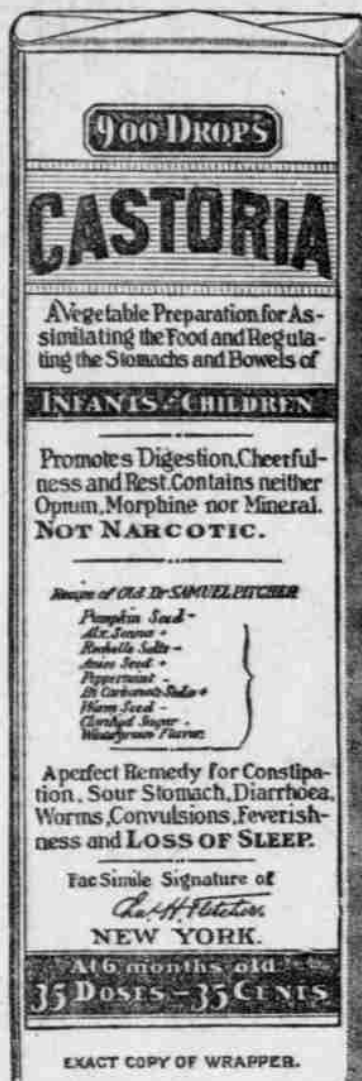
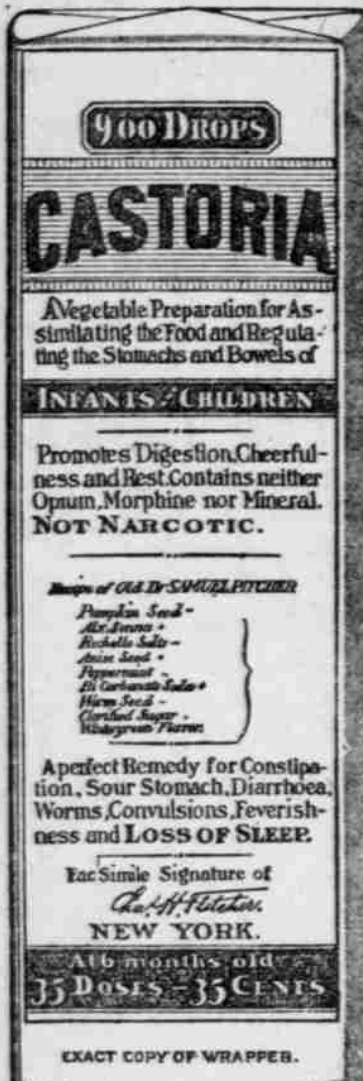

CAUGHT ON A BRIDGE

Folsom Escape Murphy Retaken at Reno.

CONVICT SHARKY GETS AWAY

Officers Fire at Fleeing Man, but Fail to Bring Him Down—Both Were Heavily Armed and Very Bold.

RENO, Nev., Aug. 23.—Convict Joseph Murphy, who escaped from Folsom Prison, was captured at 10 o'clock tonight by Deputy Sheriff Sharkey and Maxwell at the Virginia-street bridge, crossing the Truckee River in Reno. Convict Frank Miller was with Murphy at the time, but jumped off the sidewalk into the willows. Sharkey fired at him, the shot probably taking effect. Sharkey and Dwight followed Miller. Three more shots were fired at him, but he escaped in the darkness. Murphy had a 4-caliber revolver on him when searched at the jail. He was very cunning and tried to get his hand on it. W. O. Craig arrived at the jail shortly after the arrest. He has followed the convicts from Ruffians. Maxwell and Sharkey acted bravely, as both convicts were heavily armed and saw the Deputy Sheriff just as they started to cross the bridge. Their first impulse was to turn back, but finally they decided to take the chance. A large posse, headed by Sheriff Hayes and Deputies Sharkey and Maxwell are now out on the trail of Miller. His capture is expected at any minute, as he is surrounded in the willows on the bank of the Truckee River.

LAKE FOR RESERVOIRS

PLAN FOR RECLAMATION OF IDAHO'S ARID LANDS.

F. H. Newell, of the Geological Survey, With Party, is on a Tour of Investigation.

BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 23.—(Special).—F. H. Newell, chief engineer of the reclamation division of the Geological Survey, accompanied by Senator Dubois, D. W. Ross, engineer in charge of the work in Idaho, and Engineer H. W. Savage, of Los Angeles, arrived here today after a long trip through Western Wyoming and Southeastern Idaho. They left the railway at Coily, Wyo., and were just two weeks in the saddle reaching the railway again at St. Anthony, in this state.

From Coily to Jackson Lake they were accompanied by Director Charles D. Walcott, of the Geological Survey; Senator Clark, Representative Mondell, Gifford Pinchett, of the Forestry Bureau; Charles H. Fitch and Jeremiah Abern, in charge of the reclamation work in Wyoming. Mr. Savage joined the party in this state.

The party made an inspection of the proposed reservoir sites in which water is to be impounded to reinforce the Snake River during the low-water stage. The plan is to dam Jackson Lake, from which the Snake flows. Two other lakes are to be dammed so that the water may be impounded in them, to be turned into the Snake. Surveys for these works have already been made.

An immense amount of land in Southeastern Idaho has been withdrawn from settlement, awaiting consummation of the plan of the department for their reclamation by the works proposed as part of this great project. One withdrawal covers 80,000 acres and another 70,000.

