

TAKES THE MORMON

Salt Lake Police Arrest Apostle Grant for Polygamy.

OWN WORDS CAUSE TROUBLE

He Donates \$50 to the Utah University Alumni and the Same Amount for Each of His Two Wives.

SALT LAKE, Nov. 10.—A warrant was sworn out today charging Robert J. Grant, one of the leading apostles of the Mormon Church, with unlawful cohabitation with Augusta Winters Grant and Emily Wells Grant, at the same time. The apostle was confined in 1898 of the same offense and fined \$500.

Prosecution of Mr. Grant is due in part to his public admission before the students of the Utah University on November 4 that he has two wives and that he donated to the alumni scholarship fund \$50 for himself and \$50 for each of his two wives.

The apostle was to have been accompanied to Europe, where he has been assigned to do missionary work for the Mormon Church, by his polygamous wife, Emily Wells Grant.

Railroad Has Suspect Released.

DES MOINES, Nov. 10.—Detective McLaughlin, of the Rock Island Railroad, has ordered the release of James Murphy, the suspect, captured near Earlham, and supposed to have been implicated in the dynamiting plot to hold up the road for \$1000. The stranger, who was shot near the same place, is recovering, but still refuses to talk. The road has issued danger orders to its trainmen, indicating that danger is still anticipated.

Ex-Bank Cashier in Trouble.

NEWARK, O., Nov. 10.—Harry J. Hooper, formerly cashier of the People's National Bank, of this city, was placed under arrest today by a Deputy United States Marshal, on a warrant charging him with having made a false entry in the books of the bank. The accused was permitted to waive examination and give bond of \$10,000 for his appearance, pending action by the United States grand jury.

Pleaded Guilty to Peonage.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Nov. 10.—L. A. Green, William Joiner, L. L. London, J. McDaniel and F. M. Pruitt, of Dadeville, pleaded guilty today to charges of peonage and each was fined \$1000. Sentence was suspended in each case.

ALASKA LANDS WITHDRAWN.

Powell Cables Washington.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—The State Department tonight received a cablegram from Minister Powell, at Santo Domingo, dated at 4 P. M. today, reporting the situation at Santo Domingo to be extremely serious. The dispatch, it was stated, was the first which the department had received on the day since the disturbance began.

RUSSIA MUST YIELD TO JAPAN

Complete Acceptance of its Plan Only Sure Way to Get Peace.

TOKIO, Nov. 10.—There is a strong inclination in well-informed circles to doubt the pacific forecasts issued in Europe. It is believed that peace will only be made possible by Russia's complete acceptance of Japan's claims regarding Manchuria.

RENEW DEMANDS ON PORTE.

Powers Regard Objections to Reform Trifling.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 10.—Austrian and Russian Ambassadors have renewed their demands on the Sultan. In an official communication today, they notified the Sultan that his objections to the original demands for a mixed commission to supervise the reforms in Macedonia are trifling, and their governments see no reason for changing their demands.

No Ban on American Tobacco.

BERLIN, Nov. 10.—The War Ministry authorized the Associated Press to deny the report published by a news agency in the United States yesterday that the Ministry for War had prohibited the sale in the German Army and Navy of cigars and cigarettes of the American Tobacco Company, and that only German goods would be allowed to be sold.

Russians Leave Corea.

LONDON, Nov. 11.—A dispatch to the Daily Mail from Tien-Tsin says that Russian soldiers in Corea have been withdrawn.

Gazetted Ambassador to America.

LONDON, Nov. 10.—Sir Mortimer Durand has been gazetted British Ambassador at Washington.

CHILE TO REPRESENT HER.

Will Look After Colombia's Interests Pending a Settlement.

HAVANA, Nov. 10.—It is reported here that Chile has accepted the request of the Colombian government to look after that country's interests pending the settlement of the controversy over the recognition of the Republic of Panama by the United States. Walker Martinez, the Chilean Minister to the United States, who has been here for some time, left hurriedly today for the United States. Before sailing, he conferred with the German minister to Cuba, the Spanish charge d'affaires, and the Colombian consul-general. He declined to be interviewed regarding the developments in Panama and would not confirm the report that he will represent Colombian interests during the period that diplomatic relations are severed between that country and the United States.

TRAIN RUNS DOWN STREET-CAR

Two Persons Are Killed and a Number Hurt, Five Seriously.

EASTON, Pa., Nov. 10.—A freight train on the Bangor and Portland branch of the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western Railroad ran down a trolley car on the North American traction trolley line at Ackermanville, 10 miles from here, tonight. Two persons were killed and a number hurt, five of the latter seriously. The dead: JAMES THOMAS, policeman, Bangor. LEONORA DIOGIO, Rosata. The most seriously injured are: Mr. and Mrs. Pasquale Diorio, Theresa Diorio, of Rosata, father and sister of the dead girl; William Chaplin, Joseph Kern, engineer and head brakeman of the freight train, both of Nazareth.

