

DEATH IN FEUD

Two Armenians Struck Down in London.

ASSASSIN ENDS OWN LIFE

Victims Are Attacked While Walking Up Street.

SHOT DOWN FROM BEHIND

Police Believe the Murderer Is the Man Who Killed Leader Sagouni During Last Month.

LONDON, Nov. 4.—The dramatic murder of Sagouni, president of the Armenian Revolutionary Society, in London on the night of October 26, was followed this afternoon by the assassination of two more delegates to the Armenian convention here. The suicide of the assassin, though he has not yet been identified, gives good reason to believe he also was the slayer of Sagouni.

The murders were carried out in the most daring manner, more so than was the assassination of Sagouni. They took place in the early afternoon close to the Armenian headquarters at Peckham Rye. The two civilians were shot down from behind at close range. The murderer fired twice at a third member of the group, but missed him, and then attempted to flee. Seeing that his escape was cut off, he drew another revolver and shot himself with his left hand. It is considered a significant fact that the assassin of Sagouni was also left-handed.

One Hope of Identification. The murderer resembles the description given of the murderer of Sagouni, except the former was clean shaven. The police believe the suicide shaved off his mustache after Sagouni's murder. It is believed the identity of the assassin may remain unsolved unless he has been previously in the hands of the police. If so, the scars he bears on his face may render identification easy.

This series of crimes in a hitherto quiet suburb has brought terror to the Armenians, who fear to leave their houses except under police protection. The police, while believing the murderer of Sagouni and the assassin of the Armenians today are identical, fearing a continuation of the murderous vendetta, point to the ease with which the assassin escaped them after the murder of Sagouni. They say, they say that the murderer was harbored and given another set of clothing by accomplices.

Were From Russia.

The names of the murdered Armenians were Aram Grikorian and Sigran Semran, both members of the Armenian Central Committee, which has been in session here, and were soon to return to Russia. They were walking with a companion named Rouben Ghaharbi, toward the headquarters, when the assassin, who was armed with two revolvers, came up behind and shot them. They fled immediately, Ghaharbi was reported by the murderer's bullet. After failing to kill him, the murderer ran some distance, but, finding himself cornered, he shot himself through the heart. The murderer wore a hat, but under his arm the police found a cap which corresponds with the cap the murderer of Sagouni is known to have purchased the night of the tragedy.

The police took charge of the Armenian headquarters at Peckham Rye tonight. No one was allowed to enter or leave the place. The murderer was seen strolling aimlessly about Peckham Rye throughout the afternoon, evidently waiting for his victims to leave the Armenian headquarters. In the afternoon, eight of the Hentschakists went out for a walk in three parties, about 100 yards apart. The assassin followed them, and after firing his revolver, tried to escape, but he collided with a laborer who was running to see what had happened and fell to the ground. The laborer disarmed him, as he lay, but the murderer drew a second revolver from his pocket and committed suicide while in a sitting posture.

FRONTED ON REBEL SCHEME.

Japanese Consulate at Manila in No Plot Against America.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—The Japanese Minister has received an official statement regarding the alleged dealings between the officials of the Japanese Consulate at Manila and the insurgent leader, Trias, as reported by General MacArthur in December, 1900. The statement says the matter was investigated by the Japanese government, and it was learned that Mr. Hojo, of the Japanese Consulate at Manila, met Trias accidentally on a pleasure trip, and was introduced to him by a fellow traveler.

In conversation Trias stated the insurgents were in need of arms and ammunition; that if they would obtain a supply sufficient for the equipment of 800 to 10,000 men, it would be an easy matter to drive the American troops out of the islands, and ultimately to secure independence, and if Japan would assist the insurgents by supplying arms and ammunition, the right to establish a permanent coaling station, freedom of trade and railway franchises would be conceded.

He then inquired how Mr. Hojo thought the Japanese government would regard such a proposition. Mr. Hojo stated he had no authority to discuss the matter in his official capacity, but his private opinion was it would be absolutely impossible for Japan to consider such a proposition or to render any assistance whatever to the insurgents, and he added he thought the wisest course was submission to American authorities.

The United States Minister at Tokyo was notified of the facts revealed by the investigation and of the resultant action, and the reply received from him stated the United States Government regarded the matter as finally closed.

AMERICANS FOOLED COBEN.

Chamberlain Shows How Free-Trade Erred in Judgment.

