AID TO NEW POLICY

Alaska Division Satisfactory to London Telegraph.

ARBITRATION IS SUSTAINED

Standard Says Both Sides Have Gained in the Controversy—Small Concession to Canada an Aggravation, Says Daily Mail.

LONDON, Oct. 18.—Few of the morning papers publish editorial articles on the decision of the Alaska boundary tribunal. The Daily Telegraph expresses extreme satisfaction that an agreement has been reached, because failure would have dealt a blow to the policy, still in its trial and tender infancy, of referring differences of this character to arbitration. The paper hopes that no attempt will be made on either side to reopen up scores of claims a victory, but that the decision will be accepted in good faith.

It adds that the Canadians must recognize it to be better, not only for the Dominion, but for the Empire, that the United States and Great Britain live on terms of friendship and co-operation, than that in every frontier dispute Canada should get the better of the Republic. Incidentally, the Daily Telegraph pays a tribute to the Associated Press' well-earned reputation for the accuracy of its reports on international questions. The Standard is of the opinion that each side in the Alaskan boundary dispute got in essence what it wanted. It says the demand for access by one side and the denial of it by the other formed the very kernel of the controversy.

"The mere concession or loss of land," continues the paper, "is of relatively small choice to Canada. So long as she gets a satisfactory waterway she has small ground for complaint."

The Daily Mail regards the discussion as a serious blow to progress of international arbitration. It says that not even in the United States was such an ignominious climb down on the part of the British commissioners expected, nor perhaps will it be admired. Canada has, indeed, some small cause for complaint, says the Daily Mail, and the sole concession to her is an aggravation of the whole affair.

JUSTIFICATION IS COMPLETE.

Senator Fairbanks Expresses Satisfaction With Decision.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 18.—Senator Fairbanks, who was the chairman of the American contingent of the British and United States Joint Commission that met in 1898 in Quebec to take up the Alaskan boundary question, is well pleased with the decision reported in the dispatches from London. In commenting on the decision tonight Senator Fairbanks said: "The decision of the Alaskan Boundary Commission is eminently satisfactory. It sustains substantially the entire American claim and is essentially a complete justification of the position taken by the American members of the American and British Joint High Commission, which met in Quebec in 1898. The United States now will be permitted to hold all the territory in Alaska purchased of Russia in 1867 without further dispute. Our title, which was never disputed until within the last few years, since the gold discovery, is now quieted."

The press report sent from London indicates that the two small islands at the

mouth of the Portland Canal are conceded to Great Britain, and that the boundary line will run along the north-west side of the islands and not along the canal at the southeast side. This is a matter about which there was some reasonable doubt.

"The islands are small and of no great commercial importance. They were originally claimed by the United States, but it is by conceding them the more important contents of the American commission are granted, I feel that the United States has every cause for satisfaction over the terms of the settlement."

JUST AS THEY EXPECTED.

Canada Was Sacrificed for Amity With United States.

MONTREAL, Oct. 18.—Commenting upon the decision of the Alaska boundary commission, the Gazette tomorrow will say:

"Canadians generally did not expect much from the arbitration commission. The commission was not an arbitration tribunal such as could be expected to decide on the weight of evidence no matter which side suffered. The three representatives of the United States were hardly open to conviction."

Under the heading, "Canada Is Sacrificed," the Gazette says, in part: "This result had been seen from the beginning. In accepting the decision of a commission named equally by the two parties to the case, England plainly indicated a disposition no longer to sustain the contentions of Canada, but to sacrifice them in the hope of securing the disappearance of a cause for continual friction with the United States."

"Today we find ourselves contemplating, not the decision of an arbitration commission, but a diplomatic arrangement where, in our clear rights have been sacrificed without any return."

Le Canada, which is the personal organ of the Canadian Minister of Marine and Fisheries, will say:

"Lord Alverstone, the representative of Great Britain, has ranged himself on the side of the Americans and decided favorably to the Americans all along the line save for one little concession, through the grace of which it is hoped to excuse this shameful capitulation. Through the treaty Mr. Chamberlain signed with Mr. Hay, Canada is compelled to accept the decision of the tribunal and to submit to the voice of the majority."

