ALL FRANCE EAGER

Visit of Italian Royalty Has Political Significance.

MAY EFFECT TRIPLE ALLIANCE

King and Queen Will Be Met at Station by President and Mme. Loubet—Elaborate Plans for Entertainment.

PARIS, Oct. 11.—Because of the prospect that it may have political results as important as those which attended the courtesies personally exchanged by President Loubet and King Edward, France is awaiting with eagerness the approaching visit of the King and Queen of Italy who, accompanied by the Italian Foreign Minister and other distinguished Italian officials, will cross the French frontier Wednesday morning.

The first official reception to Their Majesties will be given at Dijon and from the frontier until they reach Paris, King Victor Emmanuel and his consort will see decorations including the entwined arms of France and Italy which the enthusiastic French peasants have raised at almost every station.

On arriving in Paris at 5:30 Wednesday afternoon, Their Majesties will be received at the Bois de Boulogne Railway station by President and Mme. Loubet, the President of the Senate and the Chamber of Deputies, the Minister of State and other high officials of the republic. French soldiers in their striking uniforms will surround the station along the flag-draped avenue de Bois de Boulogne, through the Arc de Triomphe and the Champs Elysees to the Palace de la Concorde, where a battery will add its thunder to the official welcome.

Between the lines of troops the Italian rulers, accompanied by the French President and Mme. Loubet, will drive to the Palace of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, where they will be lodged during their stay. The apartments have been exquisitely furnished and the King will sleep in the bed occupied by Napoleon. Many souvenirs of Marie Antoinette beauty Queen Helen's boudoir.

The King and Queen will dine at the Palace of the Elysee, the President's residence, on Wednesday evening, and on Thursday they will go with President and Mme. Loubet to Versailles, returning in the evening in time to attend a gala performance at the Grand Opera, in which some of the most distinguished artists in France will appear. The visitors will be driven through the principal thoroughfares of the city on Friday and visit the mint. A reception will be given in their honor at the Hotel Deville in the afternoon and in the evening Foreign Minister Delcasse will give a banquet to Their Majesties.

The decorations being put up in Paris in honor of the visit of the King and Queen of Italy will surpass those erected for King Edward.

The statesmen of France and Italy recognize that there are possibilities in the visit of the Italian King of the greatest importance that may lead to closer relations and seriously affect the triple alliance. Signor Prinetti, ex-Foreign Minister of Italy, has declared that allied the two countries could exercise great influence on the European concert. President Loubet shares the opinion and earnestly seeks a rapprochement with a Franco-Italian treaty of arbitration similar with the one about to be concluded with Great Britain.

IN FATHER'S STEPS

New Marquis of Salisbury Enters British Cabinet.

TO BECOME LORD PRIVY SEAL

Major Lee, Military Attache With the United States Army in Cuba, Appointed Civil Lord of the Admiralty.

LONDON, Oct. 11.—The interesting announcement is made tonight that the new Marquis of Salisbury (late Viscount Cranborne) will enter the Cabinet as Lord Privy Seal, the office held by his father until his retirement last year, when Mr. Balfour assumed the post without taking the salary of £20,000 specially attached to it when the late Marquis of Salisbury took the position.

The Cabinet now consists of 19 members. The appointment of Lieutenant-Colonel William Bromley-Davenport, M. P., as Fiscal Secretary to the War Office, cabled yesterday, is confirmed, and the following additional minor appointments have been made:

Secretary to the Admiralty, Ernest G. Freyman; Civil Lord to the Admiralty, Major Arthur H. Lee, M. P.; Junior Lord of the Treasury, Lord Balcarras, M. P.; Treasurer of the Household, the Marquis of Hamilton.

The new Civil Lord of the Admiralty, Major Lee, was British military attache with the United States Army in the Spanish-American War and military attache to the British Embassy at Washington 1898-1900. He was Parliamentary private secretary to Mr. Arnold Forster, Secretary of the Admiralty in 1901.