LONDON, Nov. 4.—Joseph Chamberlain made a speech tonight to 500 of his fellow townsmen at Birmingham. It was by far the largest audience the ex-Colonial Secretary had faced during the fiscal campaign.

After dealing with conditions during the past 50 years under free trade, and quoting figures to sustain his argument, Mr. Chamberlain commented on Cobden's position, quoting Cobden as saying the United States would eventually abandon

manufacturing, and "the workmen would go back to the land and dig and delve for us." The Americans, however, said Mr. Chamberlain, have not so conceived their National destiny, and did not believe that they were created by Providence to dig and delve and plow for the benefit of Great Britain. They knew they had resources of their own, and behind the tariff wall they had built up their industries until they had reached a stage where, unassisted with the extent of their own markets, they were invading those of the United Kingdom. Mr. Chamberlain said he did not blame the United States, but he appealed to Englishmen to say whether they would adhere to the old system or adopt another which would prevent the American invasion.

RUSSIA THREATENS CHINA.

Will Assume Charge of Manchuria, Unless Demands Are Met.

TOKIO, Nov. 4.—Reports from Peking say Russia now threatens to assume sole charge of the government of Manchuria unless China promptly dismisses Yuen, the Taoist of Mukden, and decapitates another mandarin who recently punished disorderly Chinese bandits in Russian employ. This action of Russia has caused considerable excitement among the Chinese official circles. It is looked upon as showing that the alleged pacific attitude of Russia is not borne out by her actions. A number of the high officials continue to advocate the addressing of a forcible appeal of protest against Russia's attitude to the powers, with a request that they interfere to preserve the integrity of the Chinese Empire.

Russia Branching Out in Corea.

VICTORIA, B. C., Nov. 4.—Advices were received by the steamer Victoria, which arrived today from the Orient, that the Russians are extending their scope on the Yalu River. Sok Jin, which lies below the Yungpung, has now been seized and forts erected there. Vernacular Japanese papers publish dispatches from Seoul that the Korean court has ordered that the fortifications both there and at Yungpung be abandoned, but Russia will allow no interference. Several Japanese papers also publish dispatches that Russia is building forts at Yungpung, whither 500 troops were recently transported from Port Arthur.

Assistance Offered China.

LONDON, Nov. 4.—The Standard's Tientsin correspondent says the Viceroy of Kwangsi has telegraphed to Peking offering assistance in the event of hostilities against Russia. General Ma, with 2000 troops, has gone to Shan Hai Kwan. The Chinese government, says the correspondent, is greatly annoyed by the receipt of telegrams from Urya, saying Russian soldiers are stopping the Chinese traffic there and building forts.

No Guns Mounted at Yungpung.

LONDON, Nov. 5.—A Tokyo correspondent of the Times says that General Hatahara has now been courteously advised to Yungpung and given every facility by the Russian Commander. He reports that it is impossible to say that there is any fort there, as no guns have been mounted.

Russia and Japan About Agreed.

LONDON, Nov. 4.—The Russo-Japanese negotiations have not yet been completed, but from the dispatches received today, the British government believes a satisfactory decision will very shortly be reached.

TUMULT IN HUNGARIAN DIET.

Opponents of Premier Continue Their Obstructive Tactics.

BUDAPEST, Nov. 4.—Count Steven Tisza's first appearance in the capacity of Premier before the lower house of the Hungarian Diet today showed the opposition is determined to maintain its obstructive tactics. The new Ministers waited two hours while opposition members made speeches on the subject of Count Apponyi's resignation of the presidency of the house. Finally Count Tisza demanded the Emperor's letter appointing him Premier to be read so that he could proceed with business. This was the signal for turbulent scenes. Count Tisza attempted to address the house, but in the tumult he could not be heard, and the sitting was suspended.

Premier Now Likely to Remain.

PARIS, Nov. 4.—It is said in official circles that the prospects of Premier Combes' decision to retire have been much reduced since yesterday. The Government and parliamentary leaders have been consulting, and the general feeling expressed is that it would be unwise to permit M. Combes' retirement at the present stage. M. Combes showed increased strength during the minor votes in the Chamber today, carrying the secret funds vote against the opposition by 24 to 22.

Venezuelan Case is Resumed.

