

CITY IS SACKED

Rebels Reduce Kreushevo to Ruins.

WOMEN ARE THEN RAVISHED

Macedonians Cut Off Girl's Hand to Secure Bracelet.

CORPSES, FILL THE STREETS

Dogs and Pigs Are Gnawing Them—Women and Children Spared Are Exposed to Weather and Famine.

MONASTIR, European Turkey, Aug. 25.—The once beautiful city of Kreushevo is a heap of ruins. The women and children are homeless, exposed to the weather and famine. The town is rendered uninhabitable by the odor of corpses, which are being gnawed by dogs and pigs, the Turkish authorities refusing to allow them to be removed under the pretext that an inquest will be held.

Kreushevo is situated on a hill southwest and eight hours distant from Monastir. It contains 250 houses and 1000 inhabitants, mostly Vlachs, calling themselves Greeks. There were also 200 poor Bulgarian merchants, who travel abroad on business, leaving their families in Kreushevo. After making fortunes abroad by their diligence and economy, they return to spend their wealth in Kreushevo, where they own fine houses, furniture and jewelry. The Turkish inhabitants of the surrounding villages have long envied the prosperity of Kreushevo.

The Macedonian committee, in concert with Bulgarian bands, had been completing arrangements during several months with a view to occupying the town. In July last the authorities of Kreushevo, observing the threatening movement, begged the Vail of Monastir to send reinforcements, as the garrison of 30 soldiers was insufficient to cope with an insurgent attack. These warnings were ignored.

On August 1 the day fixed for the Bulgarian attack on Kreushevo, while four marriages were being celebrated in the Greek Church, a number of Komitadjis, by prearrangement, remained hidden in the church, and waited for the signal to begin their work. At 10 o'clock at night they sounded an alarm by ringing the church bells. Simultaneously a band of 300 insurgents, headed by Peter, entered the town, discharging their rifles.

The terrified inhabitants remained indoors. The band first burned the residences of the Mudir and massacred the marrieds of Turkish soldiers and officials of the town, but the intruders spared the Turkish harems.

On the following morning the Komitadjis established a provisional government and instituted a new police and municipality. They killed ten Christians charged with betraying the plans of the commission. The notables of the town were compelled to contribute \$20,000 to the revolutionary fund. The provisional government constructed a rampart inclosing the town, and the inhabitants were ordered to melt down their spoons to make bullets.

The Turks, informed of the capture of the town, sent from Perlep three squadrons of cavalry, which were attacked en route and compelled to retire with a loss of 100 killed. On August 12 the Turks concentrated seven battalions and one battery on Kreushevo. They made an offer to the Komitadjis to allow their women and children to leave the town. This proposal was declined, and the bombardment began. The Komitadjis quickly abandoned the town, and escaped to the neighboring forest, where pursuit was impossible. The Turks then entered the town, and, guided by Turkish villagers from the neighborhood, attacked the houses of the Greek nobles and ordered the inmates to be searched and stripped. They seized the money and jewels and ravished the women, those who resisted being killed. A Greek priest who sought to protect his daughter was killed. The girl's earrings were torn out, and her hand was chopped off to secure a bracelet.

When the houses had been pillaged, Turkish peasants loaded their horses with whatever the soldiers left, and the residences were burned. The sack of Kreushevo lasted three days, during which time the women and children remained without food and shelter, and at the mercy of the soldiers and the Bashis Bazouks.

DYNAMITE REFUGE OF TURKS.

Macedonian Insurgents Kill Two Hundred and Fifty Men.

SOFIA, Aug. 25.—Following the departure of the Russian squadron from India, the insurgents attacked and captured a fort there. The bands are especially active around Lesengrad, where a number of villages have been burned. Eighteen revolutionists at Mahi attacked the Bashis Bazouks who intervened themselves in a stone tower. The revolutionists blew up the tower with dynamite and killed all the Bashis Bazouks.

The Turkish population along the Bulgarian frontier is greatly alarmed. The people have left their houses and retreated into the interior. The insurgents attacked a Turkish frontier post at Kotevcha and killed 30 soldiers.

Many Turks are attempting to cross the frontier, but the Bulgarian guards have turned them back. The insurrectionary movement is reported to have gained strength, particularly in the districts of Kuchuk, Gerbele, Enidje, Vardar, Woden and the environs of Salonika. Both sides are reported to have lost heavily.

At Solun, where the Bulgarians attacked the insurgents but were obliged to retire in the face of bombs which were thrown among them. The Sofia Post, the revolutionary organ, stated that 12 Serbian officers had crossed the frontier to help the insurgents.

