HERBERT IN TOMB**Ambassador Rests in Family Grounds at Wiltshire.****FUNERAL IS VERY IMPRESSIVE**

Britain and the United States Both Hold Services—President Roosevelt is included in the Distinguished Assemblage.

LONDON, Oct. 6.—The remains of Sir Michael Herbert, the late British Ambassador at Washington, were interred this afternoon in the family burial grounds at Wiltshire. The funeral was largely private. King Edward and the Prince of Wales sent representatives. Ambassador Choate, Secretary White and Second Secretary Carter, of the American Embassy, represented the United States.

Simultaneously there was a service in the Marlborough House Chapel, St. James' Palace. The service, which was full choral, was attended by the Earl of Kinross, lord in waiting, representing King Edward; Mr. McCormick, the United States Ambassador to Russia; the Alaska Boundary Commissioners, the members

of the United States Embassy who were not at Wiltshire, Foreign Secretary Lansdowne and Lord Strathcona, the Canadian High Commissioner, and a number of diplomats.

The King was represented by the Earl of Suffolk. The mourners included the Earl of Pembroke, Lord Herbert of Lea, the Earl of Durham, Earl Mervyn, the Duke of Devon, Viscount Newport, representing Premier Balfour, Charles Ardington, representing the Foreign Office, representatives of the various Embassies and Legations in London, Arthur Ponsonby and Robert Geale.

The service was conducted by the Archbishop of Wiltshire, Canon Meade and Canon Oliver.

The music included Mendelssohn's and Chopin's funeral marches and an interlude specially composed by Sir Hubert Parry, director of the Royal College of Music. The body was laid in a flower-lined grave in the churchyard. Wreaths were also sent by Cornelius Vanderbilt, Mrs. Ogden Golet, the Earl and Countess of Yarmouth and the American Society in London.

The report that Sir Michael died in the Roman Catholic faith is unfounded.

AMERICA PAYS HIM TRIBUTE.

Services at Washington Attended by the President and Noted Men.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—Services to the memory of the late Sir Michael Herbert were held today in St. John's Episcopal Church. They were attended by the President and Mrs. Roosevelt, Miss Roosevelt, members of the immediate family of Lady Herbert, President Roosevelt's Cabinet members, of the diplomatic corps, representatives of the United States Supreme Court, distinguished officers of the Army and Navy and Marine Corps, and officials of the United States Government. Precisely at 12 o'clock President Roosevelt

was accompanied by Mrs. Roosevelt, Miss Roosevelt, Secretary Loeb and Colonel Moore and Commander Cowles, respectively his military and naval aids, entered the church. They were received by the distinguished assemblage standing while Chopin's funeral march pealed from the organ. The President and Mrs. Roosevelt were met by Arthur S. Raikes, Secretary of the British Embassy, who had been designated by King Edward as his personal representative at the service. They were shown into the first pew on the right side of the main tier of pews, and directly in front of the chapel.

At the left of Mr. Raikes sat Major Maud, military secretary of Lord Minto, Governor-General of Canada, and his personal representative. Opposite the main tier of pews sat R. T. Wilson, father of Lady Herbert, accompanied by his daughters, Mrs. Ogden Golet and Mrs. Cornelius Vanderbilt, and his sons, Mr. Orme Wilson and R. T. Wilson, Jr. Across the aisle to the right the pews were occupied by Admiral Dewey and Lieutenant-General Young and their staffs. Members of the diplomatic corps occupied pews directly back of the President, and officers of the Army, Navy and Marine Corps occupied seats in the middle of the church.

The services were the prescribed funeral services of the Episcopal Church. The musical programme was rendered by the choir of St. John's and the string orchestra of the Marine Band. The three hymns rendered were sung at the called request of Lady Herbert, and are the same as those rendered at the funeral services today in Great Britain. The hymns were: "Hark, Hark, My Soul," by Sir Joseph Barnard; "Lead, Kindly Light," and "Fight the Good Fight With All Thy Might." Two anthems were chanted by the choir, "Lord, Let Me Know My End and the Number of My Days," and "I Heard a Voice From Heaven."

Owing to unavoidable absence from the city, none of Sir Michael Herbert's associate Ambassadors were present at the services, but all of them telegraphed to Mr. Raikes their sincere regret.

POSED AS MORGAN'S SON.

New York Police Believe They Have A Much-Wanted Prisoner.

NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—Clippings from several newspapers telling of the escapades of a man who has a habit of calling himself the son of such prominent citizens as J. Pierpont Morgan, Marcus A. Hanna and other wealthy men, seem likely to involve a prisoner of the local police in a tangle with the authorities of several cities.

The man gives his name as Albert L. Brown, and the clippings tell of clever thefts committed all over the country by a man known as Louis C. McDowell. He was arrested here while posing in a Fifth Avenue shop as J. P. Morgan, Jr. Having selected at \$500 an opera cloak, he said he would take it along in his carriage and the money would be forwarded from his office. The clerk became suspicious, and after some parleying, Brown made a dash for the street with the cloak. Two detectives happened near by and caught him. They believe he is the man referred to in the clippings, and that he has operated in Cleveland, Chicago, St. Louis, Milwaukee and many other places.

Ex-Postmaster-General Meets a Peaceful End.

HIS FAMILY AT THE BEDSIDE

Law Partner of ex-President Cleveland, a Member of His Cabinet, and Long Prominent in New York Politics.

BUFFALO, Oct. 6.—Wilson S. Bissell, ex-Postmaster-General, died at 10:15 o'clock tonight. At about noon he sank into a deep sleep, and it was with difficulty that he was aroused at intervals during the afternoon for nourishment and medicine. The end came easily and peacefully. Dr. Dewitt Sherman, the physician who has been attending him during his recent illness, and members of the family were at his bedside.

Mr. Bissell suffered from complications thought to be akin to Bright's disease, although not well understood. During the latter part of his illness, numerous messages of inquiry were received from Ex-President Cleveland and members of the Cabinet in which Mr. Bissell served as Postmaster-General.

Wilson Shannon Bissell was born in New London, December 31, 1847. Early in childhood he went to Buffalo with his parents, returning to that city to practice law after his graduation from Yale in 1869. Three years later he formed a partnership with Lyman K. Bass, Grover Cleveland being admitted to the firm after it had been in existence a year. The name then became Bass, Cleveland & Bissell, continuing until Mr. Cleveland was elected President and Mr. Bass went to Colorado. This necessitated the reorganization of the firm, which was at the time of Mr. Bissell's death Bissell, Carey & Cooke.

Mr. Bissell was prominent in Democratic politics, having been many times a delegate to state conventions, and a Presidential elector in 1884. In 1890 he was a member of the committee that proposed an amendment to the judiciary articles in the constitution of New York. President Cleveland, on March 4, 1893, appointed Mr. Bissell to the office of Postmaster-General, a position he held until 1895, when he resigned.

STRANGER TO ANARCHISTS Man Who Tried to Slay Roosevelt is Not Known at Paterson Colony.

NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—Inquiry among the few anarchists left in Paterson, N. J., since the crusade against them following the Dyer riots, failed to show that Peter Olsen Elliott, who attempted to force his way into the presence of President Roosevelt, had ever mixed with the Paterson anarchists. The incident at the White House was discussed in reports frequently by the Italian and French anarchists, but none of the men had any knowledge of Elliott. One of the leaders said:

"While we are opposed to rulers, we have no particular grievance against Mr. Roosevelt. My personal opinion is that Elliott is simply a crank."