THE HAGUE, Nov. 4.—After the interval of a month, the Venezuelan arbitration was resumed here today. By general consent the counter case of Venezuela, which United States Minister Bowen, through an oversight, failed to deposit in time, was admitted and arguments commenced. The Belgian agent, M. Woeste, contested the right of the blockading powers to demand the preferential treatment in the case of their claims against Venezuela.

Porte Absolutely Rejects Plan.

LONDON, Nov. 4.—The Constantinople correspondent of the London Daily Mail writes the Sultan has absolutely rejected every one of the proposals contained in the joint note of Austria and Russia, demanding that the Macedonian reforms be carried out under the direction and supervision of officials appointed by the two powers.

China Changes High Officials.

PEKING, Nov. 4.—Na Lung has been appointed president of the Foreign Office, succeeding the aged Wang Wen Shao, who is transferred to the Board of Revenue. The appointment of Na Lung is considered satisfactory by the powers.

Dreyfus Case is Revived.

PARIS, Nov. 4.—War Minister Andre, as a result of the inquiry which he has since transferred to the Board of Revenue, the sentence of the Rennes court-martial should be revised.

Complete Inspection of Fleet.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 4.—A dispatch from Port Arthur announces that Vice Admiral Alexiev has returned from Tientsin Wan, where he went to inspect the Russian fleet.

Disregard Strike-Board Award.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Nov. 4.—The board of conciliation appointed by the Anthracite Strike Commission has rebuked three companies which have not been obeying awards of the commission. Coke Bros. & Co., the Lehigh Coal & Navigation Company and the Bedell Bros. were asked by the secretary to explain the matter by letter. The collieries of the Lehigh Valley, Lehigh & Wilkesbarre, the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western and the Philadelphia & Reading Coal Companies, which have all been idle for a week, will resume work today.

AUTHORITIES MAY CLASH

WYOMING ASKED BY INDIAN AGENT TO RELEASE BUCKS.

He Holds Battle With Sioux Unjustifiable, but Governor Takes Different View.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Nov. 4.—There is a prospect of a clash between the Wyoming authorities and the Government over the Indian troubles. The Indian agent wishes Governor Chatterton to order the release of nine bucks held at Edgemont, S. D.

Governor Chatterton tonight received the following telegram: "Edgemont, S. D., Nov. 4.—Governor Chatterton, Cheyenne. From best information I can get, the killing of seven Indians in Converse County on last Saturday was totally unjustifiable. Indians were traveling on road with their families in wagons when fired into by Sheriff and posse. Ten Indians and their families under arrest here, and held by order of Sheriff of Converse County. To avoid any further trouble would recommend you order their release and allow them to return to agency. I will be responsible for them, and after an investigation, if any of them are wanted, will turn them over to proper authorities. They were arrested in Dakota by one of your Sheriffs."

"J. R. BRENNAN, United States Indian Agent."

In answer to this the Governor wired as follows: "J. R. Brennan, United States Indian Agent, Edgemont, S. D.: Your telegram received. You cannot expect Wyoming to waive right to conduct investigation as to violation of its laws. My information regarding killing differs from yours as stated. A legal investigation, in my judgment, is to the interest of your Indians."

HOLDS WHITES IN THE WRONG

Wyoming Indian Agent Says There Was No Need for Battle.

Washington, Nov. 4.—The Commissioner of Indian Affairs today received the following telegram from Indian Agent Brennan, who is at Newcastle, Wyo.: "Report of Indian trouble here exaggerated. From best information at hand, 35

miles north of Lusk a fight occurred between officers and some 20 Indians, some of them from Pine Ridge. Seven Indians, including one squaw, killed, also Sheriff and Deputy. About ten Indian families under arrest here; will start them for Agency tomorrow. In my opinion, a mistake was made in precipitating the fight. Would recommend that the United States Attorney of this district be directed to act on behalf of the department and make a thorough investigation. I am assured by officers of this county that no further trouble will occur."

The Indian office sympathizes with the view that the whites were the aggressors, and will recommend to Secretary Hitchcock that the Attorney-General have the affair investigated as recommended by Mr. Brennan.

Posse Brings in Indians.

EDGEMONT, S. D., Nov. 4.—A posse has reached here with nine bucks and a squaw of the party of Sioux that killed Sheriff Miller and Deputy Falkenberg, in Wyoming. They were captured on the Cheyenne River, near the South Dakota line. Other members of the band eluded the posse and escaped.

QUIET RUN CLOSES BANK.

Colorado Institution Is in the Hands of the Controller.