Strike Left to Mass Meeting.

CHICAGO, Nov. 10.—The difficulties between the management and the employees of the Chicago City Railway Company have been referred by the men to a mass meeting of all employees to be held tomorrow night.

First Snow at Salt Lake.

SALT LAKE, Nov. 10.—This city is experiencing the first snow of the season. The downfall has continued since early last night. The temperature has fallen considerably.

SURPRISE ON STRIKE

Colorado Mineowners Did Not Expect It Be So Great.

NOR DID THE LABORING MEN

Governor Will Not Send Militia to the Scene, as All Is Orderly, but Has Adjutant-General to Make Inspection.

DENVER, Nov. 10.—The tieup in the Colorado coal fields in consequence of the strike order issued by John Mitchell, president of the United Mineworkers of America, is more extensive than operators had anticipated or union leaders expected. In Las Animas County, the principal battle ground, the union leaders assert that only 100 of the 700 men employed by the various companies were working today.

The operators, however, declare that they still have about 1000 men in the mines. In Huerfano County are 1800 miners, of whom more than 500 are already on strike and the leaders are confident they will succeed in inducing the remainder to come out. Practically all the 1700 miners in Fremont County are idle.

In the northern field 1500 miners are on strike and about 400 are working on small independent properties at which all the demands of the men have been conceded. In Western Colorado about 1000 miners are working, but organizers are busy among them.

Union leaders at Trinidad say 80 per cent of the miners in New Mexico have gone out. In Wyoming and Utah the strike has not yet become effective.

No violence or disorder has been reported anywhere in the coal regions. After a conference lasting until after midnight, Governor Peabody announced that no troops would be sent to the coal fields today. Adjutant-General Bell is now in Trinidad investigating conditions.

The Colorado Fuel & Iron Company has notified all married men in its employ that they will be evicted from the company dwellings by Friday morning if they fail to return to work.

William Howells, district president of the United Mineworkers, said today that since the strike was ordered more than 2000 members had been added to the union.

DYNAMITE UNDER PLANT.

Strikers Believe It Was Put There So Militia Could Be Called Out.

TRINIDAD, Colo., Nov. 10.—Dynamite was exploded this morning under the electric light and power house at Hastings, 20 miles north of Trinidad. One corner of the house was blown out, but the machinery was not damaged to any great extent. Although information is meager it is understood that the dynamite was not placed correctly, and as a consequence very little damage was done. At the strikers' headquarters it is claimed that the dynamiting was not done by strikers, and that the purpose probably was to have militia ordered to the camp. It was rumored here that the superintendent of the Hastings mine had been shot and seriously injured, but this could not be verified.

Little Damage Is Done.

TRINIDAD, Colo., Nov. 10.—Sheriff Clark returned tonight from Hastings where he investigated the attempt to blow up the power-house of the Victor Fuel Company, and stated that no damage was done except the breaking of a few windows in the building. Eight extra deputies have been put on guard and no further trouble is anticipated. Miners have arrived here in droves today from the various camps.

More Mines Are Closed.

DENVER, Nov. 10.—A special to the Republican from Glenwood Springs, Colo., says all the mines in that district, except the Midland, closed today. The Midland, which belongs to the Rocky Mountain Fuel Company, has 28 men working, but some of these are union men and may yet come out. The Colorado Fuel & Iron Company's mines at Spring Creek, South Canon and Newcastle are all closed. The strikers here number between 300 and 400. A dispatch from LaFayette, Colo., the principal camp of the Northern Colorado district, says none of the small independent mines which were reported working yesterday are operating today.

Railroaders Move to End Strike.

PUEBLO, Colo., Nov. 10.—Railroad men of Southern Colorado are taking active steps to cause a calling off or at least a modification of the strike of coal miners. All the brotherhoods of railroad employees are to hold a mass meeting in this city Thursday evening and take action to bring influence to bear upon President John Mitchell and the other managers of the coal miners. So vitally interested are the five railroads in the strike that they have thousands of employees, in the coal transportation that the strongest possible effort will be made to bring about peace in some shape.

Guarantees All Full Right to Work.

SANTA FE, N. M., Nov. 10.—Governor Otero this afternoon issued a proclamation to the Sheriff of Santa Fe, Colfax, Rio Arriba, McKinley, Lincoln and Socorro Counties, in which the principal coal mines are listed, compelling them to preserve the peace at all costs and enforce the law guaranteeing to every man the full right to work. There are 2500 coal miners in the territory.

Wyoming Suffers Little as Yet.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Nov. 10.—The coal miners' strike has not assumed any great proportions in Wyoming. At Rock Springs 30 drivers and coal-diggers walked out and mine No. 2 of the Sweetwater Company was closed. At Dietz 600 men walked out.

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—The most distinguished detective of the day, Superintendent William Melville, of Scotland Yard, is about to retire, says a cable dispatch to the Herald from London. Melville has had a wonderful career.
