70s, and serving for 20 years continuously, completing his services at this place after North Yakima became the county seat.

BREWER EMPTIES HIS GUN

FAILS TO TOUCH THE MAN HE AIMED AT.

Is Then Battered Over the Head With His Own Revolver and Thrown in Jail.

WHATCOM, Wash., Aug. 19.—Joseph Smith, a discharged brewer, quarreled today with Carl Beyer, secretary of the local Brewerymen's Association, over his standing in the order, and meeting him on the street this afternoon emptied the contents of his revolver at him.

None of the shots took effect, and Beyer took his assailant's pistol away from him after he had finished shooting and knocked him in the head with it, inflicting an ugly wound. Smith was arrested and jailed.

In addition to the regular routine programme, State Superintendent Ackerman will deliver a lecture on the evening of September 15. The subject will be "The Trend—What Is It?" and the lecture will be given in the Courthouse.

Prunegrowers' Meeting Called.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 19.—(Special.)—A meeting of the prunegrowers of Oregon and Washington will be held for the purpose of completing the organization of a mutual insurance company. At a meeting held several days ago a committee was appointed, and at the meeting tomorrow this committee will report a plan of organization.

The purpose of the growers is to avoid the payment of what they claim to be excessive rates of insurance on prune-dryers during the drying season.

Union County Institute.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Aug. 19.—(Special.)—Captain S. V. Short and Captain G. H. Woodbury, of Portland, have arrived with their two new gasoline launches for the lakes in this vicinity. The smaller of the two boats was launched at Keno, and made the distance of 25 miles to Klamath Falls in three hours. The larger one will ply Upper Klamath Lake.

Opening of Aberdeen Opera-House.

ABERDEEN, Wash., Aug. 19.—(Special.)—September 15 has been fixed for the opening of the rejuvenated Opera-House. The building is being improved at a cost of \$20,000. The opening attraction has not been made public.

SALT LAKE, Aug. 19.—While workmen were engaged in breaking slag at the Germania smelter at Murray today a premature explosion of dynamite occurred. Dan Spencer was instantly killed his head being torn off by the force of the explosion, and Ike Harris was slightly injured.

FOUND DEAD IN BED NEAR TOWN OF FREEWATER.

Strychnine Is Found in the Bed and Coroner's Return Is Self-Destruction.

MILTON, Or., Aug. 19.—(Special.)—Edna Rolley, a young lady only 18 years of age, was found dead in bed yesterday evening. Miss Rolley lived with a Mrs. Gillette, two miles west of Freewater. She had gone to her room after dinner and was called by a daughter of the house to come and get supper. There was no answer, and becoming alarmed, an entrance was forced to her room through a window.

Dr. Cole, of Pendleton, County Coroner, who held an inquest this afternoon, and a verdict of suicide was rendered. The young lady's parents live in Park City, Utah, and the remains will be sent there. No cause can be assigned for the rash act. Strychnine was found in the bed, and a bottle containing some of the same in her trunk.

OGDEN, Utah, Aug. 19.—Jesse Langsdorf, cashier of the Salmon City, Idaho, bank, was taken to Salt Lake this morning to be treated for two dangerous gunshot wounds received while camping out on Salmon River, in Idaho.

A shotgun was accidentally discharged, a portion of the load striking him in the right eye, destroying that organ, and the rest of the charge making a dangerous wound in the thigh. The victim is the son of a prominent banker of Salmon City.
