DUSS AND NORDICA.
Metropolitan Orchestra With Nordica as Soloist.

Tonight at the Armory, on Tenth and Couch streets, will be given the nearest approach to Grand Opera, of anything ever heard in Portland. J. S. Duss, who brings the Metropolitan Opera House orchestra to Portland, has gained in the season, that which many conductors have striven for years to attain—fame, success and serious recognition in the musical world. No one in these times can gain such consideration unless he possesses the attributes necessary to fill every requirement the world demands from the orchestral conductor of today. Duss has every attribute; a thorough knowledge of music, temperament, authority, accuracy of conception, magnanimity and grace. It has been the good fortune of but a few of the world's great conductors to be the happy possessors of both the last-named qualities.

Perhaps the fact that Duss is one of those few is answerable in a great measure for the unqualified success he has achieved. Suffice to say that whatever the secret of his popularity may have been, no other conductor has ever before woven himself into the hearts of, or obtained such firm hold on the so-called "fickle" New York public as to retain its admiration and support for so long a season as it was his privilege to play last summer—128 consecutive nights—a record never before known in the history of music in America. His genius is unquestioned; his ambition unbounded.

Nordica's latest European distinction is an engagement to open the new Wagner Theater at Munich in September this year, as Isolde, in "Tristan and Isolde."

The music-lovers will be glad to know that Mme. Nordica will sing a selection tonight from "Tristan and Isolde" and "Puccini's" opera, "La Bohème," in Bayreuth for her rendition of the German operas.

Fine Library Put Up at Auction.
PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 23.—One of the most remarkable libraries in existence has been put up at auction here. It was collected by Howard T. Goodwin, confidential clerk of a banking firm, who committed suicide when confronted with evidence of a shortage amounting to \$100,000. Goodwin's hobby was book collecting, and to gratify his desire, he is said to have speculated with money not his. It is estimated that he spent over \$100,000 on his library, and the books offered include some of the most beautiful specimens of the printer's art and the finest sets of nearly all the great authors. The bidding was remarkably slow, however, and 300 volumes brought \$250.

New Wireless Telegraphy System.