"In word, Chamberlain has given it to us in the neck. He was the whole man. He issued his instructions before he left the Colonial office; he refused to heed the protests of Canada against the personality of the American commission; he gave Lord Alverstone his lesson, and Canada was condemned before the case was heard. We have one more instance of the betrayal of our interests to add to the long list of British defections. The decision of the Alaskan commission is a rule book to the cause of imperialism in Canada."

SETTLED FOR ALL TIME.

But the Toronto Globe in Fear of Disputes on Other Lines.

TORONTO, Ont., Oct. 18.—In an article on the reported decision of the Alaskan boundary decision, the Globe (government) tomorrow will make a point of the value to Canada of Poirer and Wales Islands, the latter practically commanding Port Simpson, the probable terminus of the new Canadian transcontinental railway, and says the decision giving these islands to Canada is of no great importance. The Globe continues:

"No doubt one of the British Commissioners shrank from the dangerous deadlock that would have ensued had both sides refused to give way in regard to the ownership of the head of Lynn Canal. The fact that Canadian goods are bonded across the coast strip makes the Lynn Canal question less important than it otherwise would be. Canada will nevertheless be deeply disappointed with the decision in regard to the ownership of the straits of the sea in the disputed territory. The finding is a compromise in

which neither side gets all it set out to secure.

"The decision is final, however, and there will be no harking back. Every foot of boundary line is now settled forever, with no possibility of further strife."

After asserting that the terms of the arbitration were most unfair, and that the United States showed slight confidence in the judicial soundness of its claims by refusing to accept a neutral arbitrator, the World (opposition) will say:

"Imperial statesmen, or rather English statesmen, for they do not appear to have grasped the meaning of imperialism, regard the friendship of the United States as a pearl beyond price, provided this country has to pay for it."

"These easy triumphs for American diplomacy in the settlement of boundary disputes are full of dangerous possibilities. There is a broad frontier between Canada and the United States. If raising a boundary question, and in discussing the knowledge of a mere matter of form, the Americans are likely to make our frontier bristle with boundary issues before Canada is much older."

NOTHING TO ARBITRATE.

Chamberlain Says America Should Have Made No Concessions.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—Governor George E. Chamberlain, of Oregon, who is on a visit East, arrived in Washington tonight. The Governor always has taken a great deal of interest in the Alaskan boundary question, and in discussing the conclusion reached by the arbitration commission in London spoke as follows:

"I have always felt that there was really nothing to arbitrate. In other words, America had everything to lose and nothing to gain by an arbitration. The consent to arbitrate gave coloring to a right of Great Britain to make a claim which in my opinion had no foundation in fact. I could not see how it could have been possible to decide other than in accordance with the claim which was asserted by America, and until very recently, had been lived up to and acted upon by persons of every nationality on the ground who were in a position to know the respective merits of the contending parties."

"It was a repetition of the old cry of '44-40 or fight,' and I think the United States ought to have taken the latter alternative rather than make any concessions to any power with reference to Alaska or its possessions."

SEARCH FOR MILLIONAIRE

Believed to Be Held for Ransom in Mountains of Virginia.

BRIISTOL, Tenn., Oct. 18.—It is now five days since E. L. Wentz, the young Philadelphia millionaire, so mysteriously disappeared in the mountains of Wise County, Virginia, and notwithstanding a party of 100 men have been scouring the mountains for five days, no clue has been obtained.

The missing man's brother, Daniel Wentz, has increased the reward for the finding of the young man from \$500 to \$25,000, provided he is returned alive. The reward, if the young man should be found dead, is \$2500.

The father of the missing man is hurrying from Philadelphia. The most plausible theory is that young Wentz was murdered in the mountains as a matter of spite work for his firm hand in dealing with trespassers on the lands of the Virginia Coal & Iron Company. It is not improbable, however, that kidnapers are holding him for ransom.

VENGEANCE OF ARMENIAN

Slew Banker Who Failed to Keep Promise Made in Captivity.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 18.—A Turkish Armenian has been sentenced to 10 years in Moscow for the assassination of a Russian-Armenian banker named Janjanz, who failed to contribute 15,000 roubles to the Armenian national fund, according to a promise made by him when he was captured in the Caucasus.

VIEW FRENCH TROOP

Italian Royalty at Vincennes Parade Ground.