In talking of the matter today, Senator Dubois said the damming of those lakes would afford sufficient additional water during the low stage to double the irrigated area along the Snake River in Idaho. The party will tomorrow inspect the project for diverting part of the waters of the Payette River into the Boise Valley.

SIX-YEAR LEASES INVALID.

Washington State Land Board Makes a Discovery.

OLYMPIA, Aug. 23.—(Special).—It has been discovered in the State Land Office that the provision in the new land laws passed by the last Legislature which extends the period of leasing of state lands to six years is invalid. The provision is in direct conflict with a clause of the enabling act, which, in granting the school and other lands to the state, provided that they should not be leased for a period longer than five years.

The old law placed the limit at five years, but was generally unenforced, and, in fact, the state has been leasing lands for periods longer than five years. The new law, however, is likely to be held by the courts to be invalid, and the state will not question the validity of the leases, no more leases will be issued for a period longer than five years.

NIGHT SERVICE WOULD HELP.

Fossil Would Then Get Mail Delivered More Promptly.

FOSSIL, Ore., Aug. 23.—(Special).—An effort is being made to improve the mail service between this place and the railroad. At present it comes from Arlington daily, arriving here about 4 o'clock in the evening. The distance to Arlington is 10 miles, 20 miles farther than to Shaniko, on the Columbia Southern.

LAY ALL NIGHT AS HE FELL

AGED RANCHER DROPS FROM TRESTLE AT HOOD RIVER.

Found Unconscious on a Pile of Rocks, With Perhaps Fatal Injuries About the Head.

HOOD RIVER, Ore., Aug. 23.—(Special).—Noah Page, a rancher of Underwood, Wash., aged 70, while intoxicated, fell 30 feet from the railroad trestle at Hood River Saturday night and sustained injuries about the head and neck which may result fatally.

He was found this morning unconscious on a pile of rocks by Percy Wells and conveyed to his home at Underwood.

OVERALL WILL CAPTAIN NINE.

Popular Berkeley Man to Have Complete Charge—Football Prospects.

UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA, Berkeley, Aug. 23.—(Special).—Baseball men are already turning out for the class teams, and by the middle of the week practice will be under full swing. "Ovie" Overall, crack athlete, and the most popular man in college, will be the captain of the 'Varsity nine this year, and the making-up and training of the class teams will come under his supervision. It is his duty to appoint captains, and to see to other necessary details.

In two weeks football material will have a chance to exhibit itself on the university field. Enthusiasts are already at work figuring on the respective chances of Stanford and California, and in a few days gridiron work will be the most important topic of conversation in college halls and on the campus.

Stanford will lose this year McGilvray, Meade, Clark and Captain Lee, according to present reports. The loss of these four crack men will mean a serious blow to the supporters of the cardinal, and extra good material will have to be found among the incoming students with which to properly fill the vacancies.

California will not lose so heavily by graduation as her rival, though some of the good men of 1903 will not be on hand. The freshman class contains some very good material, and with the proper training, there seems to be no good reason why the team of this year should not be as good as last.

Among the students who are entering this fall is Kenneth C. Hamilton, who has been a prominent player on the Reliance team of San Francisco for several years past. He played against Multnomah last New Year's day, and will manage the Reliance team this year with "Pete" Smith, who managed it last year. Reliance expects to play Multnomah during the holidays, and will play both Christmas and New Year's days if games can be arranged with the Portland management.

The most notable event of the week has been the organization of the freshman class. Aided by the juniors, the class of 1903 succeeded in electing as president, Darling, a Lowell High School man, from San Francisco, and in transacting other class business. But these results were not obtained, however, until the sophomores had made several attempts to gain entrance into the hall, breaking out doors, and using firehose and an abundance of water in their efforts.

PRICE FIXED FOR PICKERS.

Lane County Hopgrowers Will Pay 45 Cents a Box.

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 23.—(Special).—Hopgrowers of this county have come to a general understanding regarding the price to be paid pickers during the coming harvest. Those who pay by the box will give 45 cents per box, while those who pay by weight will give 30 cents per 100 pounds.

Some of the earliest varieties are now ready for picking, but the harvest is not yet well advanced.

BOY'S BODY IS FOUND.

No Trace of Father, Who Had Large Sum of Money.

BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 23.—The body of Henry Gibson, the boy who was drowned last evening, was found in the river today near where the drowning occurred. No trace has been found of the father and the fear increases that he has been foully dealt with, as he carried a large sum of money.

Using New Road Law.

RAINIER, Ore., Aug. 23.—(Special).—Columbia County is adopting a new system for road work under the new law. The road master, recently appointed, has made a tour of inspection through the lower end of the county and will recommend some radical changes in the building of roads. He reports many miles of good roads being built this year under the supervisors' systems, but believes more can be done by letting all work possible by contract.

Sawmill on the Scappoose.

ST. HELENS, Ore., Aug. 23.—(Special).—Messrs. Daniels & Hanna, of Hood River, have secured a valuable body of timber on the north fork of the Scappoose, and are putting in a sawmill of large capacity. The product will be hauled by teams to the Northern Pacific Railroad and shipped to market.

Rain Has Done No Damage.

ALBANY, Ore., Aug. 23.—(Special).—The rain of the past two days has suspended harvesting. Threshing machines and hay-balers are idle for a few days. Fall wheat, however, is mostly threshed, and the rain has done no damage as yet. It has been a great benefit to gardens and pastures.