MANY BULGARIANS MASSACRED.

Circassians Slay Entire Population of Three Villages.

SOFIA, Aug. 25.—A revolutionary band has appeared at the village of Tcherchok, between Adrianople and Constantinople, within six hours of the Sultan's capital. The insurgents and Turks fought and afterward the Circassian inhabitants of the village pillaged and destroyed three Bulgarian villages in the neighborhood, killing all the men, women and children except a few, who escaped to the mountains.

The Macedonian fugitives in Bulgaria are preparing to send a deputation to St. Petersburg to inform the Czar of the pitiable condition of Macedonia and to beg for his intervention.

There is no truth in the report that a deputation left Sofia last Friday to visit Prince Ferdinand of Bulgaria, who is in

Hungaria, to invite him to declare his Macedonia policy. The commander of the Turkish troops in Macedonia, has been recalled and arrived here this evening. Marshal Ibrahim Pasha, commanding the division of Seres, has been appointed to succeed him.

Manner Rifle Works Have Big Order.
BERLIN, Aug. 25.—The Manner works, at Obern, on the Neckar, are making 200,000 rifles, which were ordered some weeks ago, and the ammunition factory in Berlin has contracted to deliver 100,000 cartridges. The Krupp declines to give any information as to whether they have received fresh orders for artillery.

Turkish Commander Recalled.
CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 25.—Emmer Ruschid Pasha, the commander of the Turkish troops in Macedonia, has been recalled and arrived here this evening. Marshal Ibrahim Pasha, commanding the division of Seres, has been appointed to succeed him.

Humberts Appeal Their Case.
PARIS, Aug. 25.—Mme. Therese Humbert and her husband, Frederic Humbert, have signed an appeal to the Court of Cassation against the sentence passed on them last Saturday.

Turns to Roosevelt.
CHINA, Despairing of Russia Quitting Manchuria, Wants Arbitration.
TOKIO, Aug. 25.—China, in embarrassment, has turned to President Roosevelt, says the Peking correspondent of the Nichi Nichi, who says the Chinese Emperor wants to telegraph personally to President Roosevelt, asking the United States that China's former status be revived by means of arbitration.

Viceroy Chang Chi Tung. Interviewed by the Asahi correspondent, said there was still a secret stage to the Manchurian negotiations, and he regretted that China was not sufficient power to compel Russia to carry out the evacuation, though China had frequently refused new Russian demands. He did not understand why none of the three powers—Japan, Great Britain and America—had begun direct negotiations with Russia.

The Viceroy said further that, even if Russian troops were driven out of Manchuria, the Russians would then start an encroachment in the vicinity of H. In this district no third country takes interest. This contingency worried the Viceroy. He expressed himself strongly in the interview, favoring the Chinese effort to secure the opening of Manchuria and the necessity of China completing her armament.

Russia in Korea Makes It Worse.
JAPAN IS INDIGNANT OVER THE TIMBER LAND GRANT ON THE YALU.
TOKIO, Aug. 25.—The situation in the Orient has been rendered more acute by Russia concluding an agreement with Korea for the lease of Yongampo, in the Korean harbor, commanding the estuary of the Yalu. This news of Russia securing a base in Korea, when officially confirmed, caused the arch-enemy of Japan in Japan. The concession was ostensibly to a Russian timber company, but Japan views it as impairing her peace.

The press denounces the agreement as a betrayal, and warnings have been addressed by Japan to Korea that the final execution of such a lease would be followed by the enactment of similar concessions by all the powers interested.

Mr. Jordan, British Minister at Seoul, demanded a counter-move that Wiju be opened to foreign trade within five days, under pain of "serious consequences" to Korea. Japan still is directing negotiations on the Manchurian question direct with Russia, and at once protested to St. Petersburg on account of this last Russian move. Baron Komura, Minister of Foreign Affairs, who was given a free hand in discussing the question, held secret audiences with the Mikado, and important developments are expected.

Attacks Policy of Hay.
California in China Paints a Very Gloomy Picture for America.
SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 25.—In a letter from Tientsin to Dr. W. S. Thorne, editor of the San Francisco Examiner, of this city, Judge W. E. Evans, of this city, declares that China is already dismembered, and that the policy of Secretary Hay has been a failure so far as the United States is concerned. Judge Evans writes:

"China is in a bad way just now. As a nation she is finished. The so-called imperial clan, the Peking government, are gone morally and physically, and are sold body and soul to the enemy. The break up is not far off. Russia already has Manchuria and Mongolia. Germany has Shantung, France Yunnan, but our Government keeps on talking about the open door and the integrity of China, but it is all over. The John Hay policy just suits every one but ourselves."

