STILL FIGHT TIGER

Brooklyn Democrats and Tammany Much at Outs.

McCLELLAN STILL STANDS PAT

Refuses to Attend Ratification Meeting Unless Full Ticket Is Indorsed—Tammany Holds Rally, but No Brooklyn Men Are There.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—All other features of the political campaign were overshadowed in interest today by the almost positive assurance that the factional Democratic fight in Brooklyn would be continued, and that peace between the McClellan faction and Tammany Hall is as far distant as ever. Mr. McClellan declined to attend the Brooklyn ratification meeting unless the full Democratic ticket was indorsed, and Senator McClellan called at Tammany headquarters to express his approval of McClellan's course. A bitter struggle for supremacy is predicted at the approaching meeting of the Brooklyn county committee called at the instance of McClellan.

Tammany Hall held an enthusiastic ratification meeting tonight, at which the Brooklyn delegates to the campaign, held to ratify the Democratic platform and nominations.

TAMMANY HOLDS RATIFICATION.

Speakers All Contend That Nonpartisan Government Is a Failure.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—Tammany Hall was thronged tonight at the first great mass meeting of the campaign, held to ratify the Democratic platform and nominations. Controller Theodore W. Meyers presided.

added, and in the course of his address paid a high tribute to his successor in office, Mr. Grout, and to President Foran. An enthusiastic welcome was given them as they appeared on the platform.

After the passage of the customary resolutions, ex-United States Senator Charles A. Towse was introduced as the first speaker. Mr. Towse argued that non-partisan government was a failure. What ever might be said of it in theory, he could not recall an instance where it had succeeded in fact.

William McAfee, ex-Assistant Secretary of the Navy, said: "We are tonight fighting the battle for the restoration of Democratic government in the United States." He believed, he said, that Mr. Chamberlain would succeed in converting the British Empire to protection, and it was only by having the Democratic party returned to power at Washington that the British Government could be thwarted in its effort to injure American trade.

Mr. Grout was then introduced, and said the greeting he had received simply repaid him for what he had suffered of late. He declared he had no apology to offer for any act of his, and that, God helping him, he would continue what he thought was right. He declared that Mayor Low was not nonpartisan, as he should be, and said he would be, but Republican all the way through, and the close ally of Governor Odell, as the Mayor of the city was against the city, helping the state government to put upon the city excessive taxes for the Republican party of the state north of the Harlem River.

"Two years ago the Fusion movement was composed not only of the regular Republican party and its adjunct, the Citizens' Union, but was supported by a large Democratic organization. Today, the so-called Fusion is composed almost exclusively of the Republican machine and its Citizens' Union annex, minus its former Democratic members, and has neither the active aid nor the tacit approval of any Democratic organization nor body of Democratic whitesever."

"The Fusion administration having proved to the complete satisfaction of those Democrats who helped to place it in power that nonpartisan government is impossible, the political struggle which will be ended on November 3 is between the Democratic party on the one hand and the Republican party on the other. It is between the great parties that the people must make their choice."

"A Republican Legislature imposed upon this city an excise law, the net result of which was that the city's share of the

revenue derived from excise taxation was increased only 12½ per cent, while the state's share was increased 125 per cent. The city will only receive about \$500,000 more under the new law than it did under the old, yet there will be distributed among the Republican strongholds of the state nearly \$3,500,000 more paid by the people of New York than was paid during the year 1902."

Indorsed by Greater Democracy.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—A committee of 40 from the Greater New York Democracy indorsed the Democratic candidates on the city, borough and county tickets at the Hoffman House today, and notified the candidates of their nomination. Mr. McClellan, Mr. Grout and Mr. Foran responded briefly in acceptance of the nominations.

CHARGE CLERK WITH FRAUD.

Honest Election League Says He Put Fictitious Names on Rolls for Pay. DENVER, Oct. 14.—W. H. Bryant, president of the Honest Elections League, today filed a suit in the District Court against Julius Alchele, City and County Clerk of Denver; C. E. Collier, Treasurer; D. A. Barton, Auditor, and the members of the City Council, charging that great frauds have been committed in registration, and that the clerk has habitually added fictitious names to the lists, receiving pay for putting the names on before elections, and also for removing those not voting after elections. The court is asked to prevent the payment of the clerk's bills and to order an investigation.

It is charged that a conspiracy exists between Alchele and some of the other officials named to defraud the city and county, and also to carry elections by means of fraudulent registration and fraudulent voting.

REPUBLICANS CONTROL COUNCIL.

Indianapolis Gives Democratic Mayor or 825 Plurality.

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 15.—The official canvass of the vote in Tuesday's city election was completed at 1:30 o'clock this morning. The official figures are: For Mayor—John A. Holtzman, Democrat, 20,538; Charles A. Bookwalter, Republican, 19,702; George Hitz, Prohibition and Independent, 5,517. Holtzman's plurality, 825.

Thomas C. Whallon, Republican; is

elected Police Judge by 385; William Fogarty, Democrat, is elected Clerk by 89. The Council is Republican.

Kentuckians Let Bryan Off.

COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 14.—The Democratic State Committee of Kentucky has relinquished W. J. Bryan's assignment to speak at Louisville next Monday in order that Mr. Bryan might put in one day in Ohio. Mr. Bryan has, as a result, been assigned to speak at Woods Field, Monroe County, Monday afternoon and at Zanesville in the evening. He will then proceed to the East.

Sheldon Succeeds Gibbs.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—George R. Sheldon, of this city, has received a notice from Senator Hanna, chairman of the Republican National Committee, of his appointment as a member of the committee to succeed the late Frederick S. Gibbs.

Delegate to Good Roads Convention. ASTORIA, Or., Oct. 14.—(Special.)—The County Court today appointed Howell Lewis, Martin Foad, E. A. Gerding and O. J.