EMMANUEL PRAISES THE ARMY

After Elaborate Luncheon at the Elysee Palace, Attended by Military and Naval Officers, King and Queen Leave.

PARIS, Oct. 18.—King Victor Emmanuel of Italy and Queen Helene heard mass early this morning in the Italian Chapel here, whither they drove without escort.

At about 9 o'clock this morning a start was made for Vincennes to witness the military review. The streets through which their Majesties passed were not crowded owing to the early hour and a drizzling rain. Upon arriving at the review ground, King Victor Emmanuel mounted a horse, Queen Helene took her place in President Loubet's carriage, while Marie Loubet entered the richly decorated royal train, where before the march passed, she was joined by their Majesties and the French President.

The party returned to Paris by way of the boulevards amid the hearty cheering of the people. The sun had come out and the crowds were enthusiastic. At 1 o'clock their Majesties drove to the Elysee Palace where an elaborate luncheon was given, the guests being all military and naval officers.

At the lunch King Victor Emmanuel made a speech expressing his admiration for the French army and recalling the days when it had fought side by side with the soldiers of Italy. His Majesty referred again to the pleasure that he and Queen Helene had derived from their visit to Paris. President Loubet replied briefly.

The King and Queen left for Italy from the Invalides Railroad Station at 2:25. Their departure was without any worthy incident.

Before his departure King Victor Emmanuel gave 10,000 for the poor of Paris and \$5000 for the indigent Italians.

PARLIAMENT OPENS ON TUESDAY.

Reduction of Army Service and Pensions the Main Questions.

PARIS, Oct. 18.—The reopening of Parliament next Tuesday, after a vacation of four months, excites little attention here, as there are few important issues in sight.

The Combes Ministry has practically the same strength today as it had at the close of the last session and there is no doubt that the government has the sufficient majority to resist adverse votes. The main features of the policy relating to schools and the religious orders have been carried out. A number of interpellations, however, are pending on the methods adopted by the government in closing the religious establishments.

It is the intention of the government to group the clerical interpellations so that all phases of the matter be discussed at the same time and that the voting follow.

The principal business of the approaching session will be the budget for 1904 and the discussion in the Chamber of a bill which already has passed the Senate, reducing the term of military service from three to two years. The debate on the budget in the Chamber will begin October 28.

The principal work of the Senate will

be the consideration of a bill granting old age pensions to workmen.

SERMON ENDS WITH TOAST.

Emperor William's Advice to His Sons on Confirmation Day.

BERLIN, Oct. 18.—At the banquet given in the new palace yesterday in honor of the confirmation of Princes August William and Oscar, respectively the fourth and fifth sons of Emperor William, His Majesty addressed the Princes as follows:

"My Dear Sons: This day is in its spiritual relations to be compared to the day an officer or soldier takes the oath of loyalty. Today you have, so to speak, come of age in your beliefs. I speak intentionally in the military sense, because I assume that you also know the beautiful allegory in which the Christian is compared to the warrior. You will, of course, carry out what you have today so beautifully promised in your vows to your spiritual master."

"With justice you have emphasized the fact that you intend to be persons; that, in my opinion, is the point which most concerns the Christian in his daily life, for undoubtedly we can say with confidence of the Savior, that he was the most personal personage who ever walked the earth among men."

"In your lessons you have read and heard of many great men who have elevated and even inspired you, but these are only human words, and no human words can be considered equal to any single word of our Lord. Never has a human word succeeded in inspiring the people of all races and all nations equally to the same goal, to strive to imitate him; yes, even to yield their lives for him. This miracle can only be explained in the assumption that his words are the words of everlasting life."

"From my own experience I can assure you that this angle and turning point of human life, especially a responsible and a busy life, lies alone in the attitude adopted toward the Savior. There can be no doubt that our Lord lives today as an entire personality which cannot be ignored. I am ready to believe that many persons take the view that in modern life it is impossible that any one should concern himself so intimately with the Savior or take him into consideration as formerly; but the only helper and rescuer remains the Savior."

"I advise you from the bottom of my heart to toil and work without ceasing. That is the kernel of Christian life. He who will be most heavily punished is he who does nothing, who goes with the stream and lets others work. May each of you strive to do his best in his province, to become a personage and to grow up with his tasks according to the example of his Savior."