China Honors American.
Ex-Consul Melver Receives Highest Decoration Allowed Foreigners.
TOKIO, Aug. 24.—via Victoria, B. C., Aug. 25.—N. M. Melver, a United States Consul-General at Yokohama, has received the decoration of the Order of the Rising Sun, the highest decoration that can be given to those not of imperial birth. The presentation was made through United States Minister Conger at Peking, and a recognition of Melver's services to China at Yokohama during the China-Japan war.

China has ordered four gunboats for service on the Yangtze River at Kobe. The United States Monarchy is being offered for sale at Shanghai. Her appraisal value is given in the advertisements as \$300,000.

JAPAN GETTING MONEY FOR WAR.
Arrangements Made for \$100,000,000 for Military Purposes.
VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 25.—Japanese papers brought by the Empress of China, which arrived today from the Orient, have claimed that the Japanese government has concluded arrangements with a certain power for the loan of \$100,000,000 for military purposes. The paper states editorially that the report is believed to be true.

New British Warship Launched.
LONDON, Aug. 25.—Princess Louise today launched the battleship Dominion at Harlow. The Dominion is the last of the ships known as the King Edward VII class. When completed, the Dominion will have cost \$5,000,000.

Will Not Serve in Venezuela Case.
COPENHAGEN, Aug. 25.—Professor Matzen, of the Copenhagen University, who was recently appointed by the Czar as one of the arbitrators in the claims of the allied powers for preferential treatment in the settlements with Venezuela, has declined to accept the position for the reason that Denmark is an interested party.

No Plot Against King of Spain.
MADRID, Aug. 25.—The report published in the United States by a new agency yesterday, that a plot against the life of King Alfonso has been discovered at Huesca, is officially declared to be absolutely unfounded.

Doctor Orders Absolute Quiet for a Time.

VICTIM OF STOMACH TROUBLE

Noted Oklaon Is Stricken While at Work in His Office—Warm Weather, No Doubt, Affects Him.

The physician stated after an examination that Mr. Hanna was suffering from stomach trouble, and advised his immediate relocation of business and retirement direct to his home. Senator Hanna immediately left for his home, and tonight is reported to be somewhat better. The remarkably warm weather that has prevailed during the past few days, no doubt, has affected Senator Hanna, and in all probability the heat has aggravated a minor complaint sufficiently to overcome him.

RUSSIA PLEDGES SUPPORT

Plan of Jews to Settle in Palestine Is Heartily Approved.

BASEL, Switzerland, Aug. 25.—At today's session of the Zionist Congress Dr. Herzl, the president, submitted to the delegates a letter which he had received from the Russian Minister of the Interior, Von Plehve, apparently pledging the support of the Russian government to the Zionist plan in their movement to establish an independent state in Palestine. The minister said his government was favorable to the original programme of Zionism, which can rely on its moral and material support when its practical measures tend to decrease the Jewish population of Russia. Such support might have been given to the Jewish people, demands on the Ottoman government and helping the Jewish emigration societies.

The Russian government has been obliged to act towards the Jewish people as the interests of the state require, but it has never deviated from the great principles of morality and humanity. He hoped nothing would prevent the development of measures tending to improve the conditions of the existence of the Russian Jews, especially if emigration decreased their numbers.

HEIRESS HUNTER TALKS.

Monkish Brands Marriage Brokers Hounding Him as Blackmailers.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—Great interest is shown here in the report that marriage brokers had been arrested in Berlin for hounding Count Franz Joseph von Lasch-Monich, who married Miss Matilda Satterfield, of this city, in 1901, says a Tribune special from Buffalo. With her husband, the Count, she is now visiting here. The latter has given out a statement, in which he says:

"Since the story is out, I will admit that there is some truth in it. I would rather not go into details, but since so much has been published, I will say that the owners concerned are blackmailers and usurers. One has served six years in prison for an offense similar to that charged against him in this case. He secured a paper with my signature, which he filled in. There are half a dozen cases against them, and mine is only one of the counts in the indictment against them. Those who are more concerned with the prosecution than I have been over a year and a half in getting evidence against the men."

GLACIER CLIMBER HURT.

Young Woman Grabs Her Companion—Both Fall 300 Feet.

