

CALL TO ARMS

Turkey Orders Out Many Reserves.

MACEDONIA MUST SUBMIT

Sultan's Force Double That in Conflict With Greece.

REBELS APPEAL TO THE POWERS.

They See No Other Way of Averting Great Loss of Life—Porte Holds Bulgaria Responsible for Adriatic Outrage.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 26.—The government has decided to call to the colors all reserve forces in Macedonia, amounting to the Second and Third Army Corps, and a number of other reserves, which will bring the total of the Turkish military forces in Macedonia up to 50 battalions, or almost double the force utilized in the Greece-Turkey War. The enrollment of such large bodies of troops indicates the seriousness with which Turkey views the situation, and her determination to use all the means at her disposal to suppress the rebellion. Ibrahim Pasha, the new commander of the troops, is a young and capable officer. Seven battalions have been dispatched to Florina from Monastir. The calls of Monastir and Salonica telegraph that they are now unable to guarantee the maintenance of order in their respective towns.

Soldiers Refuse to Join Colors.

LONDON, Aug. 26.—According to a dispatch from Belgrade, Serbia, many of the soldiers belonging to the reserves, called out by Turkey for the Adriatic incident, as the troops in the field have not received any pay for months.

POWERS ASKED TO STEP IN.

Sofia Maceдонians Hold Great Meeting and Issue a Note.

SOPIA, Aug. 26.—An immense mass meeting of Maceдонians took place here today. The proceedings were most energetic. It was resolved that a memorandum should be presented to the representatives of the great powers at Sofia, urging their governments to take action against the Bulgarian aggression, and to demand the immediate withdrawal of Turkish troops from the region. The gathering was the largest yet held in Sofia. Most of the shops were closed during the meeting, as a mark of sympathy with its objects.

SEVENTY VILLAGES IN RUINS.

Macedonian Committee Issues a Sheet Denouncing Awful Outrage.

SOPIA, Aug. 26.—The Macedonian committee has issued a black-bordered list of 70 villages which have been pillaged and destroyed in the Vilkajet of Monastir, to which are added instances of revolting outrages perpetrated on women. The publication of this sheet has created a sensation.

LAYS MASSACRE TO BULGARIA.

Turkey Denies All Responsibility for the Adriatic Outrage.

VIENNA, Aug. 26.—It is stated that the Porte is preparing an answer to the recent Bulgarian memorandum to the powers by which it declared that the Bulgarians were responsible for the rising in the vilayet of Adria, and declining to be responsible for the consequences.

TRKS BARBAROUS TO EXTREME.

Total Extirpation of the Bulgarian Population is Planned.

LONDON, Aug. 26.—According to a Sofia telegram to the Times the Turkish repressive measures in Macedonia have reached the utmost limits of barbarism and it is evident that it is the intention to accomplish by degrees the total extirpation of the Bulgarian population.

NATION BACKS OFFICIAL UP.

Governor of Panama in the Right in Removing General.

BOGOTA, Colombia, Aug. 19 (Wednesday), via Buenos Ayres, Aug. 26.—The national government has approved the action of the Governor of Panama, Roberto Mueller, in removing General Rosendo, commander of the national forces at Panama, after the latter, on July 25, had surrounded the Governor's palace because the troops were not paid, attempted to arrest the Governor, and arrested several officials who attempted to argue with the General.

Argentine Bill of Estimates.

NEW YORK, Aug. 26.—The Government has presented to Congress the bill of estimates for 1964, cables the Herald correspondent at Buenos Ayres, Argentina. The expenditures are placed at \$4,682,231,000 pesos and 200 million pesos paper, making a total of 15,548,000,000 pesos. During the first quarter of the current year the exports showed an increase of 22,619,000 pesos gold over the same period last year. The interior and floating debt were largely reduced during the fiscal year.

New Cabinet for Peru.

LIMA, Peru, Aug. 26.—It is reported that Dr. Isaac Alzamora will form a new cabinet.

Woman Held on Suspicion Released.

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 25.—Nellie Brooks, who was arrested last Saturday on suspicion of the murder of Dr. George E. Burdette, was released today. Captain Langan was in charge against the woman. NOTED GENERAL SAYS THERE IS NOTHING IN SITUATION CONCERNING IT.

CRAWFORDVILLE, Ind., Aug. 25.—General Law Wallace said tonight, when asked for a statement regarding the Macedonians, and whether the United States should take any action in stopping the outbreaks and massacres that are shocking the civilized world:

"There is nothing in the Turkish situation with which the American Government has any concern. The only danger being perpetrated by the Turks, it is for the European powers to act, not us, and this will continue while the old Berlin Treaty remains in force. It is not our business to interfere in their domestic affairs. It is also to be remembered that we put it down, no foreign power interfering."