VICTOR, Colo., Nov. 4.—The First National Bank of this city, a controlling interest in which is owned by the Woods Investment Company, closed its doors shortly before 2 o'clock this afternoon. A notice was posted, stating the bank was in the hands of the Controller of the Currency. The bank's capital is \$50,000. The deposits amount to about \$300,000. A quiet run on the bank had been in progress for several days.

Cause of the Failure.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—The First National Bank of Victor, Colo., was closed today by direction of the Acting Controller of the Currency, the examiner reporting the bank to be insolvent. James R. Laaser, National Bank Examiner, has been appointed receiver. The bank was organized in September, 1900.

The failure, the Acting Controller states, is due to losses sustained by reason of excessive accommodations extended to mining interests, with which the officers of the bank were connected.

The statement of the resources and

liabilities of the bank on September 3, 1903, the date of the last report of condition made to the Controller, shows loans and discounts of \$221,782; cash and cash items, \$53,114; deposits, \$304,342.

Bank's Funds Are Missing.

OKLAHOMA CITY, O. T., Nov. 4.—Upon opening the safe of the Bank of the Chickasaw Nation, at Tahlequah, which closed its doors last week, Receiver Foster found but \$50, which was in silver. It is supposed that President Kirby Purdon, who disappeared at the time of the failure, took the funds with him. The bank was the official depository of the Chickasaw Nation, and had a capital of \$50,000, with large private deposits. Governor Mosley is one of the directors.

Iowa Bank Forced to the Wall.

SHELDON, Ia., Nov. 4.—The Sheldon Bank closed its doors today, and will go into the hands of a receiver. Officers from the bank assign the cause of the failure to the slow payment of notes by farmers for the past two years.

Judge Gaynor, of Shelby, on application of the stockholders, appointed W. R. Ady receiver of the bank. The assets are about \$225,000; liabilities about \$175,000.

ST. LOUIS HAS EARTHQUAKE.

Series of Distinct Shocks Felt in High Office Buildings.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 4.—This city and vicinity experienced a decided earthquake or series of shocks at 12:30 this afternoon. There is a difference of opinion as to how many. The earthquake was perceptible all over the city, and was mostly felt in the high business blocks in the downtown section of the city. One occupant of a high building said his chandelier swung three inches. The movement was from east to west.

A message from Louisiana, Mo., says that a perceptible shock was felt there about the same time.

Reports from Clarksville, 16 miles south, say the quake was plainly felt there. No damage resulted here from the shock.

Felt in Memphis.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Nov. 4.—A distinct earthquake shock was felt all over Memphis this morning. No damage was done, but in a number of instances tenants in high buildings hastened to the streets.

Another distinct shock occurred at 1:15 P. M. Reports from surrounding towns tell of earthquake shocks but no serious damage is reported. The vibrations were felt as far south as Grenada, Miss.

Slight Shock at Louisville.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 4.—A slight shock of earthquake was felt here this afternoon, but no damage was done.

Drops Dead at the Polls.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Dr. E. C. Angell, who had practiced medicine in New York 40 years and was well known as a writer for medical magazines, dropped dead at his polling-place in Brooklyn as he was about to take his ballot to the booth. Dr. Angell was 81 years old and retired five years ago from active life. He had been a Republican partisan since the formation of the party, and told his family before leaving home that he intended to scratch his ticket for the first time in 50 years and vote for Controller Groat.

Trust Company Assigns.

PUEBLO, Colo., Nov. 4.—The Pueblo Title & Trust Company, of this city, the principal stockholder in which is the Woods Investment Company, has announced a voluntary assignment for the protection of its depositors. Sufficient cash to meet a run that was considered inevitable after the suspension of the First National Bank at Victor could not be raised at once. Secretary Small, of the Company, announces that the deposits are \$250,000 and the assets are \$150,000.

Six "Allies" Warrants for Beavers.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—The Supreme Court of the District of Columbia has issued six "allies" bench warrants for the arrest of George W. Beavers, formerly chief of the salary and allowance division of the Postoffice Department. The action is based on indictments recently returned against Beavers.

Order Steel Bars From America.

LONDON, Nov. 4.—Tinsmiths in South Wales, belonging to the new port, Swansea and Llanelly mines, have ordered 100,000 tons of steel bars from the United States Steel Corporation. It is announced. The price is given at \$30 a ton.
