

HEINZE GETS GO

Amalgamated Gets All His Butte Holdings.

HE WILL BE THEIR MANAGER

End of Tie-Up of Copper Properties Is in Sight.

THE LEGISLATURE WILL MEET

Bill to Be Introduced to Allow Removal of Mining Cases From Courts of Judges Alleged to Be Prejudiced.

BUTTE, Mont., Nov. 6.—(Special.)—A report late tonight, apparently based upon the very best authority, indicates that the settlement of the long and bitter copper war between P. Augustus Heinze and the Amalgamated Copper Company is in sight and resumption of the latter's mines and smelters is not far distant.

According to information tonight Heinze has sold out his entire Butte holdings, with the exception of a small interest, and he will act as the Amalgamated Copper Company's manager of all its mines and smelters.

The price paid by the Amalgamated, or price it is to pay, could not be ascertained. President William Scallan, of the Amalgamated Company, and representative of the Amalgamated, refuses either to affirm or deny the report. He declared that such was possible, though if the settlement had been effected with Heinze by the Amalgamated officials in New York he was not aware of it.

Upon the most reliable statements made by the Amalgamated people it is understood that Governor Toole will call an extra session of the Legislature within the next week, that a fair trial bill of the Amalgamated Copper Company may be enacted. By this bill the Amalgamated will be able to remove trial of its mining cases from Judges alleged to be prejudiced or biased.

COUNSEL HAVE MORE TILTS.

Ship-Trust Hearing Is Still Confined to Nixon's Testimony.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Lewis Nixon was again the center of the stand at the hearing this afternoon on the application to make permanent the receivership of the United States Shipbuilding Company, the session being marked by frequent tiffs between counsel, at times verging on personalities. Mr. Guthrie and Mr. Untermyer each making the flattest of denials of statements made by the other, and Mr. Guthrie speaking in addition of the "impertinence" of Mr. Untermyer.

Mr. Schwab was not reached as a witness. Mr. Untermyer spending the afternoon in examining Mr. Nixon about the alleged false statements and misrepresentations to the public during the preliminary organization.

Mr. Untermyer asked Nixon about the agreement made between Mr. Nixon, Mr. Dresser and Mr. Schwab for the purchase of the Bethlehem plant. Mr. Pam, Mr. Nixon said, had been through the negotiations, and Charles M. Schwab, whose personal counsel Mr. Pam is, was regarded as the dominant figure in the negotiations. Mr. Nixon declared that when the mortgage covering the plant of the Bethlehem plant was drawn up at the time of the organization, he had merely glanced at it, but had not read it through carefully, having confidence in the men who prepared it, and being without expert knowledge of mortgage forms. The second mortgage, covering the Bethlehem plant, and a second mortgage on the other plants, was also merely glanced through by him, and he had only a general knowledge of its provisions, knowing, however, by it it should have equal voting power with the stock. The two mortgages he believed were presented to him for execution, the first by Alexander and the second by Mr. Pam. In each case, he thought, by men who executed them.

Insurance Company Sells Out.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—The Union Assurance Society of London has purchased the Scottish Alliance Insurance Company, Limited, of Glasgow, says a dispatch to the Journal of Commerce from London. The capital of the Scottish is \$500,000, in shares of \$10 each. The price paid by the Union was about \$550 a share. The Scottish Alliance did some surplus mine business in the United States.

CLUBS MAN WHO TAKES HIS JOB

Engineer Then Returns Home and Commits Suicide by Shooting.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—After murdering by shooting a man who had taken his old job in a brewery at Clinton, Staten Island, Richard Reich went home and shot himself to death. Five minutes later the police were beating at the door. Reich recently quit his place as engineer at the brewery, but went back and, after quarreling with Lewis Anderson, who had taken the job, killed him with a heavy club. Anderson lay as though dead. Reich went to his home and said he was going to bed. A few minutes later his wife heard a shot. She found her husband dead, with a bullet hole in his temple. The police arrived immediately afterward, having found Anderson and learned of the assault. The wounded man will probably die.

WARSHIP STOPS LINER.

Santo Domingo Will Not Allow Vessel to Enter Two Ports.

SANTO DOMINGO, Sunday, Nov. 1.—A Dominican warship stopped the Clyde line steamer Cherokee at the latter's near Puerto Plata, and informed the captain that he could not enter that port. The Cherokee then proceeded for Samana, and was also prevented from entering that port, the Minister of War ordering the captain of the Cherokee to proceed direct to the capital.

On the arrival of the vessel here, the government demanded that the cargo intended for Puerto Plata and Samana be landed at this port. The agent of the company and the captain of the Cherokee refused to comply with the demand. When the Cherokee was ready to leave

for Azua, clearance papers were refused and it was again demanded that she land her cargo at this port.

Minister Powell wrote a sharp note to the government, demanding a permit for the Cherokee to depart. The government refused to allow a pilot to board the vessel, and Minister Powell then instructed Captain Archibald to take his ship out and proceed to Azua, keeping his cargo aboard and landing it at the ports of destination. The Cherokee left the harbor without a pilot.