BULGARIA'S TROUBLES INCREASE.

Turkish Consul is Stopped by Policeman and Strong Protest is Filed.

PHILIPPOPOLIS, Bulgaria, Aug. 25.—

The Turkish Consul, accompanied by a suspected person, arrived here last evening from Constantinople. They were stopped by a policeman, who demanded their passports. An altercation ensued and the Consul took his complaint to the prefect.

INSURGENTS GET A TURKISH POST.

SOPIA, Aug. 26.—A private telegram from Dubratica says that a number of Bulgarian officers, leading a band of 100 insurgents, recently forced their way past the Turkish post at Pevka, and now occupy an unassailable position.

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STORM HITS IOWA

Cloudbursts Cause \$500,000 Loss at Council Bluffs.

STREETS BECOME TORRENTS

Many Families Are Rescued From Their Homes With Difficulty, and Stocks in Stores Are Damaged Thousands of Dollars.

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Ia., Aug. 26.—Two

cloudbursts, one at 5:30 this afternoon and another at 7:30 p.m., have destroyed hundreds of thousands of dollars' worth of property in this city. The storm at 5:30 turned the streets of the city into torrents, and hundreds of families in lower districts of the city were removed from their homes with difficulty. Many business houses were flooded by the first storm, and the damage to stocks will amount to thousands of dollars.

DAMAGE BY STORM GROWS.

Kansas Counties Swept by Cloudburst Are Out \$500,000.

FRANKFURT, Kan., Aug. 26.—The

damage to farms in Nemaha and Marshall Counties by yesterday's cloudburst is greater than at first estimated, and now placed at \$500,000. Great quantities of wheat and corn in stacks, besides wheat and corn in bins, were swept away, while many farmers lost all their cattle and hogs, according to reports brought in today from flooded districts. Business at Frankfurt is still at a standstill. Many bridges are out and wire communication with most of the flooded points is still interrupted.

GALE WORKS HAVOC IN CITY.

Ithaca Light and Telephone Wires Are Down and Trees Block Streets.

ITHACA, N. Y., Aug. 26.—The City of Ithaca was without light and telephone service last night. Giant trees lay across the streets in every part of the city, and buried beneath are electric light, trolley, telephone and telegraph wires. The storm lasted only 15 minutes, during which 1 1/2 inches of rain fell. A 30-mile-an-hour gale swept the rain in sheets before it.

THE RIVER IS RISING RAPIDLY.

TOPEKA, Kas., Aug. 26.—The Blue River is rising rapidly tonight and has reached the 14-foot mark. Since morning the river has risen over six feet. People are moving from the low districts along the river. Three trains are tied up and much valuable farm land is flooded.

HANNA IS TAKEN TO TASK AND IMPERIALISM AND TRUSTS DENOUNCED.

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 26.—The platform adopted by the Democratic State Convention was as follows:

"Assembled in convention at Columbus,

preparatory to the state election of 1902, we the Democrats of Ohio, reaffirming the declaration on National issues of our platform of 1902 adopted at Sandusky, hereby renew our allegiance to the Democratic party of the Nation, and again avow our devotion to the principles of our last National platform. We accordingly condemn colonialism and imperialism, denounce trusts and trust-fostering tariffs, repudiate government by injunction and oppose financial monopoly, together with every other legalized monopoly and legalized privilege. Adhering to these principles of the Kansas City platform, we repeat our condemnation of all efforts to renounce or ignore them."

"While the platform contains more than 600 words, the above paragraph is the only reference to National issues. The people are asked to determine whether all state interests are to be sacrificed for the re-election of Hanna as Senator. The platform continues:

"By embodying in the new Ohio code unwise and unjust provisions for the regulation of street railways, Republican managers have reduced the city to a difficult and street-car monopoly more sure. By reserving to the Governor the power to appoint municipal officers in Republican cities they have rendered the power of the police power and have complicated their meager conceptions of home rule with tempting opportunities for interference by the state government in the local affairs of cities and villages. A precedent has thus been set that would altogether nullify the principle of home rule."

"The platform concludes:

"United States Senators are required by an amendment of the Federal Constitution to be elected by popular vote; nomination of candidates for United States Senators should be made by state conventions."

"FUSIONISTS' VICTORY COMPLETE."