Redmond Warns Irish Landlords.
LONDON, Oct. 11.—John Redmond, the Irish leader, speaking at Roscommon today, expressed his opinion that the new Irish land act would prove successful in the congested district of Connacht, but he said if the landlords refused to sell their grazing ranches to the congested districts board, it would be easy in the present condition of the English parties to get compulsory powers at the next session of Parliament. He therefore warned the Irish landlords and Irish Government not to provide obstructions.

HOLD FAREWELL SERVICE
Brotherhood of St. Andrew Convention Closes at Denver.

DENVER, Oct. 11.—The convention of the Brotherhood of St. Andrews came to a close tonight with a farewell service conducted by Robert H. Gardner, of Maine. Previous to this there was a thanksgiving service, at which addresses were delivered by President H. W. English, of the brotherhood, and Frederick Cook Moorehouse, of Milwaukee.

This afternoon at a public mass meeting, presided over by Governor Peabody, of Colorado, the question of "Winning the West" was discussed.

At St. Mark's Church this morning the annual service was delivered by Rev. Arthur S. Lloyd, of New York.

Liquor and Tobacco Cost More.
NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—At the annual convention of the Christian and Missionary Alliance, held here today, the missionary offering in cash and pledges amounted to \$91,157. Rev. A. B. Simpson preached the annual missionary sermon. The speaker stated that for every man, woman and child in the United States \$40 is spent annually for liquor and tobacco while 49 cents was the average contribution for each member of Protestant Christians in this country.

Archbishop Kain is Dying.

BALTIMORE, Oct. 12, 3 A. M.—Archbishop Kain, of St. Louis, has been unconscious since midnight. His physicians express the opinion that the end is near.

ADMIRAL KEMPF RETIRES

Distinguished Himself While in Charge of Asiatic Squadron.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 11.—Admiral Louis Kempf went on the retired list of the United States Navy today.

Admiral Kempf was in command of the American Asiatic Squadron during the Chinese Boxer trouble. He was the only one of the commanders of the fleets of the different nations who stood out against the occupation of the Chinese forts at Taku, and he persistently held aloof until a shot struck the Monocacy. Deeming this a direct insult to the flag, he considered it necessary to join in the hostilities.

For his action Admiral Kempf was mentioned in complimentary terms on the floor of the British Parliament, and the House of Representatives, as a reward, unanimously passed a measure to give him the thanks of Congress, but the measure was never brought before the Senate.

WILL TRY IT ON THE CLERKS.
Sallylic Acid Preserved Foods to Be Tested.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—The food tests conducted under the direction of Professor Wiley, of the Bureau of Chemistry, of the Agricultural Department, will be resumed tomorrow when 12 young Government clerks who have pledged themselves to partake of a poison diet for nine months in the interest of science will go to breakfast in the laboratory dining-room. Dr. Wiley said:

"Sallylic acid probably will be the first preservative used in the experiments. The report of the work accomplished with borax last year has been almost completed. So far I have been unable to make only deductions from the experiments."

LANDOR ARRIVES FROM ORIENT.
Says Success in Attending Philippine Administration.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 11.—A Henry Savage Landor, the English artist and traveler, who has been engaged the past nine months exploring the Philippines, arrived here from the Orient today on the steamer Siberia. Mr. Landor visited some 400 of the islands altogether, many of which he alleges had never before been visited by a white man.

Mr. Landor states that success is gradually crowning the establishment of American administration in the islands.

Implicated in Certificate Frauds.
MANILA, Oct. 12, 11 A. M.—Collector of Customs Shuster has been advised of the arrest at Shanghai of W. D. Ballantine, an Inspector of Customs at Manila, who is accused of complicity in the issuance of alleged fraudulent Chinese certificates.

TAKE STRIKERS' PART

SOLDIERS CHASE NONUNIONISTS FROM STREET-CARS.

San Antonio Deputy Fires Into Assembling Mob and Wounds a Man.

SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS, Oct. 11.—The street car strike here was marked by violence and bloodshed today. Soldiers from Fort Sam Houston attacked the non-union car crews and chased them from their cars. Later a crowd attacked a car on the Government Hill route and threw stones at the passengers, a woman in one car being seriously injured.

On South Flores street a mob attacked a car that was guarded by Deputy Sheriff. One of the deputies jumped from the car and attempted to arrest one of the mob, when he was attacked by a dozen rioters. He shot and dangerously wounded Henry Mockert. The situation is growing worse.

