

BANDIT IS MERE BOY

Charles Hoehn Admits Flagging O. R. & N. Train.

LIVED AT EQUALITY COLONY

Says There Were Five Men in the Hold-Up Gang—All Supposed Still to Be in Western Washington.

SEATTLE, Oct. 11.—Captain Nevins, superintendent of the Pinkertons at Portland, and Sheriff Storey, of Portland, passed through the city tonight with Charles Hoehn, a youth 17 years of age, who was arrested at the Equality Colony, in Skagit County, on a charge of being one of the men implicated in the attempted hold-up of the Oregon Railroad & Navigation overland train, 21 miles east of Portland, on the night of September 22.

Hoehn admits that he is the man who flagged the train, and says there were four in the job, including Guy Harshman, the robber wounded by Messenger Kerner at the time of the attempt.

James James, another member of the gang, is believed to be in this vicinity, and the Pinkertons are on his track. Allen Miner, also a member of the gang, who accompanied Hoehn to Skagit County after the robbery, and whose home is at Whistman, this state, where his parents are respected, is also said to be in Western Washington.

Morgan, the aged member of the gang, has not been located. Harshman has been a confession to Captain Nevins, giving all the names of the gang, which is corroborated by Hoehn, excepting that he eliminates Morgan, who is his uncle.

Hoehn has lived at Equality Colony for 10 years. His parents are dead, and his only criminal record, heretofore, is that he was charged with petty larceny. He was working in a shingle mill when arrested by Captain Nevins. For a week a Pinkerton man worked with him.

BOY'S STORY OF THE HOLDUP.

Hoehn Says He Was Forced Into Affair by Others.

WHATCOM, Wash., Oct. 11.—The report of the capture of a young man today, "Bill Morgan," one of the leaders in the recent attempt to rob an Oregon Railroad & Navigation Company's train near Troutdale, Or., is untrue and no doubt arose from the presence in that city of a member of the robbers, "Charles Morgan," whose capture was effected Tuesday last by Sheriff Riebell, at Bow, near this city, the news of it, however, being kept a secret until Saturday night.

Charles Morgan, whose true name is Charles Hoehn, was supposed to be a nephew of "Bill Morgan," whose true name is A. E. Miner. Last night in the Mount Vernon jail he made a confession of the affair to the captain of the Pinkerton detectives and Detective P. T. Fitzgerald, of the Oregon Railroad & Navigation Company, who tracked him and the elder Morgan to this vicinity.

Charles Morgan, or Hoehn, is only 15 years old. According to his story, he was forced to take the part he did in the affair. Young Morgan waived extradition proceedings and started this afternoon for Portland with Sheriff Storey, of Multnomah County. Young Morgan was located by a young boy of Portland, who knew him and who was brought here by the detectives and placed at work in the same logging camp.

Sheriff Riebell and the Portland detectives are tonight out near Lake Umbagog, chasing a man seen there answering Bill Morgan's description, but they have little faith that it is the right man.

Comparison of Ten Big Teams of the Pacific Coast.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 11.—(Special.)—The Chronicle says:

"Looking over the season's football possibilities as they appear at present, the various teams may be classified in this order of merit: University of California, Stanford University, Oregon Agricultural College, Multnomah Athletic Club of Portland, University of Oregon, Peris Indians of Riverside, Nevada State University, Chemawa Indians of Oregon; University of Washington, Oregon Agricultural College. The California and Stanford freshmen would perhaps be able to defeat two or three at the tail end of the list. This comparison may indicate about the prospective strength of the ten big eleven of the Coast.

Multnomah will likely play Oregon and the Chemawa Indians. Both Multnomah and Chemawa will come to California and play California and Stanford in campus games. THROUGH SURF

HEROIC RESCUE OF SAILORS FROM WRECKED VESSEL.

Beach Patrolman, on Virginia Coast, Strips and Plunges Into Sea Filled With Wreckage.

NORFOLK, Va., Oct. 11.—The northeast gale that has raged over this region since Thursday has tonight practically spent its power, but for miles and miles along the Virginia coast the beach is strewn with wreckage, and throughout this entire section of the country devastation lies in the wake of the storm. Thousands of people crowded the coast today to see the wrecks of the big barges Ocean Belle and Georgia. The body of Captain George H. Adams, of Georgia, washed ashore late last night.

The rescue of three negroes of the crew by the Virginia William Capps was a most heroic act. Capps, while two miles from any other human being, and patrolling his stretch between the stations, saw one negro over 100 yards off shore in the roaring surf. Without a moment's consideration he stripped and plunged into the sea, that was already a seething mass of wreckage from the barge, and after a half-hour's battle single-handed and alone brought the unconscious man to shore.

A moment later he discovered through a rift another form. This time his struggle was a harder one, but he eventually succeeded in saving the negro. Placing both men under the lee of a cliff, he started back to the station to give the alarm, when he saw a third negro in the waves, and for a third time plunged in and brought an unconscious man ashore.

While the rescue is reported in the wake of wrecks on the coast, there is absolutely no means of securing information from points more than six miles south of Virginia Beach. The entire coast telegraph system is prostrated and it will be some days before communication can be restored.

The passenger steamer reported off the Cape last night in a dangerous position proved today to be the Old Dominion steamer Hamilton from New York Friday. The Hamilton reached Norfolk at 4 o'clock this morning after a terrible experience in the gale.

The steamer was not damaged to any great extent and will continue her scheduled run, but the suffering of the passengers, particularly those in the steerage, was heartrending. Locked in the bowels of the plunging and lurching ship, these foreigners—men, women and children—became panic-stricken and their shrieks of terror could be heard above the gale. Many of them were bruised by the tossing of the boat and three received fractured limbs, aside from other passengers.

Among the first-class passengers the fear of death in the storm seemed as great as among those below. Life preservers were worn constantly by nearly every one and some women became hysterical and collapsed. Few on board expected the Hamilton would survive the blow.

Anchored off Virginia Beach with no signs of life aboard are two large sea-going barges. Both are slowly but surely drifting toward the beach. What fate has befallen their crew is not known.