IDAHO SPRINGS, Colo., Aug. 25.—Two young women met with a painful accident on the Snake River glacier near Alice, Colo., which nearly cost them their lives. The glacier is one of the Summer attractions here. Miss Mills, of Iowa, a tourist, and Miss Chapman, of this city, were climbing a large mass of ice and snow when Miss Mills lost her footing. She caught her companion and together they were precipitated down the steep side of the glacier, 300 feet upon the rocks below.

DIARY IS FOUND.

TELLS OF HER DEATH BY STARVATION IN COPPER RIVER COUNTRY.

SEATTLE, Aug. 25.—The diary of Mrs. Edith White, written as to her death by starvation in the wilds of Copper River country, has been found by a hunter, according to a story sent from Central Alaska. The writings contain a confession and a desire to make amends for an alleged wrong which the woman writes drove her from her home in Mankato, Minn.

They contain descriptions of desperate adventures in the forest and a conviction that death from starvation would finally overtake her. Although search was made for the body it was not found.

Morning Mine May Be Included.
WALLACE, Idaho, Aug. 25.—John D. Rockefeller, Jr., who inspected the mines at Wardner, Burke and Gem yesterday in company with Charles Sweeney, also briefly examined the Morning mine at Millan in the afternoon, one of the largest silver producers in the Coeur d'Alene, valued at \$4,000,000. Local rumor is to the effect that the Rockefeller-Sweeney syndicate, who recently purchased the Mammoth and Standard mines, have secured an option on the Morning and will include it in the merger of several big mines which are to be operated by the Federal Bank Company, which is to employ in its operations \$20,000,000. The Goulds as well as the Rockefellers are directly interested in the big deal.

Found Floating in the Yellowstone.
MILES CITY, Mont., Aug. 25.—The corpse of John Flynn, who was recognized as one of the most expert horsemen and cowboys in this section of the state, was found floating in the Yellowstone River Sunday evening, about 40 miles from here. Flynn's friends said the idea of suicide, and as no marks of violence were found on the body, it is presumed that his death was accidental. Though Flynn was known to be a good swimmer, a boy said that he saw Flynn tie his horse to a tree, go down to the river and then disappear.

Prisoners Closely Guarded.
RENO, Nevada, Aug. 25.—Sheriff Hayes is guarding his prisoners, Woods and Murphy, of the escaped Folsom gang, with great vigilance, and today permitted no one to see them. While Woods sat in the barber's chair yesterday, a few minutes before his capture, a man now believed to have been Theron entered the shop, whispered to him and then rushed out. Woods made no attempt to follow and almost immediately afterwards was confronted by Constable Wilson and another officer.

Burglar Frightened Away.
SALEM, Or., Aug. 25.—(Special.)—A burglar entered the residence of Mrs. Everett, on Oak street, but was frightened away before he had stolen anything.

Cost Telegraphic Notes.
Ubbe Peters, a well-known Linn County farmer, is very ill with typhoid fever. He refuses medical treatment, saying that faith will cure him.

While her parents were attending church, 8-year-old Margaret Grady, daughter of Michael Grady, of Butte, Mont., played with matches and was burned to death.

Professor Martin Kellogg, ex-president of the University of California, is dying at the Waldeck Sanitarium in San Francisco. A sedentary life has brought on a complication of stomach, liver and blood troubles.

Frederick Billeit, a well-known young rancher of the Occidental District, says a Santa Rosa, Cal., dispatch, was fatally shot by James Patterson, a friend, while hunting. Patterson mistook Billeit for a deer.

Rev. Thomas Sullivan, pastor of the Congregational Church Mission in Tacoma, has disappeared. All trace of him has been lost since last Wednesday, when he went on a trip to Seattle. Mr. Sullivan was at one time on the staff of the Ram's Horn.

The preliminary hearing of T. J. Turnbow, the real estate man, who shot J. E. Brown at Geary, August 5th, was held yesterday morning at Colfax, Wash. Turnbow was bound over to the Superior Court in \$10,000 on a charge of assault with intent to commit murder. The trial will occur September 25.

Philippine Bonds Sold.
WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—Bids were opened today at the War Department for the purchase of \$2,000,000 of 5 per cent bonds for the Philippine government. Harvey Fisk & Sons, of New York, bid for all or any part of the amount at \$1,024. This was the only bid for the whole amount, and it was accepted.

The bonds are deliverable in New York on September 1. Among the other bidders was the Puget Sound Savings Bank, of Tacoma, Wash., for \$20,000 at par.