Foremen Demand More Pay.
CHICAGO, Oct. 11.—The committee of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen which has been in session in Chicago for the past 10 days, left today for the East, to demand that the wages of the locomotive firemen east of Chicago be made uniform and a minimum of 24 to 24 cents a mile be made on the roads west of Chicago to the Rockies, and later on those in the Far West.

Governor Penbody Denounced.
COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Oct. 11.—A mass meeting of trade unionists of Colorado Springs was held this afternoon, at which resolutions were adopted denouncing Governor Penbody for sending troops to the Gripple Creek district. President Meyer and other labor leaders addressed the meeting.

Compromise With Screw Men.
NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 11.—The screw men lockout is virtually over, and work will be resumed tomorrow. The strikers have been granted part of the increase demanded.

GOODNOW HAS RESIGNED.
Leaves Service of the Rock Island as General Manager.

CHICAGO, Oct. 11.—Charles A. Goodnow will sever his connection with the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific Railroad as general manager at the end of the present month. Though his resignation was forecasted several weeks ago, it was not formally presented until yesterday.

Fourth Vice-President John F. Stevens, who recently came to the Rock Island from the Great Northern, will have charge of the operations and construction and it has been semi-officially announced that E. F. Winchell, now vice-president and general manager of the St. Louis & San Francisco, is to be third vice-president of the Rock Island and will be given supreme charge of the traffic affairs of all the lines of the system.

Mr. Winchell, it is said, will move from St. Louis to Chicago on November 1. It is also stated that Mr. Goodnow's position as general manager will not be filled after his retirement.

Will Convene Circuit Court Tuesday.
ST. HELENS, Or., Oct. 11.—(Special.)—The October term of the Circuit Court will be convened by Judge McBride Tuesday. There are 60 cases on the docket, 30 law and 30 equity. There is less than the usual number of divorce cases. One of the most important matters of litigation to be brought up at this term will be the suits between Muckle Bros., owners of the St. Helens sawmill property, and the Lone Star Lumber Company, who acquired possession under the conditions of a lease, and a purchase contract which has not been carried out. A suit has been filed by Maria Girt, an administrator, against the O. R. & N. Co., for \$500 on account of the death of her husband, who was run into by the steamer Haskins last May, while fishing near Rainier. Two or three damage suits have been filed against the county by property-owners on account of locations of county roads.

Richard Henry Savage.
NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—Richard Henry Savage, the author and soldier, died at Roosevelt Hospital tonight as the result of injuries received October 3, when he was run over by a wagon in this city, aged 61 years.

Richard Henry Savage was born at Utica, N. Y., in 1846. He was appointed to the military academy at West Point from California and graduated in 1868, serving three years as Second Lieutenant in the Engineers. From 1871 to 1874 he served in the Egyptian army, afterward entering the railroad business and finally taking up the practice of law in New York. In November, 1898, he was appointed senior major in the Second United States Volunteer Engineers, and served through the war with Spain, holding with his own hands the first American flag in Havana. In October, 1900, he was elected chief engineer of the Spanish War Veterans.

As an author, Colonel Savage was very prolific. His best known story being "My Official Wife." Among the other books he wrote were: "The Masked Venus," "Dellish of Harlem," "In the Old Chateau," and the "Little Judge of Laguntas."

OMAHA, Oct. 11.—John F. Richardson, superintendent of the Western district for the Pullman Palace Car Company, died in his home today from cerebral hemorrhage.

William G. Hibbard.
CHICAGO, Oct. 11.—William G. Hibbard, head of the wholesale hardware firm of Hibbard, Spencer, Bartlett & Co., died today of Bright's disease, aged 37 years.

Rockwell Held in Reserve.
NEW HAVEN, Conn., Oct. 11.—(Special.)—F. H. Rockwell, the young sophomore from Portland, Or., is regarded by the "varsity" football coaches as an ideal leader and driver for the Yale team. His voice is heard in nearly every play and on nearly every push-and-pull scrimmage the heap falls away from Yale's goals. He is quick on his feet and shows great judgment in running the team.