GERMANY WILL SEND SHIPS.

San Dominican Situation Is Regarded as Serious.

MILLIONAIRE HEARD FROM.

E. L. Wentz, Who Has Been Missing, Is Camping in Kentucky.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Nov. 6.—A special to the Sentinel from Knoxville says: It is reliably reported that E. L. Wentz, the missing millionaire, has been located in the mountains of Kentucky on a camping tour with Northern friends.

ANOTHER VERSION OF STORY.

Wentz Held to Be a Captive and Asks Family to Pay Ransom.

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—A dispatch to the Tribune from Bristol, Tenn., says: Edward L. Wentz, the young Philadelphia millionaire, who mysteriously disappeared from his father's home at Big Stone Gap, Va., October 14, is alive and a captive in the Cumberland Mountains. A letter has just been received from him, addressed to his parents, in which he states he is well and asks that the ransom of \$100,000 demanded by his captors be at once paid, so he can get his freedom.

A strange, well-dressed man appeared at Big Stone Gap last Friday and was quired for the Wentz office, to which he was directed, and there had a talk with Dr. John S. Wentz, the father of the missing man. Dr. Wentz, the chief detective under whose directions the great search was being carried on in the mountains of Southwest Virginia and Eastern Kentucky. The strange man told them E. L. Wentz was still alive and for \$100,000 he would be delivered to his family. Dr. Wentz informed him that if he would bring back a letter from his son, or some evidence that his son was still alive, he would then consider the proposition. The man said he would do so, and that night left on a Louisville and Nashville train for Knoxville, Va., from which place he went into Stony Mountain.

The stranger has just returned to Big Stone Gap, bringing a letter from young Mr. Wentz himself. In his own handwriting assured his family he is alive, is being held captive and asks that they at once pay the ransom and effect his release. Dr. Wentz left here last night for Philadelphia.

When the negotiations are completed and Edward L. Wentz restored to his family cannot now be told, but it is known he is still alive, and negotiations for his release are being made.

Brother Denies the Report.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 6.—J. L. Wentz, brother of E. L. Wentz, the young millionaire of this city who disappeared in Southwest Virginia some weeks ago, arrived here today from Big Stone Gap, and denied there was any truth in the story that his missing brother had been held captive.

lapse and had to be supported to Mr. Crowe's carriage. She was Miss Clara Coffin, the beautiful daughter of Edward Coffin, the Standard Oil magnate and millionaire of East Orange, N. J., who had mysteriously disappeared from her home last Tuesday. Arriving at the home of Mr. Crowe, whose wife is a cousin of Miss Coffin, she told a most thrilling tale of being kidnapped.

"Tuesday morning while I was at the High School in East Orange," she said, "I met in one of the corridors a strange dark woman, with piercing eyes which she fixed on me. As my eyes met her glance I trembled from head to foot, but I escaped into a recreation room. Again as I was returning home from the school I met this woman on a street near my home. Again she transfixed me with her eyes, and I was powerless this time. She ordered me to go to my home, get some of my clothes in a grip, get what little money I had, and meet her at the depot. I could not refuse, and I followed her instructions implicitly.

"Somewhere over in Iowa I saw a time table and the name Omaha. I remembered my mother's knifemaker there, and later asked to go to the toilet-room. This was permitted and while there I wrote a telegram to Mr. Crowe and gave it to the porter who sent it for me. When the train stopped at Cedar Rapids to change engines there was another train just alongside. Our train waited a few minutes, and the other train began pulling out. I suddenly ran to the door of our train, and before the dark woman could see what I was up to, jumped from the train and onto the rear-coach of the moving train, which had gained considerable headway, and was away before the other people could stop me. I don't know what became of her and don't care. She never told me what she wanted with me and I have no idea."

Miss Coffin is still frequently hysterical tonight. She cannot describe her abductors further than that the woman was small and dark, and the man whom she says joined them later, was short and stout. They spoke French. An effort made to substantiate her story through the train crew failed because the trainmen are on a trip tonight. The town where Miss Coffin says she slipped out of the car is thought from her description to be Tama, Ia. She says she was too worried to make note mentally of the names and surroundings. No effort has been made to find the alleged abductors. The police discredit the girl's story.

Will Be Tried for Postal Robbery.

TOPEKA, Kan., Nov. 6.—Frank Martin, alias "Dutch," and Robert Mann, alias "Nebraska Doc," were brought to Topeka today from St. Joseph, and will be placed on trial in the Federal Court on the charge of robbing the postoffice at Morrill, Kan. They are said to be members of the organized gang of robbers who have been operating in Kansas and Nebraska. It is understood that the officers of the Burlington road were interested in the capture of the men, as they are charged with giving the road much trouble during recent years by robberies.

