STAMPED HIS NAME IN SIDEWALK.—An important test case affecting the right of a citizen to have his name stamped in cement in the sidewalk outside his place of business came up for decision yesterday before a jury in the Municipal Court when August Erickson, a saloon-keeper at the northwest corner of Second and Burnside streets, was found guilty of violating ordinance No. 258, which prohibits any advertising cuts in sidewalks. Deputy City Attorney Fitzgerald prosecuted, and when the jury returned a verdict of guilty a fine of \$50 was imposed. Notice of an appeal to the Circuit Court was given. Erickson recently had a cement sidewalk laid in front of his place of business, and his name was impressed on the walk. The cutters are about eight inches in length. The hollow was dressed in flaming red. Erickson's arrest followed at the hands of Deputy City Engineer Lilla.

RECEIVER FOR SAWMILL. W. W. McCredie Appointed for Columbia River Lumber Company.

The Columbia River Lumber Company, the largest sawmill in Vancouver, has been placed in the hands of a receiver, W. W. McCredie, of Vancouver, having been mutually agreed upon for the position by both stockholders and creditors yesterday afternoon. The inability to get out 5,000,000 feet of logs, in the Lewis River and to take a cargo of 1,000,000 feet of lumber, loaded on the bark Two Brothers, is said to be the direct cause of the company's embarrassment.

The total indebtedness of the company will not exceed \$100,000, while the assets are over \$25,000. Recent improvements to the amount of \$75,000, which have not as yet been entirely settled for, have caused several of the smaller creditors of the company to become alarmed. The Port-

LAND CREDITORS ARE INTERESTED in the amount of \$16,000, among them being Tatum & Bowen, who petitioned the court for the appointment of a receiver. Other creditors are the Pacific Coast Lumber Company, the Northern Pacific Railroad Company and the Vancouver National Bank. Manager W. E. Stover's aunt, who, it is understood, advanced the money for the improvement of the mill, is the heaviest creditor and stockholder, holding stock to the amount of \$5,000. The Vancouver National Bank has extensive interests in the company are secured by her deposits.

The mill company met its last pay roll promptly, paying out all the employees August 15, requiring more than \$3000. E. E. Covert, of Portland, attorney for the company, stated last night that the embarrassment was only temporary and that the mill would not shut down but would clear its affairs up in the course of ten days.