"Strive so that what you undertake will be a joy to your fellowmen or at least a service to them. Then you will have accomplished what is expected of you. That you may not be wanting in the help of God and of our Savior to this let us empty our glasses."

IMPERIAL STATUES UNVEILED.

Emperor William and Large Assemblage Witness Ceremony.

BERLIN, Oct. 18.—The statues of the Emperor and Empress Frederick, opposite the Brandenburg gate, were unveiled today in the presence of Emperor William and his Empress, the Crown Prince and other imperial personages and a large assemblage of Ministers, officers and officials.

In spite of the wet and cold weather, a large crowd gathered to witness the ceremony. Their majesties deposited wreaths at the bases of the statues and then drove to the castle, where lunch was served to the members of the imperial family and their foreign guests.

After the repeat Emperor William delivered an address in which he said that he would best perpetuate the memory of his parents' activity in the past by reading some sentences which Countess Hinzpeter has committed to paper in grateful love and reverence for the dead. Having read these extracts, which referred to the tragic fate of Emperor Frederick and the

sufferings of his consort, the Emperor eulogized the life work of his parents as a happy augury for the future of the empire and the dynasty. His Majesty then called upon his guests to empty their glasses in silence to the memory of the dead.

This statue of Emperor Frederick is the first to be erected in Berlin and the work of a sculptor named Brunn. The statue of the Empress, which is done in white marble, is by Herr Gerth.

Leopold Pointed to The Hague.

LONDON, Oct. 18.—The Vienna correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says that King Leopold of Belgium had a cool reception in Vienna. He held a conference with Count Goluchowski, the Austria-Hungary Minister of Foreign Affairs, who explained that Emperor Francis Joseph could not undertake to arbitrate the Congo affair.

Count Goluchowski, the correspondent adds, strongly advised the King to submit the question to The Hague tribunal for arbitration.

Papal Secretary of State.

ROME, Oct. 18.—The pope has appointed Monsignore Merry del Val papal Secretary of State.

The announcement of this appointment was made in a letter presented by the Pope to Mgr. Merry del Val. The nomination, however, will not be made of effect until the next consistory, when the monsignor will also be made a Cardinal.

blessing on the mission of the host, on their works and on the metropolises. The invocation was followed by the hymn, "All Power Is Given Unto Thee."

Mrs. Dowie, known to the followers of her husband as "Overseer" Jane Dowie, read from the Gospel of St. Mark the first chapter and the first 15 verses.

Dr. Dowie made a long prayer, at the close of which many hundreds of persons left the building. Dowie again reiterated with those who were leaving and asked them to do him the courtesy to remain until the end of the meeting.

The subject of the discourse was "Repentance," and Dr. Dowie's text was from Scriptural passages having reference to the teaching and promised teaching of Elijah.

The Coming of Elijah.

"In these three passages," said the preacher, "we have the great and mighty records of the appearance of Elijah and the promise that he shall come again. Where is the common honesty of modern theologians in not admitting this fact? What theologian is worth his salt

who has denied the fact that Elijah must come again? I say to the Protestant theologians of New York, dig up your commentaries, and annotations on the Gospel, look everywhere you can, and you will find that all the authorities agree that Elijah must come again before Christ comes.

"No matter whether I am Elijah or not, Elijah must come again. He has come once as a mighty destroyer when he called down the fire of Mount Carmel. He came again as John the Baptist, and once more he must come, according to the promise of God, before the great and terrible day of Jehovah."

"Elijah triumphed once!" he cried. "God grant he may triumph again!" "Amen, amen," came from all over the house.

The general overseer asked every one who wished to repent and wished to be saved to rise, and many responded. The meeting closed with a hymn, the benediction and the shouts of "Peace be unto you," and "Peace unto you be multiplied."

Gilberters Make Poor Laborers.

HONOLULU, Oct. 18.—The steamer Isleworth left for the Gilbert Islands today with 200 Gilberters, the last of several thousand imported during the last 25 years, for plantation laborers. As laborers they have proven unsatisfactory. Many of them are destitute. They have been trying to return home for a long time. The expense of chartering the Isleworth is partially borne by private subscription.