Pal of Pat Crowe Caught.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., Nov. 6.—Thomas Costello, alias Tom Murphy, an aged pal of Pat Crowe, the outlaw, was arrested here today. Costello confessed to participating in the kidnapping of young Cudaby, at Omaha. He says the man, Johnson, who is now serving time in Montana for train robbery, seized young Cudaby while he and Crowe waited at a little house on the outskirts of Omaha.

MAY AVERT STRIKE

Northern Colorado Mineowners Make Concessions.

MEN MODIFY THEIR DEMANDS

Situation in the Southern District Is Growing More Tense, and a Walkout Monday Now Appears Certain.

DENVER, Nov. 6.—The conference of the operators of the Northern coal fields with representatives of their employees came to a close tonight, with every prospect that a strike in that section will be averted. Mutual concessions were made, and the only thing at issue now is the question of an eight-hour day.

The matter of receding from that demand is to be submitted to the unions of the district, and the representatives of the men expressed the belief today that it would be agreed to. "We have abandoned all hope for a conference with the Colorado Fuel & Iron Company and the Victor Fuel Company, and the fight will be in full blast Monday, and will be waged to a finish. Colorado will be the battleground, but the interests of the miners in Southern Wyoming, Utah and New Mexico will be looked after."

National President John Mitchell will be on the ground. Commissioners are to be established in nearly every mining town, and Pueblo will be the commissary point. If any miners are ejected from the company houses these will be looked after by the National organization, which has an ample reserve fund to carry on the strike to a successful end. In reference to the nonunion miners, I will say if they refuse to obey the strike order and do not come out at present, weight will be brought to bear upon them to get to work."

The number of miners employed in the Southern Colorado field is about 12,000. Notices have been posted by the operators at all the mines in the Trinidad district ordering the miners to report for work as usual Monday morning or consider themselves discharged, never again to be employed there.

ASK FEDERATION TO END ROW

Ironworkers Are Anxious for Peace in New York.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—The convention of the American Federation of Labor,

which is to open next Monday in Boston, will be requested by the structural workers' officials to settle the troubles existing in the structural iron industry and bring about the signing of an arbitration agreement by the United House-Smiths and Bridgemen's Union and Iron League. The plan for appealing to the Federation was decided upon at a conference between the executive committee of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Ironworkers and the United House-Smiths and Bridgemen's Union in this city. The trouble, which has been continuous during the entire building season, threatened a few days ago to result in a general strike of ironworkers in many large cities.

Vote to Present Ultimatum.

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—By a vote of 254 to 133 the employees of the Chicago City Railway Company have endorsed a strike if necessary to enforce the demands of their union. The executive board will call upon the officials of the railway company with the ultimatum. The joint board of affiliated locals, representing all of the employees of the street-car company, will meet tomorrow night to consider the vote, and final action on whether or not a strike shall be called will be taken. Unless some concessions are made by the officials of the street-car company before that time, it now seems impossible to avoid a general strike.

Cigar Dealers to Fight Trust.

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—The Chronicle today says: The independent cigar dealers of the country have adopted a plan to secure \$200,000 a year with which to fight the trust. This plan will remain in effect until the independent dealers have accomplished some results, according to the statement last night of M. W. Duffey, chairman of the executive committee of the board of directors of the Cigar Dealers' Association of America.

Head of American Banking House.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—John C. Kane, head of the American Banking & Forwarding House, bearing his name and for many years agent of the North German Lloyd Steamship Line, is dead, says a Paris dispatch to the Herald. He was widely known among tourists. Mr. Kane underwent an operation for appendicitis at a sanitarium at Neuilly, October 27. The operation was completely successful and he was believed to be on the road to work.

To recovery, when aneurism of the heart suddenly ended his life.

Mr. Kane was buried in Paris, where he had lived many years.

SUICIDE WAS LONG PROMINENT

Captain Thompson Had Great Reputation as Skipper in Early Days.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—William H. Thompson, a sea captain, who committed suicide yesterday by drinking poison at his home near Bridgeport, Conn., as the result of domestic trouble, was commander of the White Star fleet of steamships 25 years ago, and at that time one of the best known and most popular sailing masters of the trans-Atlantic service. In 1872, when captain of the Britannic, he was given a medal by Congress for saving 19 lives. In 1877, with the same ship, he made the record for those days of a seven-day voyage and was presented with a silver service by the passengers, among whom were many prominent men. In 1901 he was arrested for forgery in connection with the affairs of Dr. R. C. Flower. The arrest grew out of an issue of bonds. Thompson quit the sea 20 years ago.

Concludes Argument of Britain.

THE HAGUE, Nov. 6.—Solicitor-General Finlay concluded his argument in behalf of Great Britain before the Venezuelan arbitration tribunal today, contending that the war was entirely justified, that all the documents showed it was only under the presence of blockade that Venezuela consented to guarantee the blockading powers 30 per cent of the customs, and that preferential treatment of the claims of the powers which took part in the blockade would in nowise prejudice the rights of the other powers.
